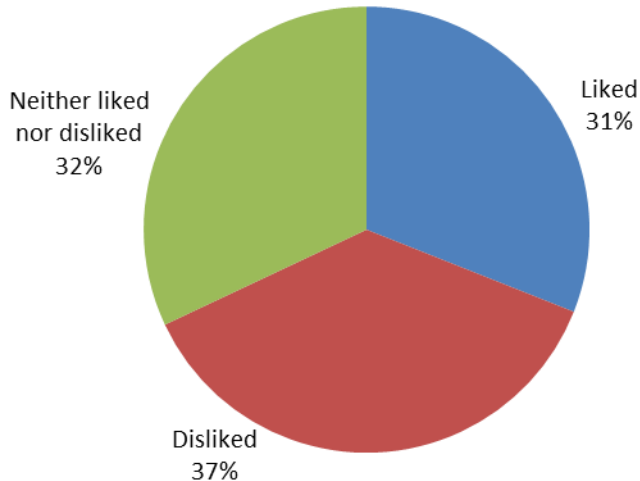

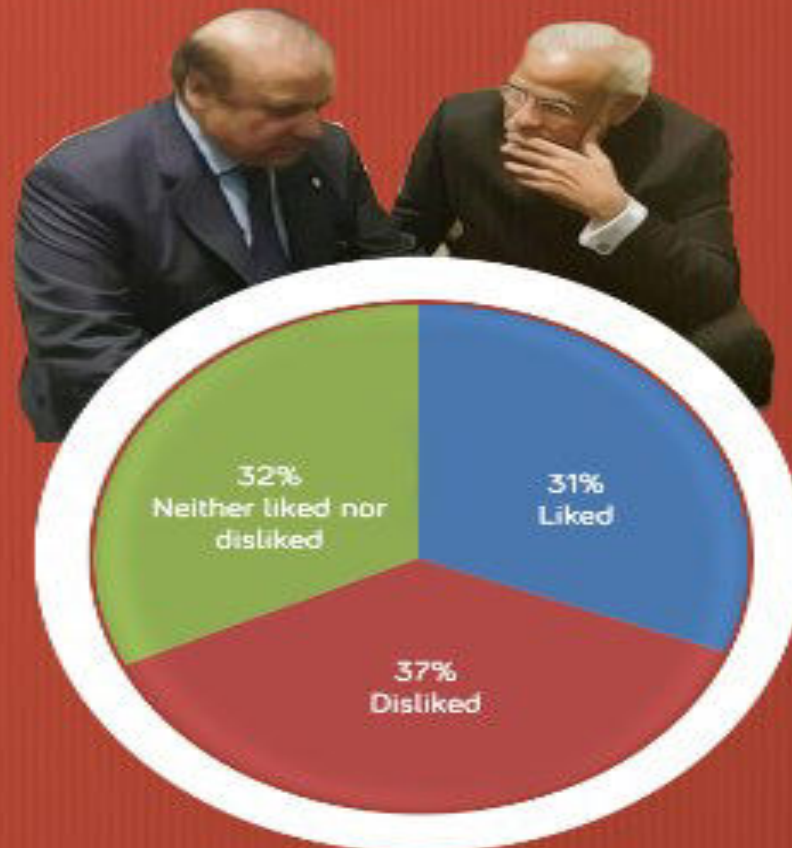

Please tell, what is your opinion on this?” In response to this question 31% said that they liked it, 37% said that they disliked it and 32% said that they neither liked nor disliked it.

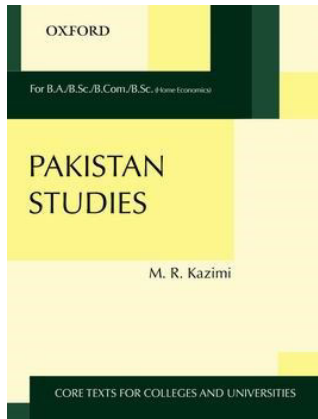

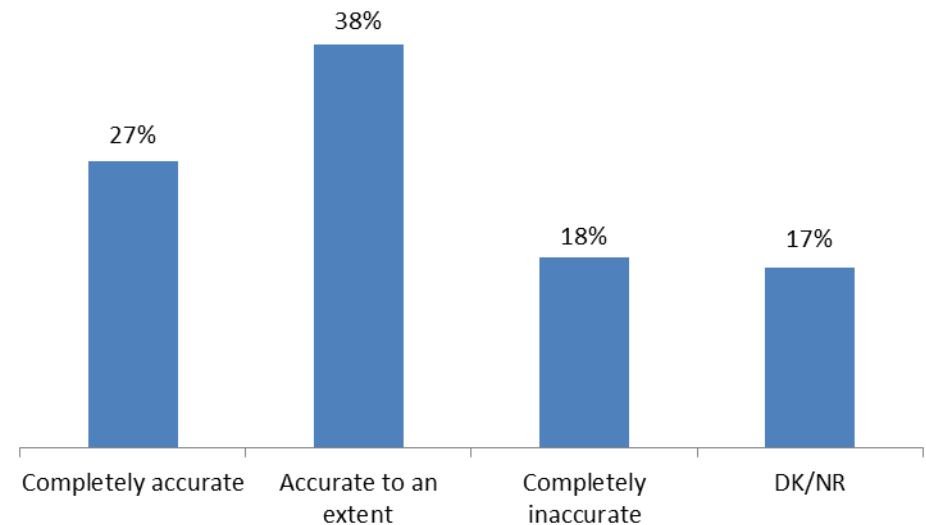

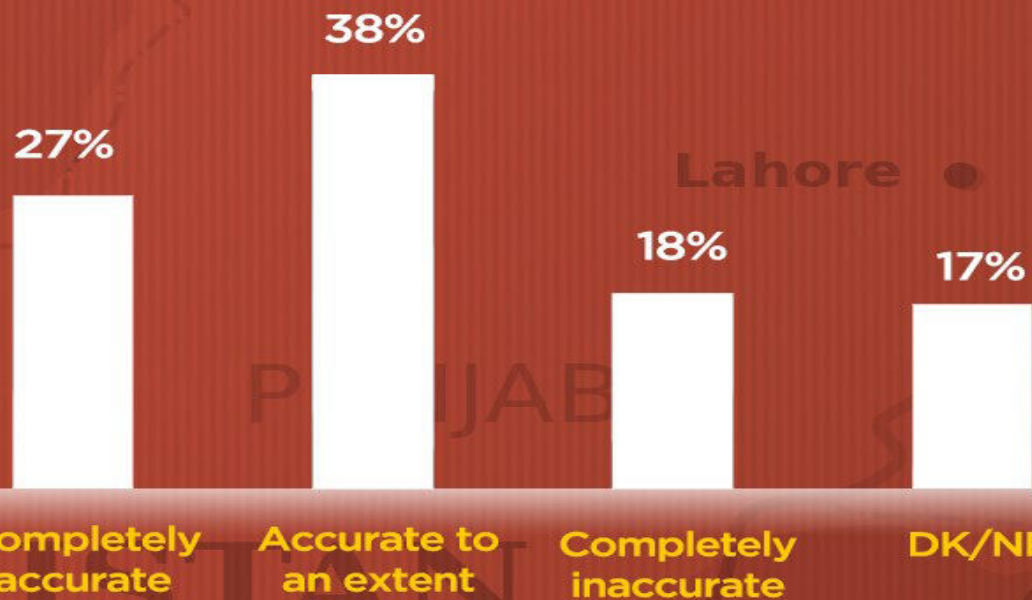
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, how accurate do you think are the history textbooks in schools with respect to events that happened before, during and after partition?” In response to this question 27% said that they are completely accurate, 38% said that they are accurate to an extent while 18% said that they are completely inaccurate. 17% did not respond.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1756 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 07 – December 14, 2015. 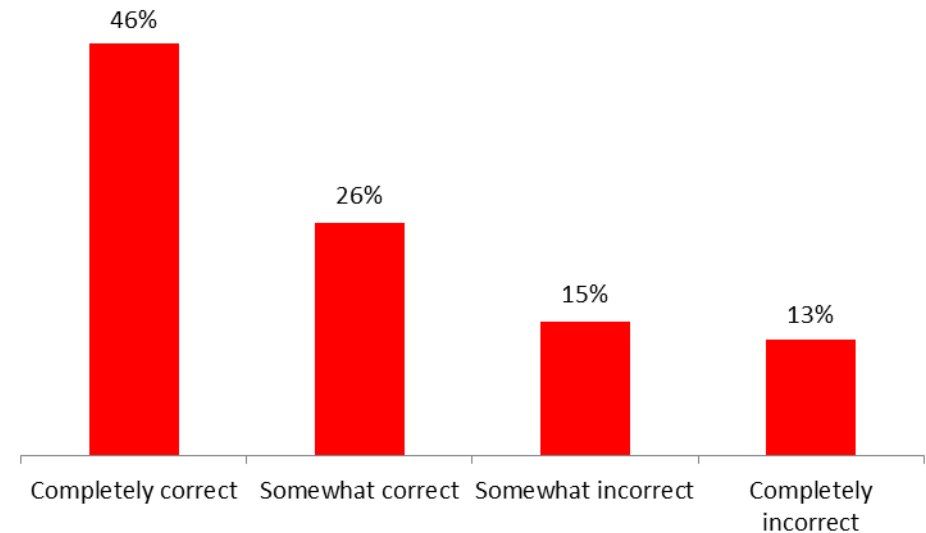

To what extent do you think that this viewpoint (that Hindus and Muslims are socially and politically different) is correct today?

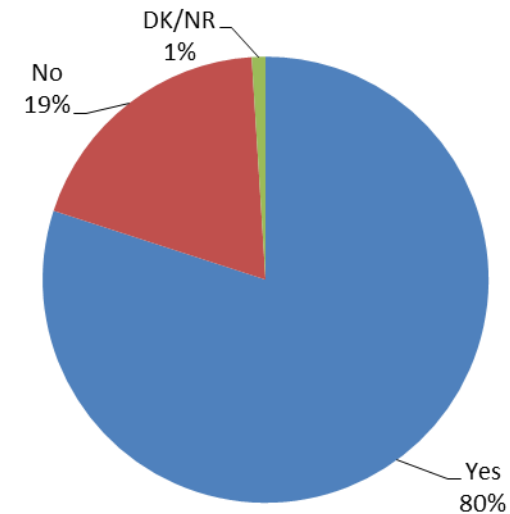

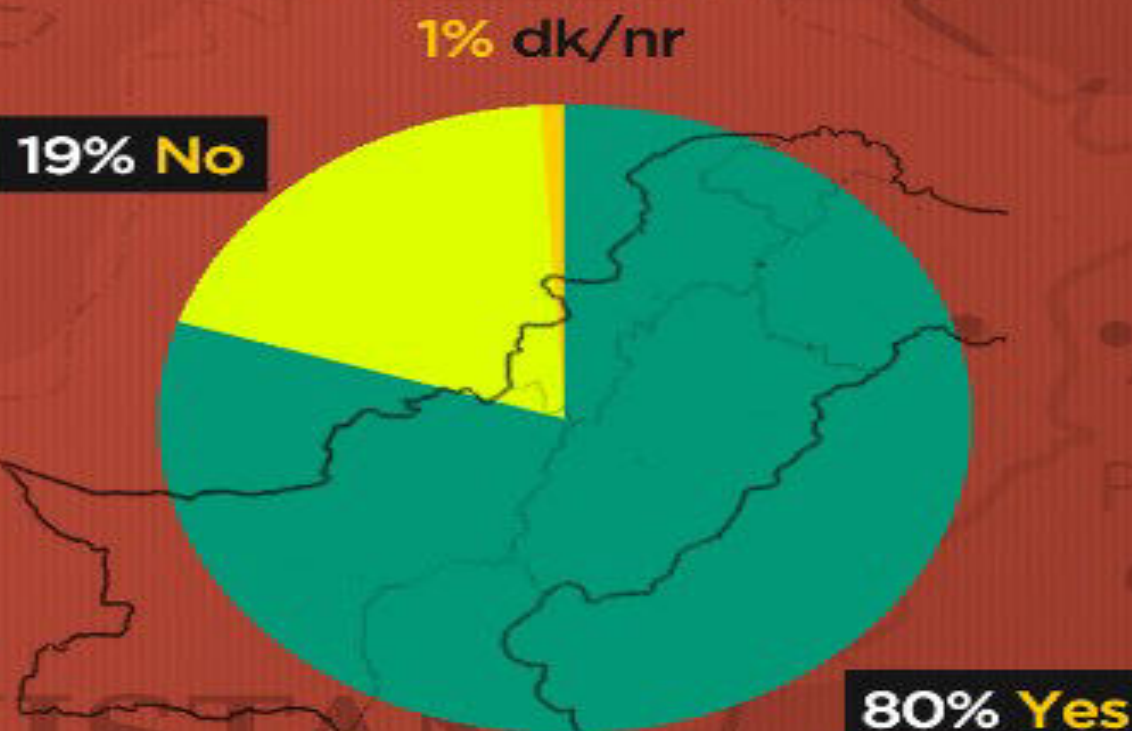

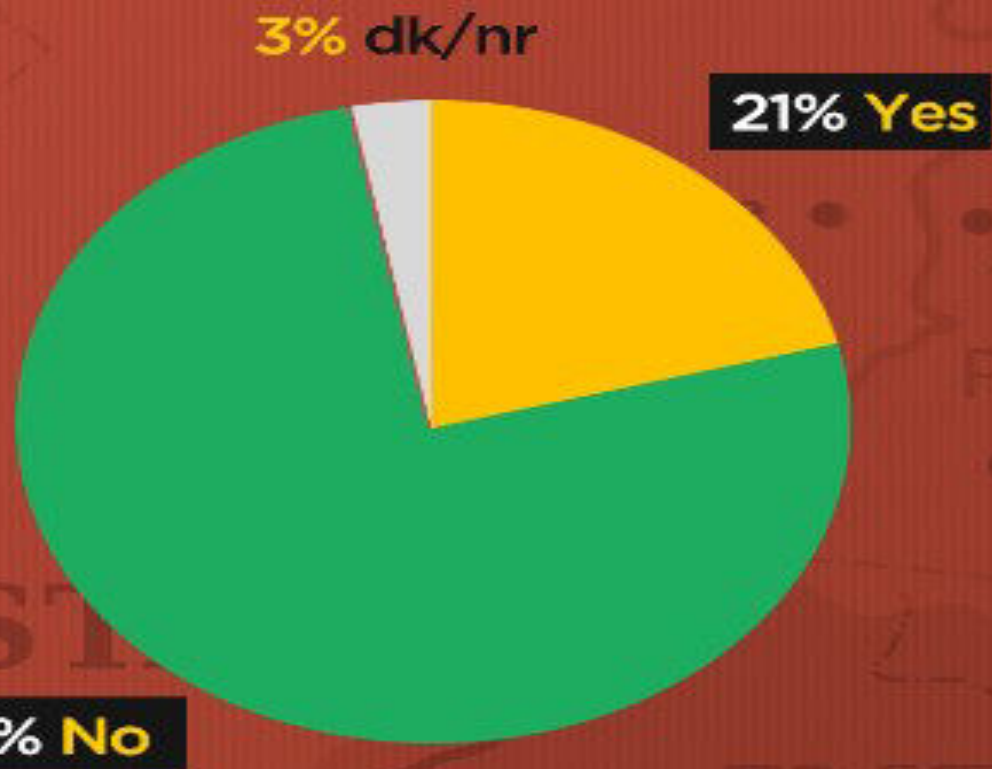
