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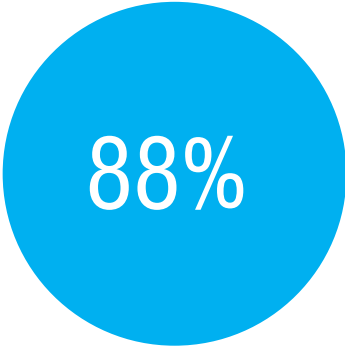

Pakistanis say in their household men are responsible for dealing with the bank.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 88% say in their household men are responsible for dealing with the bank.

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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, views are divided on whether the severity of winter has decreased (36%), increased (35%) or remained the same (27%) in the last few years.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, has the severity of winter increased, decreased or remained the same in the last few years?” Responding to this 36% said it has decreased, 35% said it has increased and 27% said it has remained the same. However, 2% did not give a response. Among the respondents who said the severity of winter has decreased, 39% were male and 34% were female and among the respondents who said the severity of winter has increased, 36% were male and 35% were female.

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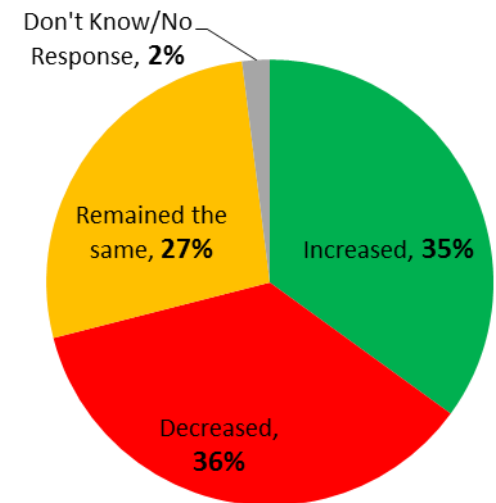
Views are divided on whether the severity of winter has decreased (36%), increased (35%) or remained the same (27%) in the last few years.

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Further, among the respondents who said the severity of winter has remained the same, 25% were male and 40% were female.

A similar question was asked in December 2012 in a Gallup Pakistan poll, the results of which showed that 33% think the severity of winter has increased, 29% think it has decreased and 37% think it has remained the same over the last few years.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2730 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 04, 2013 – February 11, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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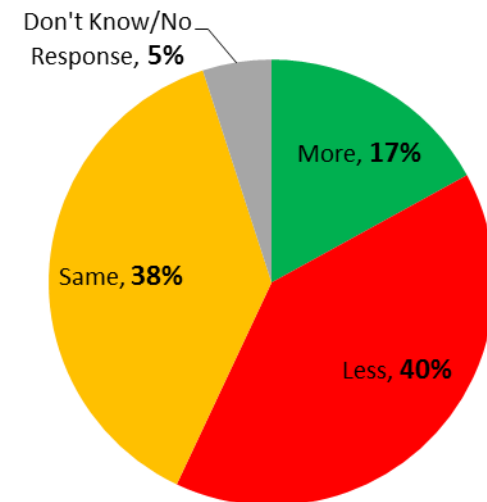

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked **“According to your information, was there less, more or same amount of rain this year in Pakistan?”** Responding to this 40% said less, 38% said the same amount of rain and 17% said more. However, 5% did not give a response.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2730 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 04, 2013 – February 11, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.



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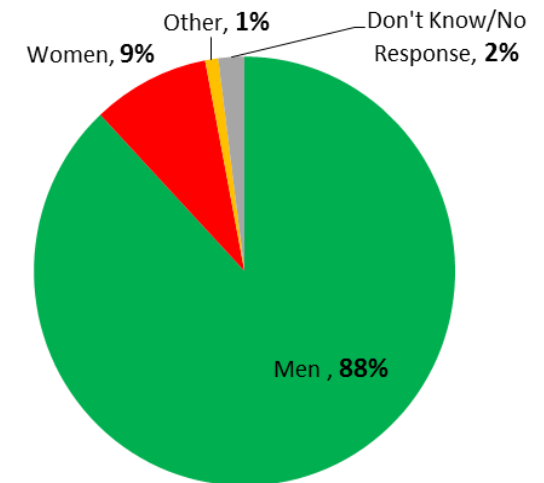
Gilani Research Foundation and Gallup Pakistan recently participated in a Global Poll coordinated by GlobeScan on environmental concerns of different nations; the results show that Pakistanis say the most pressing environmental challenge they have to face is acute shortage of fresh water (68%). 55% said automobile emissions, 46% said water pollution in rivers, lakes and oceans, 40% said loss of animal and plant species, 38% said depletion of natural resources, e.g. forests, farmlands & fish, 37% said air pollution in general and 36% said climate change or global warming due to Greenhouse

Effect.

The global findings are drawn from the GlobeScan Radar annual tracking poll of citizens across 22 countries. A total of 22,812 people were interviewed face-to-face or by telephone during the second half of 2012. Twelve of these countries have been regularly polled on environmental issues since 1992. Asked how serious they consider each of six environmental problems to be—air pollution, water pollution, species loss, automobile emissions, fresh water shortages, and climate change—fewer people now consider them “very serious” than at any time

since tracking began twenty years ago.

Climate change is the only exception, where concern was lower from 1998 to 2003 than it is now. Concern about air and water pollution, as well as biodiversity, is significantly below where it was even in the 1990s. Many of the sharpest falls have taken place in the past two years. The perceived seriousness of climate change has fallen particularly sharply since the unsuccessful UN Climate Summit in Copenhagen in December 2009. Climate concern dropped first in industrialized countries, but this year’s



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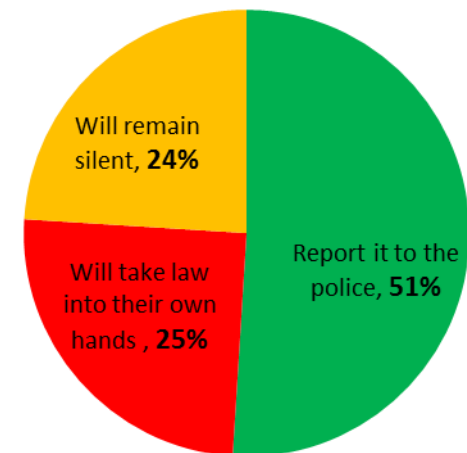

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Suppose someone treats you badly, for example if someone frauds or assaults you, what would be your most likely reaction in return?” Responding to this, 51% said they would report it to the police, 25% said they would take the law into their own hands and 24% said they would remain silent.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2677 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 18, 2012 – November 25, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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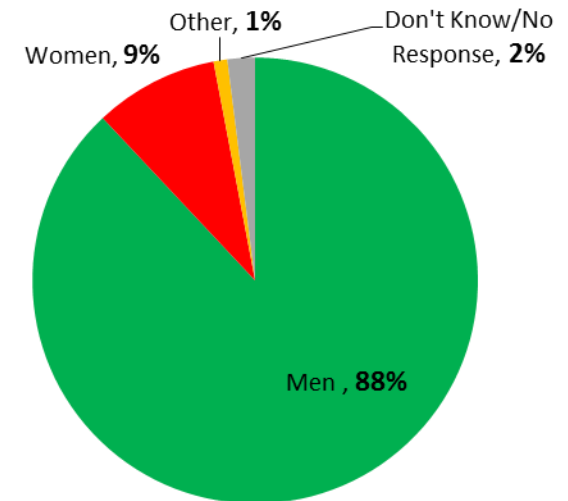

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 88% say in their household men are responsible for dealing with the bank.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked **“In some households, depending on the country, different errands are carried out sometimes by men and sometimes by women. In your household, who is responsible for dealing with the bank?”** Responding to this, 88% said men, 9% said women and 1% said other. However, 2% did not give a response.

The finding has important implications for the banking industry as it provides an insight about who the customer is. For policy makers, it is important to find out why there are so few women involved in dealing with the bank and if these hurdles can be resolved.
