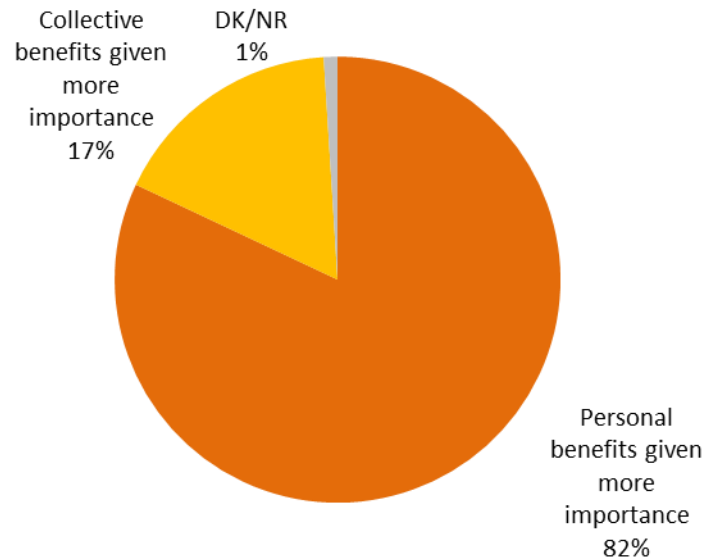

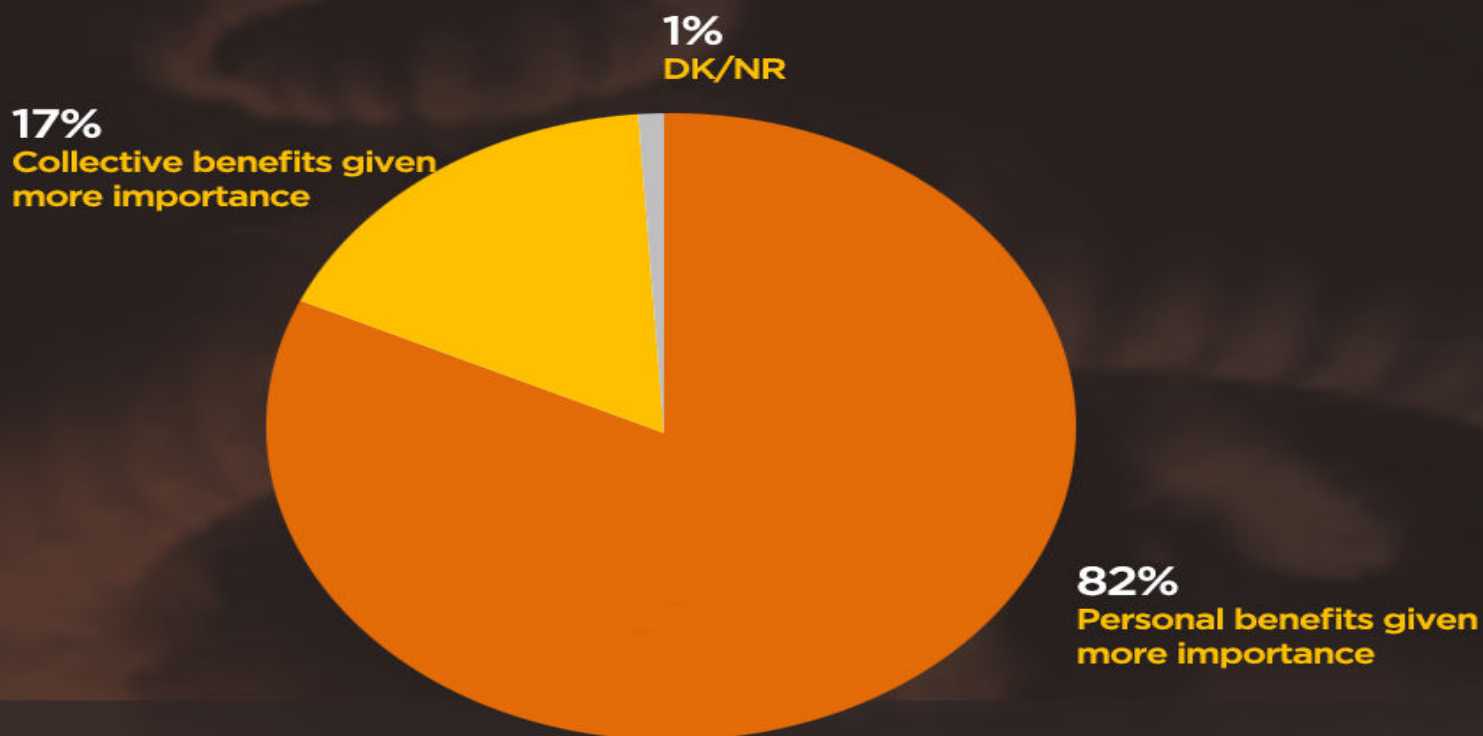

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1849 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 11– January 18, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

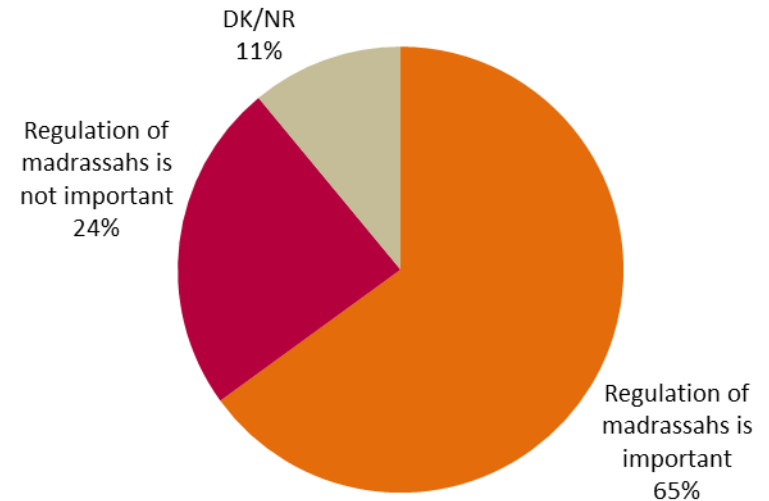

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 65% Pakistanis believe that the government should regulate religious madrassahs.

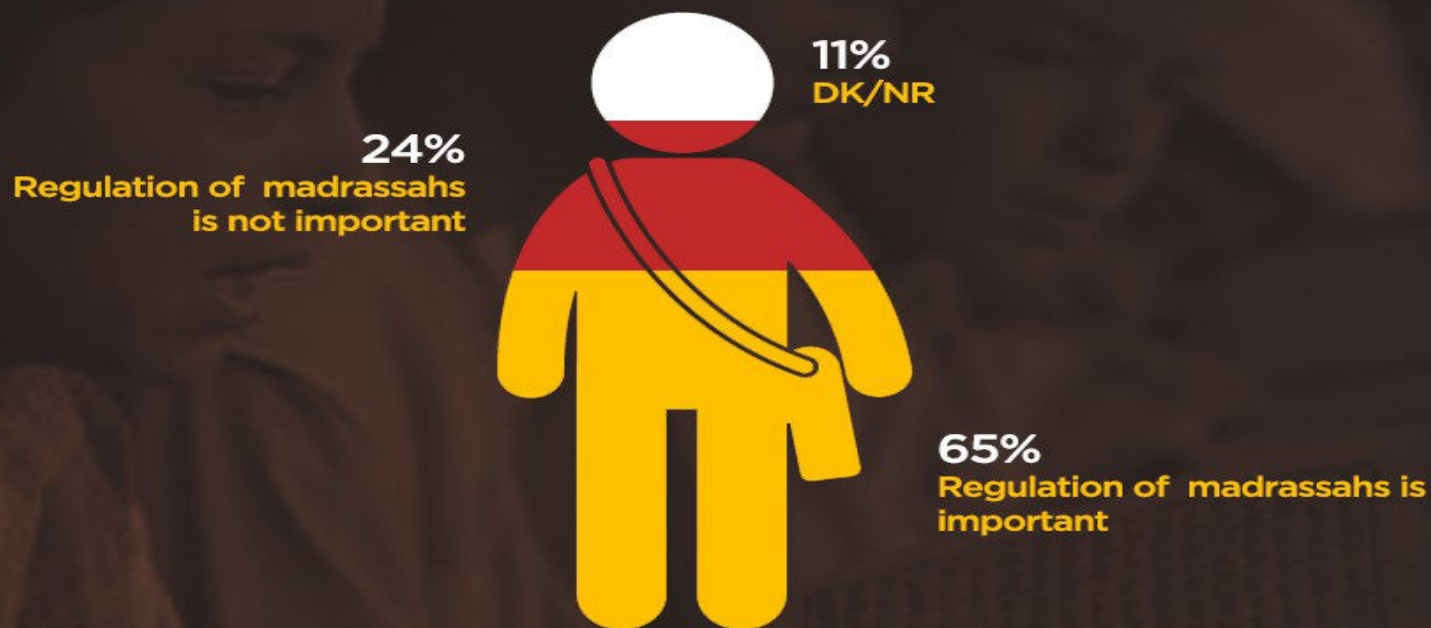
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people are of the opinion that the government should regulate religious madrassahs. Others say that there is no need to do this. What is your opinion on this?” In response to this question 65% said that regulation of madrassahs is important, 24% said that regulation of madrassahs is not important and 11% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1849 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 11 – January 18, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

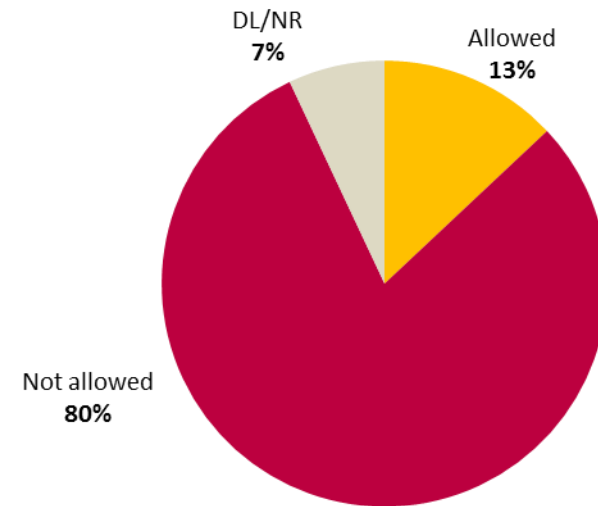

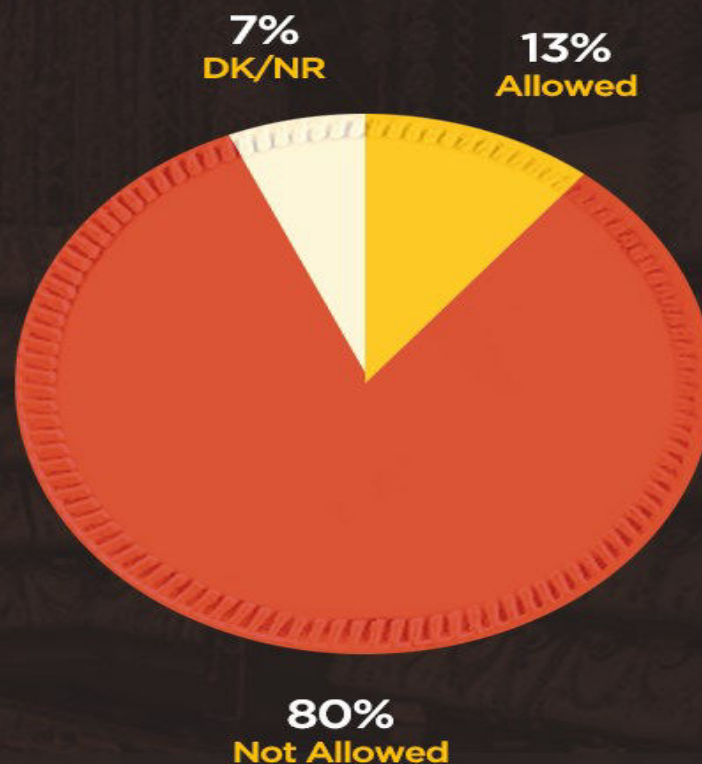

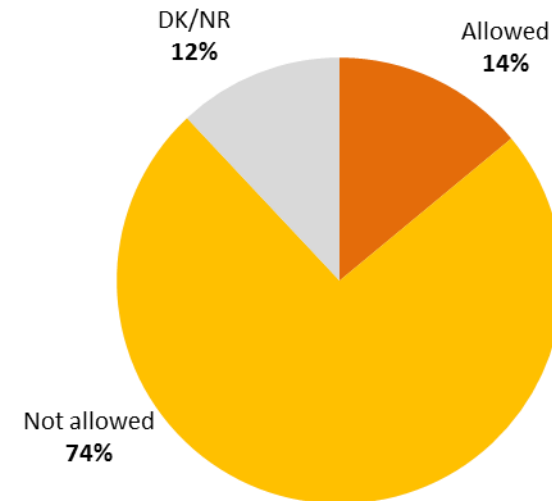

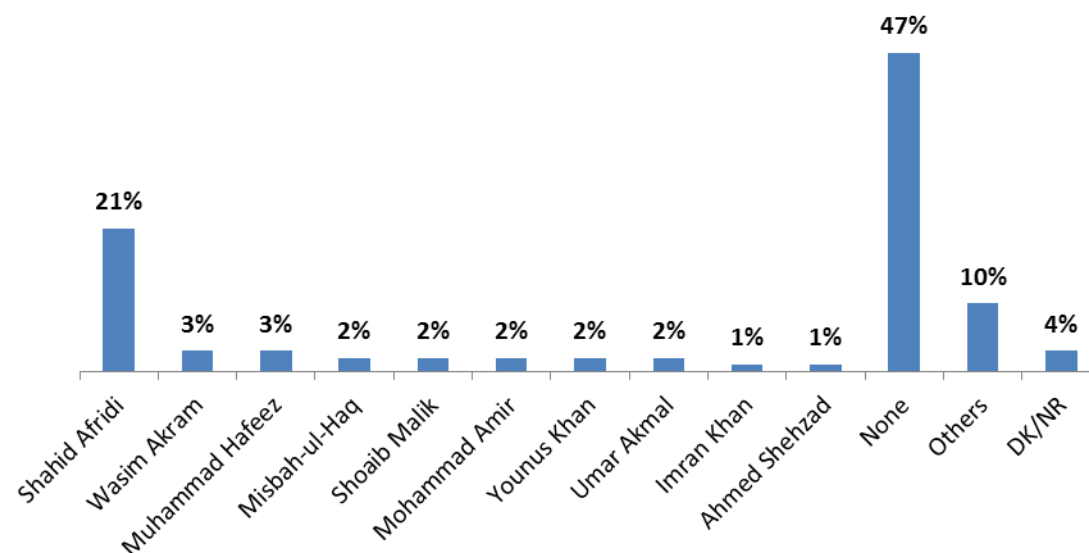

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell, who is our favourite Pakistani cricketer?” In response to this question 21% mentioned Shahid Afridi, 3% mentioned Wasim Akram and Muhammad Hafeez each while 2% each mentioned Misbah-ul-Haq, Shoaib Malik, Mohammad Amir, Younus Khan and Umar Akmal. 1% said that their favourite cricketer is Imran Khan and another 1% named Ahmed Shehzad. 47% said no one, 10% said others and 4% did not respond.

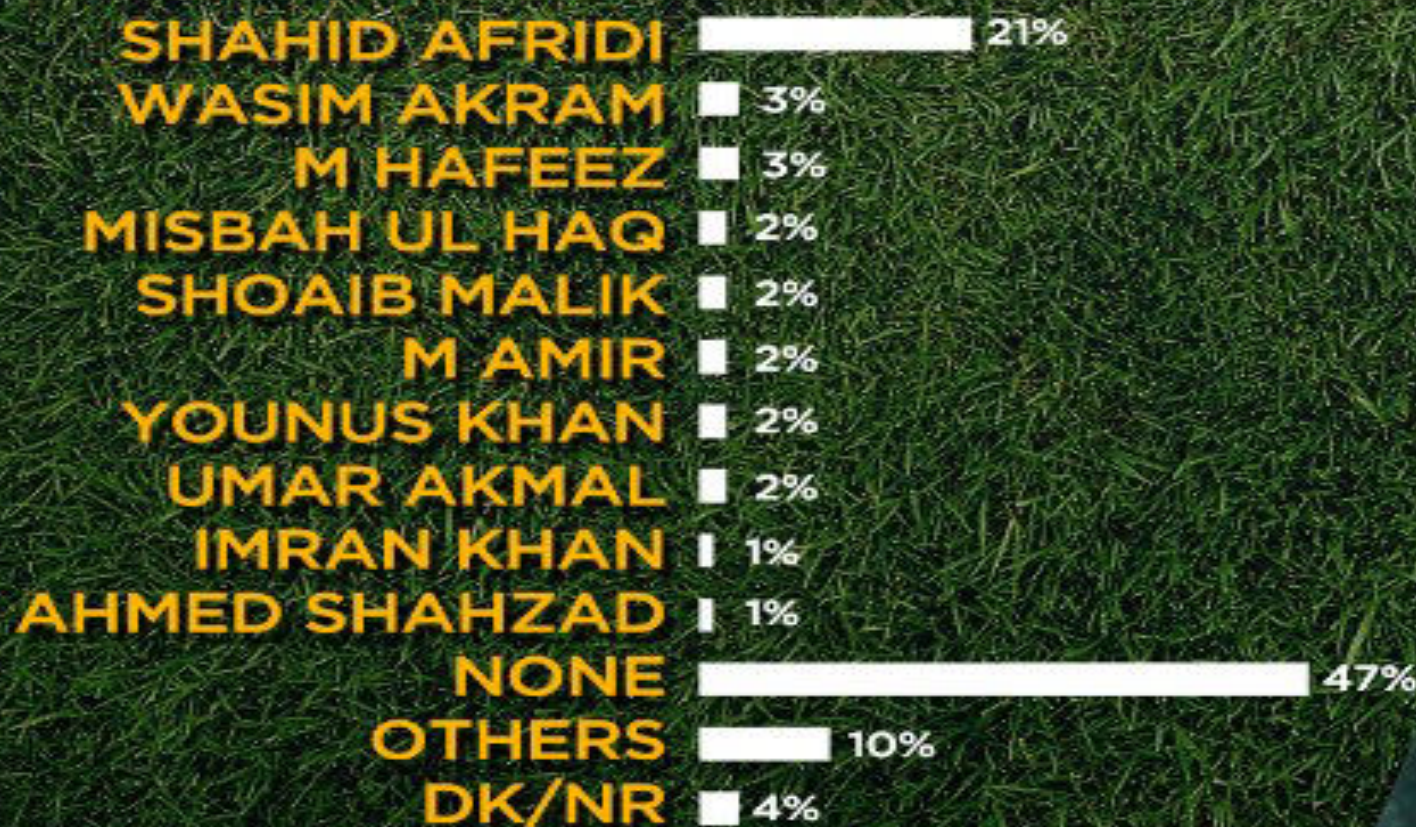
