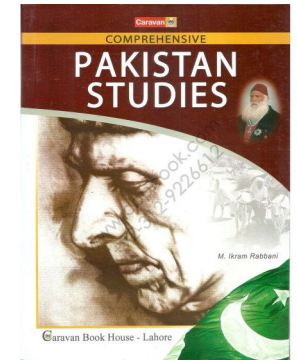

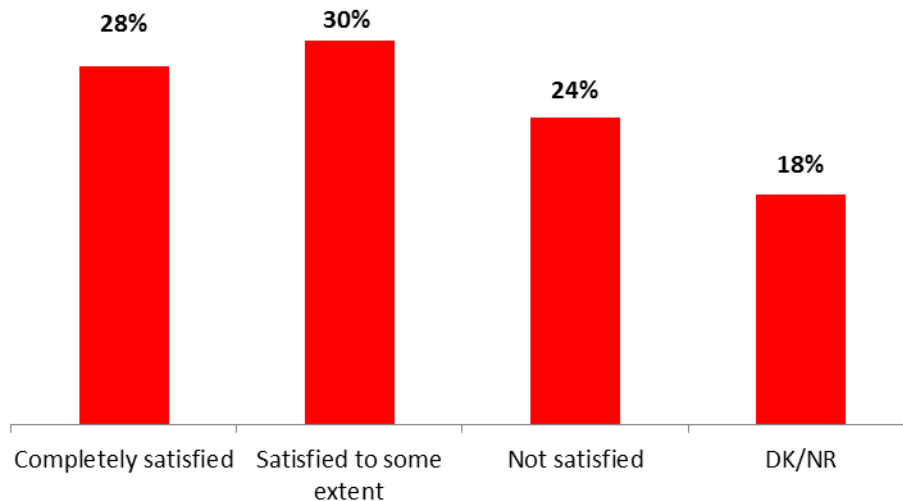

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 58% Pakistanis claim to be satisfied with the syllabi in children's history textbooks in schools.

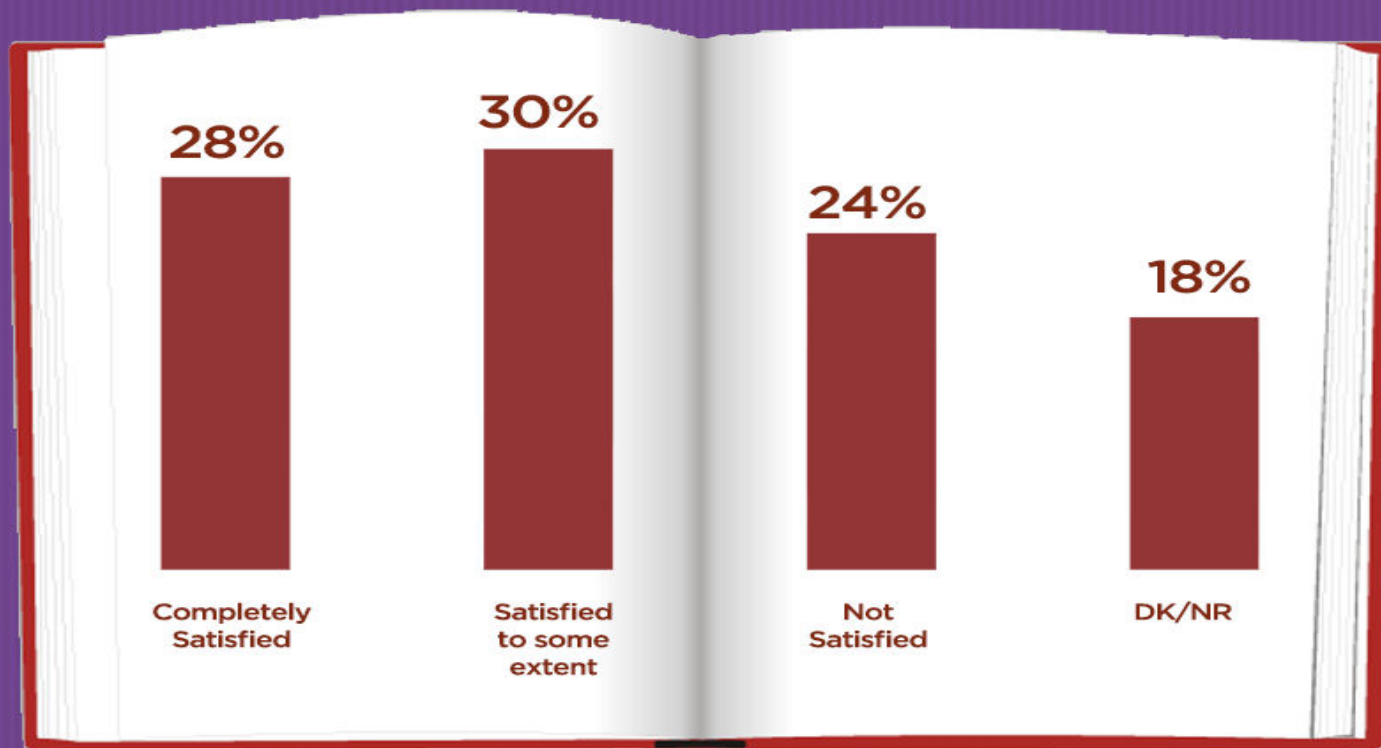
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Are you satisfied with the syllabi of children's history textbooks in schools?" In response to this question 28% said that they are completely satisfied, 30% said that they are satisfied to some extent and 24% said that they are not satisfied. 18% did not respond.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1756 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 07 – December 14, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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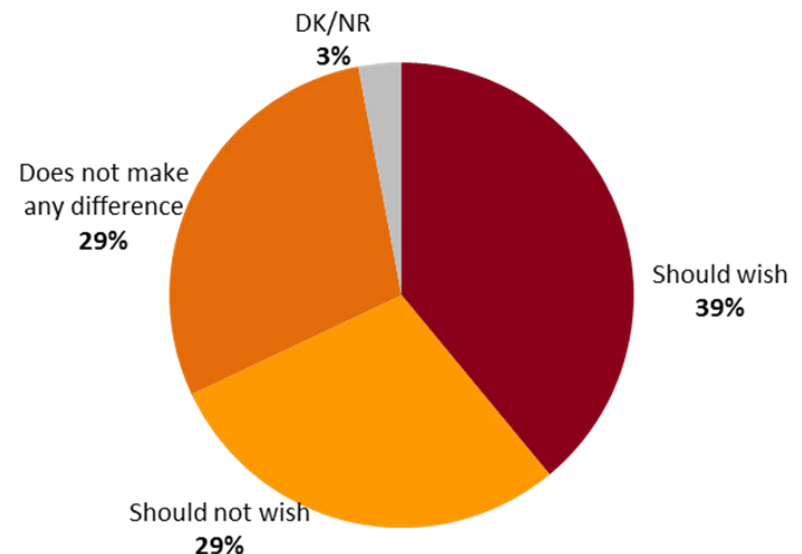

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 39% Pakistanis believe that Muslims should wish Christians on Christmas.

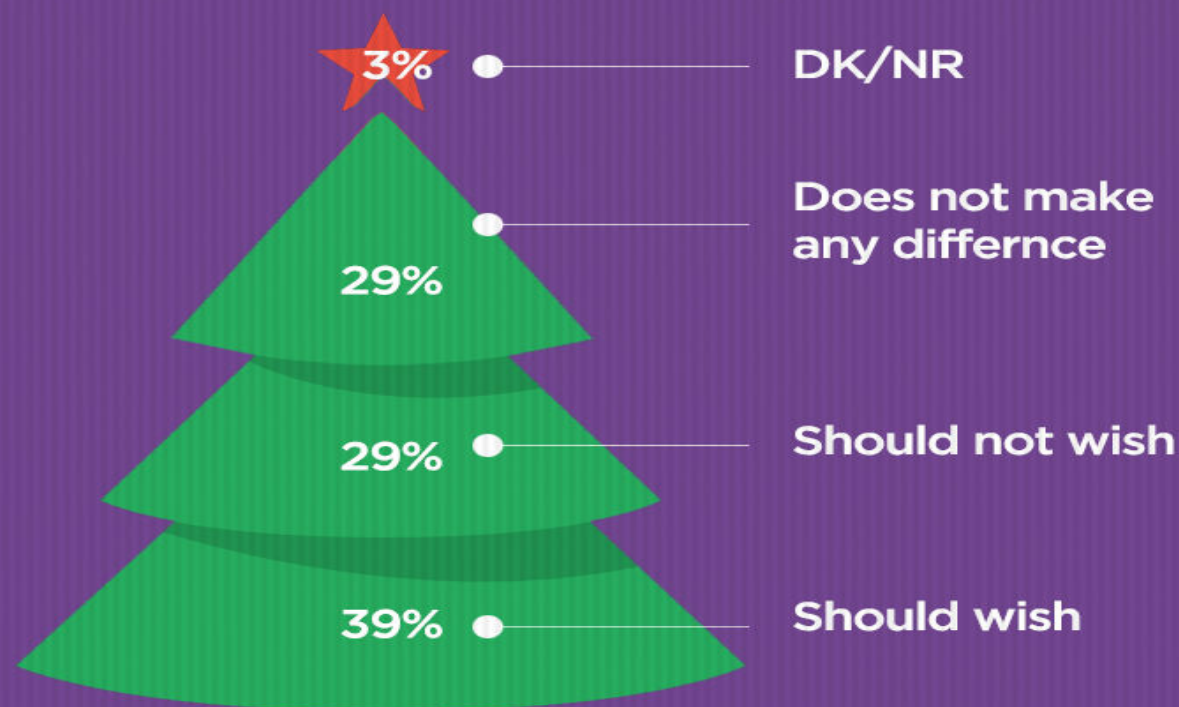
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think that Muslims should wish Christians on Christmas while others believe that this is not good. Some others however, believe that this does not make any difference. What is your opinion?” In response to this question 39% said Muslims should wish, 29% said they should not wish and another 29% said this does not make any difference. 3% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1883 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 04 – January 11, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

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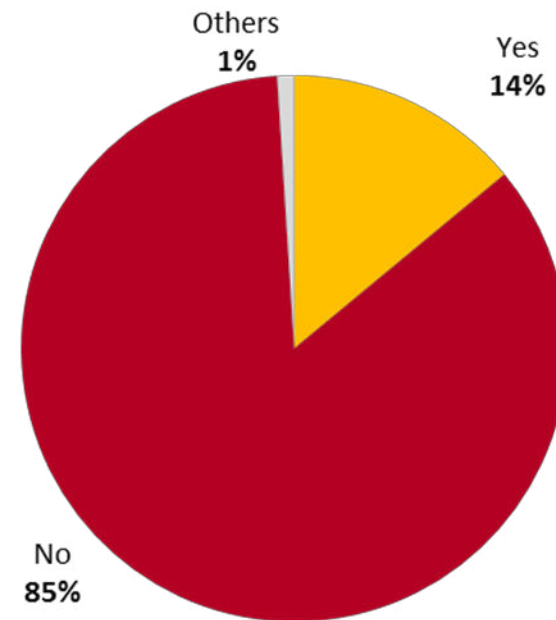
14% Pakistanis claim to have wished a 'Merry Christmas' to a Christian friend or neighbor this year .

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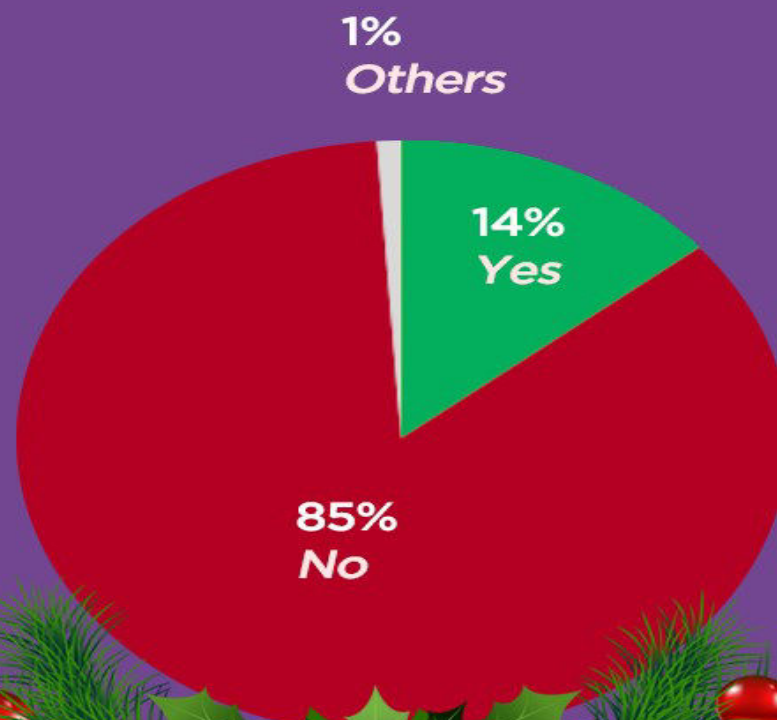
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “This year, did you wish a Christian friend or neighbor a merry Christmas?” In response to this question 14% said yes, 85% said no and 1% gave other responses (e.g. the respondent is a Christian himself/herself).

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1883 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 04 – January 11, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

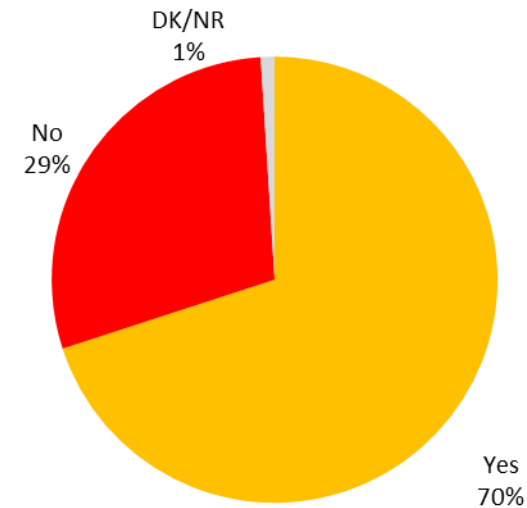

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, do children in our society nowadays pay respect and behave well with their elders, teachers or other people?” In response to this question 70% said yes and 29% said no. 1% did not respond.

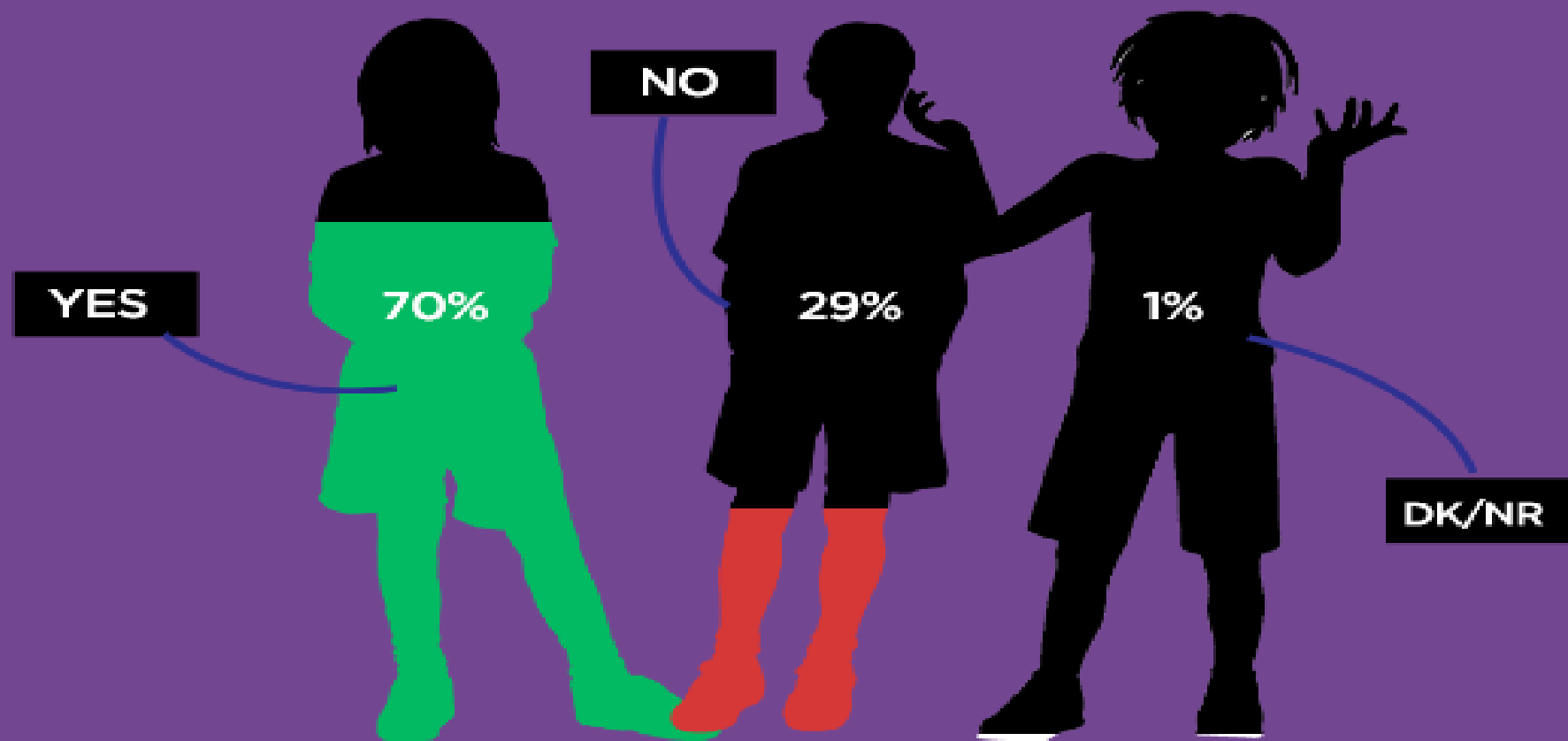

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1/3rd Pakistanis believe that a lot of people in Pakistan are afraid of expressing their political opinions.

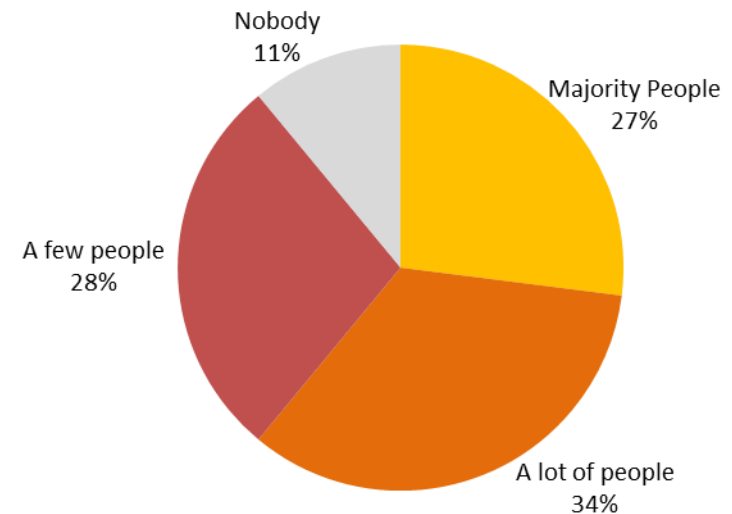
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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 34% Pakistanis believe that a lot of people in Pakistan are afraid of expressing their political opinions.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, how many people in our country are afraid of expressing their political opinions?” In response to this question 27% said majority people, 34% said a lot of people, 28% said a few people and 11% said nobody.

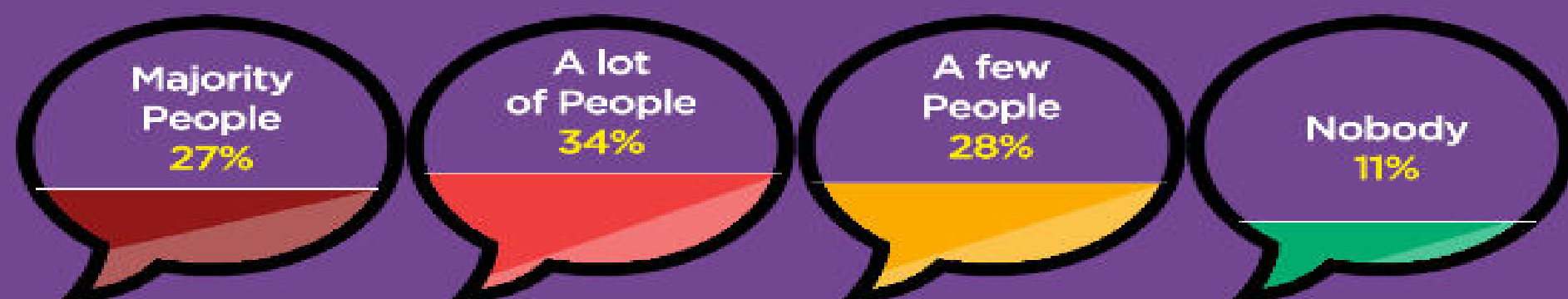
