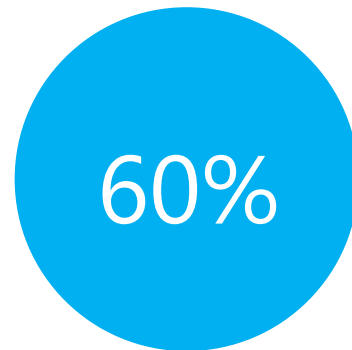

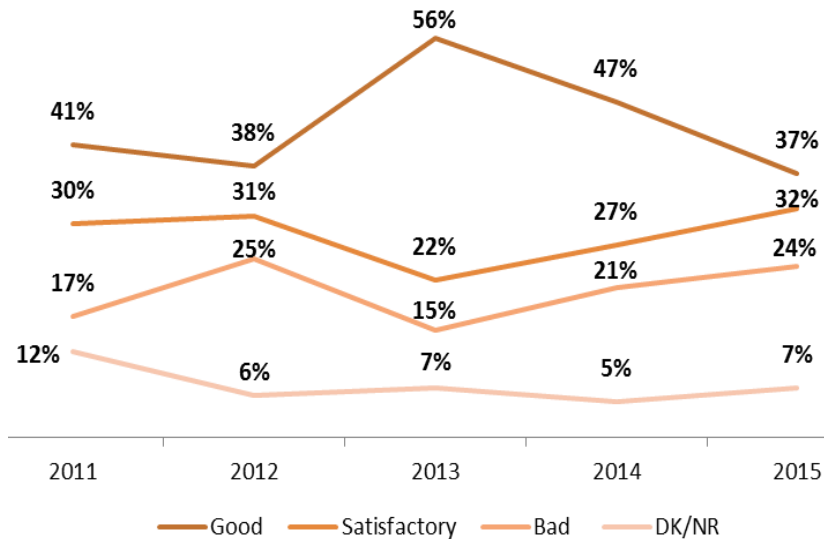

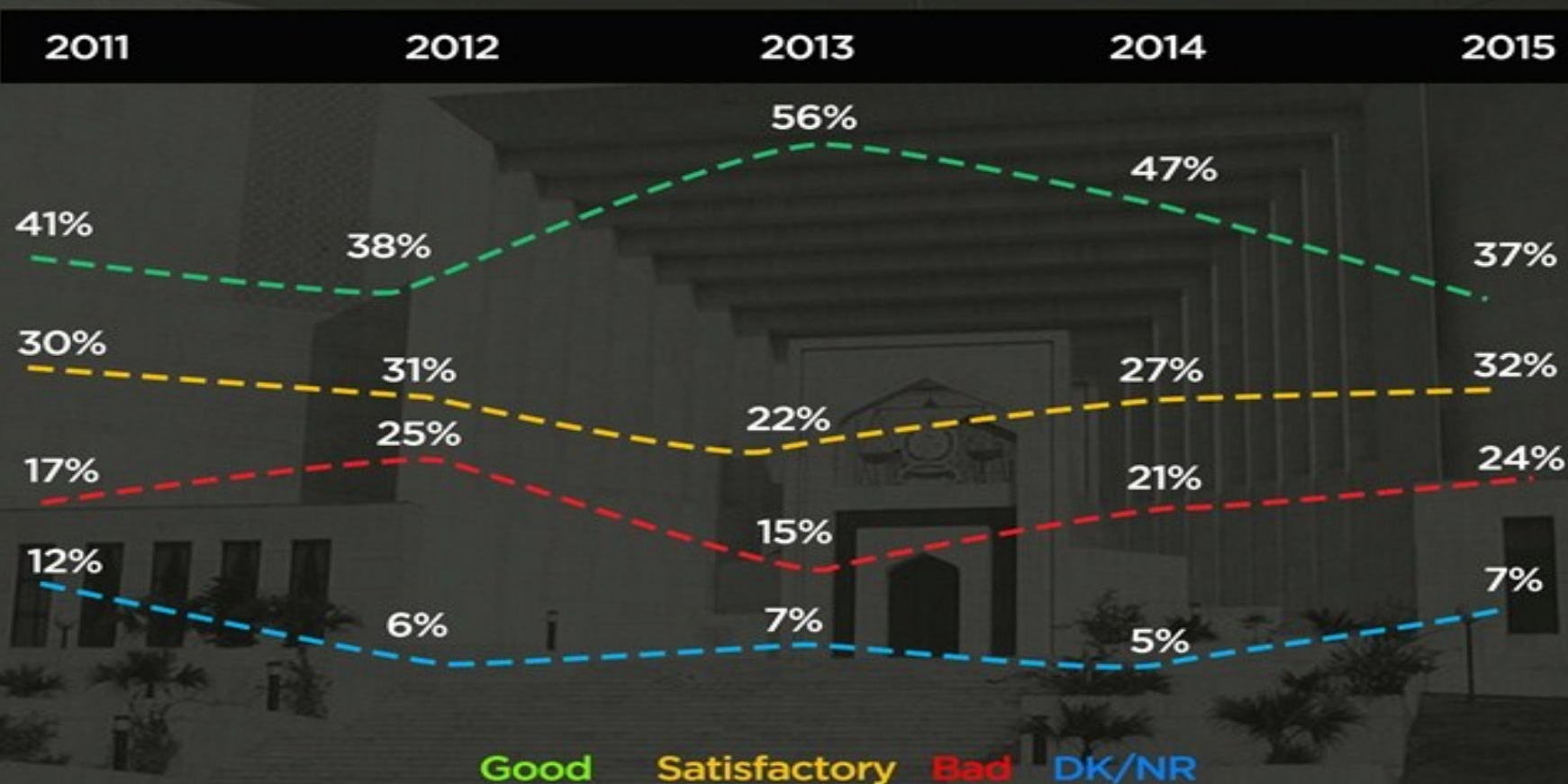

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell us, what do you think about the performance of the Supreme Court in the last year? Do you think it was very good, good, satisfactory, bad or very bad?” In response to this question, 9% respondents said the performance of the Supreme Court was very good, 28% said it was good, 32% said it was satisfactory, 16% said it was bad, while 8% said it was very bad and 7% did not respond.

This question was also asked during previous years. In 2012, 38% respondents said the performance of the Supreme Court during last year was good, 31% said it was satisfactory, 25% said it was bad and 6% did not respond. The percentage of those respondents who rated the performance of the Supreme Court as good peaked in 2013 (56%) and corresponded with sharp decreases in those who said the performance was satisfactory (22%) and those who said it was bad (15%). Since 2013, public opinion has shifted again. In 2014, 47% respondents said the performance of the Supreme Court was good, 27% said it was satisfactory, while 21% said it was bad and 5% did not respond. The percentage of those who rate the performance of the Supreme Court during the past year as good has continued to decline since 2013, and by 2015 the trend of public opinion was very similar to what it had been in 2012.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1374 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 26 - February 2, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

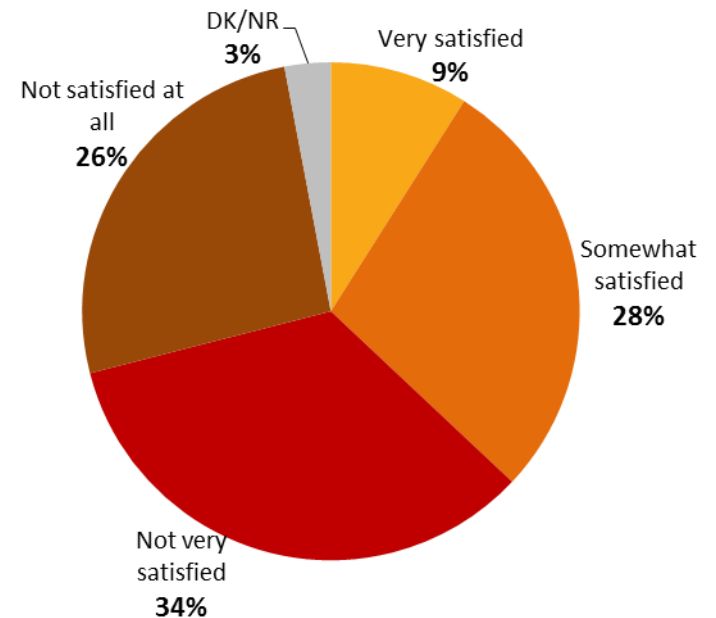

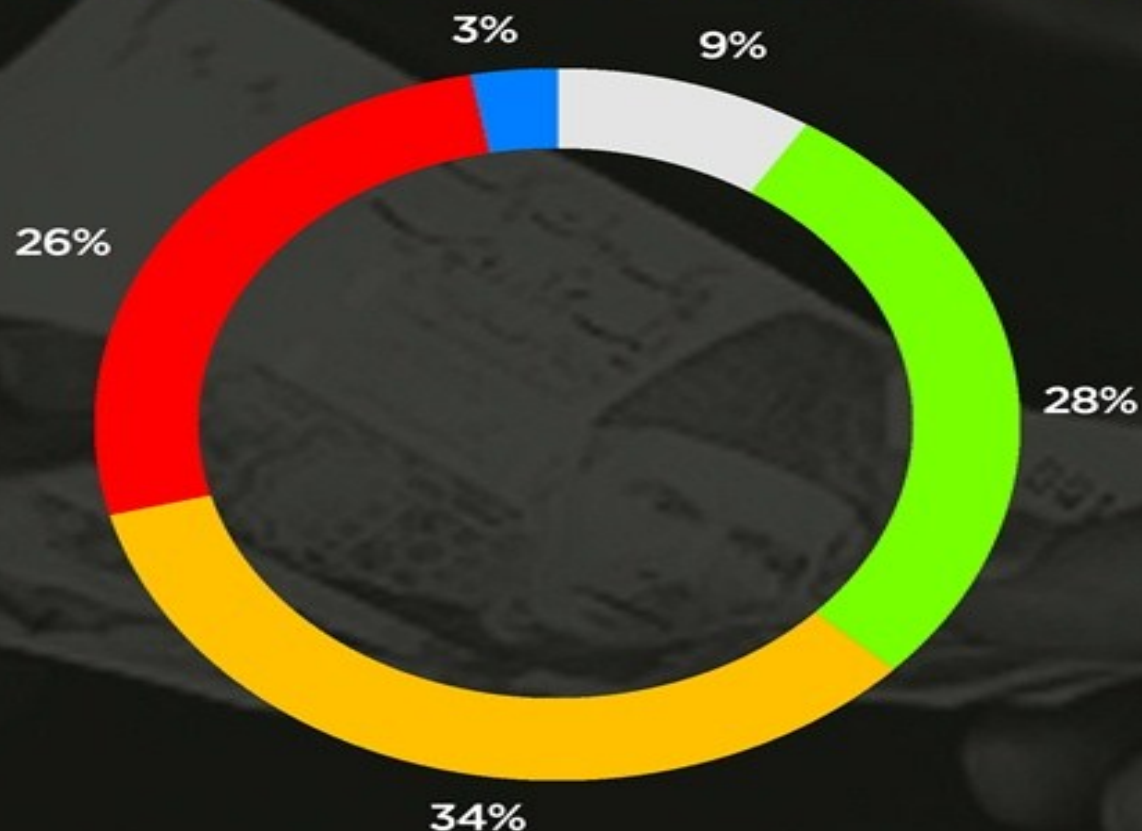

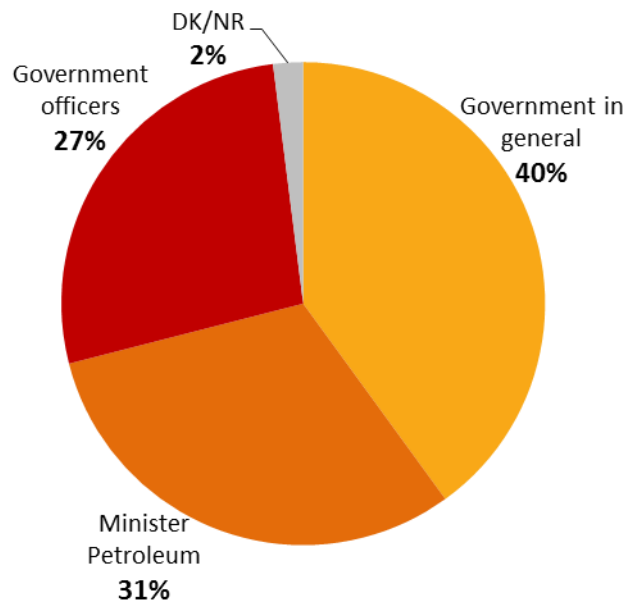
How much satisfied are you with the performance of government in ending corruption?

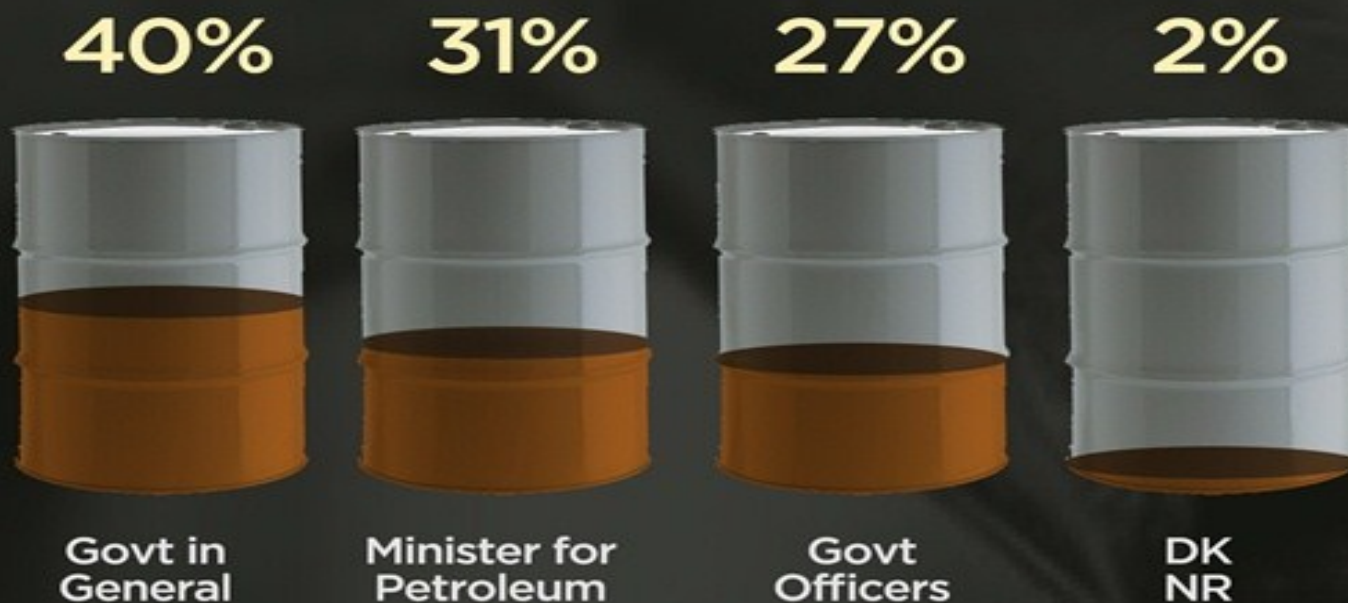

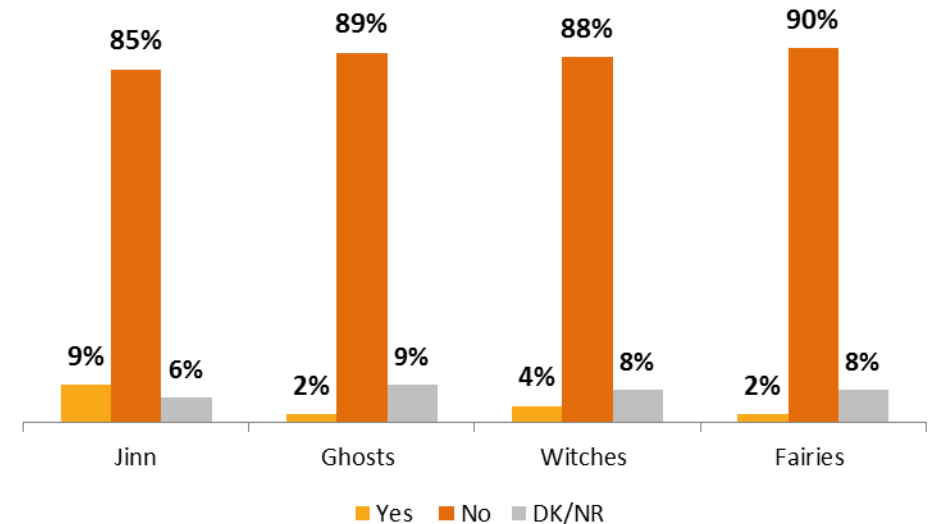

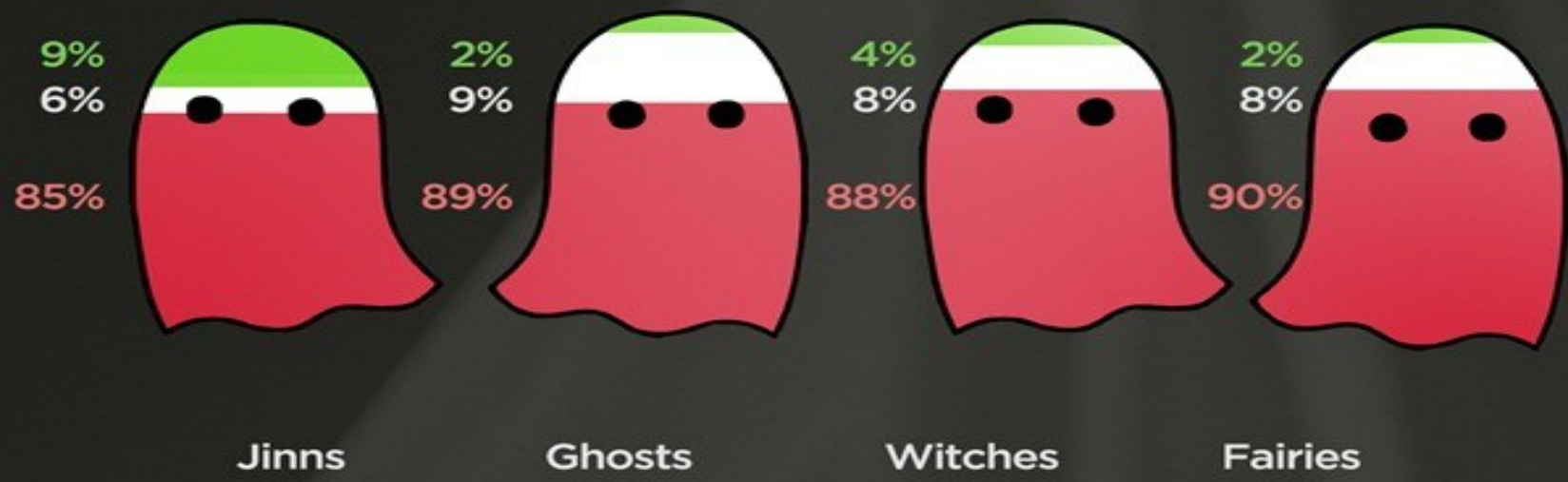

Regarding ghosts, 2% respondents said they have seen them, while 89% have not and 9% did not respond. Regarding witches, 4% respondents said they have seen them, while 88% have not and 8% did not respond. Regarding fairies, 2% respondents said they have seen them, while 90% have not and 8% did not respond.

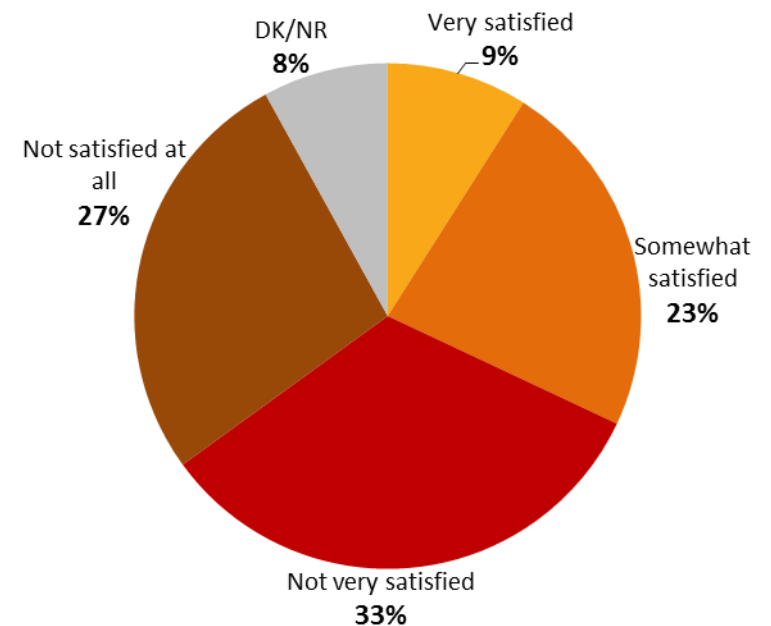

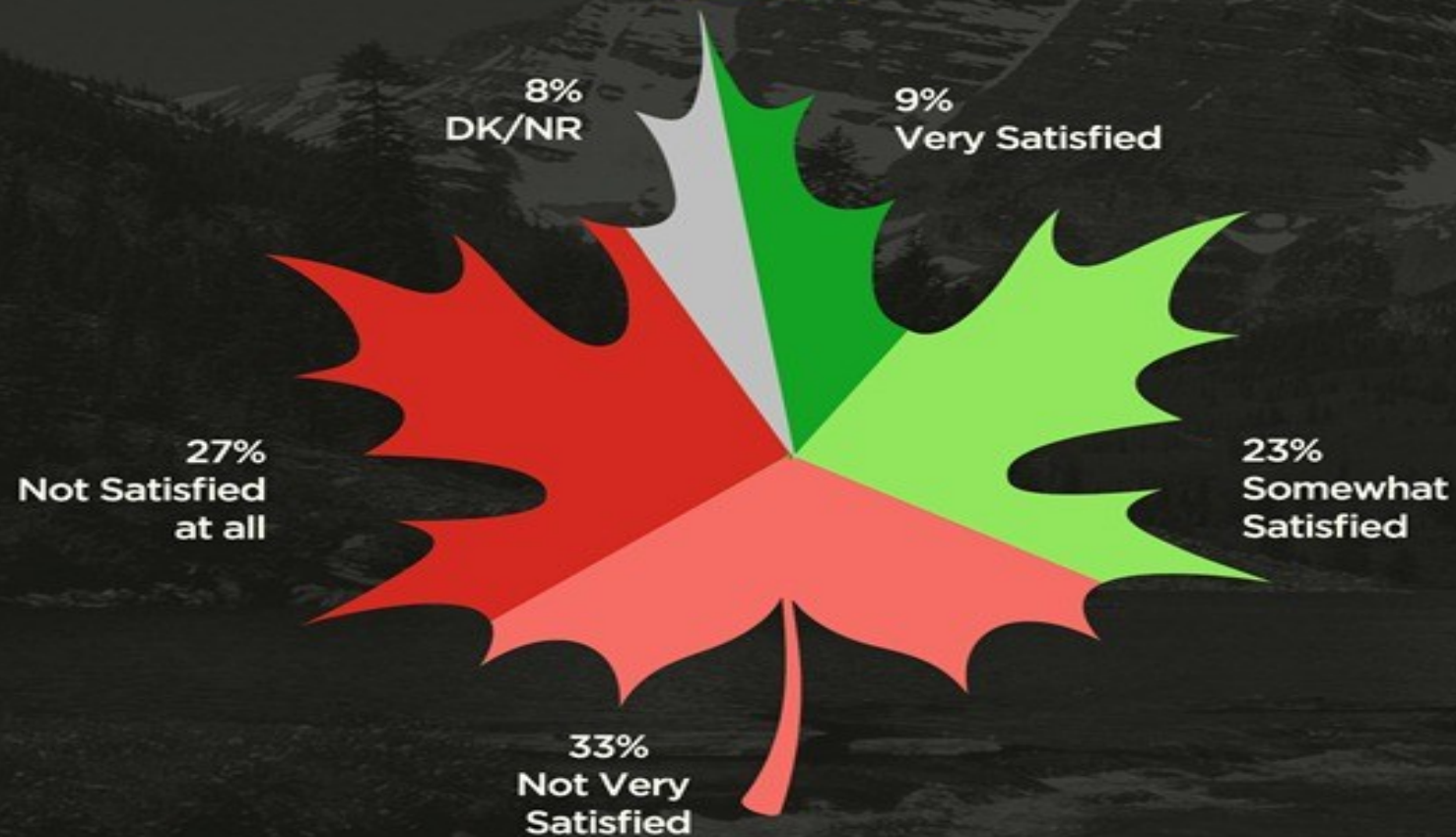
