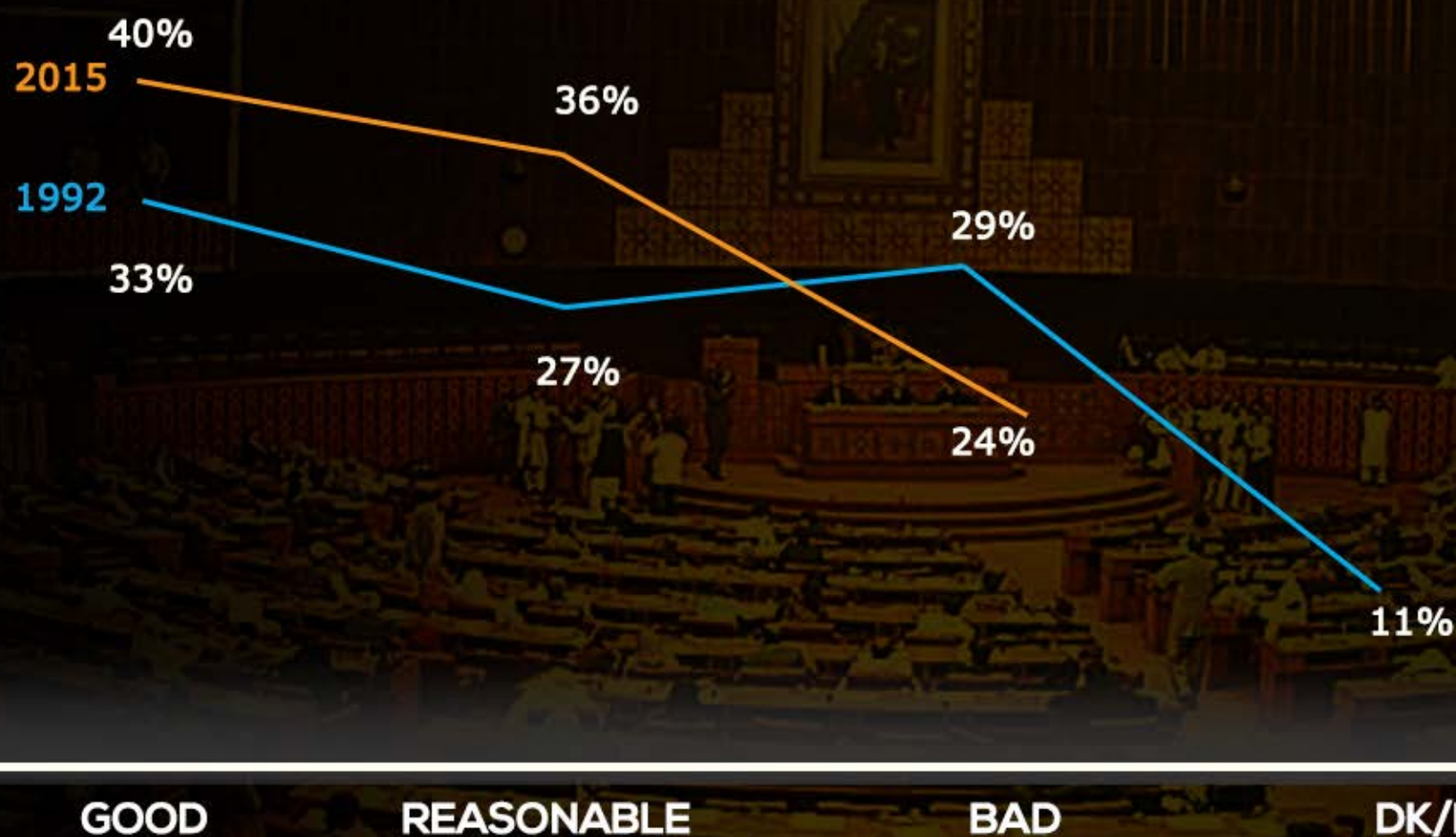

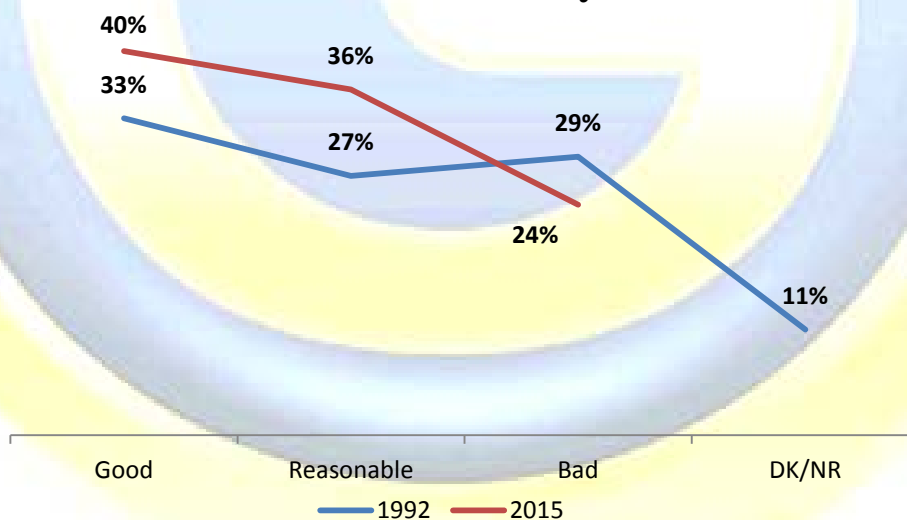
According to a Gallup Pakistan National Survey conducted in the year 1992 (24 years ago) respondents had been asked for their opinion regarding the members of Provincial Assembly (MPAs). 33% respondents said that they would rate the MPAs as Good and 27% said that they would rate them as Reasonable. 29% on the other hand, rated them as Bad. 11% did not respond.

Comparative Picture: The question was asked again in 2015 during to enable a concrete comparison. In 2015, 40% rated current MPAs as Good and 36% rated them as reasonable. 24% on the other hand rated them as Bad.

Public opinion regarding members of Provincial Assembly has shown a positive trend between 1992 and 2015. There has been a 7% increase in respondents who rated the MPAs as good in 2015 and a 5% decrease in those who rated the MPAs as bad. There has also been a 9% increase in those who rated them as Reasonable.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision making in Pakistan.
