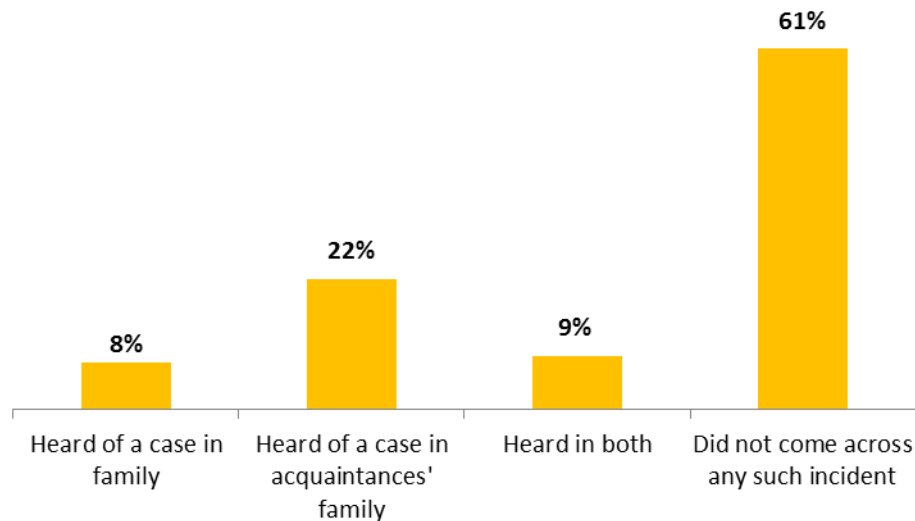

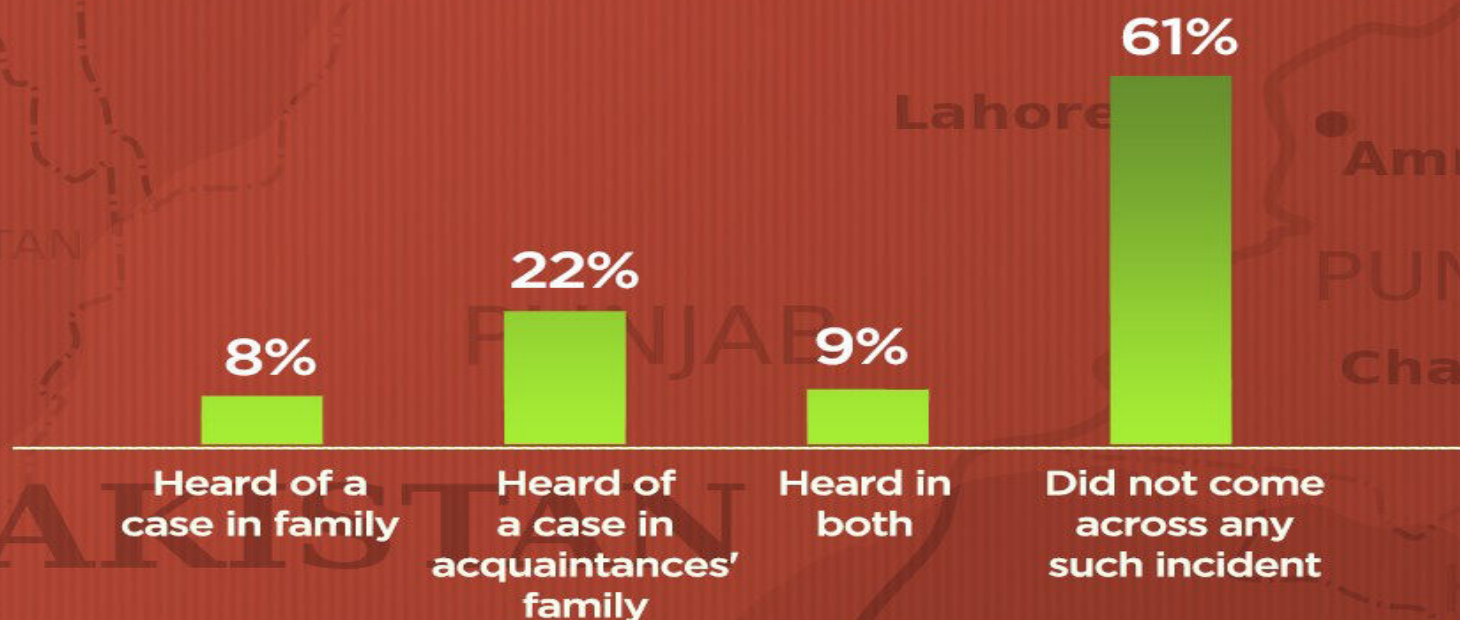

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 39% Pakistanis said that they have heard of an incident in their family (8%) or acquaintances' families (22%) or in both (9%) in which a Muslim's life was saved by a Hindu/Sikh.

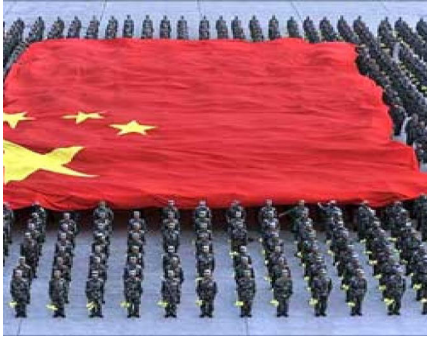
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "According to some people, a few Hindus and Sikhs saved lives of Muslims during partition violence in 1947. Did you hear about any such case in your family or acquaintances' families in which a person's life was saved by a Hindu or a Sikh?" In response to this question 8% said that they had heard of such a case in their family, 22% said that they had heard of a case in acquaintances' family and 9% said that they had heard in both. 61% however said that they did not come across any such incident.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1756 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 07 – December 14, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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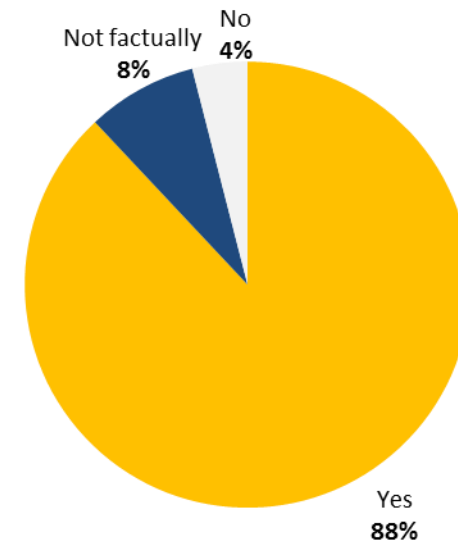

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 88% Pakistanis believe that China is a world power.

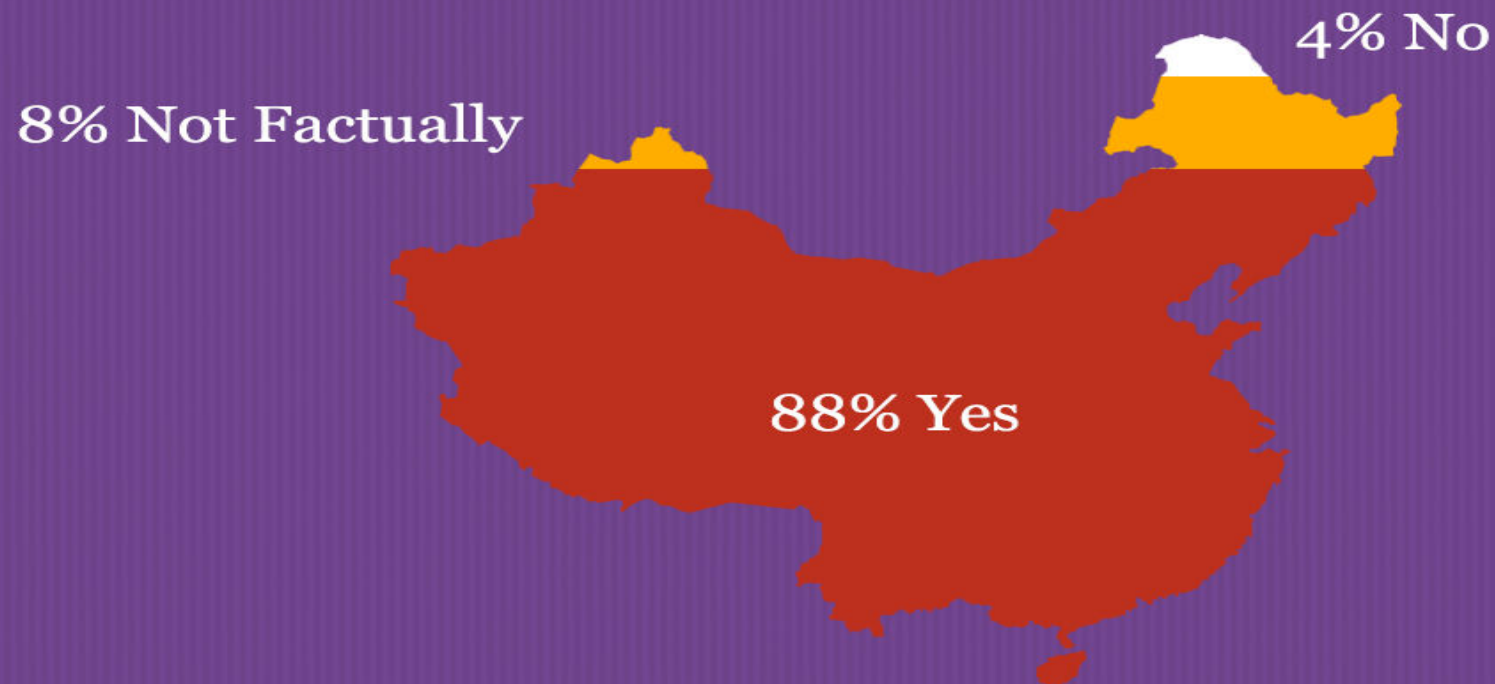
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Do you think China is a world power?” In response to this question, 88% said ‘yes’, 8% said ‘not factually’ and 4% said ‘no’.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1853 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 09 – November 16, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

Do you think China is a world power?



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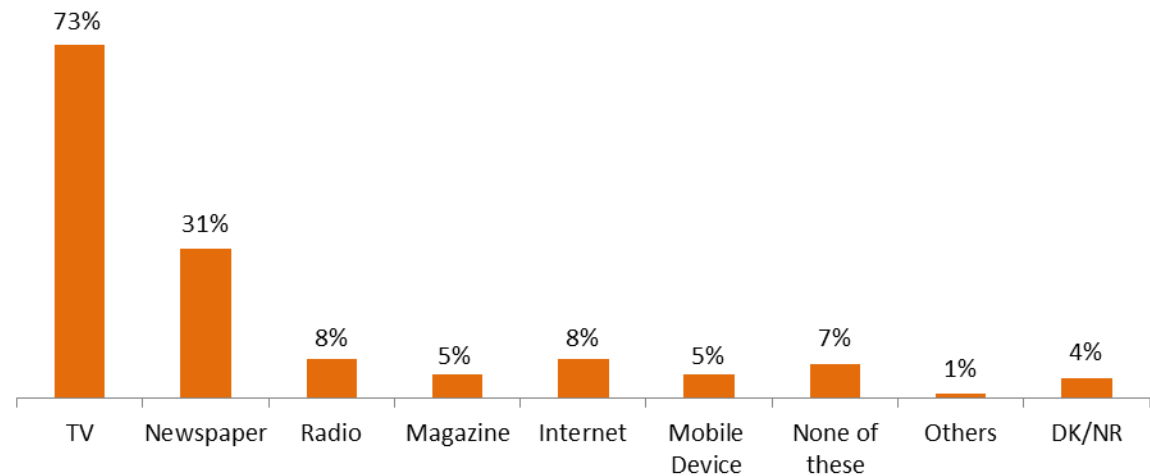
Majority Pakistanis (73%) claim to use TV regularly for entertainment.

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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, most Pakistanis (73%) regularly use TV for entertainment.

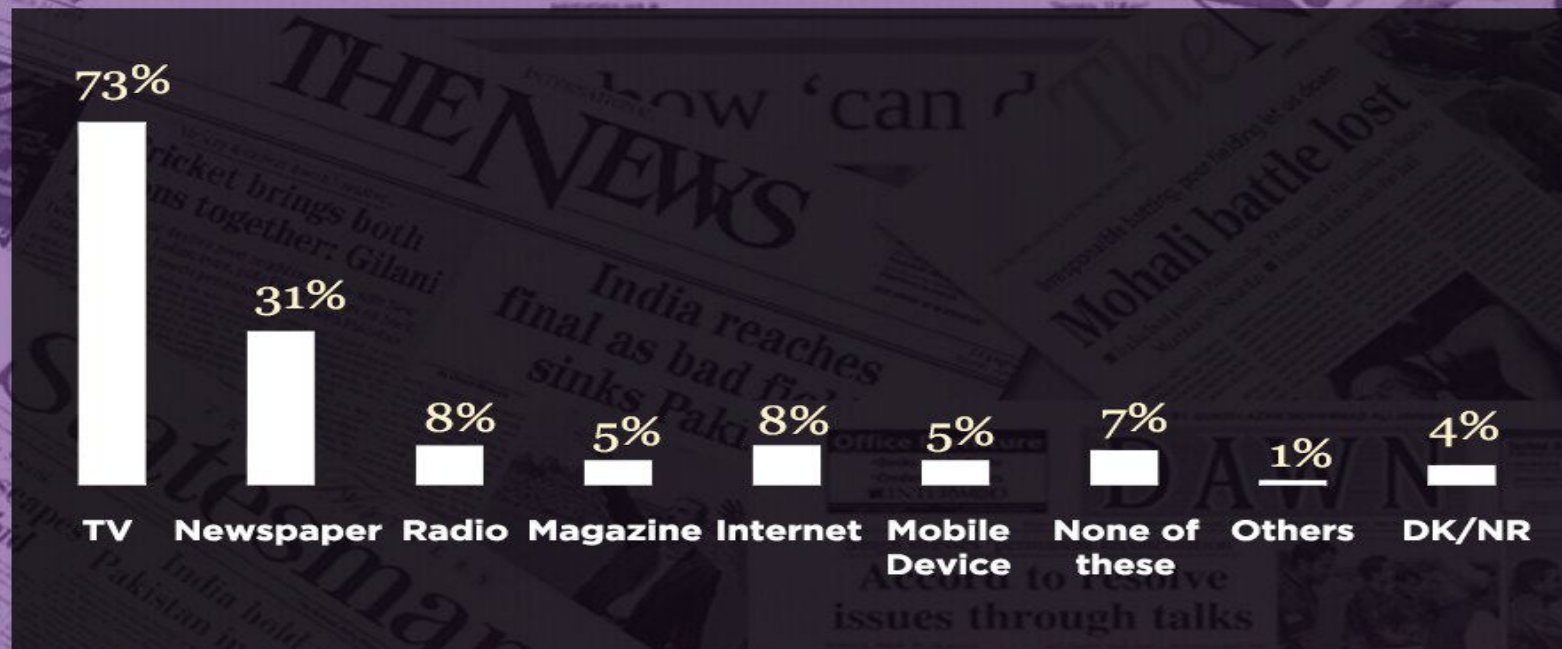
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Which of the following media or technology do you use regularly for entertainment?” In response to this question, 73% mentioned TV, 31% mentioned newspaper, 8% said radio, 5% said magazines, 8% said internet and 5% mentioned mobile device (smart phone, iPad etc.). 7% said none of these, 1% mentioned others and 4% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1853 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 09 – November 16, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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Divided opinion on whether Imran Khan and Reham Khan's divorce should be discussed on media.

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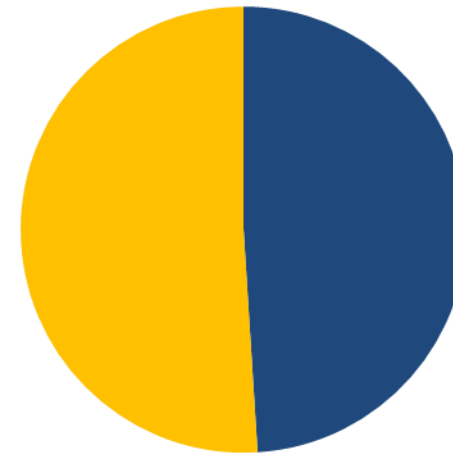

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 51% Pakistanis believe that Imran Khan and Reham Khan's divorce discussions on the media are not justified.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Some people are of the opinion that Imran Khan and Reham Khan's divorce is their personal matter and there should be no discussion on this on the media. Others say that it is very difficult to draw a distinction between Imran Khan's personal and political life. Therefore there is no harm in having discussions related to this on the media. What is your opinion?" In response to this question, 51% said that a discussion on this on the media is not justified while 49% said that discussion on the media is justified.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1526 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 09 – November 16, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

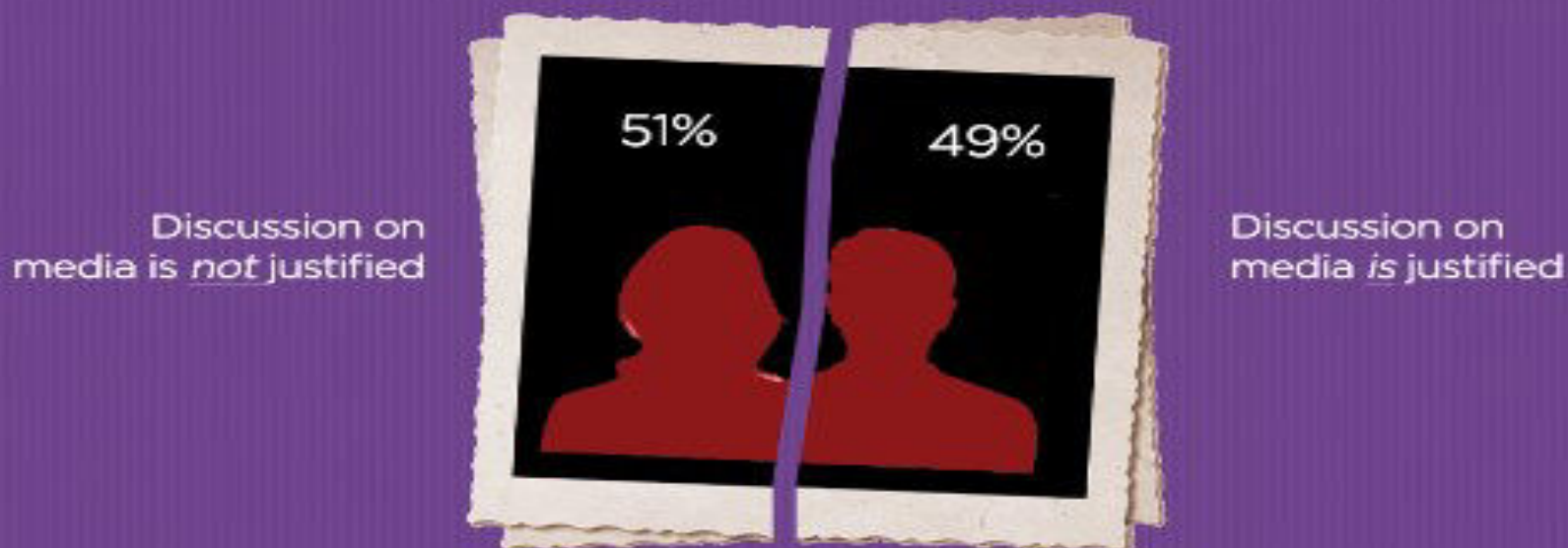

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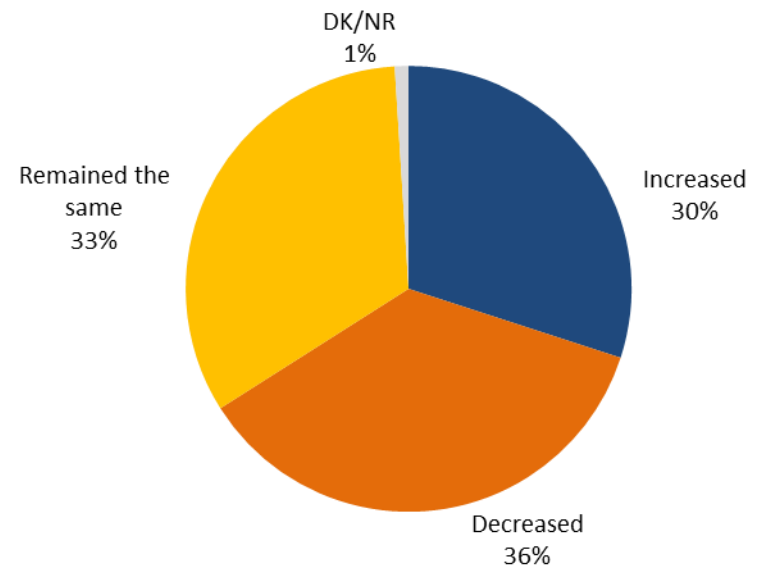
1 in 3 Pakistanis believe that the duration of load shedding has decreased this year.

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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 36% Pakistanis believe that duration of load-shedding has decreased this year.

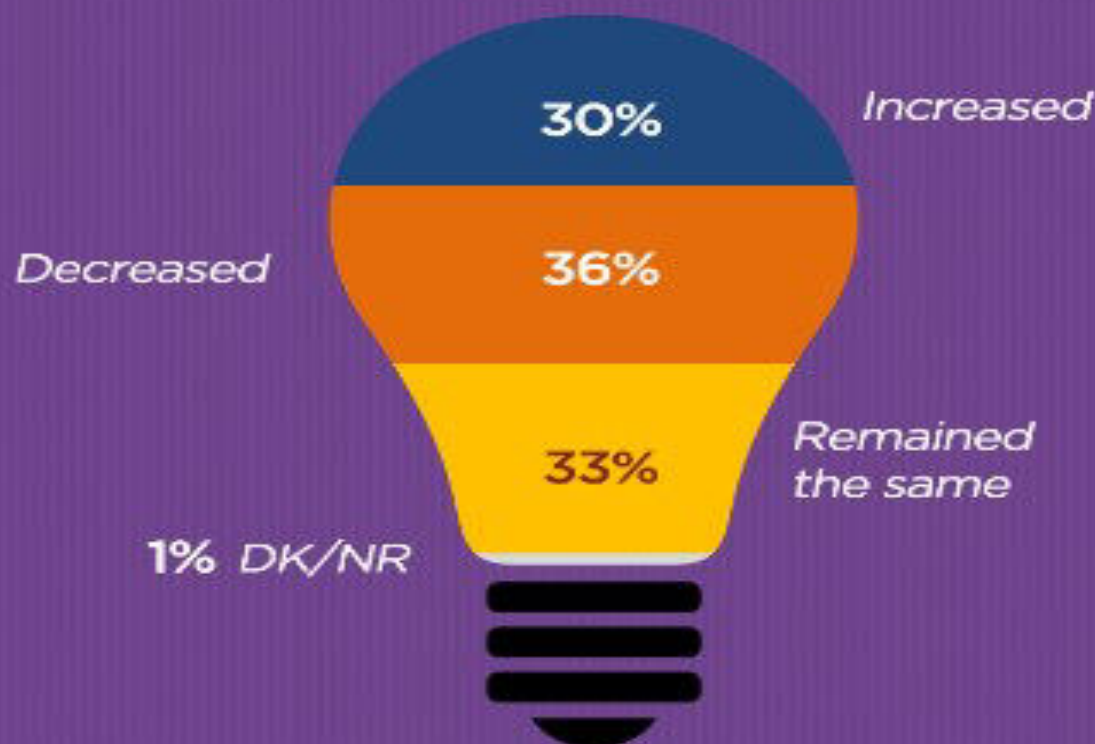
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, has the duration of load shedding this year increased, decreased or remained the same as previous year?” In response to this question, 30% said that duration of load-shedding has increased this year, 36% said that it has decreased while 33% said that it has remained the same. 1% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1832 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during October 19 – October 26, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
