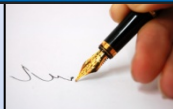

5% Of Pakistanis Complain Of 'Insomnia', 30% Suffer From Restless Sleep: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

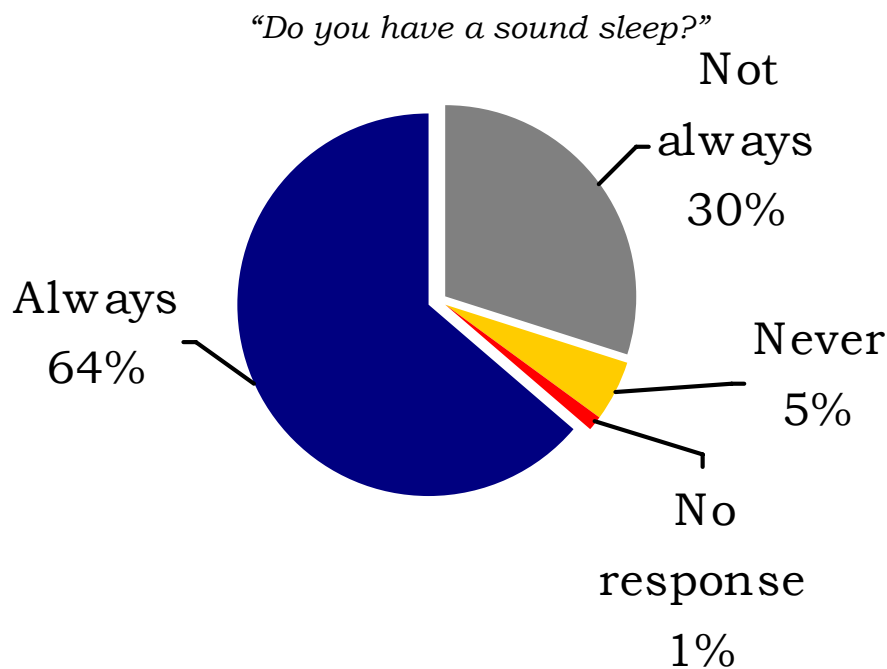

According to a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, almost two third of all Pakistanis (64%) claim to sleep well. However the remaining 30% say they don't always have a sound sleep and 5% say they never sleep well.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: "Do you have a sound sleep?" Sixty four percent (64%) of all Pakistanis claimed to sleep well. On the contrary 30% said they don't always have a sound sleep and 5% claimed that they never sleep well. 1% gave no response.

A detailed analysis of the survey showed that relatively more rural dwellers (67%) claimed to sleep well as compared to their urban counter parts (58%).

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61% Believe That The Use Of Narcotics Has Increased In Pakistan. 71% Say That Addicts Deserve Medical Care: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

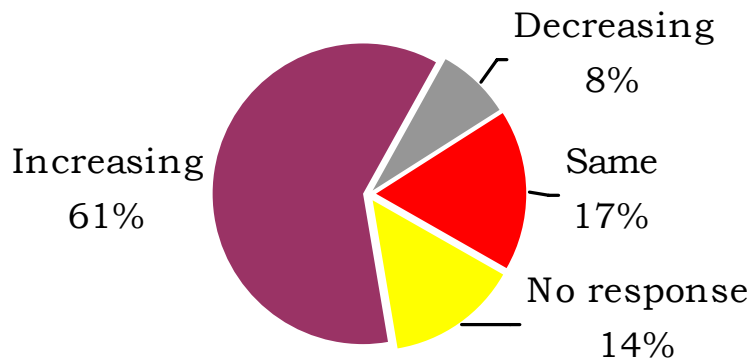

According to a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, almost two third of all Pakistanis (61%) believe that the use of narcotics has increased in Pakistan. 71% believe that the addicts should be given medical care.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: "Considering all the news you receive, do you think that the use of narcotics in Pakistan is increasing or decreasing ?" Sixty one percent (61%) believed that the use of narcotics is increasing in Pakistan, 8% considered it to be decreasing while 17% said there is no change. A considerable 14% gave no response.

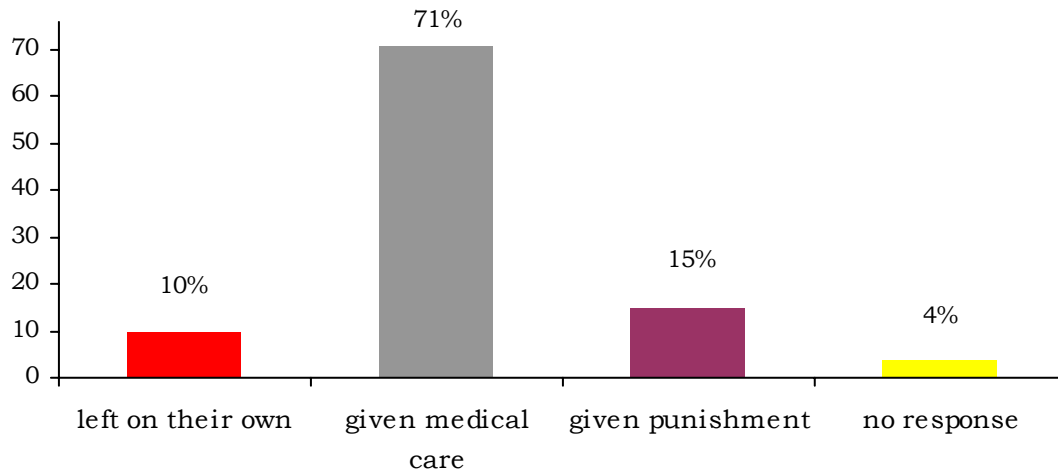
In a follow up question, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: *"In your opinion how should the addicts be treated?"* Seventy one percent (71%) believe that addicts deserve medical care, 15% think that they should be punished while 10% say they should be left on their own . 4% gave no response.

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Financial Worries Tops The List Of Personal Problems: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

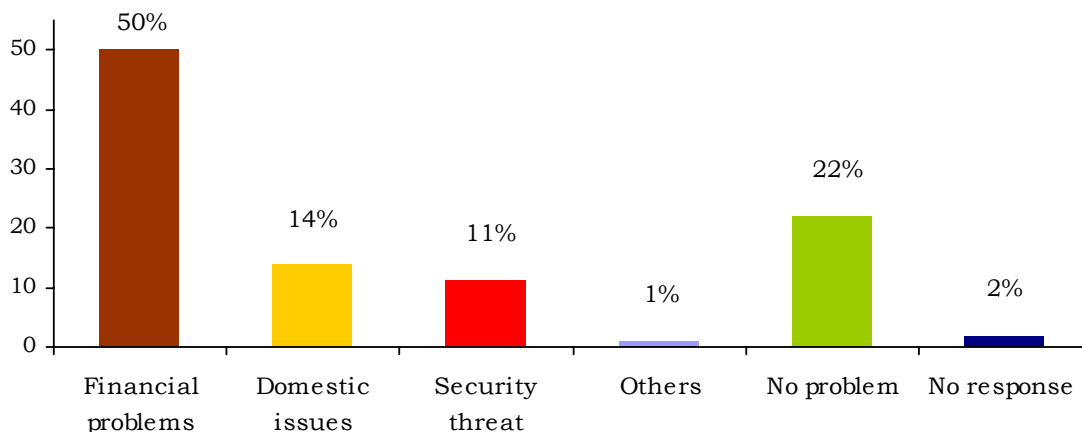
According to a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, half of all Pakistanis (50%) consider financial issues to be the most important personal problem followed by domestic issues (14%) and security risk (11%).



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: "At the moment, which is the most important problem in your personal life?" Fifty percent (50%) of all Pakistanis rated financial issues as most crucial, 14% stated domestic issues and 11% security threat to be most significant. 1% gave other responses while 22% said that they have no problem at all. 2% gave no response.

A detailed analysis of the survey showed small differences across various groups of society. For example it was found that relatively more urban dwellers (53%) found financial issues to be most important among personal problems compared to their rural counter parts (48%). At the same time, comparatively more males (52%) considered financial worries to be more significant than the females (47%). The study of urban and rural sections revealed that more urbanites (15%) felt a greater security threat as compared to their rural counter parts (9%).

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Breakfast Turns Out To Be The Most Popular Teatime: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

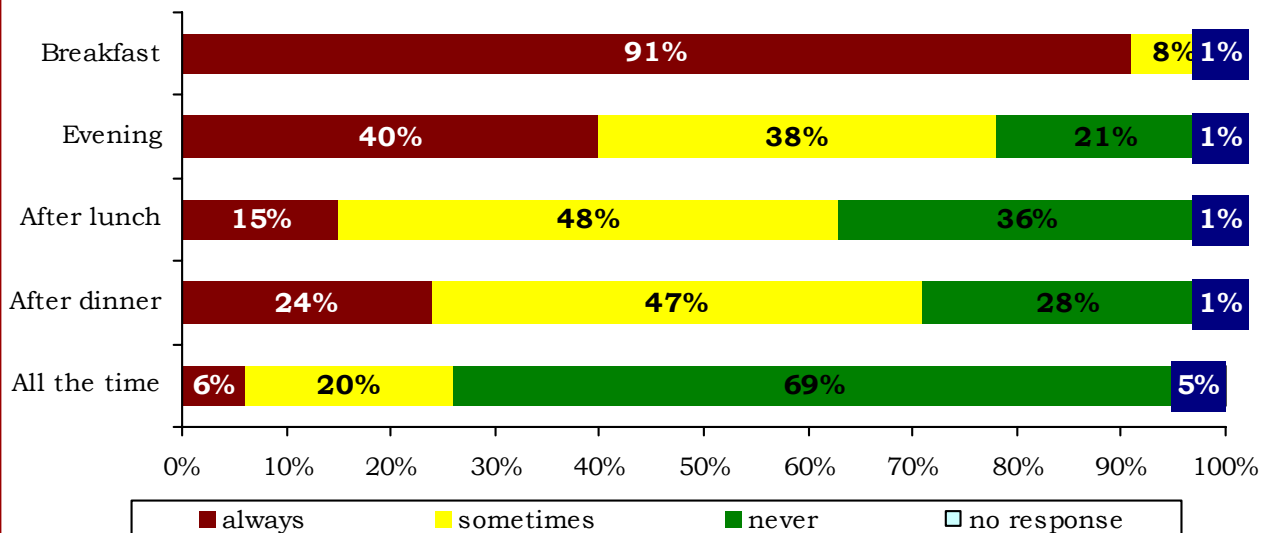
Islamabad February 3, 2011

According to a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 91% of all Pakistanis claim that tea is regularly served at breakfast in their household, followed by 40% who say the same for evening and 24% for after dinner.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: “During what times is tea mostly served in your household?” Ninety one percent (91%) of all Pakistanis claimed that tea is almost always served at breakfast in their household, 40% said the same for evening and 24% for after dinner. Another 15% said it is served in their homes after lunch.

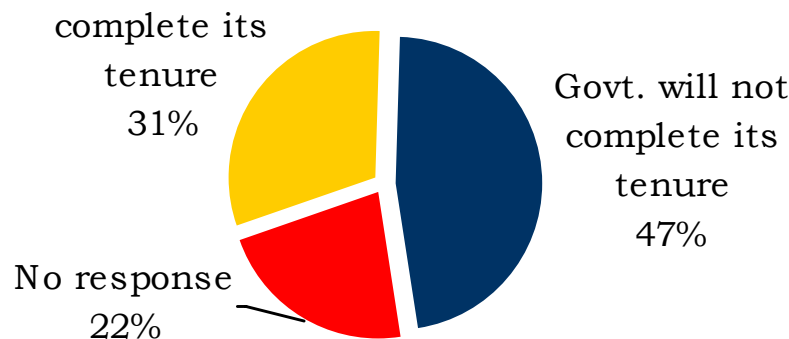

According to a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, almost half of all Pakistanis (47%) believe that the current government will dissolve without completing its tenure as opposed to 31% in whose assessment it will complete its term.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: “Do you think that the current government will complete its tenure or dissolve before that?” Forty seven percent (47%) believed that the government will not complete its term of 5 years where as 31% were of the view that the government will complete its tenure. A considerable 22% gave no response.

In a follow up question, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: “Some people believe that government has become too weak at the moment while others believe it is not so. What is your opinion?” Fifty two percent (52%) agreed that government has become weak. On the contrary 29% said that it has not become weak. 19% were unsure and gave no response.

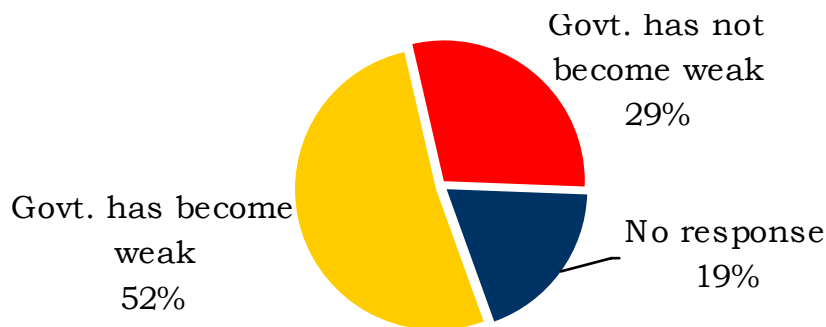
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A detailed analysis of the survey showed that relatively more urbanites (59%) believed that government has become weak as compared to its rural counterparts (50%).
