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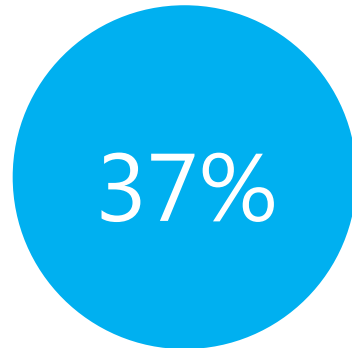

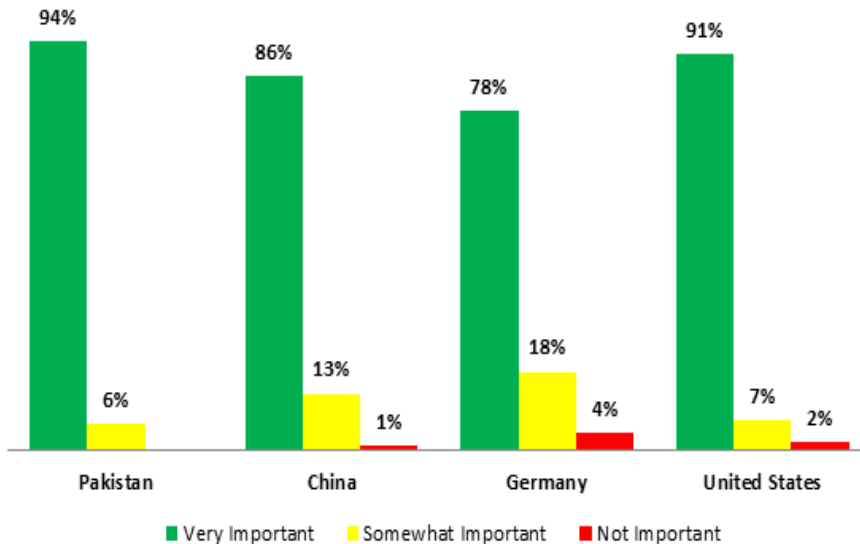

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 94% Pakistanis consider family to be very important in their life.

A nationally representative sample of adult men, from across the four provinces was asked **“Please tell us, how important is family in your life?”** Responding to this, 94% said very important and 6% said somewhat important. A similar survey was conducted in other countries. In China, 86% of the respondents considered family to be very important whereas 13% said it was somewhat important. 1% did not respond. In Germany, 78% said family is very important compared to 18% who said it is somewhat important and 4% who opined that it is not very important. When the same question was asked in the United States, 91% believed that family was very important, 7% said it was somewhat important while 2% said it was not very important.

This study was done as part of the World Values Survey Sixth Wave, conducted apart from Pakistan in 60 other countries. The study was released recently in Doha where Gallup Pakistan's Executive Director represented Pakistan. The survey was carried out among a sample of 1200 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during 30th January - 20th February, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately  $\pm 2-3$  per cent at 95% confidence level.

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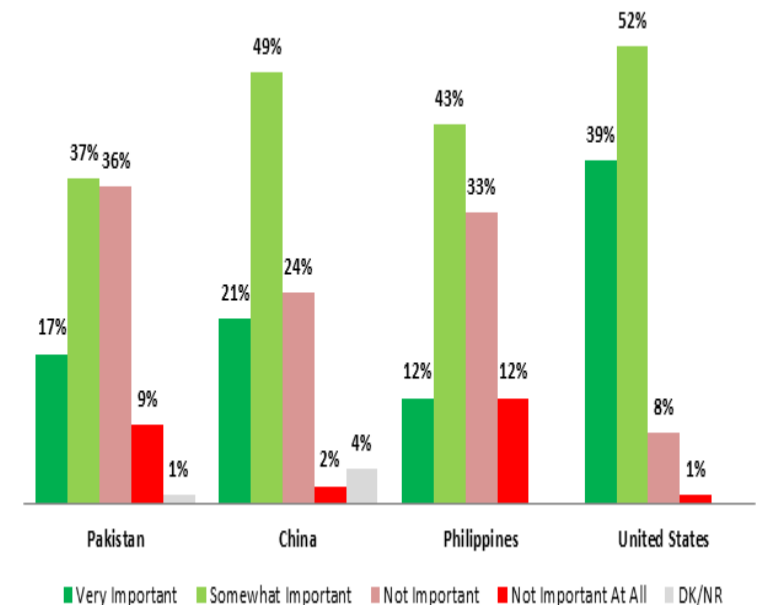

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 54% Pakistanis say leisure is an important part of their life; 45% consider it unimportant.

A nationally representative sample of adult men, from across the four provinces was asked **“Please tell us, how important is leisure in your life?”** Responding to this, 17% said very important, 37% said somewhat important and 36% said not important. 9% said it was not important at all and 1% did not respond. A similar survey was conducted in China, where 21% of the respondents considered leisure to be very important whereas 49% said it was somewhat important. 24% said it was not important, 2% said not at all important and 4% did not respond. In Philippines, 12% said leisure is very important compared to 43% who said it is somewhat important and 33% who opined that it is not important. 12% of the respondents said that leisure was not important at all. In the United States, 39% considered leisure to be very important, 52% said it was somewhat important while 8% said it was not important. 1% replied leisure was not important at all.

This study was done as part of the World Values Survey Sixth Wave, conducted apart from Pakistan in 60 other countries. The study was released recently in Doha where Gallup Pakistan's Executive Director represented Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1200 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during 30th January - 20th February, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately  $\pm 2-3$  per cent at 95% confidence level.



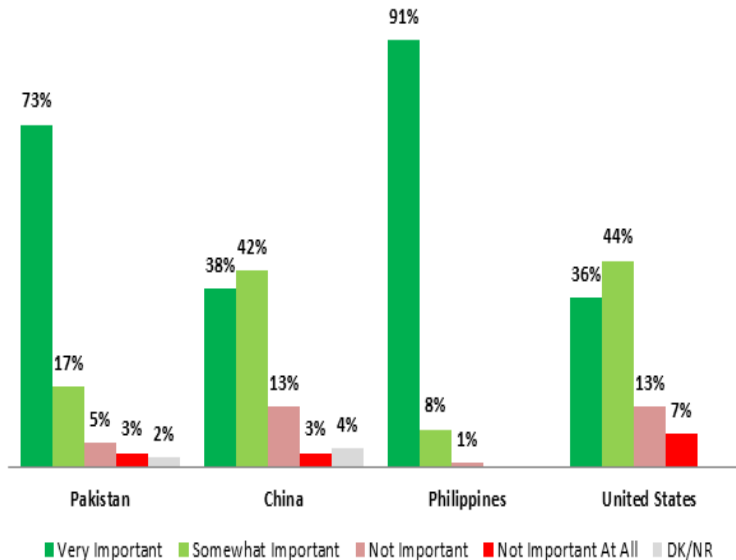

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked “Please tell us, how important is work in your life?” Responding to this, 73% said very important, 17% said somewhat important and 5% said not important. 3% said it was not important at all and 2% did not respond. A similar survey was conducted in China, where 38% of the respondents considered work to be very important whereas 42% said it was somewhat important. 13% said it was not important, 3% said not at all important and 4% did not respond. In Philippines, 91% said work is very important compared to 8% who said it is somewhat important and 1% who opined that it is not important. In the United States, 36% considered work to be very important, 44% said it was somewhat important while 13% said it was not important. 7% replied work was not important at all.

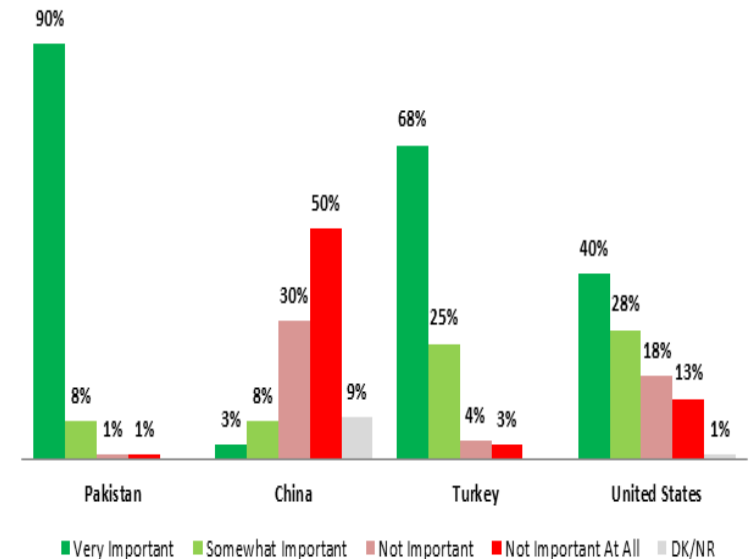

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked “**Please tell us, how important is religion in your life?**” Responding to this, 90% said very important, 8% said somewhat important and 1% said not important. A further 1% said religion was not important at all. A similar survey was conducted in other countries. In China, 3% of the respondents considered religion to be very important whereas 8% said it was somewhat important. 30% thought religion was not important and 50% said it was not important at all. 9% did not respond. In Turkey, 68% said religion is very important compared to 25% who said it is somewhat important and 4% who opined that it is not very important. 3% said not important at all. When the same question was asked in the United States, 40% believed that religion was very important, 28% said it was somewhat important while 18% said it was not very important. 13% considered it to be not important at all and 1% did not respond.

This study was done as part of the World Values Survey Sixth Wave, conducted apart from Pakistan in 60 other countries. The study was released recently in Doha where Gallup Pakistan's Executive Director represented Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1200 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during 30th January - 20th February, 2012. 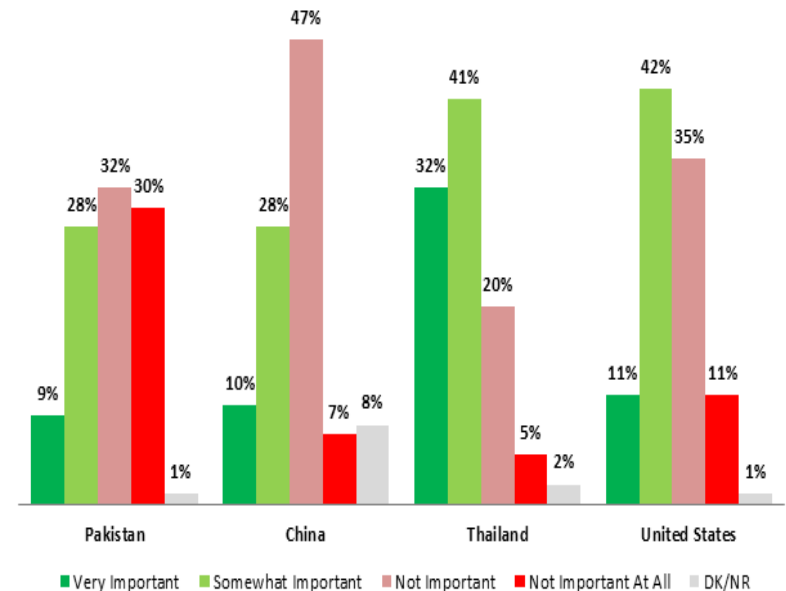

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 37% Pakistanis consider politics an important part of their life; 62% consider it unimportant.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked **“Please tell us, how important is politics in your life?”** Responding to this, 9% said very important, 28% said somewhat important and 32% said not important. 30% said it was not important at all and 1% did not respond.

A similar survey was conducted in United States, where 11% of the respondents considered politics to be very important whereas 42% said it was somewhat important. 35% said it was not important, 11% said not at all important and 1% did not respond. Similarly, in Thailand, 32% said politics is very important compared to 41% who said it is somewhat important and 20% who opined that it is not important. 5% said it is not important at all and 2% did not respond. When the same question was asked in China, 10% considered politics to be very important, 28% said it was somewhat important while 47% said it was not important. 7% replied politics was not important at all. 8% did not respond.

This study was done as part of the World Values Survey Sixth Wave, conducted apart from Pakistan in 60 other countries. The study was released recently in Doha where Gallup Pakistan's Executive Director represented Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1200 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during 30th January - 20th February, 2012.
