



Opinion Poll **SOCIAL BEHAVIOR** **Religious Practices in Pakistan (Part 3)**

*This is a **5 part series** on **5** aspects of religious practice in Pakistan. **Part 1** deals with claims about attending Friday prayers at a local mosque; **Part 2** deals with attending annual congregation/festival (Urs) at a Sufi shrine; **Part 3** deals with participation in religious education (Tabligh) by listening to someone who visited your home for this purpose (Dawaa); **Part 4** deals with participation in religious education (Tabligh) by participating in a group which went to other people's homes for this purpose (Dawaa). **Part 5** deals with source of Guidance on religious matters, that is, the person who influences you most on religious matters.*

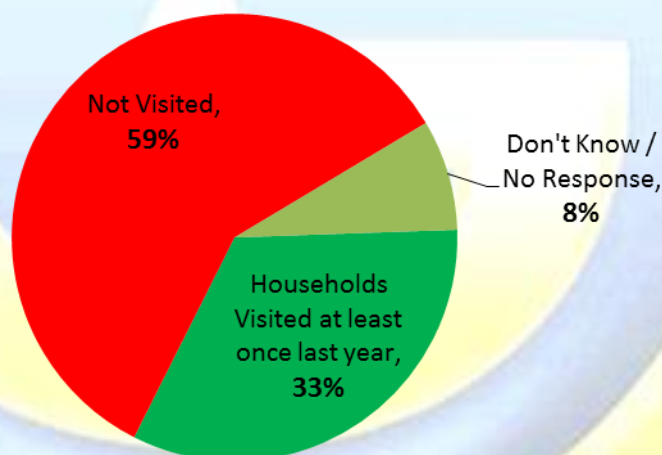
33% of Pakistani households claim they were visited at least once last year for religious education (Dawaa). GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 33% of Pakistani households claim they were visited at least once last year for religious education (Dawaa).

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "Did anyone come to your house to invite you to religious education or not?" Responding to this, 33% of households claim that they were visited at least once last year for religious education (Dawaa) whereas 59% of households claim they have not been visited. However, 8% did not give a view.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2697 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 15 - April 21, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

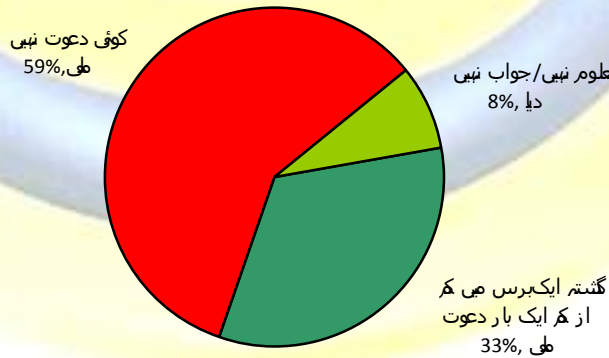

گیلانی ریسرچ فاؤنڈیشن کے ایک حالیہ سروے کے مطابق، 33% پاکستانیوں کے مطابق گذشتہ ایک برس میں کم از کم ایک بار اسلامی تعلیمات کی دعوت دینے کے لیے کوئی شخص اُن کے گھر آیا۔

سروے میں ملک بھر سے شماریاتی طور پر منتخب خواتین و حضرات سے یہ سوال پوچھا گیا کہ، "کیا گذشتہ ایک برس میں اسلامی تعلیمات دینے کے لیے کوئی آپ کے گھر آیا یا نہیں؟"، اس سوال کے جواب میں 33% گھرانوں کے مطابق گذشتہ ایک برس میں کم از کم ایک بار اسلامی تعلیمات کی دعوت دینے کے لیے کوئی شخص اُن کے گھر آیا، جبکہ 59% گھرانوں کے مطابق اُن کے گھر میں ایسا کوئی شخص نہیں آیا۔ بقیہ 8% نے کسی رائے کا اظہار نہیں کیا۔

گیلانی ریسرچ فاؤنڈیشن کا حالیہ سروے گیلپ انٹرنیشنل سے منسلک گیلپ پاکستان کی مدد سے کیا گیا۔ یہ سروے پاکستان کے چاروں صوبوں کی دیہی اور شہری آبادی کے 2697 مرد اور خواتین سے 15 اپریل تا 21 اپریل 2012 میں منعقد ہوا۔ غلطی کے امکان کا تخمینہ شماریاتی طور پر تقریباً $\pm 2-3\%$ لگایا گیا ہے۔
