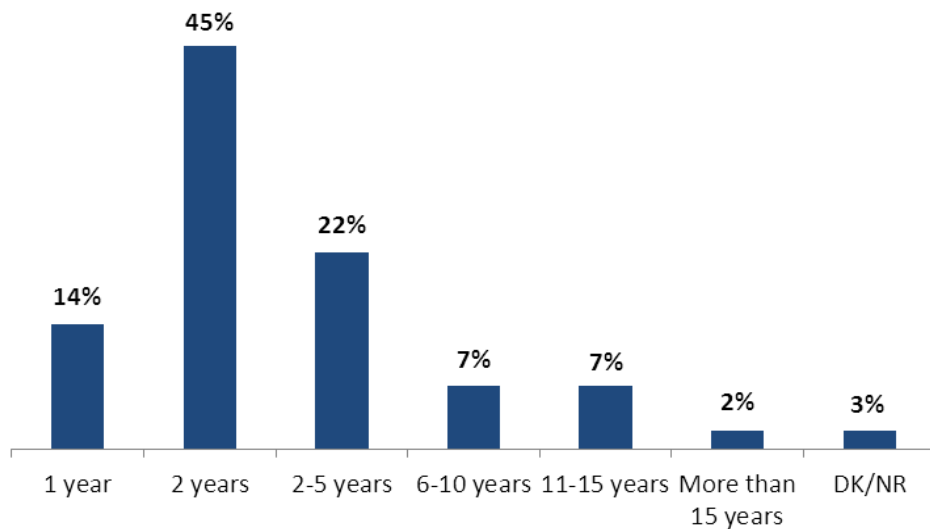

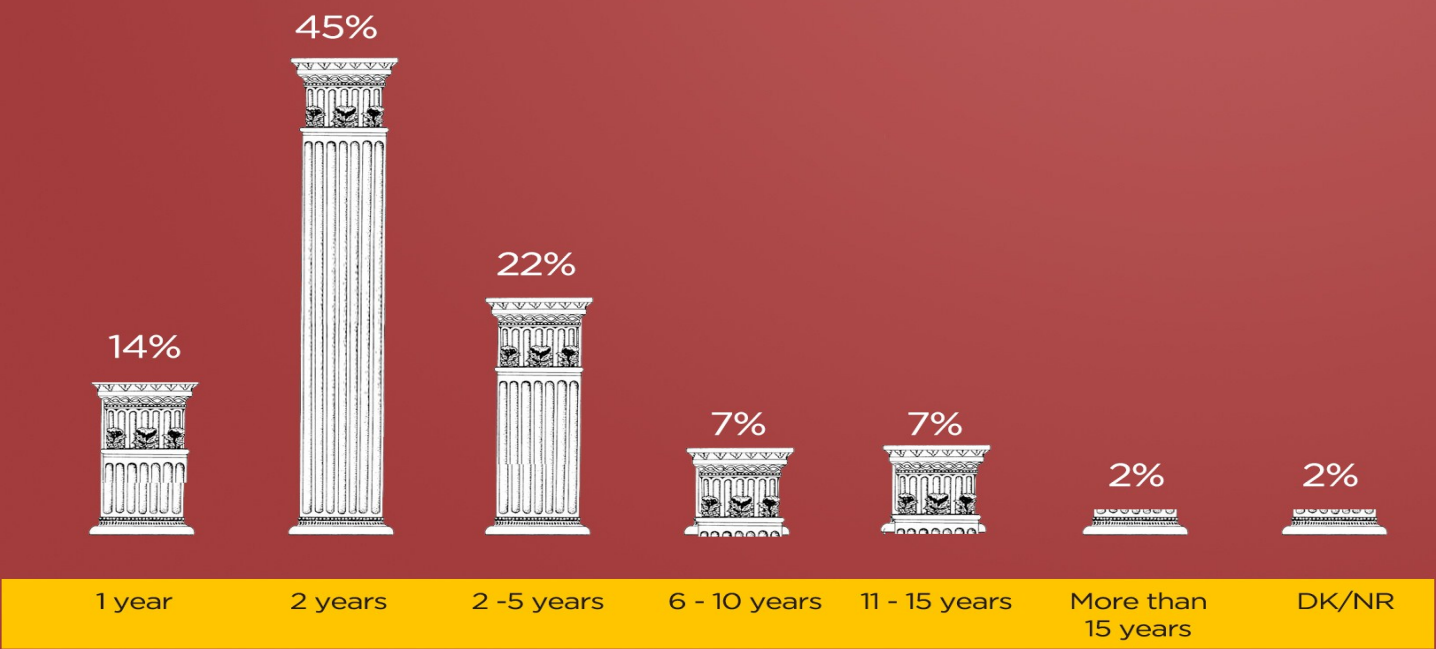
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 45% Pakistanis who currently have a case in court said that it has been pending since 2 years; 22% said that it has been pending since 2-5 years.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces who are currently fighting a case in court were asked, “For how long has your case been in court?” In response to this question, 14% said that their case has been pending since one year, 45% said that their case has been in court since two years, 22% said that it has been in court since 2-5 years, 7% said 6-10 years and another 7% said 11-15 years. 2% said their case has been pending for more than 15 years and 3% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 150 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 27 - August 3, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

For how long has your case been in court?





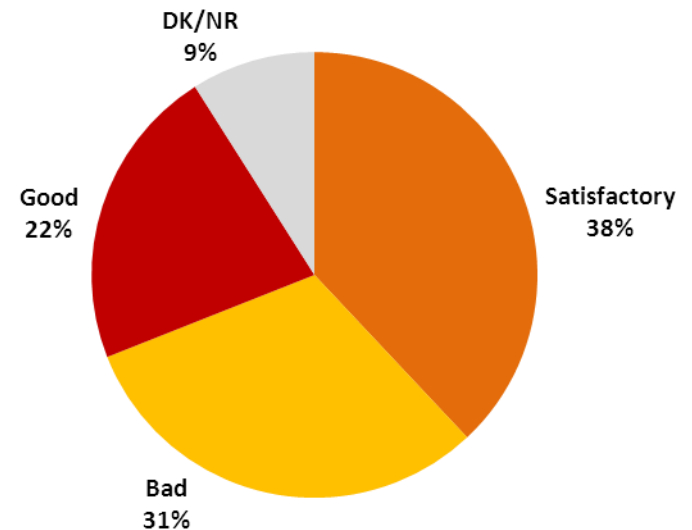

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “What is the standard of education in government schools: good, bad or satisfactory?” In response to this question, 38% respondents said that it is satisfactory, 31% said that it is bad, 22% said that it is good and 9% did not respond.

This survey is part of a Governance Tracker implemented by Gallup Pakistan to gauge citizens’ feedback regarding government services. Data for this tracker is available for past decade.

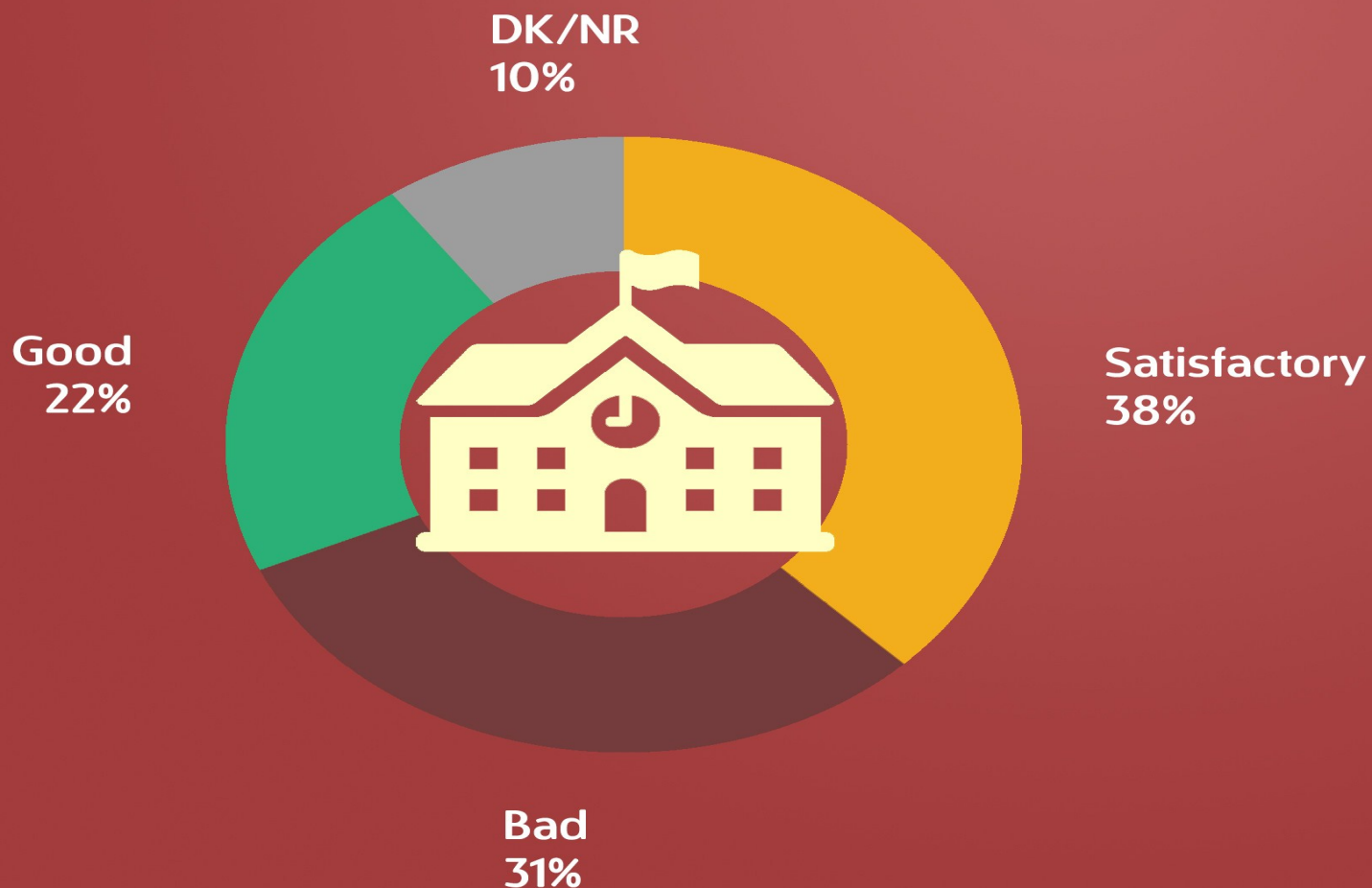

What is the standard of education in government schools: good, bad or satisfactory?





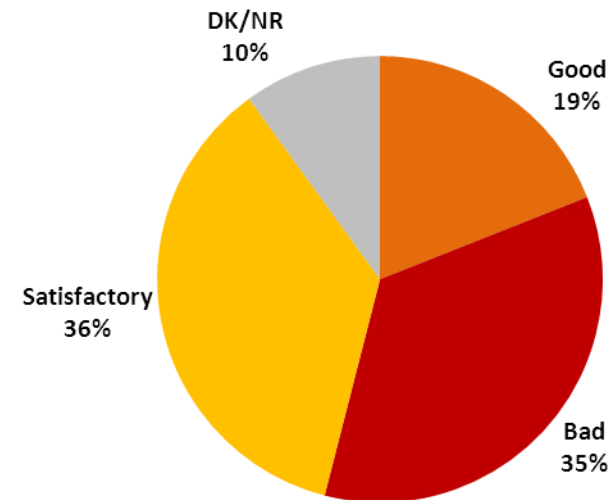

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 36% Pakistanis opine that the standard of medical treatment in government hospital is satisfactory; 35% opine that it is bad.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “What is the standard of medical treatment in government hospital in your opinion?” In response to this question, 19% said that the standard of treatment in government hospital is good, 35% respondents said that it is bad, 36% said that it is satisfactory and 10% did not respond.

This survey is part of a Governance Tracker implemented by Gallup Pakistan to gauge citizens’ feedback regarding government services. Data for this tracker is available for past decade.

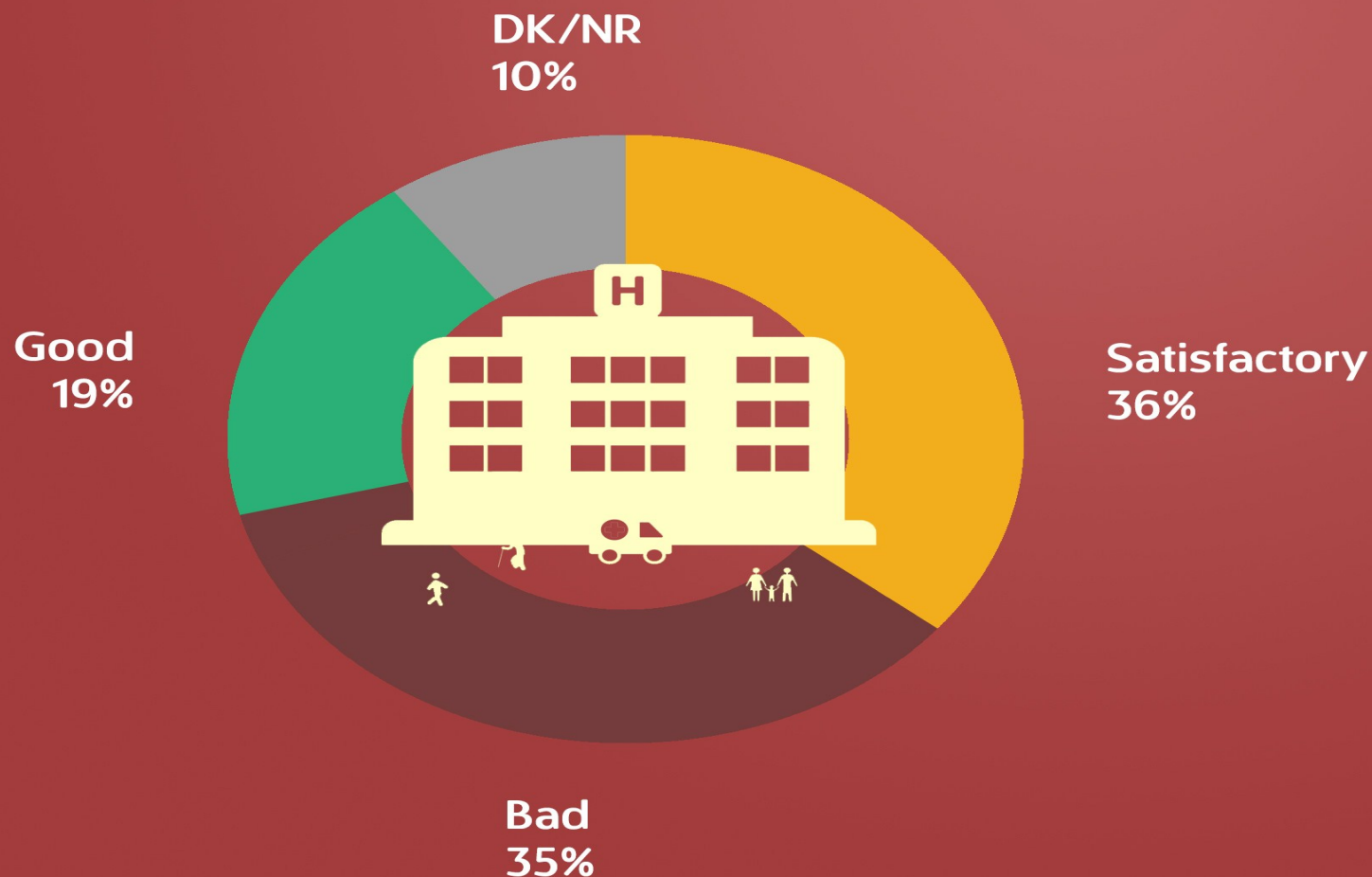

What is the standard of medical treatment in government hospital in your opinion?



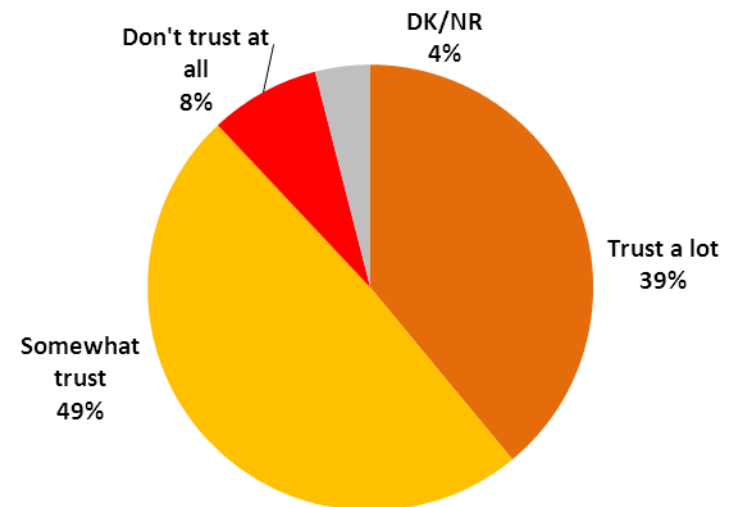

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 88% Pakistanis trust the results of public opinion surveys carried out in the country; 8% Pakistanis do not trust them at all.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some marketing and research organizations hold surveys where public opinion on different topics is taken and then the results of the survey are published countrywide. Please tell us, how much do you trust the results of such surveys held in Pakistan? Do you trust them a lot, trust them somewhat or you don’t trust them at all?” In response to this question, 39% said that they trust the surveys a lot, 49% said that they somewhat trust them, 8% said that they don’t trust at all and 4% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1932 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 10 – August 17, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

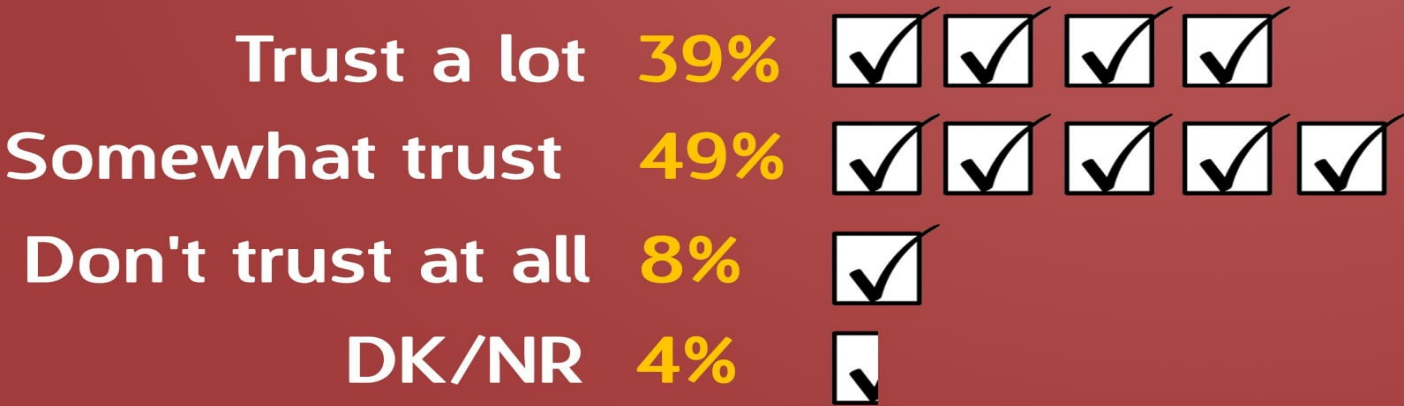
