International Country-Wise Britain

Improving ties between UK and Pakistan? Pakistanis express increasing level of trust regarding British people; a larger proportion however seems to have a negative opinion. GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

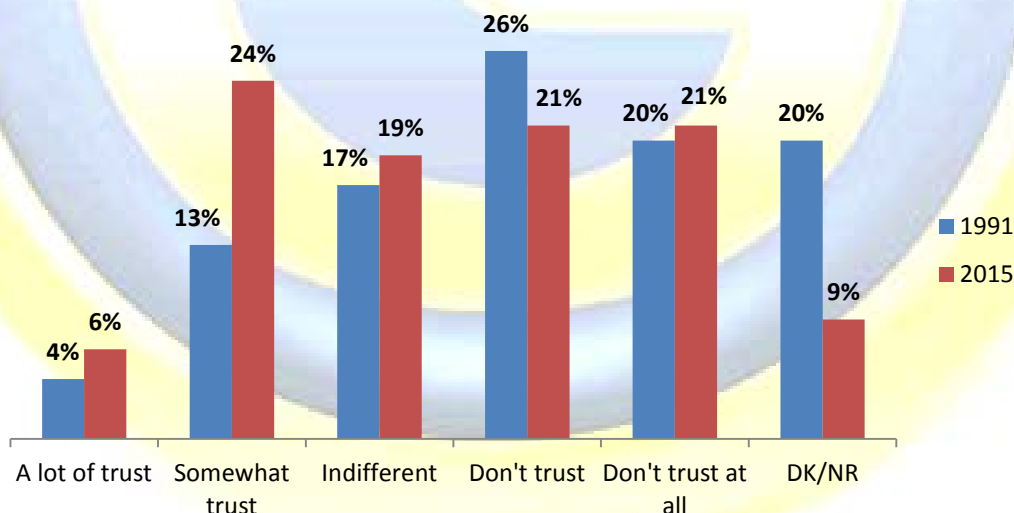
According to a Gallup Pakistan National Survey conducted in the year 1991 (24 years ago), 4% Pakistanis said that the British are very trustworthy, 13% said that they are somewhat trustworthy, 17% were indifferent while another 26% said that they are not trustworthy. 20% said that the British are not trustworthy at all and 20% did not respond.

Comparative Picture: The question was asked again in 2015 to enable a solid comparison and to observe the trend in public opinion. In 2015, 6% respondents said that they trust the British a lot, 24% said that they somewhat trust them, 19% were indifferent and 21% said that they did not trust the British. A further 21% said that they did not trust the British at all and 9% did not respond.

Public opinion has changed over the years with a general increase in the number of people who claim to have trust in the British. Those who said that they trust the British a lot increased by 2% from 1991 to 2015 while those who somewhat trust them increased by 11%. Further, there has been a 2% increase in those who are indifferent as well as a 5% decrease in those who do not trust the British. There has however been a 1% increase in those who do not trust the British at all.
