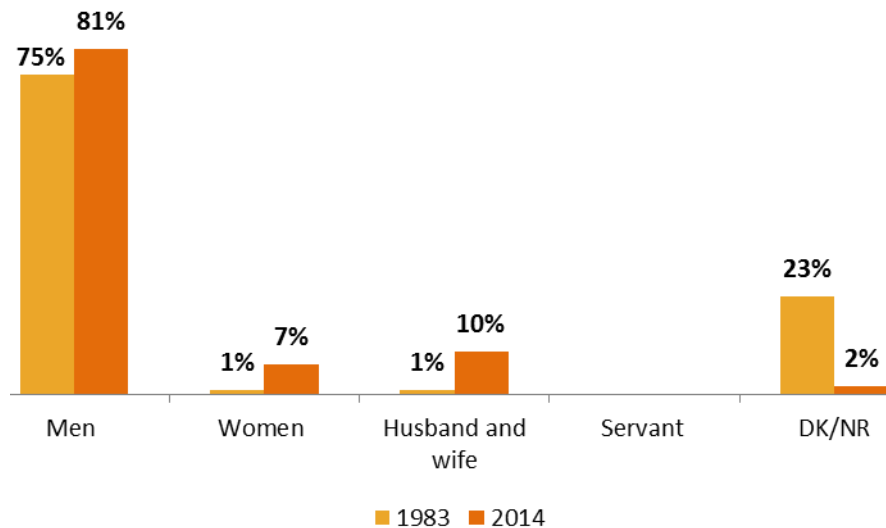

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “I will read out to you a list of different actions. In some households, in different parts of the country, men do these chores while in others women do. In your household who usually carries out these chores?” Regarding taking cash to and from the bank, 81% respondents said the men in their household do this, 7% said the women do this, 10% said the husband and wife do this chore together and 2% did not respond.

This question was also asked in 1983 and the results can be interpreted as a reflection of the changes that may have taken place in Pakistani society over the years. In 1983, 75% respondents said the men in their household did this, 1% said the women did this, 1% said the husband and wife did this chore together and 23% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2562 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 24 – December 1, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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Trust in performance of National Assembly low since 2008.

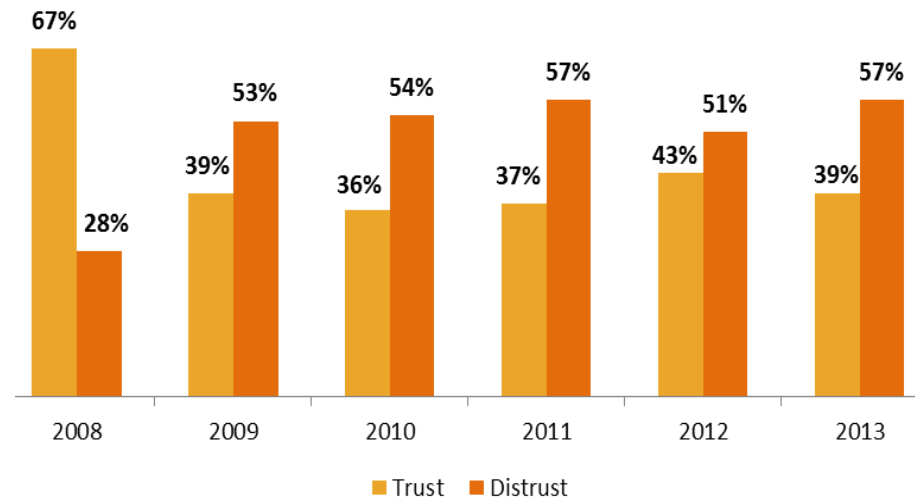
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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan in 2013, 39% Pakistanis said they trust the performance of the National Assembly; 57% said they distrust it.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked in 2013, “I will take names of some organizations; kindly tell how much trust you have on the performance of the following organizations?” Regarding the performance of National Assembly, 9% respondents said they trust its performance too much, 30% said they trust its performance to an extent, 26% trust it less, while 31% have no trust at all and 4% did not respond.

This question was also asked in previous years. In 2008, 20% respondents said they trust the performance of the National too much, 47% trusted it to an extent, 22% trusted it less, while only 6% did not trust it all and 5% did not respond. Since 2008, trust ratings for the performance of the National Assembly have fallen and remained consistently low. In 2009, 7% respondents said they trust the performance of the National too much, 32% trusted it to an extent, 35% trusted it less, while 18% did not trust it all and 8% did not respond. Pakistani public’s trust in the performance of the National Assembly remained around this level through 2010 and 2011, before rising slightly in 2012. In 2012, 13% respondents said they trust the performance of the National too much, 30% trusted it to an extent, 19% trusted it less, while 32% did not trust it all and 6% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2516 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 06 – January 13, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

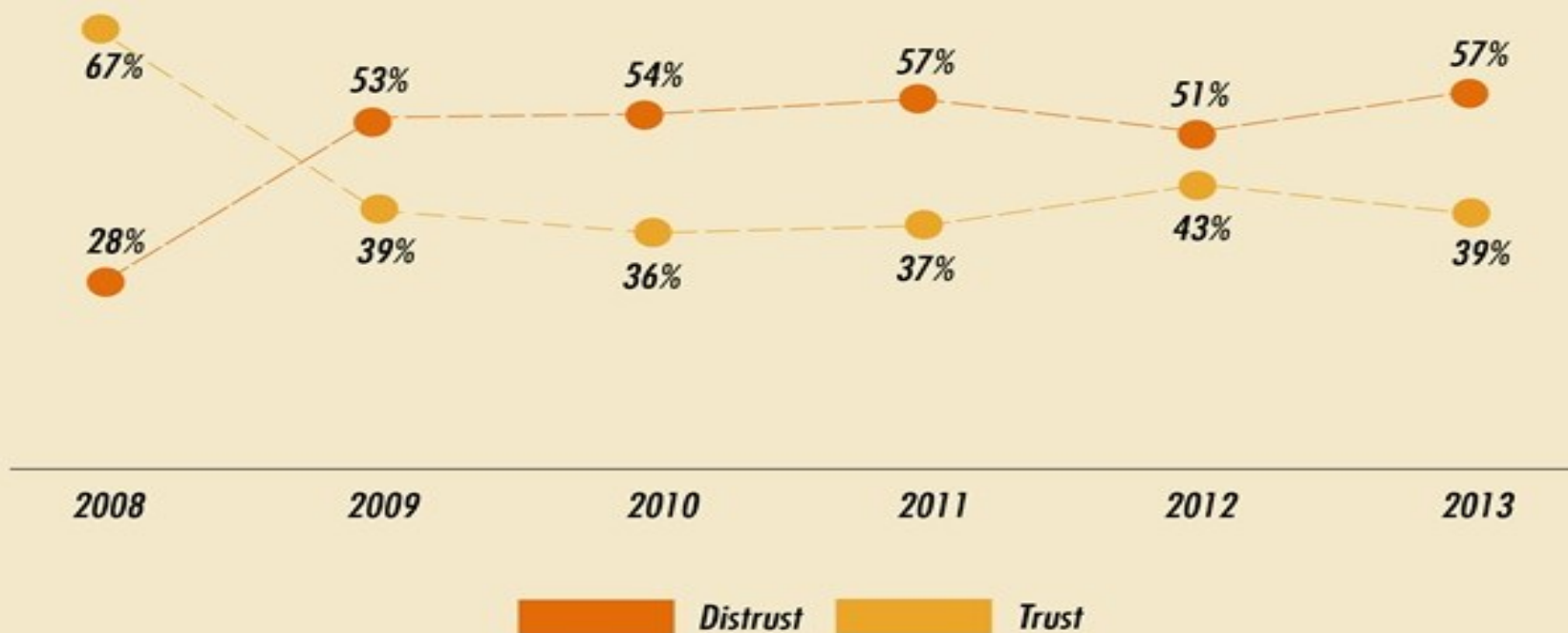

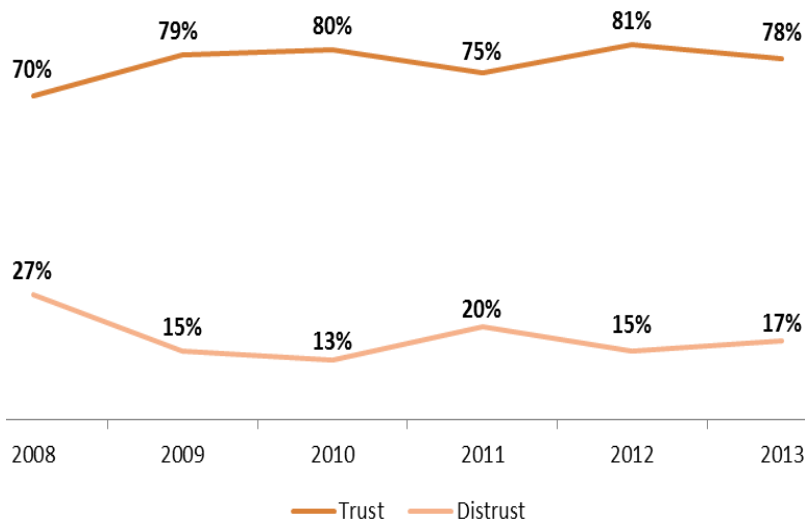

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan in 2013, 78% Pakistanis said they trusted the performance of the Armed Forces; 17% said they did not trust it.



A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked in 2013, “I will take names of some organizations; kindly tell how much trust you have on the performance of the following organizations?” Regarding the performance of Armed Forces, 40% respondents said they trust its performance too much, 38% said they trust its performance to an extent, 10% trust it less, while 7% have no trust at all and 5% did not respond.

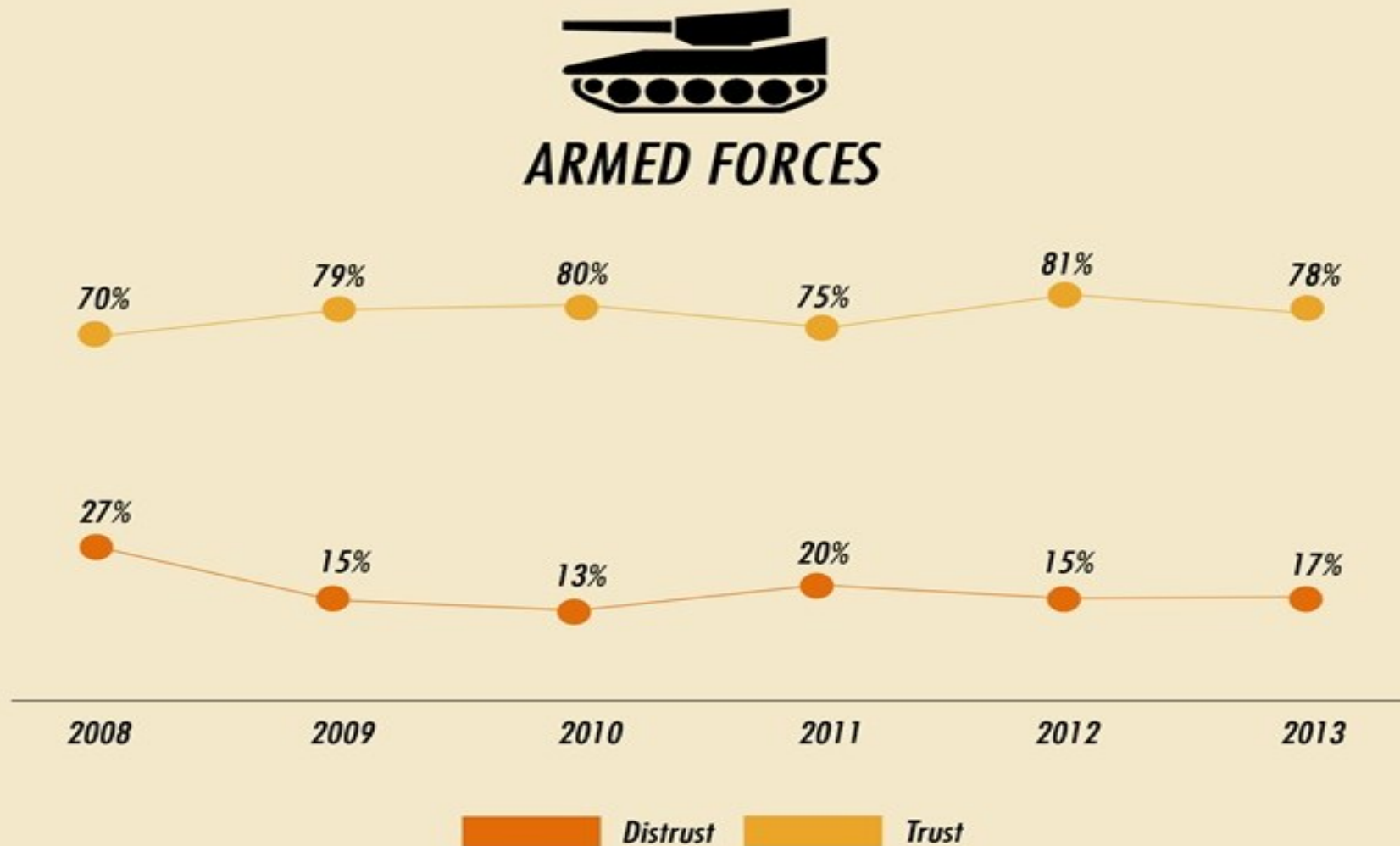
This question was also asked in previous years. In 2008, trust in the performance of the Armed Forces was lower than in the years that followed. In 2008, 26% respondents said they trust the performance of the army too much, 44% said they trust it to an extent, 20% said they trust it less, while 7% did not trust it at all and 3% did not respond. Trust ratings rose steadily after 2008 and remained high through 2009 and 2010, before falling slightly in 2011. In 2011, 35% respondents said they trust the performance of the army too much, 40% said they trust it to an extent, 12% said they trust it less, while 8% did not trust it at all and 5% did not respond. Pakistani public’s trust in the performance of the armed forces has risen again since 2011.

Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

PUBLIC TRUST IN PERFORMANCE OF ARMY HAS RISEN SINCE 2008, EXCEPT FOR A SLIGHT DECLINE IN 2011.

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Trust in newspapers has been steadily rising for the past two decades.

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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 76% Pakistanis trust newspapers; 24% do not trust them.

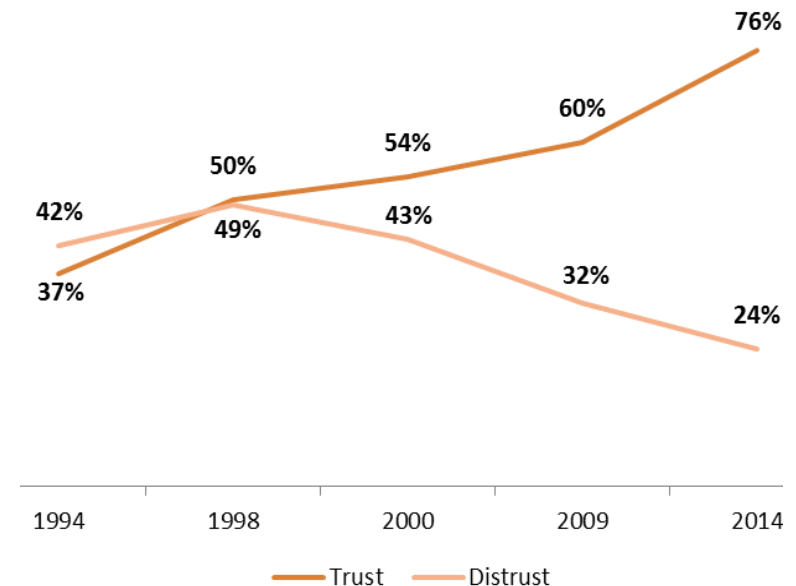
A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “We want to ask you about how much you trust the following institutions?” Regarding newspapers, 27% respondents said they trust them very much, 49% said they somewhat trust newspapers, 19% trust them very little, while 5% have no trust in newspapers at all.

This question was also asked in previous years. In 1994, 11% respondents said they trust newspapers very much, 26% trusted them somewhat, 24% trusted them very little, while 18% did not trust them at all and 21% did not reply. From 1994 to 1998, there was a rise in the number of respondents who said they trusted newspapers as well as those who said they did not trust newspapers, since only 1% respondents did not respond to the question. Since 1998, there has been a steady rise in the percentage of respondents who trust newspapers and a steady decline in the percentage of those who do not trust newspapers. In 2009, 28% respondents said they trust newspapers very much, 32% said they trust them somewhat, 16% trusted them very little, while 16% did not trust them at all and 8% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2548 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 21 – April 28, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

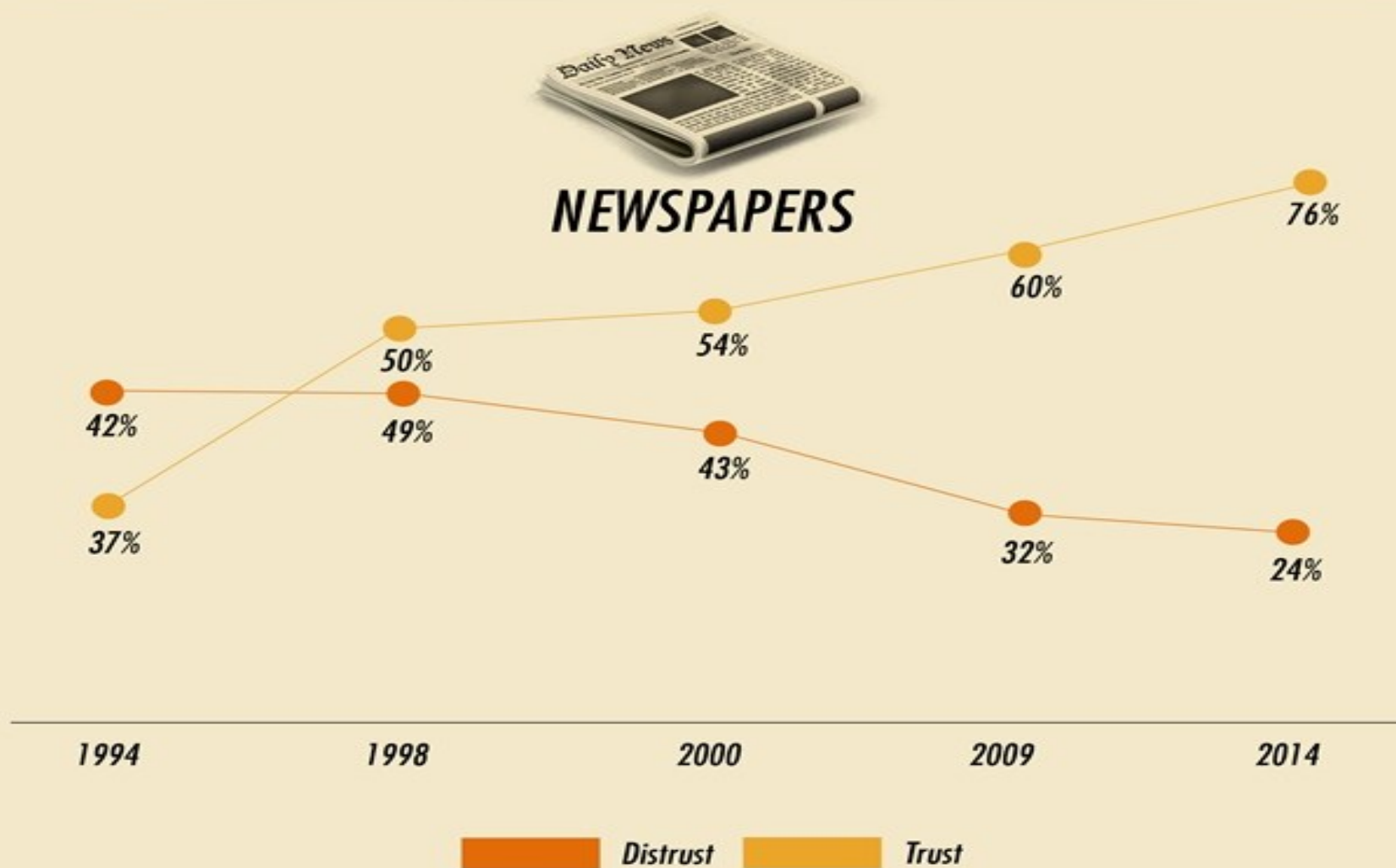
