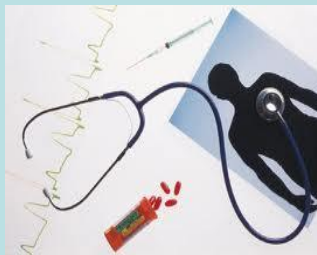

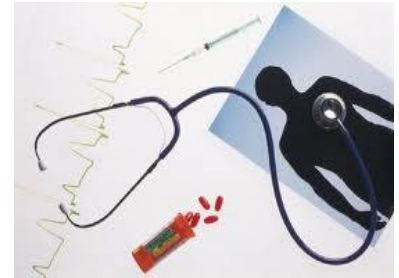
Gilani Research Foundation is a not for profit public service project to provide social science research to students academia, policy makers and concerned citizens in Pakistan and across the globe.

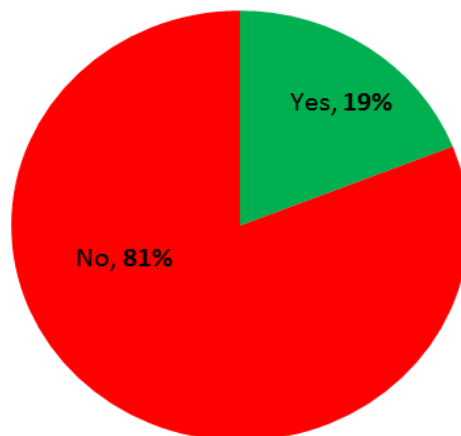

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 19% of Pakistanis say they have been admitted to a hospital or medical facility at least once in their life.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Have you ever been admitted to a hospital or not?” Responding to this, 19% say they have been admitted to a hospital whereas 81% say they have never been admitted.

Question: “Have you ever been admitted to a hospital or not?”

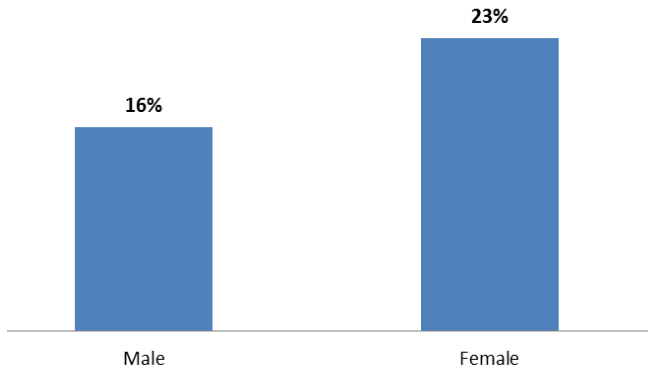
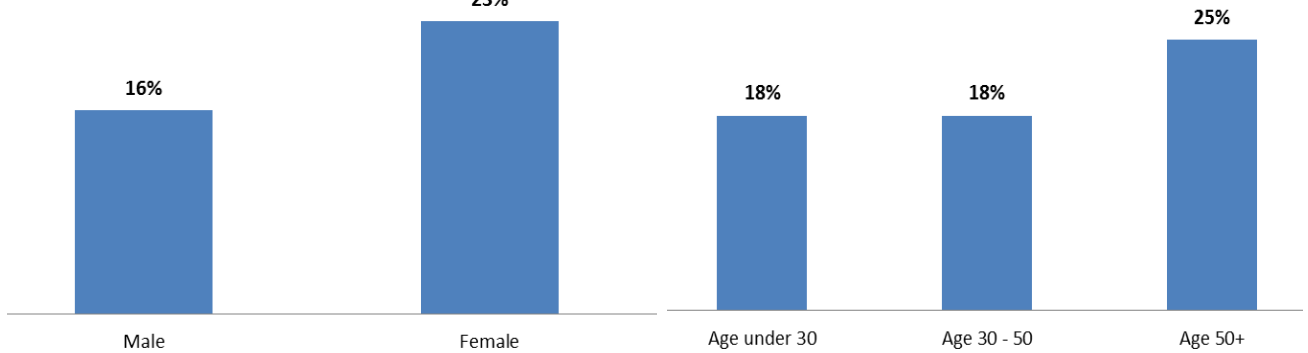

Further analysis shows that being admitted to a hospital or medical facility for medical treatment is higher among women than men and understandably higher as people grow in age.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, majority considers Pakistan's nuclear capability as the most important achievement while economic mismanagement is seen as key failure in 65 year history.



MAJOR ACHIEVEMENT IN 65 YEARS: Nuclear Capability seen as major achievement

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "What would you describe as Pakistan's Number one Achievement since its creation in 1947?" Responding to this, Pakistan's Nuclear Capability is seen as its key achievement in 65 year history, rated by 40%. A smaller number, at 7%, take pride in technological break-throughs specially telecom, while a modern motorway inspires 2%.

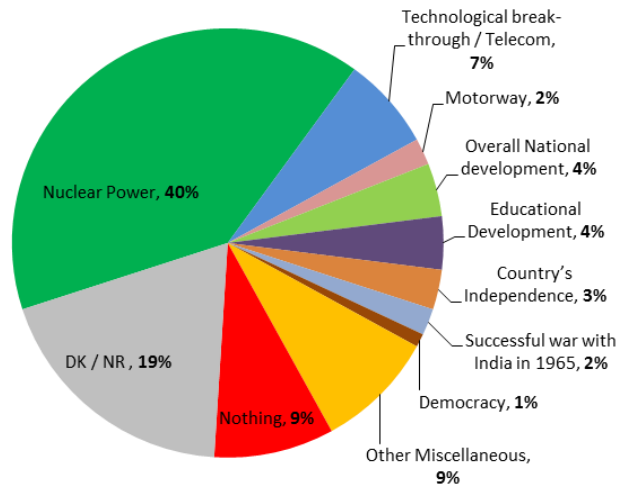

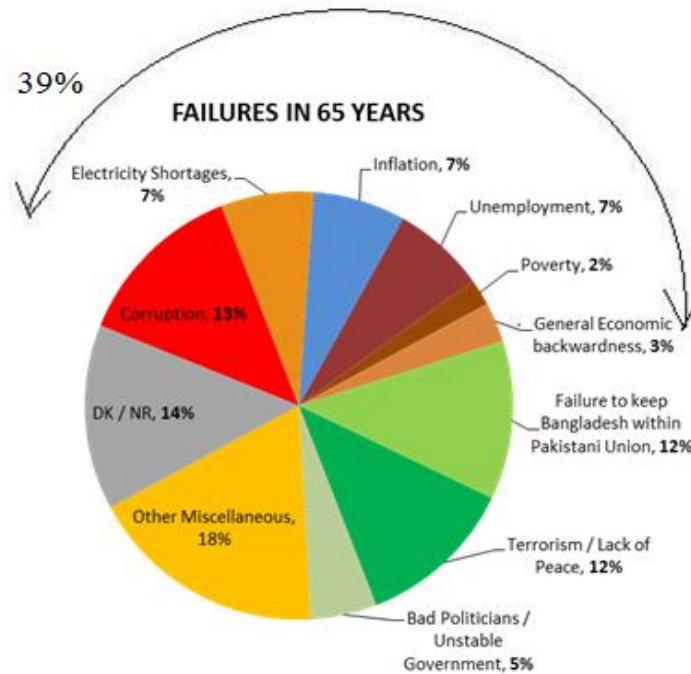
MAJOR FAILURES IN 65 YEARS: Economic Mismanagement and failure to keep Bangladesh within United Pakistan seen as major failures

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “What would you describe as Pakistan’s Number one Failure since its creation in 1947?” Responding to this, Corruption and Economic Failures prick Pakistanis the most. Failure to keep Bangladesh within the Union of Pakistan haunts many. According to survey findings, 39% give reasons pertaining to Economic Mismanagement. Failure to keep Bangladesh within United Pakistan is mentioned by 12% as the Nation’s outstanding failure.

These findings are based on a nation-wide opinion poll conducted by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The sample is chosen through stratified area probability sampling and is representative of the adult population of Pakistan and comprises a cross-section of men and women belonging to various regional, age and socio-economic backgrounds.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2685 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 27, 2012 – August 04, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at 95% confidence level.

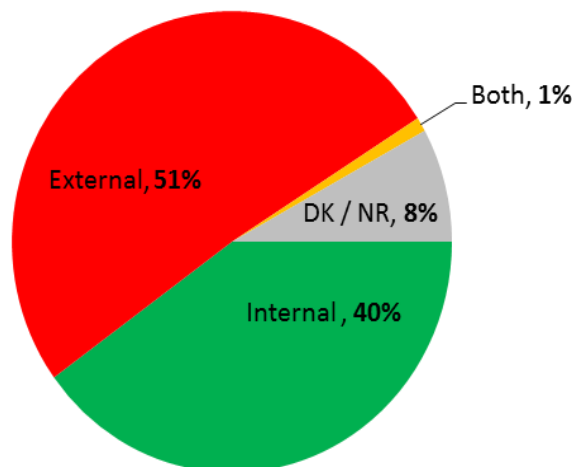

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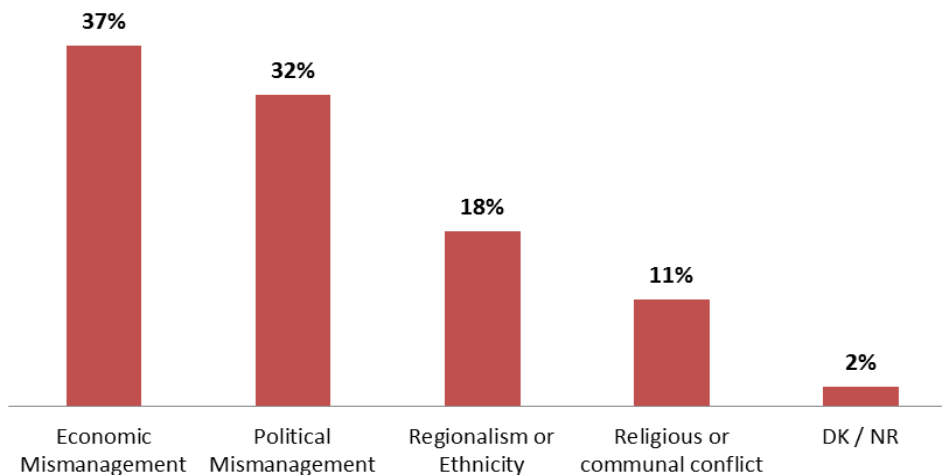

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, Economic Mismanagement is seen as Most Important Threat to the nation, rated by 37%; only 11% rate religious or communal conflict as top threat.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Like all nations of the world, Pakistan faces several problems like Economic Threats (meaning that Pakistan is undergoing financial troubles), Political Threats (meaning political leadership and institutions are weak), Social Threats (meaning people belonging to different regions fight) and Religious Threats (meaning people of different faith fight with each other). In your opinion, which is the most important threat out of these? (Give one answer)” Responding to this, 37% rate Economic Mismanagement as the top threat to the nation, 32% rate Political Mismanagement as the top threat, 18% rate Regionalism or Ethnicity as top threat whereas 11% rate Religious or communal conflict as the top threat to Pakistani nation. However, 2% did not give a view.
