Reasons for visiting courts: Of the Pakistanis or their relatives who have visited courts, the greatest proportion (32%) did it to resolve conflicts over land or property.

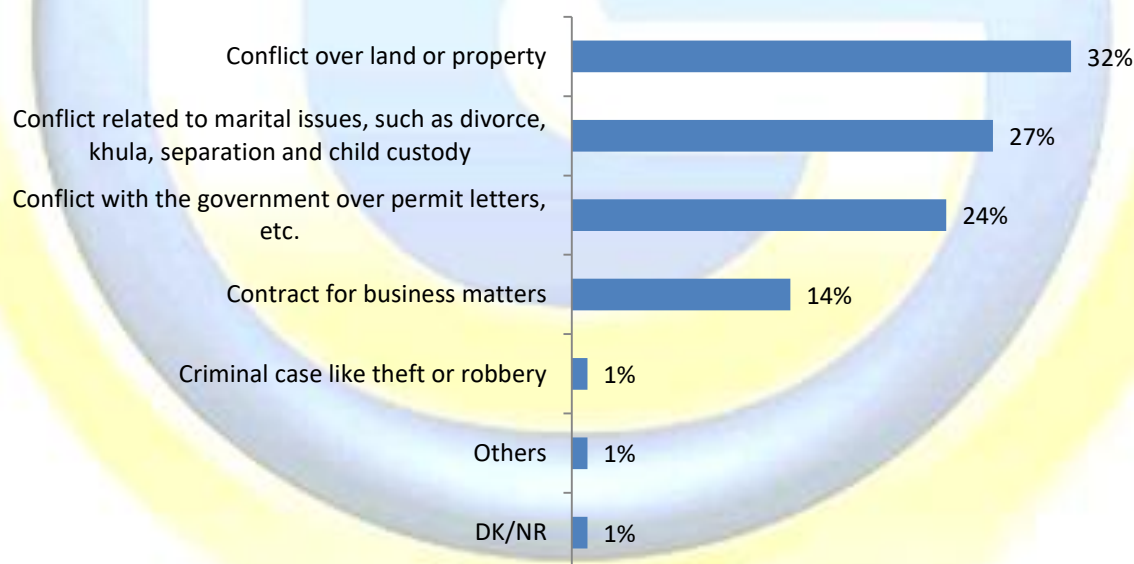

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, of the Pakistanis or their relatives who have visited courts, the greatest proportion (32%) did it to resolve conflicts over land or property.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces who have either themselves visited the courts or had a close family member do so, was asked, "Please tell us what was the nature of the fight or conflict due to which you or your family member had to go to the court?" In response to this question, 32% cited a conflict over land or property, 27% a conflict related to marital issues, 24% a conflict with the government over permit letters, license or property papers, 14% contracts for business matters, 1% criminal cases, 1% cited other reasons, while a further 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

It should be noted that these figures are based on people's perceptions. Perceptions can diverge from reality, especially when they concern another person (in this case, the respondent's relatives).

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 131 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during 5 November – 12 November, 2018. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level.
