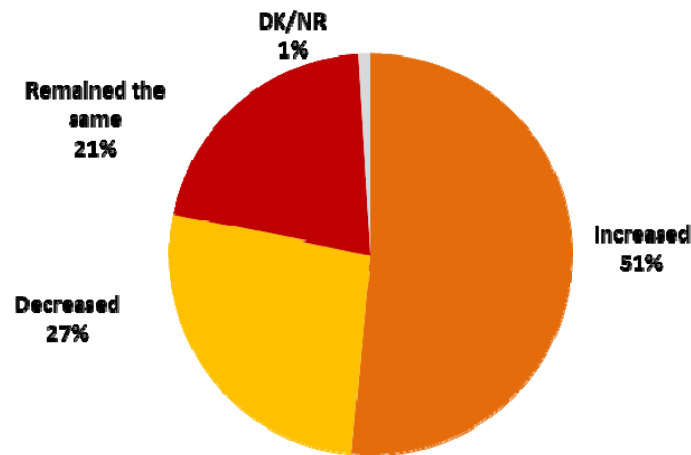

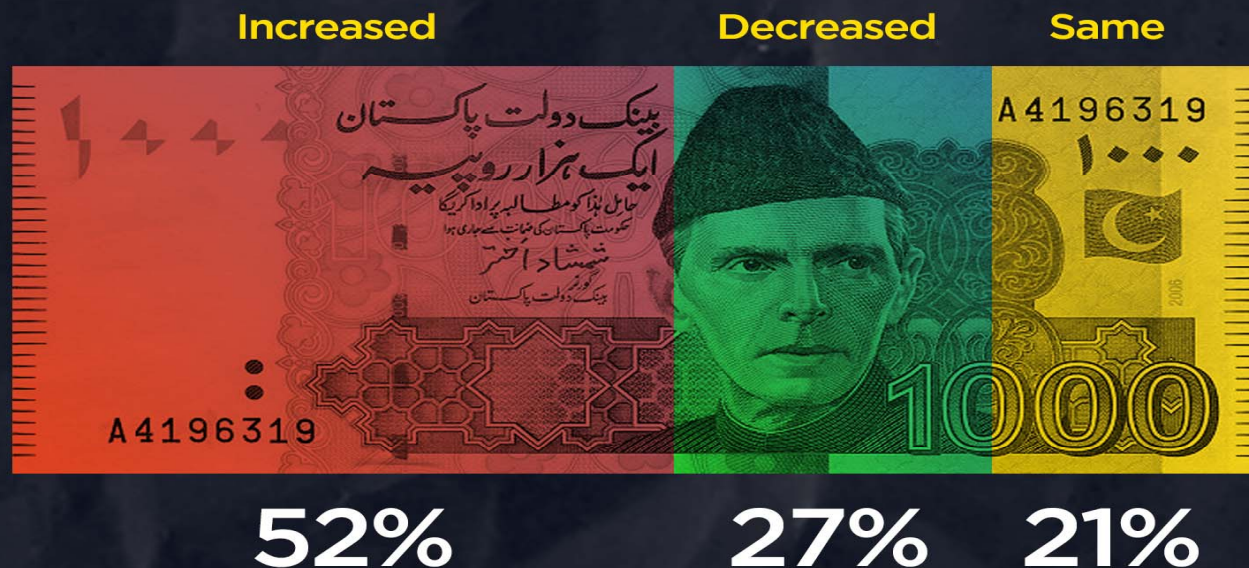
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 52% Pakistanis believe that poverty in the country has increased while 27% believe that it has decreased and 21% say that it has remained the same.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “In the last ten years has poverty in our country increased, decreased or remained the same according to your opinion?” In response to this question, 52% said that in their opinion poverty has increased and 27% said it has decreased while 21% said that it has remained the same. 1% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1910 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 24 – August 31, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

Rising Poverty: More than half Pakistanis (52%) believe that poverty in the country has increased.

In the last ten years has poverty in our country increased, decreased or remained the same according to your opinion?





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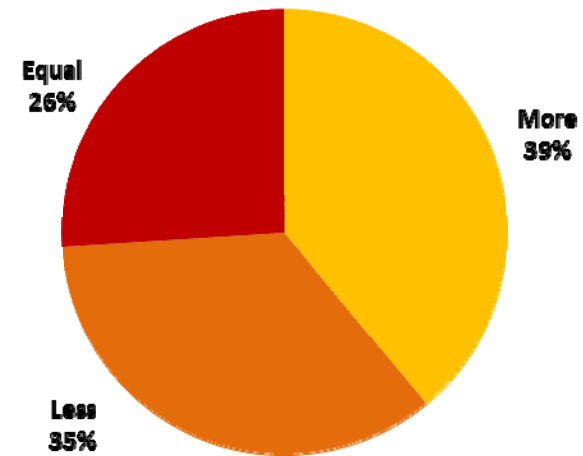

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Is the extent of poverty in Pakistan compared to its neighbours (India, Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Nepal) more, less or equal in your opinion?” In response to this question, 39% said that poverty is comparatively greater in Pakistan, 35% said that it is less while 26% said that poverty levels in these countries are approximately the same.

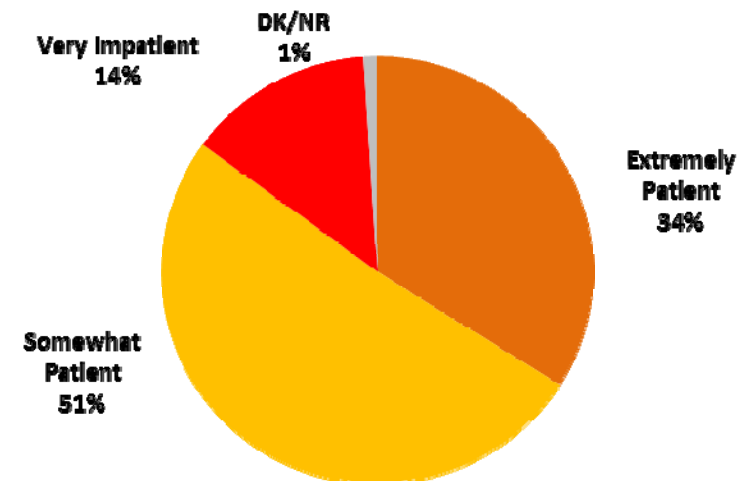


“Patient Pakistanis: 85% Pakistanis claim to be patient in their personal lives.”

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 85% Pakistanis claim to be patient in their personal life; 14% say that they are usually very impatient.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “How patient are you in your personal life?” In response to this question, 34% said that they are extremely patient, 51% said they are somewhat patient while 14% said they are very impatient. 1% did not respond.

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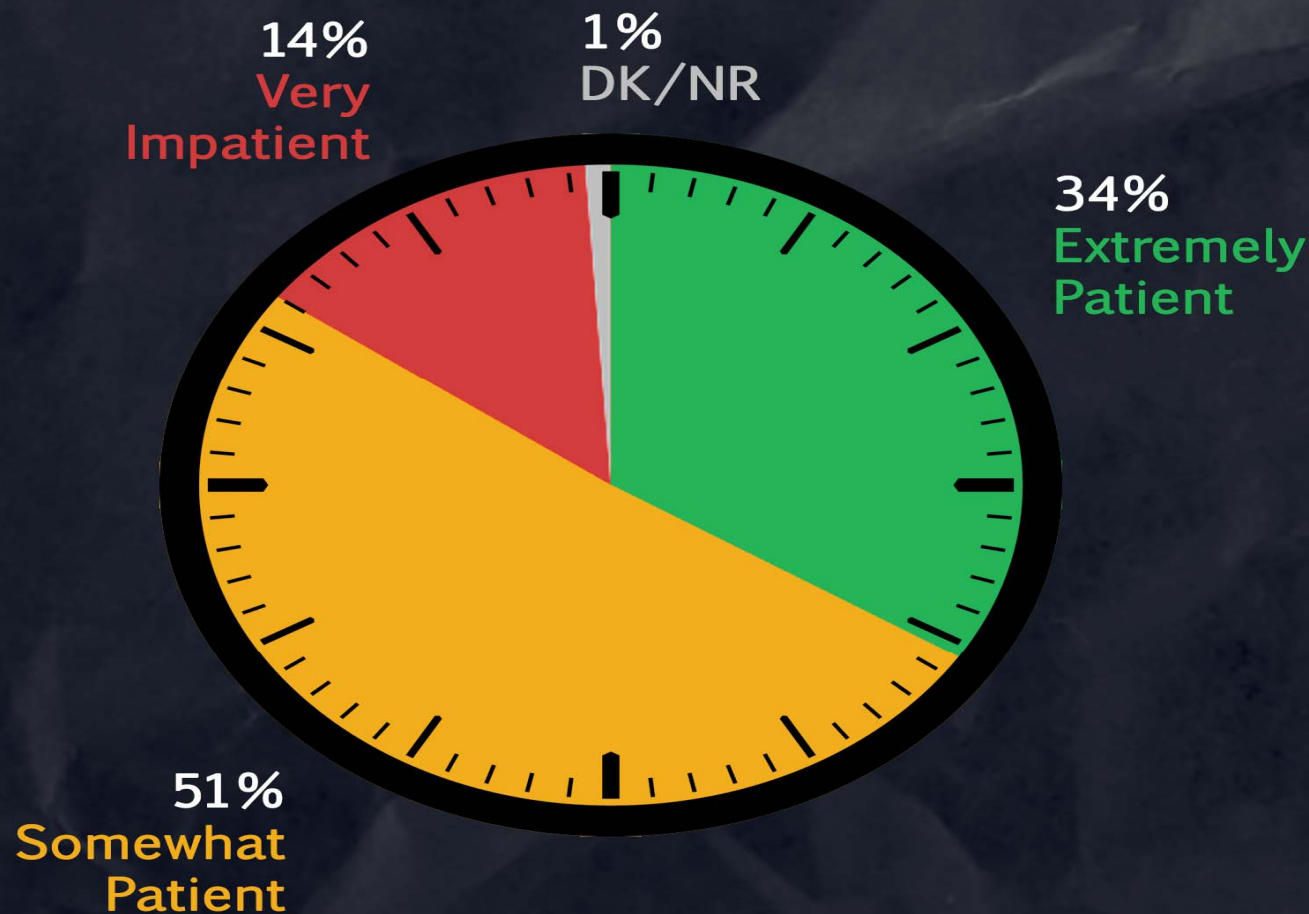


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Patient Pakistanis: 85% Pakistanis claim to be patient in their personal lives.

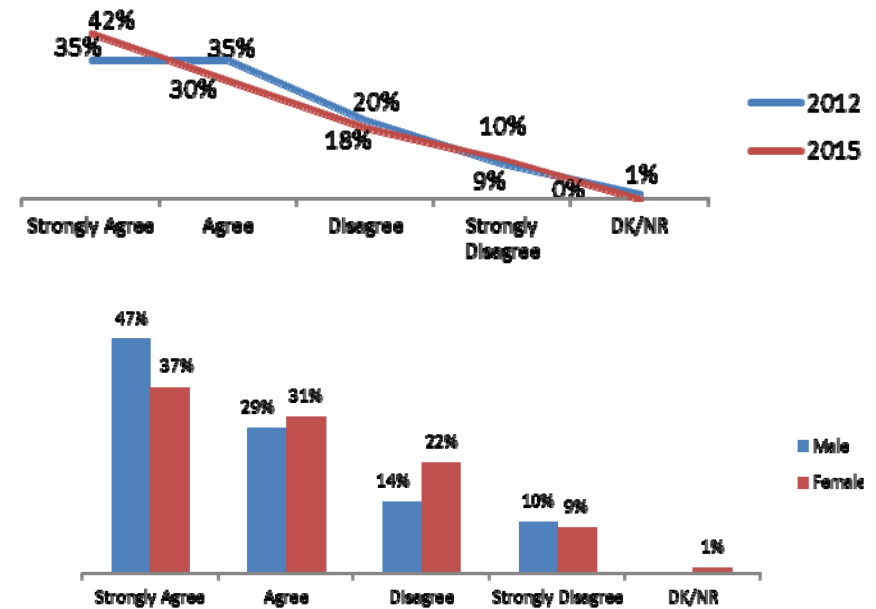
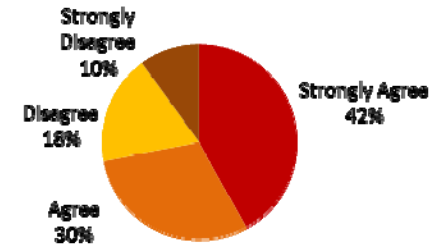

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 42% of the respondents believe that women should discharge their household duties in a way as if they are being paid for it.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked the extent to which they agree with the following statement, “As a housewife, a woman should work with an attitude of one who is being paid for her work.” In response, 42% strongly agreed with the statement, 30% agreed with it, 18% disagreed with it and 10% strongly disagreed with the statement.

This question was also asked previously in August 2012. The general trend has been such that while public opinion has remained relatively consistent during the course of these three years, there has been an increase in respondents who strongly agree with this statement. Those who strongly believe that women should perform their household duties such that it seems that they are being paid for it increased from 35% in August 2012 to 42% in August 2015. Those who ‘agree’ with the statement however decreased from 35% to 30% during these three years. Likewise, those who disagree with the statement decreased from 20% to 18% and those who strongly disagree with the statement increased from 9% to 10%. 1% did not respond in August 2012.

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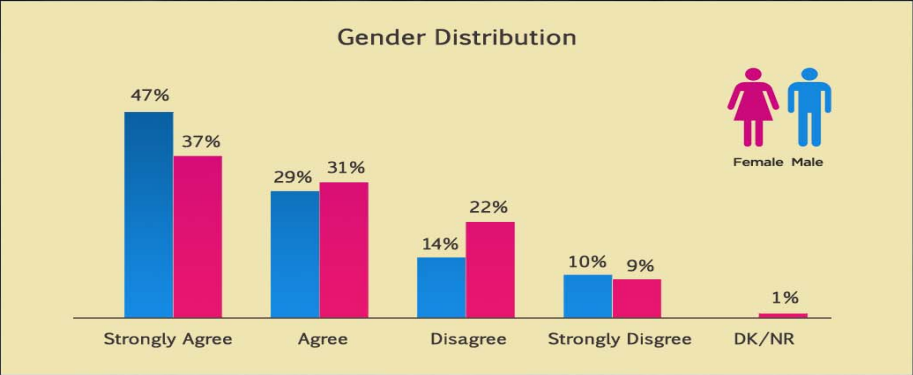
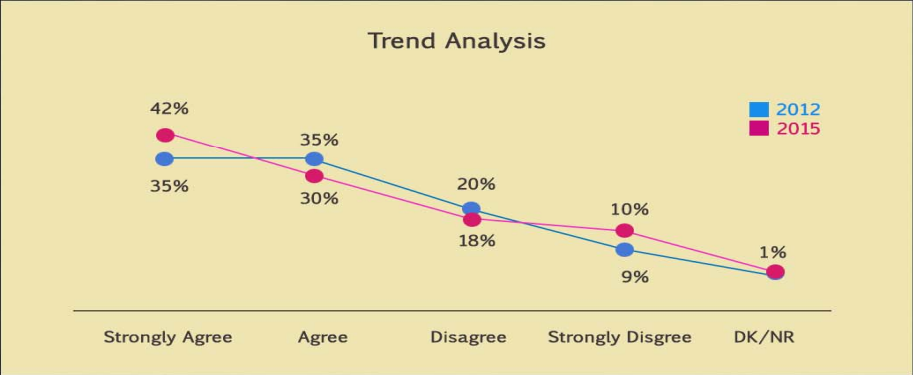
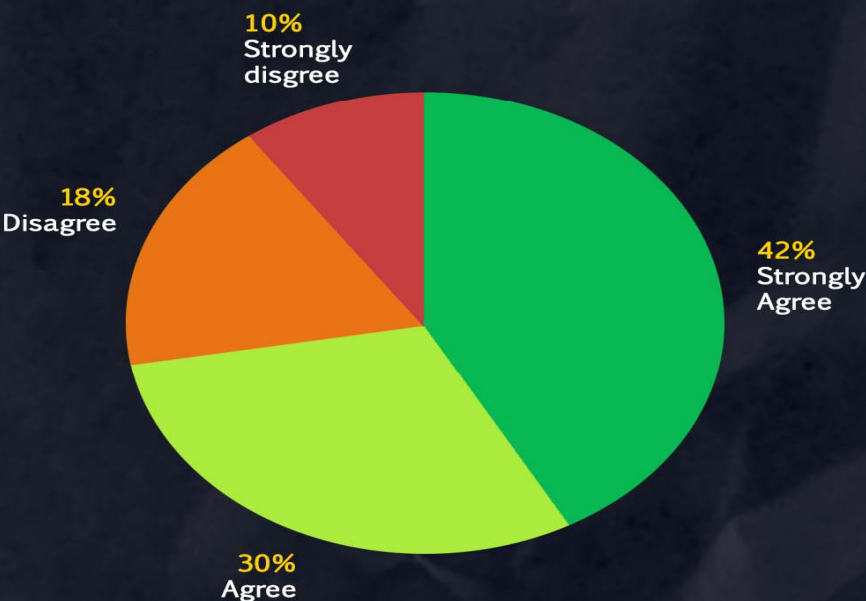
