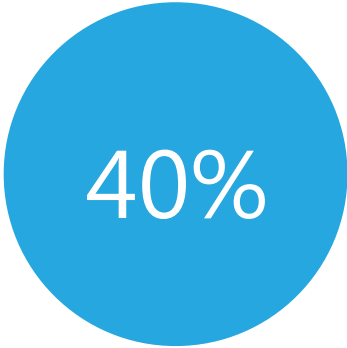

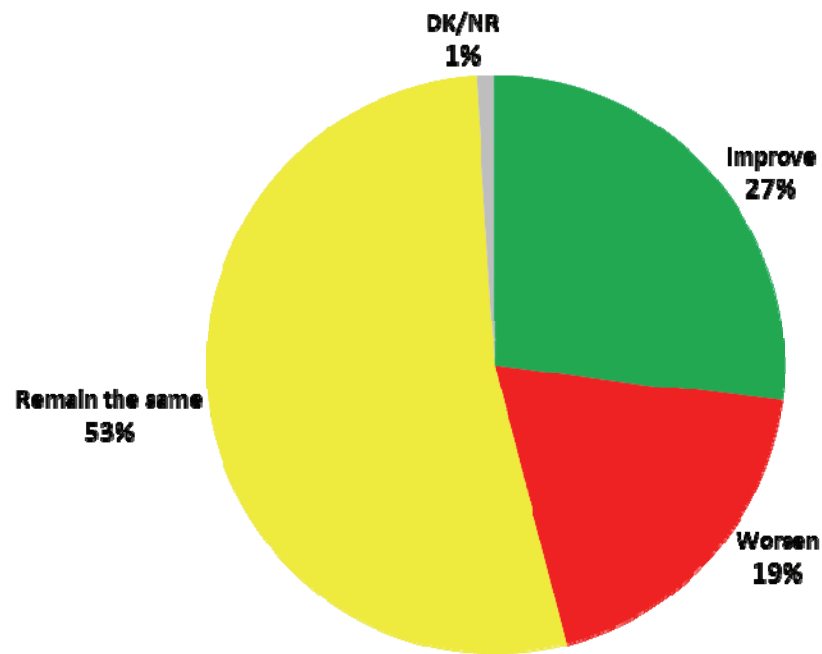

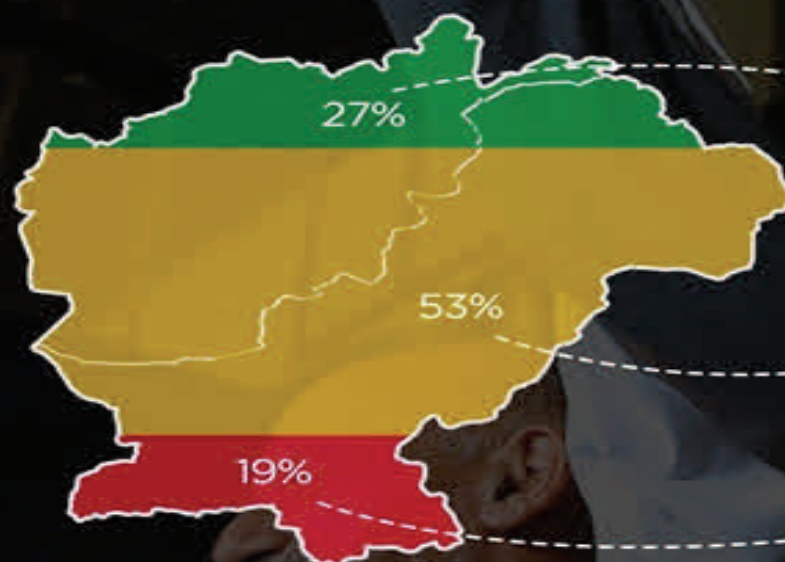

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 53% Pakistanis believe that Pak-Afghan relations will remain the same after the coming of the new President.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Think about Pakistan-Afghanistan relations, and tell us whether relations between the two countries will improve, worsen or will remain the same after the coming of the new president?” Responding to this question, 27% Pakistanis said relations will improve after the coming of the new president, 19% said relations will worsen, while 53% said relations will remain the same and 1% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2656 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 14 – July 21, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

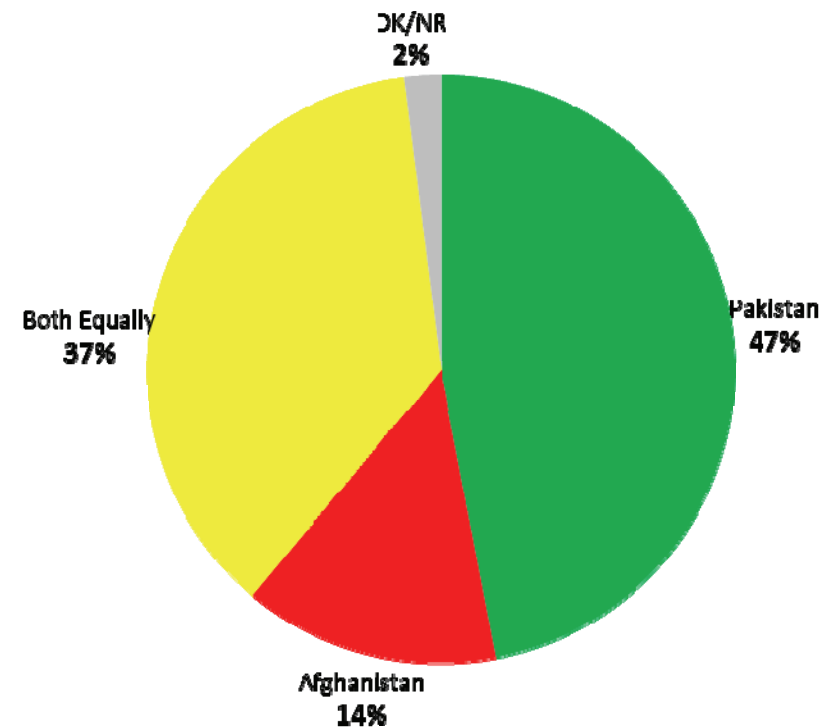

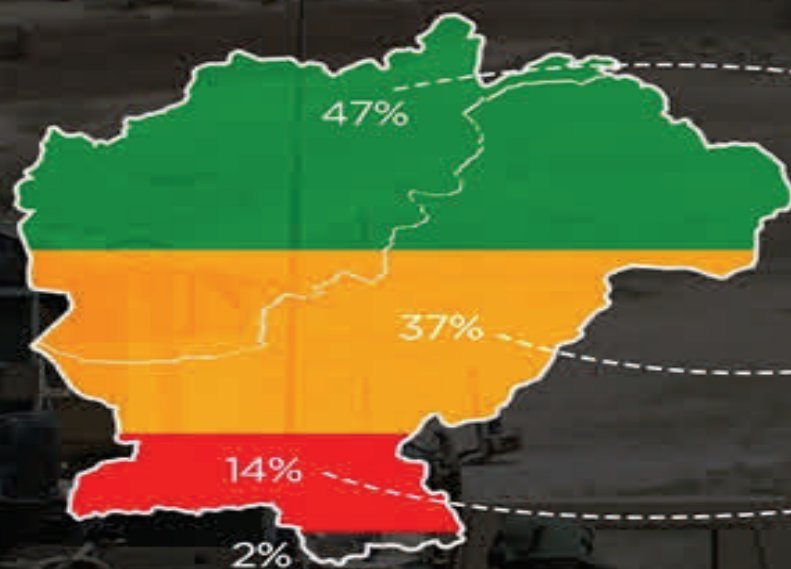
A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, has Pakistan or Afghanistan suffered more losses from terrorism? Has Pakistan suffered more, has Afghanistan suffered more or have both suffered equally?” According to the survey, 47% Pakistanis believe that Pakistan has suffered more losses from terrorism, 14% believe that Afghanistan has suffered more losses, while 37% believe that both have suffered equally. 2% of the respondents did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2656 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 14 – July 21, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

14% believe that **Afghanistan** has suffered more losses.

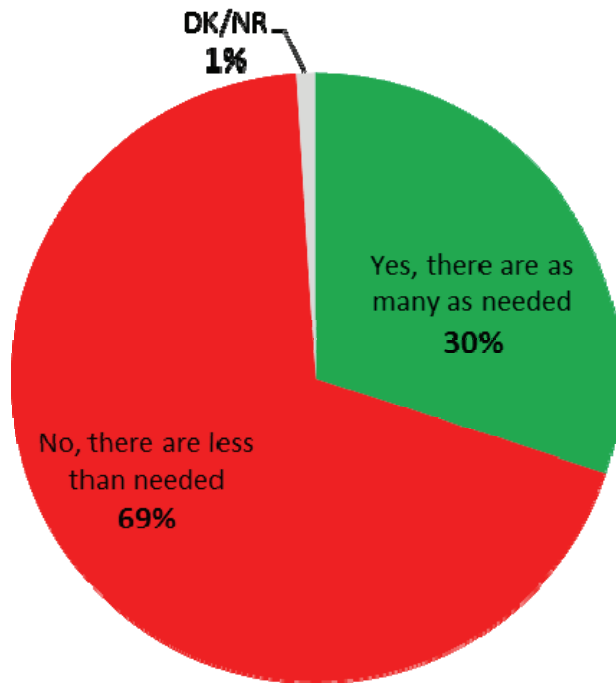

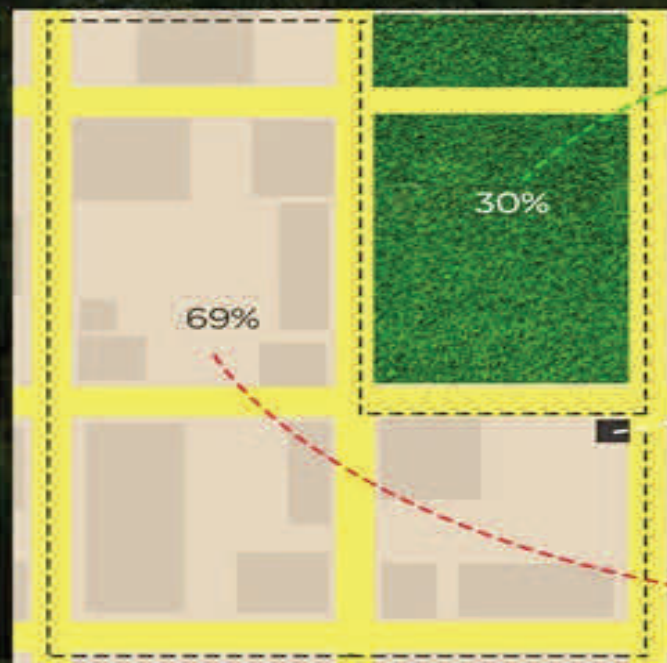
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 30% Pakistanis think there are enough parks in their city; 69% think there are less than enough.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, are there enough parks in your city as needed?” Responding to this question, 30% respondents said that there were as many parks as needed in their city, while 69% said that there were fewer parks than needed and 1% did not respond.

This question was asked once before in March 2013. The trend for public opinion on number of parks has not changed since then. In March 2013 as well, 30% respondents had said the number of parks was enough, 69% had said it was not enough and 1% had not responded.

The study was released by Gilani Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2698 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 07 – July 14, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

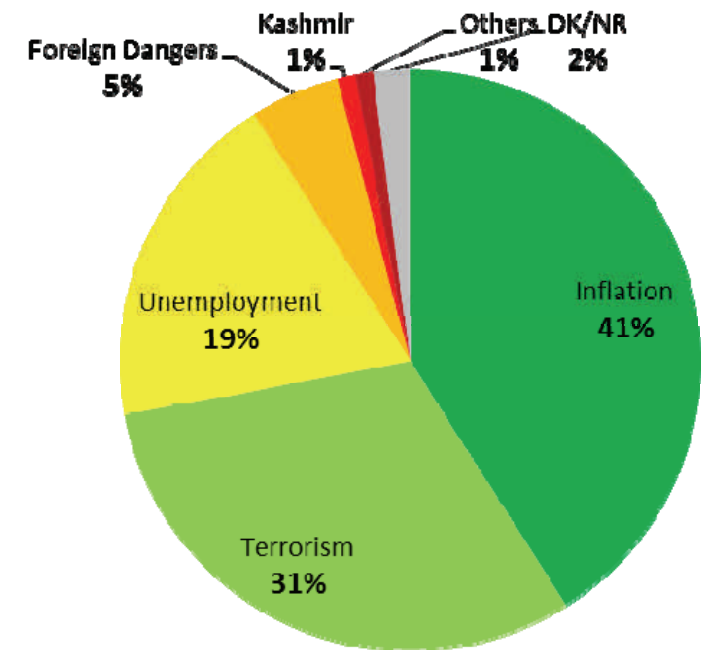
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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 41% Pakistanis think that inflation is the biggest problem of Pakistan at the moment.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, what is the biggest problem of Pakistan at the moment?” 41% respondents said inflation is the biggest problem of Pakistan at the moment, 31% think terrorism is the biggest problem, 19% think it is unemployment and 5% think foreign dangers are the biggest problem for Pakistan. 1% respondents believe Kashmir to be the biggest problem, while 1% named other problems and 2% did not respond.

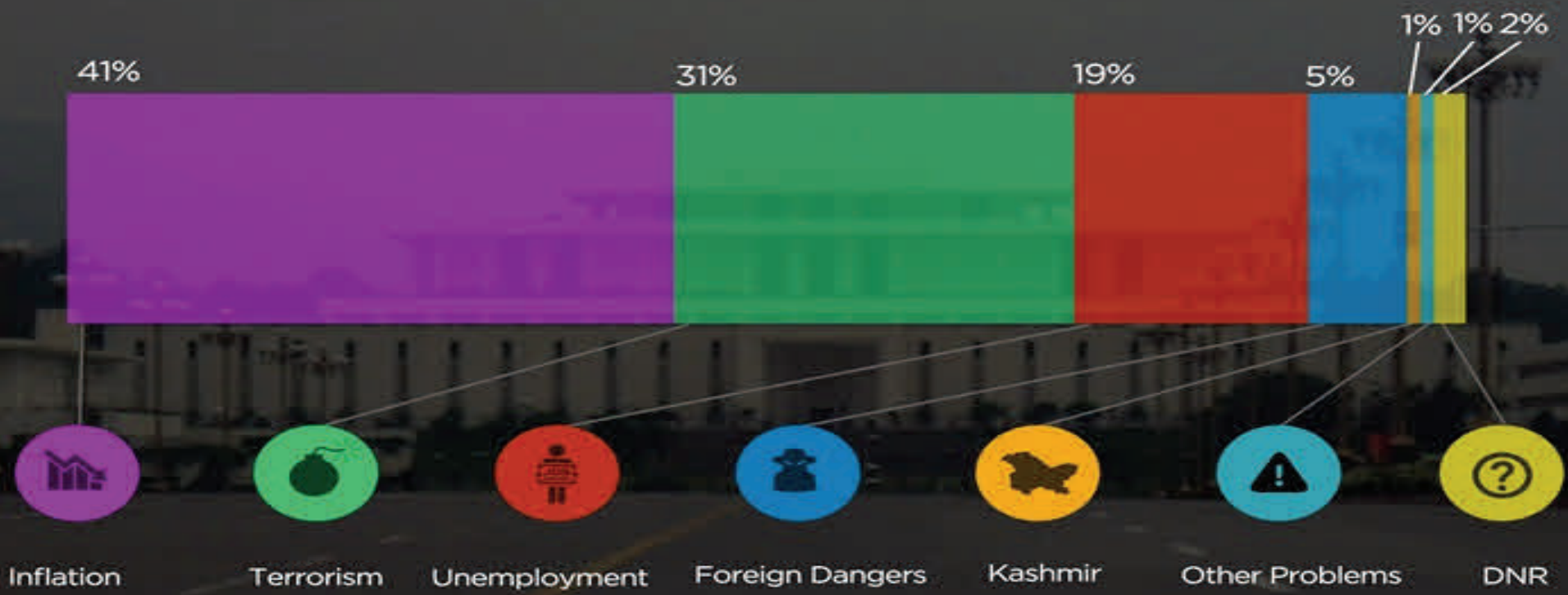
Inflation has always remained popular as the biggest problem facing Pakistan in earlier surveys carried out by Gallup Pakistan as well, getting the highest number of votes for this question from January 2010 to July 2014. In recent years, inflation has been voted as the biggest problem by 46%, 47%, 43% and 48% Pakistanis respectively in Oct 2012, Jan 2013, Jan 2014 and May 2014. Terrorism has remained an important problem in people’s perception as well, with 24%, 24%, 22%, and 21% Pakistanis rating it as the biggest problem during the same period. Employment has also remained steady with 20%, 18%, 26% and 21% of the votes during this period.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2656 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 14 – July 21, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

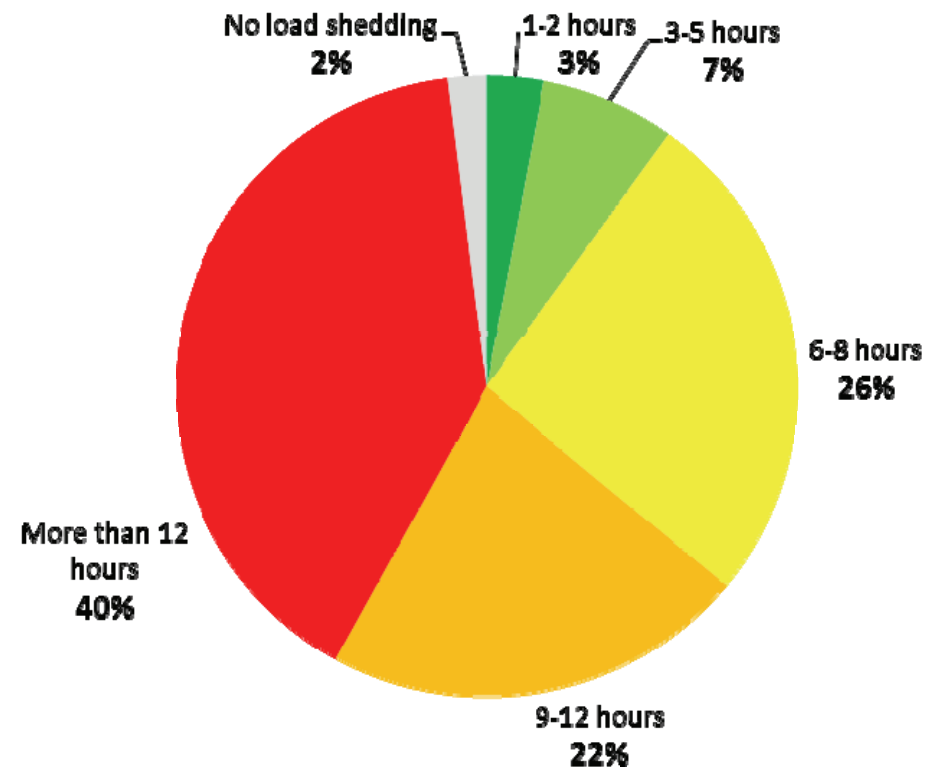

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 40% Pakistanis said the duration of load shedding in their area during Ramzan was more than 12 hours.

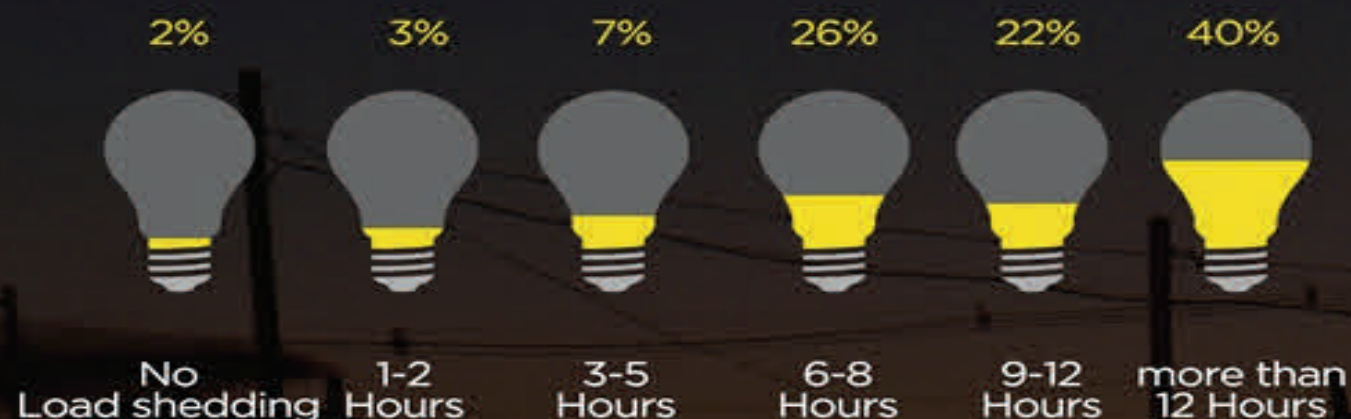
A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell us, what is the duration of load shedding in your area during the month of Ramzan?” Responding to this question 2% said there was no load shedding, 3% said there was 1-2 hours of load shedding and 7% said there was 3-5 hours of load shedding. 26% respondents said the duration of load shedding was 6-8 hours, 22% said it was 9-12 hours and 40% said it was more than 12 hours.

The study was released by Gilani Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2655 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 21 – July 28, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
