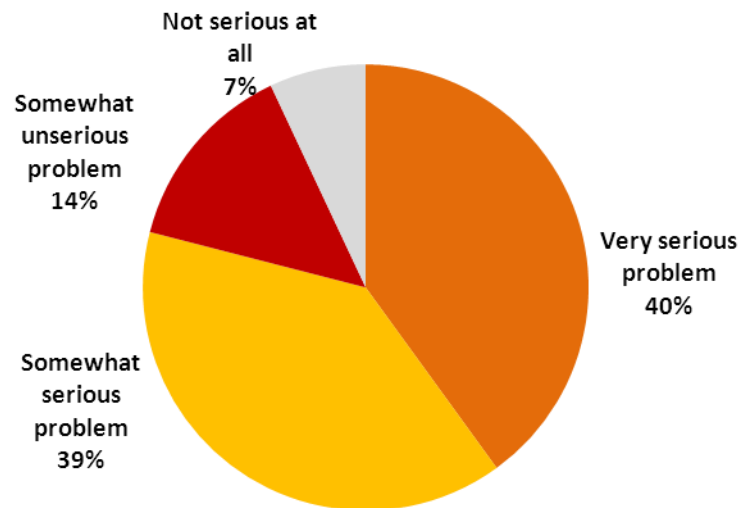

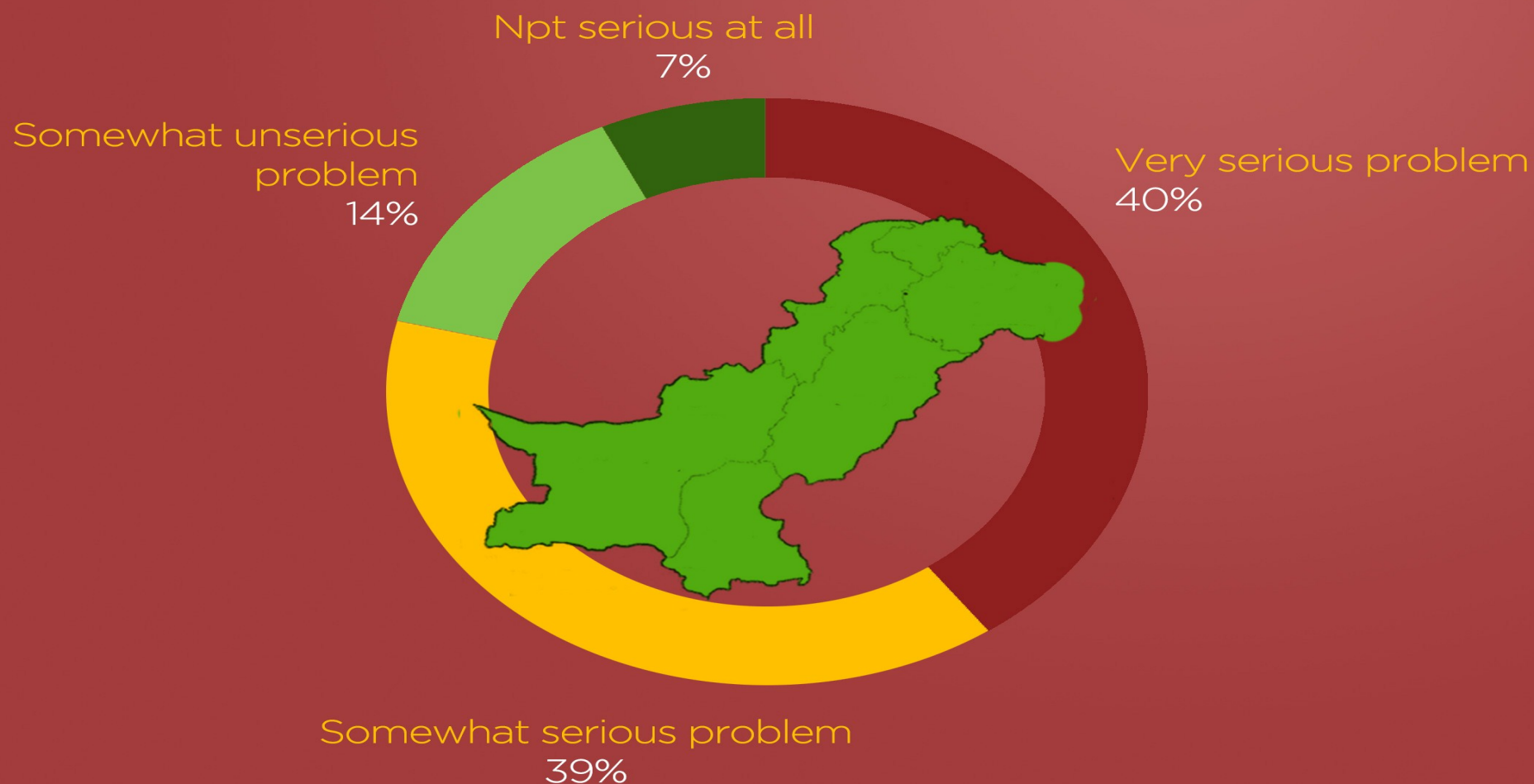
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 79% Pakistanis believe that religious fanaticism is a serious problem for Pakistan; 21% Pakistanis believe that it is not serious.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell me how big of a problem religious fanaticism for Pakistan is?” In response to this question, 40% Pakistanis said that it is a very serious problem, 39% said that it is a somewhat serious problem, 14% said that it is somewhat unserious, and 7% said that it is not serious at all.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1932 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 10 – August 17, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately  $\pm 2-3$  per cent at 95% confidence level.

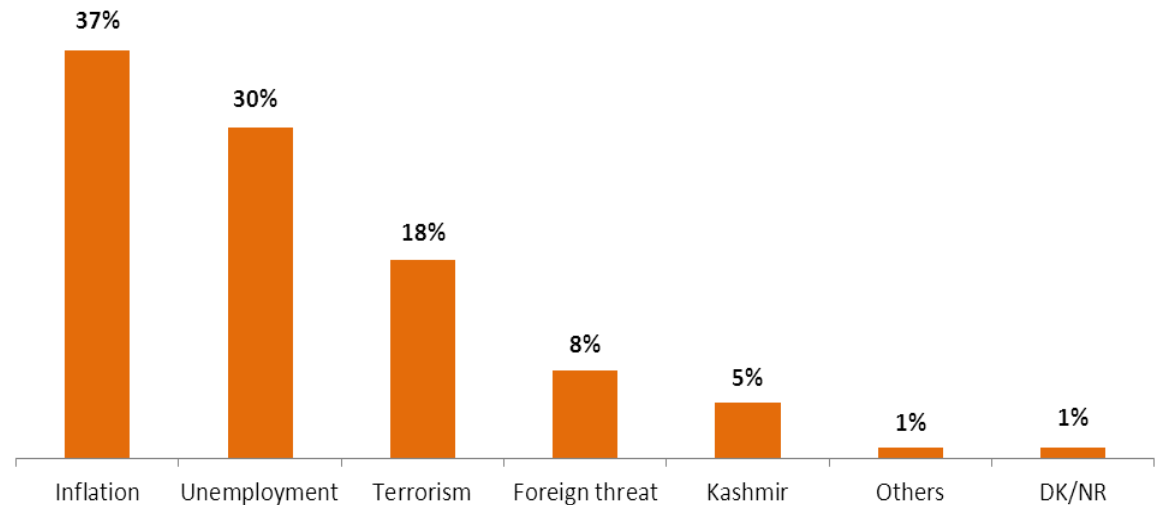

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 37% Pakistanis believe that the biggest current problem Pakistan is facing is inflation; 30% believe that it is unemployment.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “According to you what is the biggest problem facing Pakistan currently?” In response to this question, 37% Pakistanis said that the biggest national problem is currently inflation, 30% said that it is unemployment, 18% said that it is terrorism, 8% said that it is some foreign threat, 5% said that Kashmir is the biggest national problem while 1% of the respondents mentioned others and 1% did not respond.

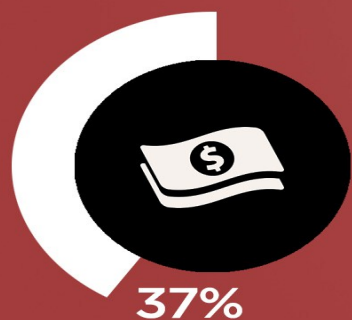

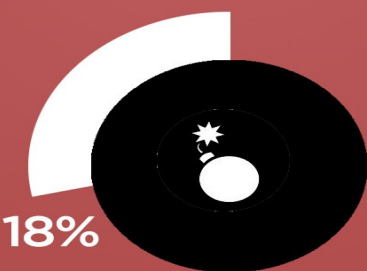
According to you what is the biggest problem facing Pakistan currently?

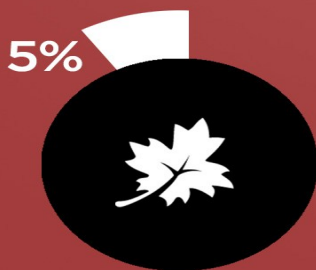

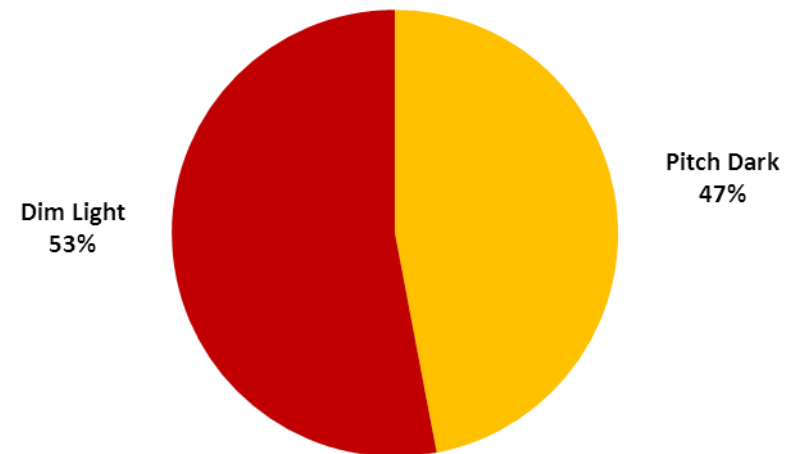

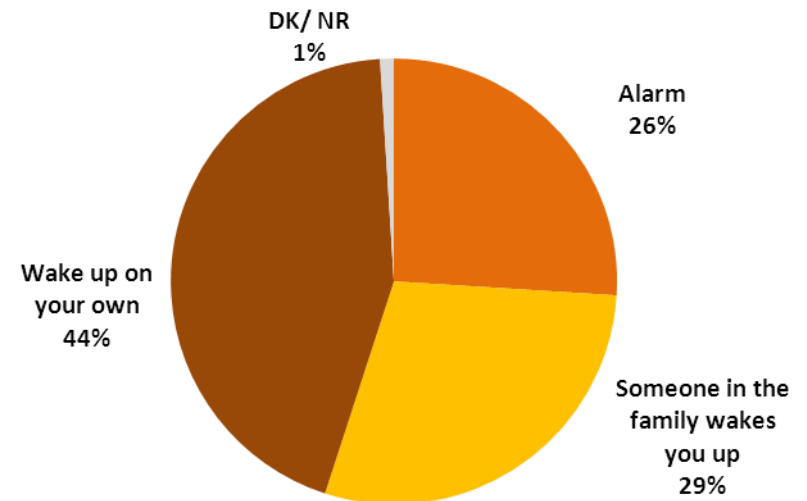

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Do you wake up in the morning using an alarm, or does a member of your household wake you up or do you wake up by yourself in the morning?” In response to this question, 44% said that they wake up in the morning on their own, 29% said that somebody in their family wakes them up and only 26% said that they wake up at the sound of the alarm, 1% didn’t respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1910 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 24 – August 31, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately  $\pm 2-3$  per cent at 95% confidence level.
