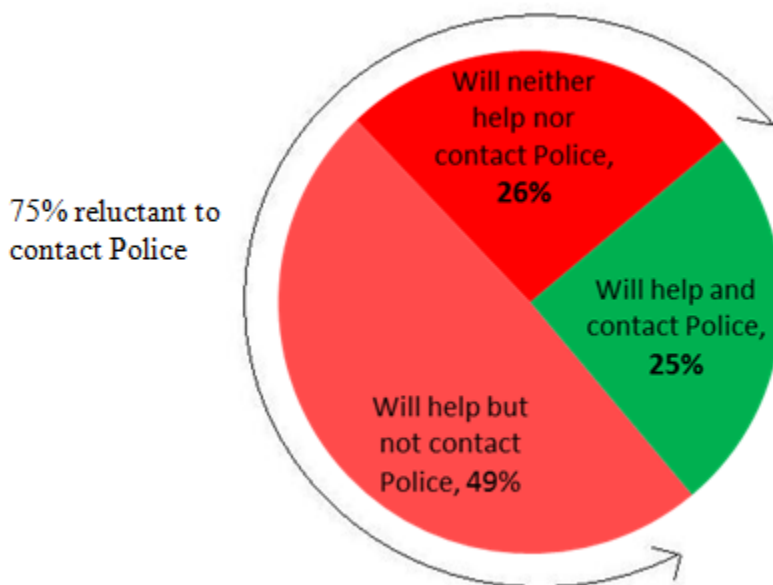

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 75% of Pakistanis reluctant to contact Police for help in Road accidents.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “God forbid, if you witness an accident on the road and a man is injured then what will you do?” Responding to this, 26% claim that they will quietly leave the accident site, 49% claim that they will help the injured person but will not go to police to report whereas 25% claim that they will help the injured person and will go to police to report the accident.

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The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2564 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 15, 2012 – July 21, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

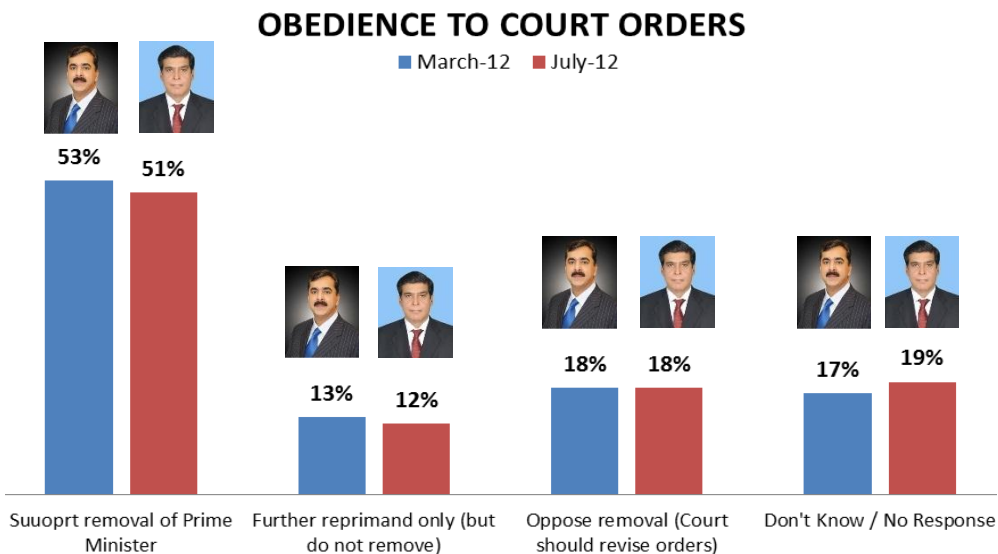
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 51% favor Prime Minister's Removal if he disobeys court orders; 12% recommend further reprimand; 15% favor revising court orders; 19% unable to answer.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "If Prime Minister Raja Pervaiz Ashraf does not obey the Supreme Court's order to write a letter to the Swiss Officials, what do you think should the Supreme Court do, remove the Prime Minister, further reprimand the Prime Minister but do not remove or court should revise its orders?" Responding to this, 51% favor removal of Prime Minister if he disobeys court, 12% believe further reprimand is required whereas 18% believe that the court should revise its order. However, 19% did not give a view.

Further analysis of Trend data shows that popular views on the subject are broadly similar to when the previous Prime Minister Yousaf Raza Gilani faced identical court orders.

Question: "If Prime Minister Raja Pervaiz Ashraf does not obey the Supreme Court's order to write a letter to the Swiss Officials, what do you think should the Supreme Court do, remove the Prime Minister, further reprimand the Prime Minister but do not remove or court should revise its orders?"



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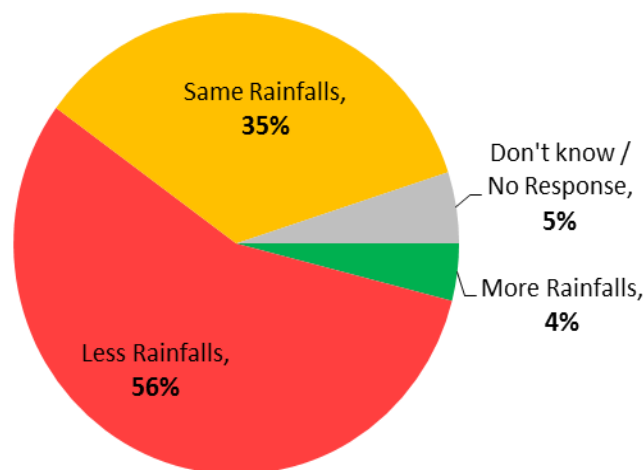

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 56% of Pakistanis believe that this year summer rains are less than the historic averages; 35% believe there is no difference.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "According to your view there was less rain, more or the same during this year in Pakistan?" Responding to this, 4% believe that there has been more rainfall compared to last year, 56% believe that the rainfalls have been less whereas 35% believe that there has been same amount of rainfalls as last year. However, 5% did not give a view.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2689 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 03, 2012 – June 09, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

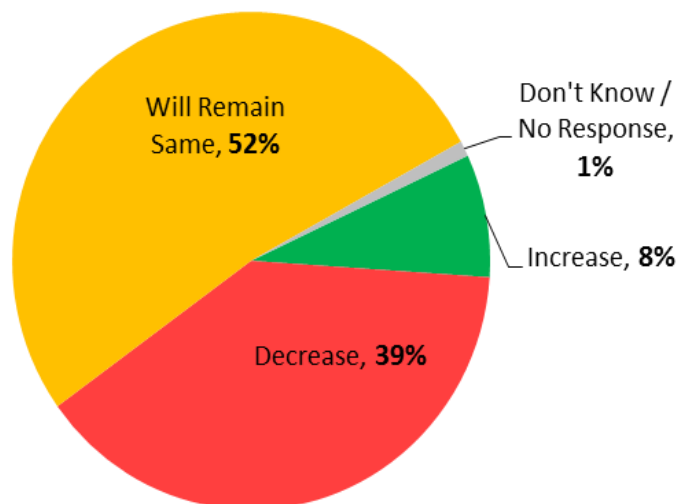

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 39% of Pakistanis say their personal incomes fall when summer rains are less than usual.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, will less rainfalls this year make any difference on your personal income?” Responding to this, 8% believe that their income will increase with fewer rainfalls, 39% believe their income will decrease whereas 52% claim that fewer rainfalls will have no effect on their personal income. However, 1% did not give a view.

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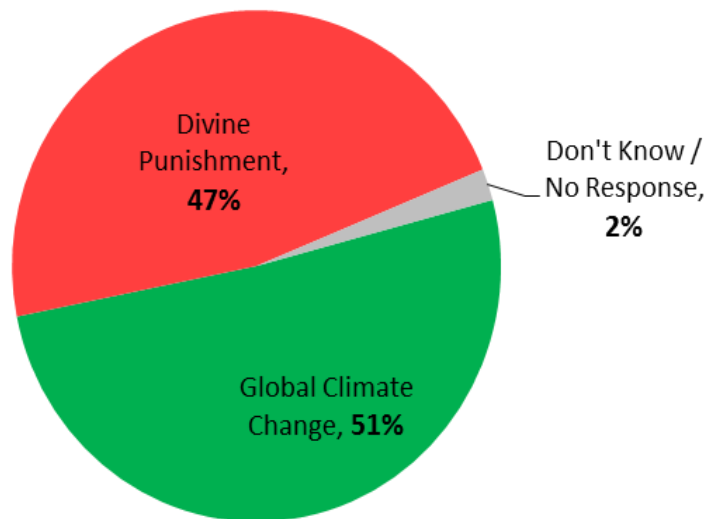

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 47% attribute shortfall in rains to divine punishment, 51% to global climate change.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your view, what is the main reason for less rainfalls: Divine Punishment or Global Climate Change?” Responding to this, 51% believe that global climate change is causing shortages in rainfalls whereas 47% believe that it is divine punishment. However 2% did not give a view.
