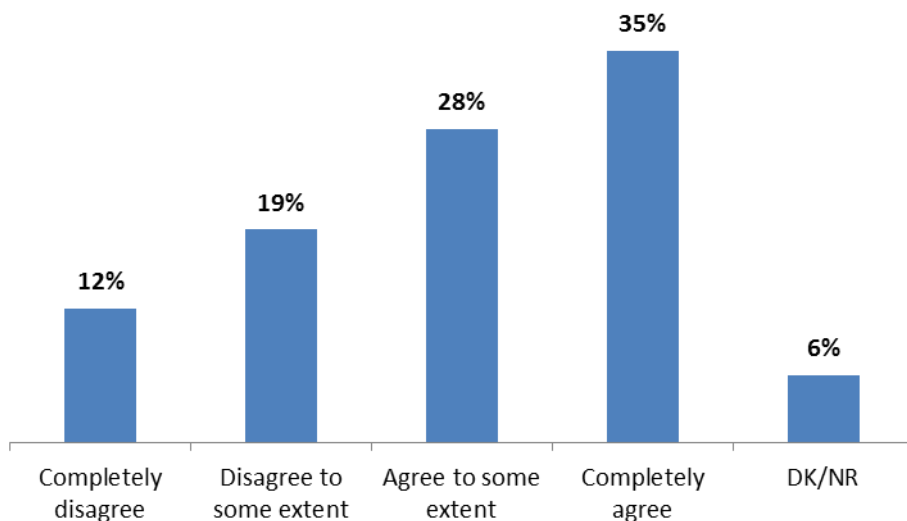

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 63% Pakistanis say that majority of their friends and relatives vote for the same party that they vote for.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement: Most of my friends and relatives vote for the same party that I vote for too.” In response to this question, 12% completely disagreed, 19% disagreed to some extent while 28% said that they agree to some extent and 35% said that they completely agree. 6% did not respond.

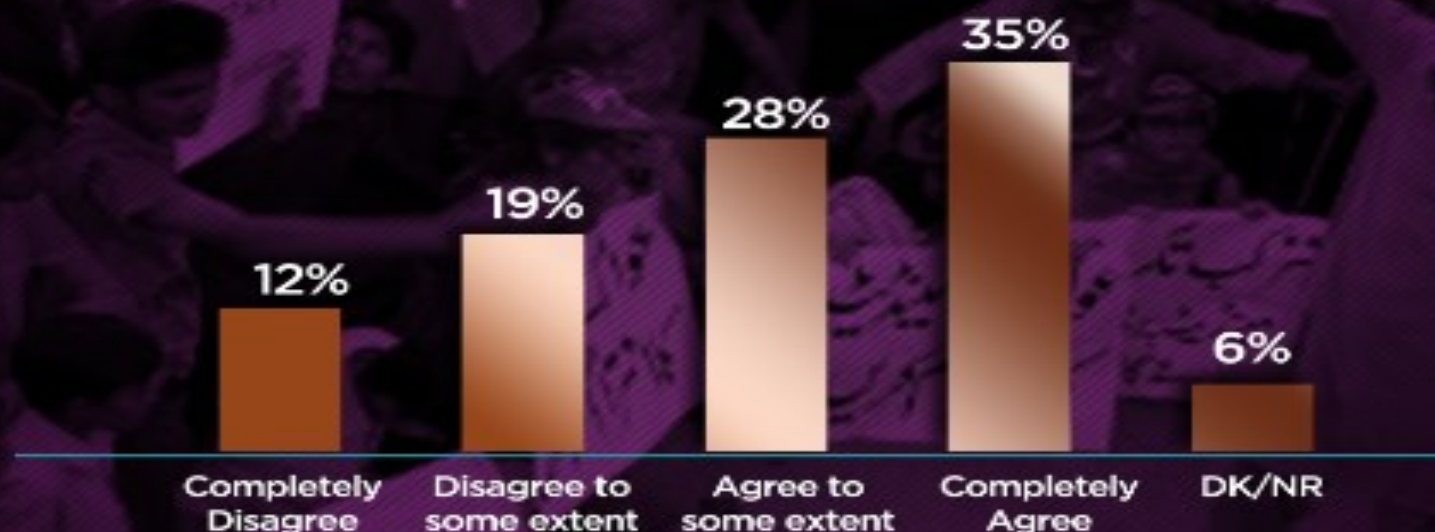
The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1781 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 18 – January 25, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

Most of my friends and relatives vote for the same party that I vote for too.





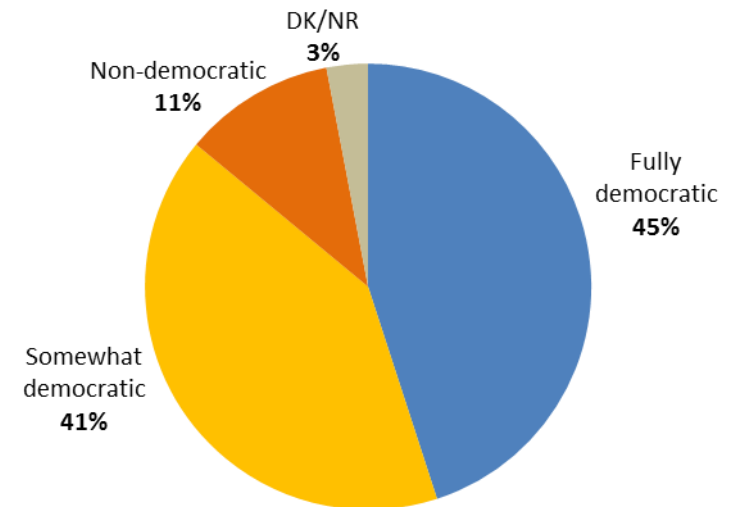

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, is the system of governance in Pakistan somewhat democratic, fully democratic or non-democratic?” In response to this question, 45% said that it is fully democratic, 41% said that it is somewhat democratic and 11% said that it is non-democratic. 3% did not respond.

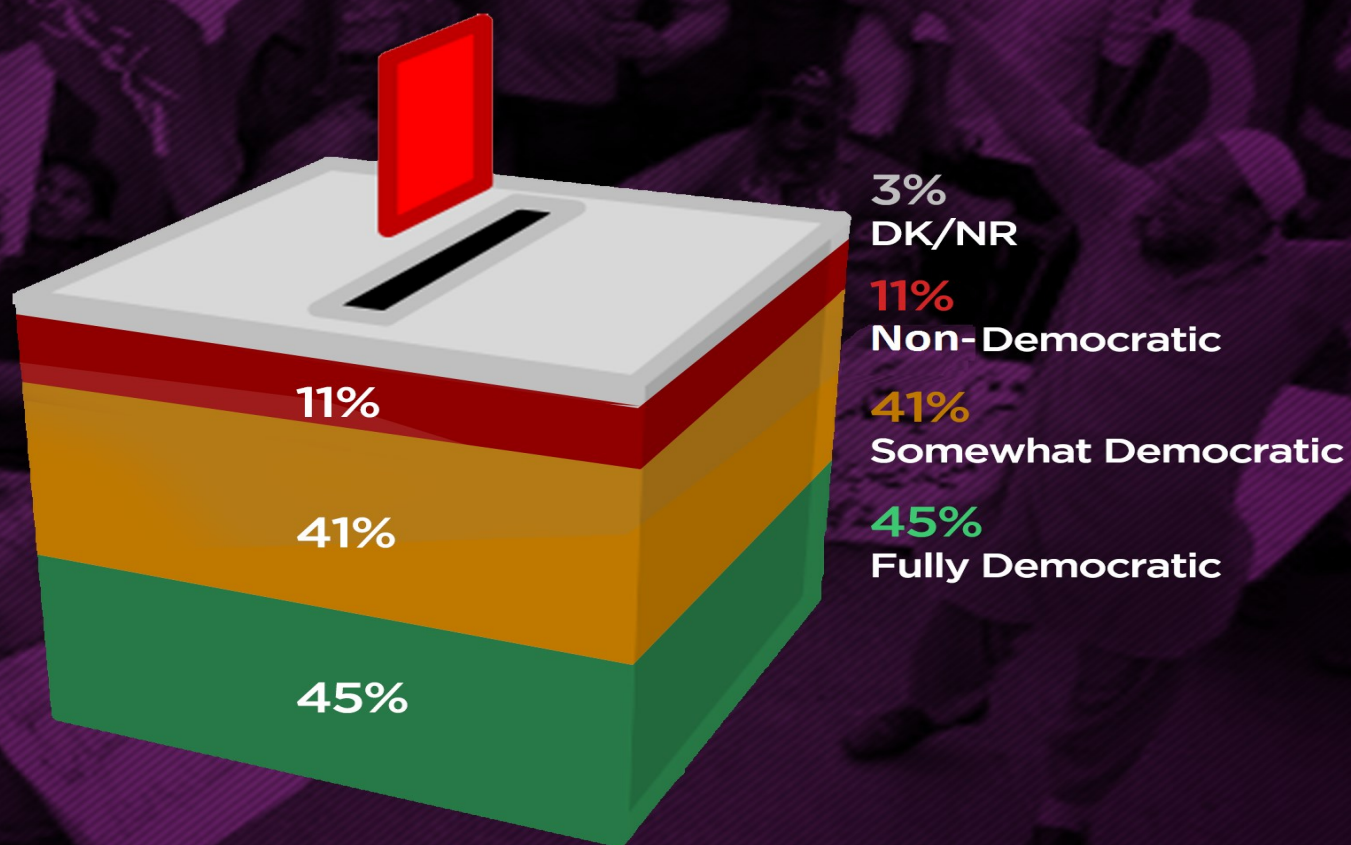

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 42% Pakistanis believe that the system of governance in China is fully democratic; 26% believe that the system of governance in India is fully democratic.

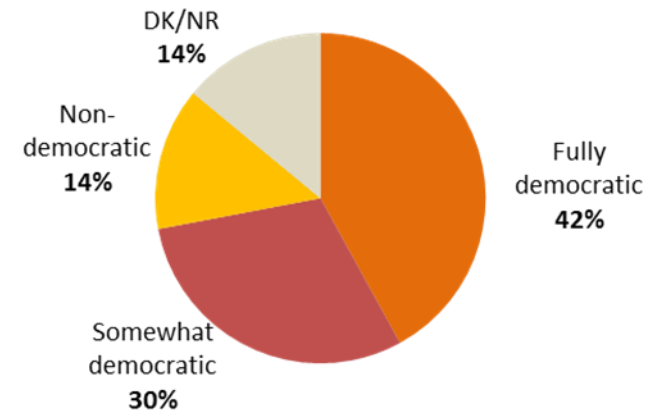
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “In your opinion, is the system of governance in China somewhat democratic, fully democratic or non-democratic?” In response to this question, 42% said that it is fully democratic, 30% said that it is somewhat democratic and 14% said that it is non-democratic. 14% did not respond.

The same sample of men and women was also asked the same question with regards to India. In response, 26% said that the system of governance in India is fully democratic, 33% said that it is somewhat democratic and 25% said that it is non-democratic. 16% did not respond.

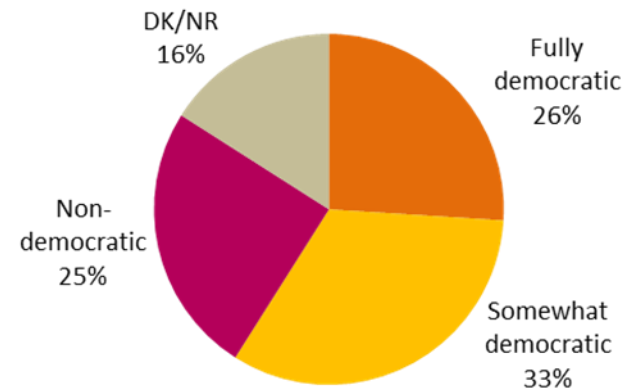

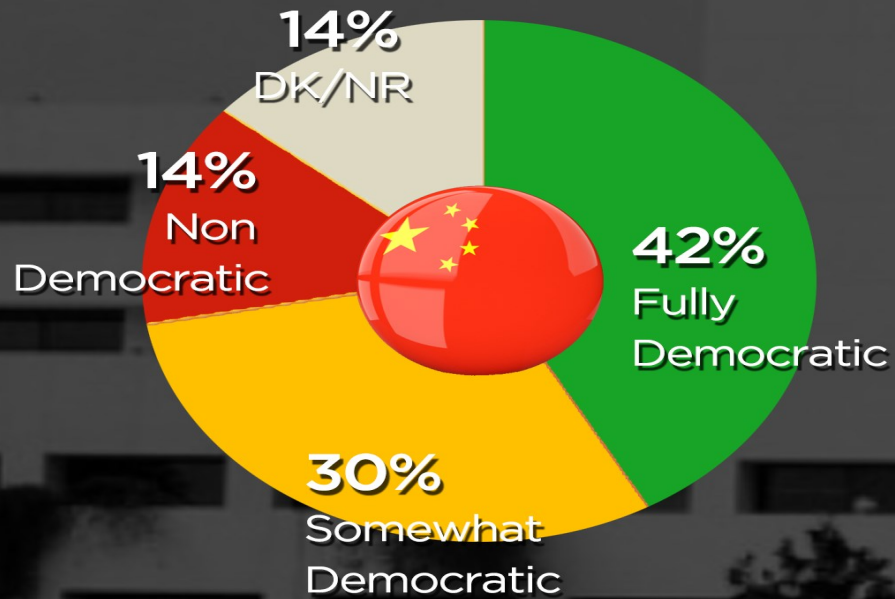

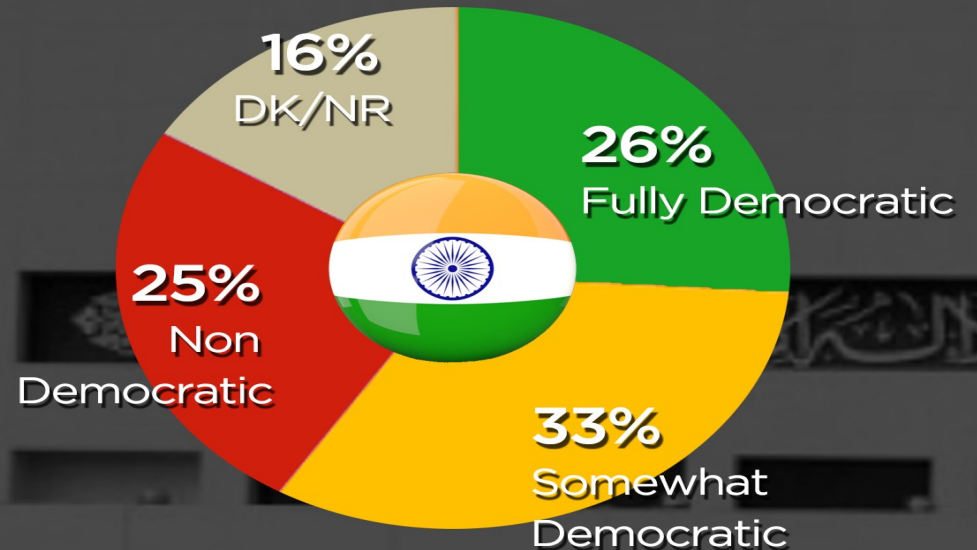

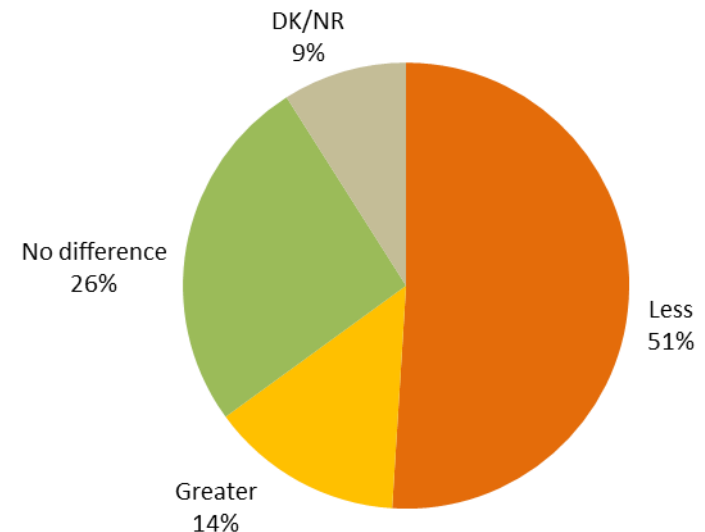

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 51% Pakistanis believe that the amount of rainfall in Pakistan last year (2015) was less than the previous years.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “According to your information, was the amount of rainfall in Pakistan last year (2015) greater, lesser or was there no difference compared to previous years?” In response to this question, 14% said that rainfall was greater than before, 51% said that rainfall was less than before while 26% said that there was no difference. 9% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1849 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 11 – January 18, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
