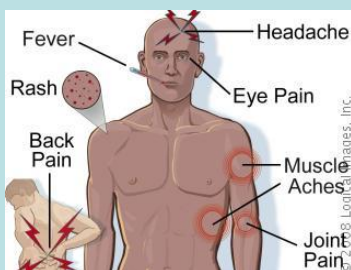

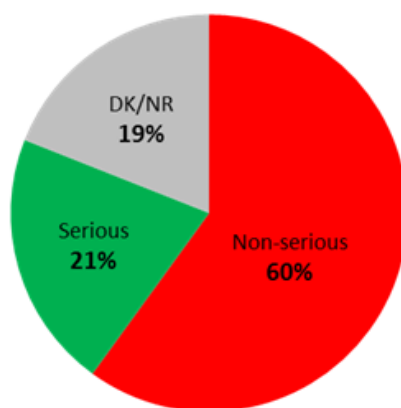

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, most Pakistanis (60%) are of the opinion that their political parties are not serious on re-drawing provincial boundaries and creating new provinces.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, are political parties serious on creation of new provinces or are they non-serious?” Responding to this, 60% of Pakistanis think that they are non-serious whereas 21% think they are serious. However, 19% did not give a view.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2685 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 29, 2012 – August 04, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

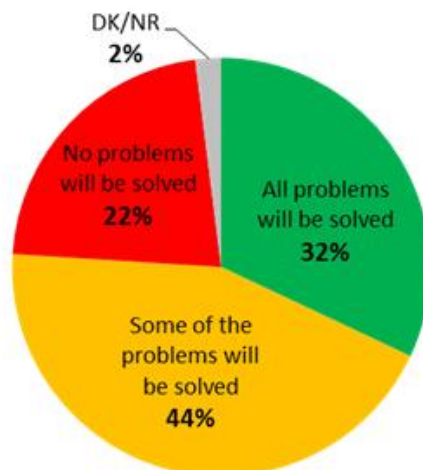

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, most Pakistanis are strongly (32%) or mildly (44%) hopeful about the ability of new provinces to solve popular problems.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, to what extent will the problems of the public be solved by creation of new provinces?” Responding to this, 32% believe that all problems will be solved, 44% believe some of the problems will be solved and 22% believe no problems will be solved. However, 2% did not give a response.

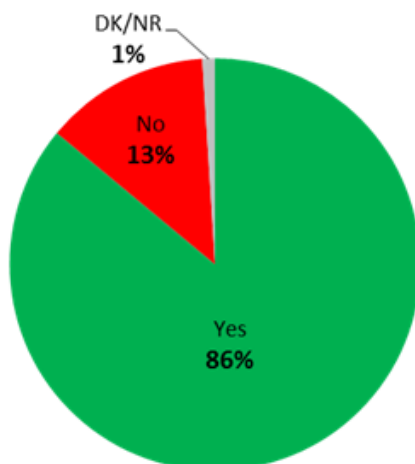

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, majority of Pakistanis (86%) have heard or read about Dengue virus in Pakistan and only 13% are unaware of it.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Have you ever heard or read anything about Dengue virus?” Responding to this, 86% of Pakistanis have heard or read about it and only 13% are unaware about it. However, 1% did not give a response.

Question: “Have you ever heard or read anything about Dengue virus?”



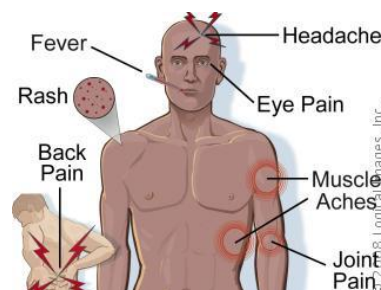
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The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2659 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during September 9, 2012 – September 15, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

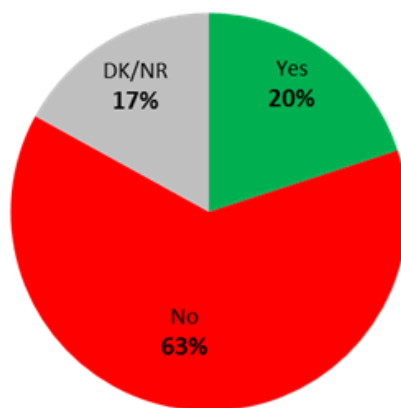

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 20% of Pakistanis suspect someone in their area or city has been ill due to Dengue Virus.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Has anyone in your area or city been ill due to Dengue Virus?” Responding to this, 63% of Pakistanis say no one in their area has been ill due to Dengue Virus while 20% say someone in their area has been ill due to it. However, 17% did not give a response. The survey reports on popular perceptions about what people suspect to be Dengue virus. These figures may be different from the actual incidence of those suffering from it.
