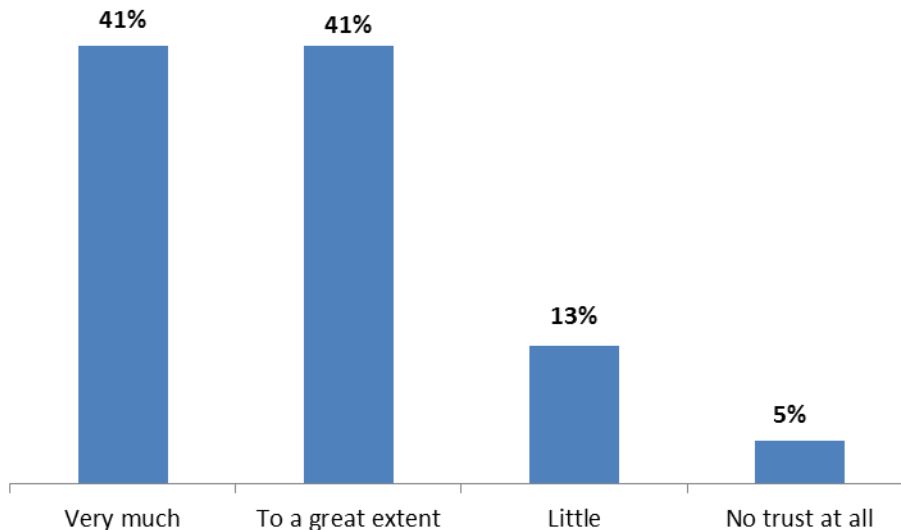

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 82% Pakistanis said that they would trust a doctor to a great extent.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much do you trust a doctor?” In response to this question, 41% said that they would trust a doctor very much, another 41% said that they would trust a doctor to a great extent while 13% said that they would have little trust in the doctor and 5% said that they would have no trust at all.

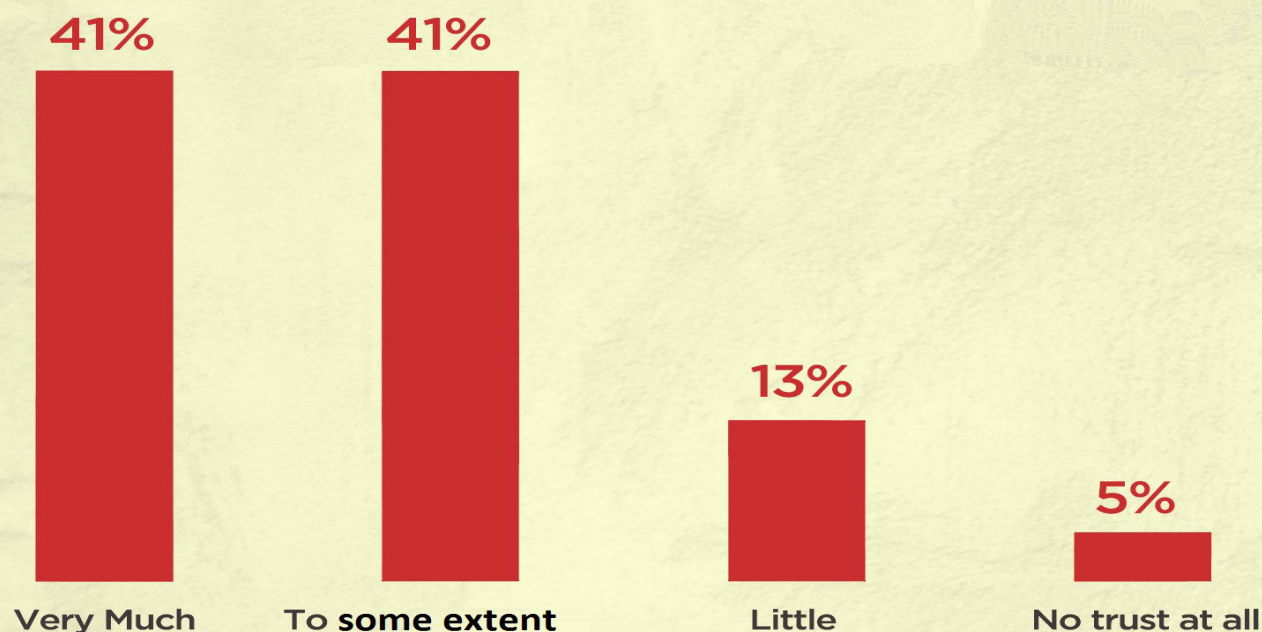

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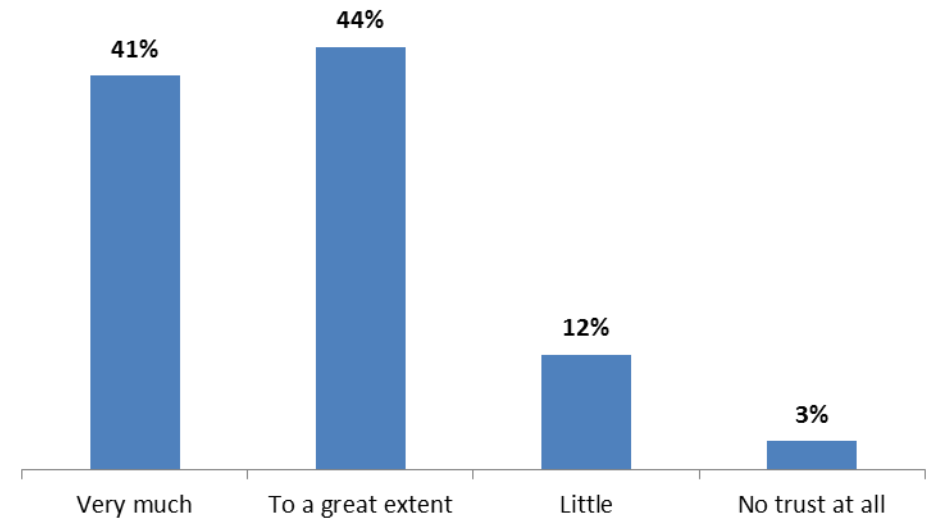

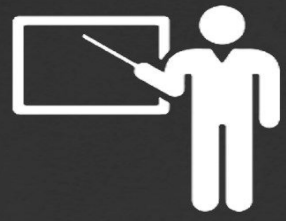
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 85% Pakistanis said that they would trust a teacher to a great extent.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much do you trust a teacher?” In response to this question, 41% said that they would trust a teacher very much, 44% said that they would trust a teacher to a great extent while 12% said that they would have little trust in the teacher and 3% said that they would have no trust at all.

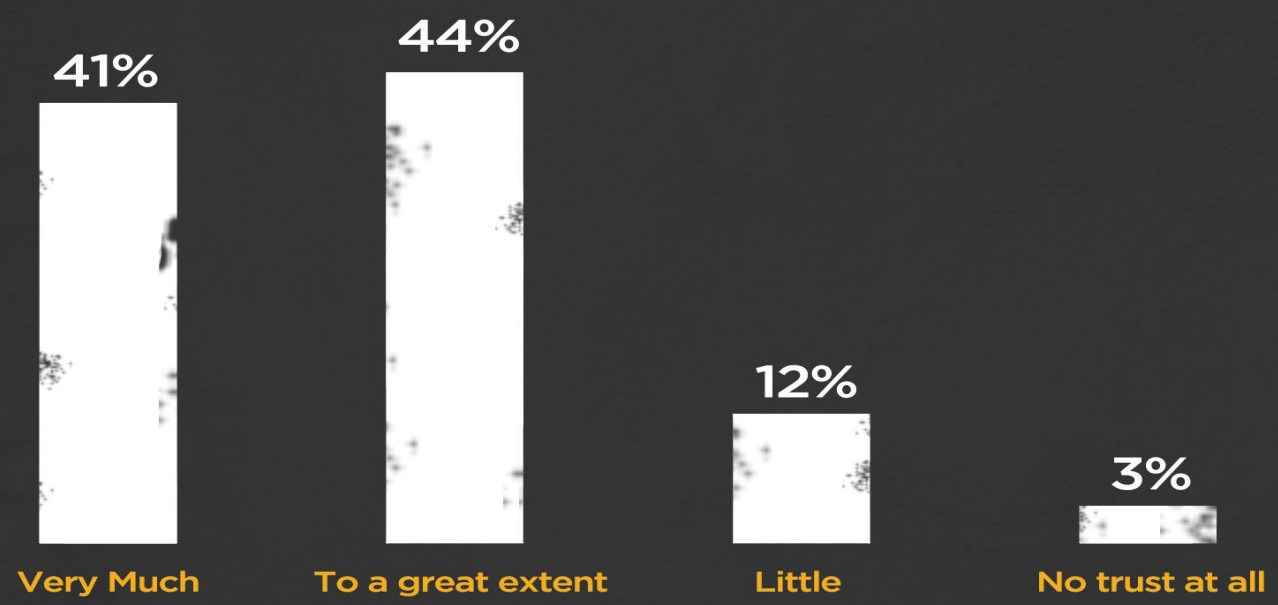

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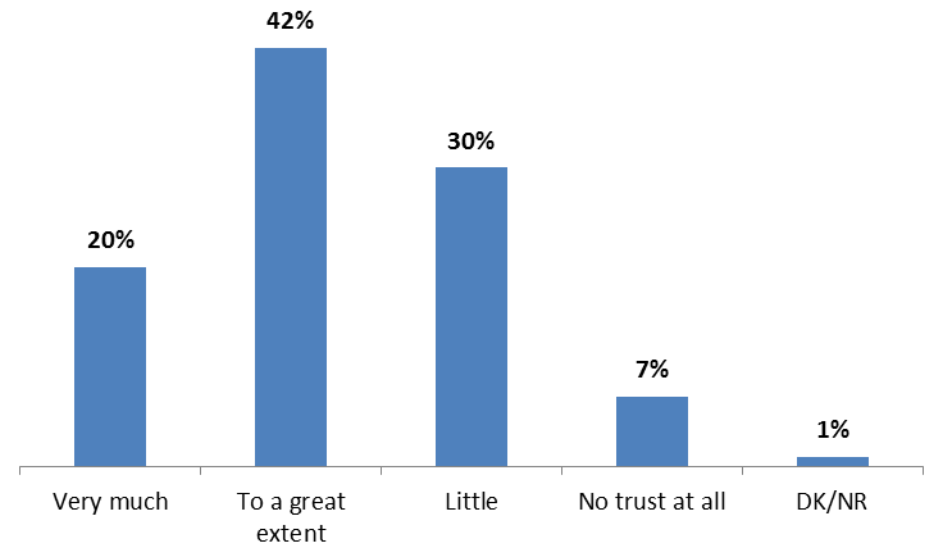
(Part 3 of an 8 part series) 1 in 3 Pakistanis claim to have little to no trust in a shopkeeper.

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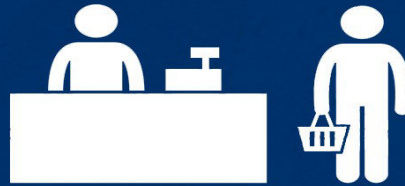
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 62% Pakistanis have a lot of trust in a shopkeeper; 37% have little to no trust in a shopkeeper.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much do you trust a shopkeeper?” In response to this question, 20% said that they would trust a shopkeeper very much, 42% said that they would trust a shopkeeper to a great extent while 30% said that they would have little trust in the shopkeeper and 4% said that they would have no trust at all. 1% did not respond.

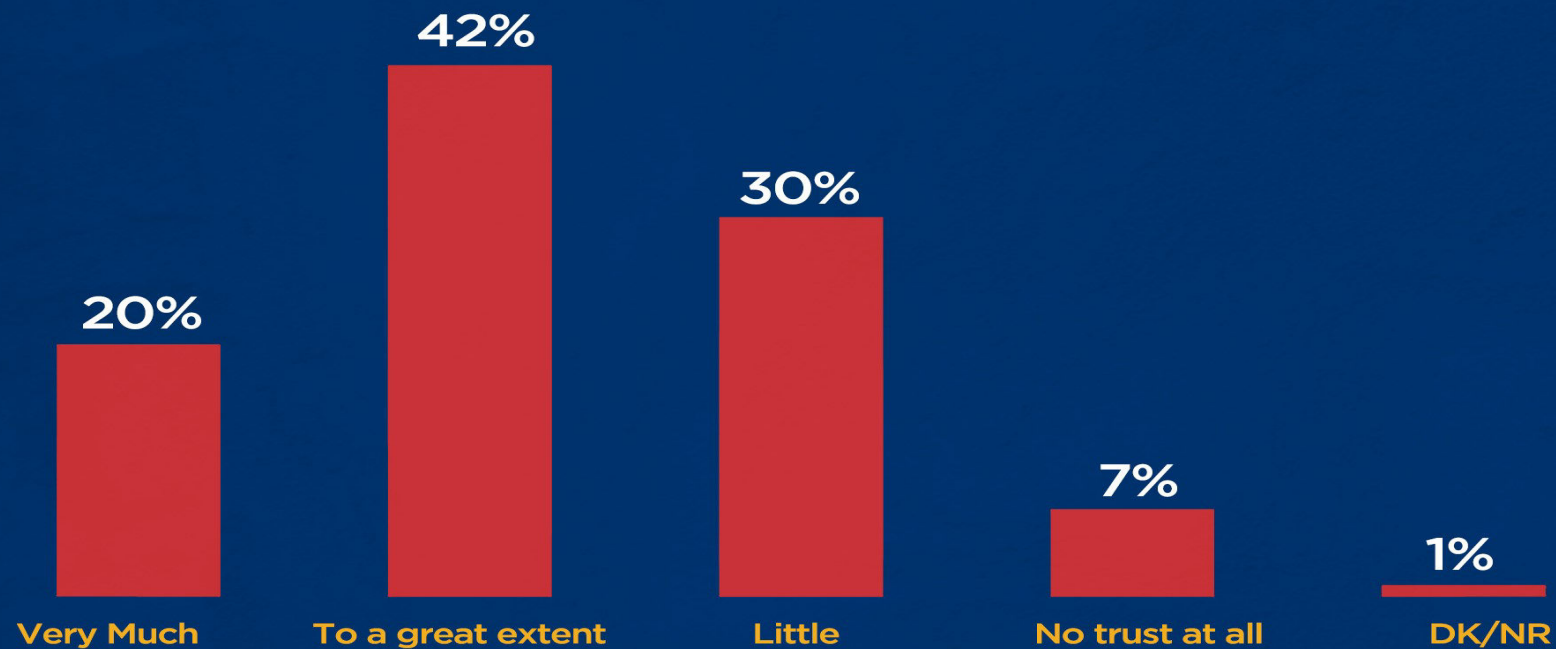

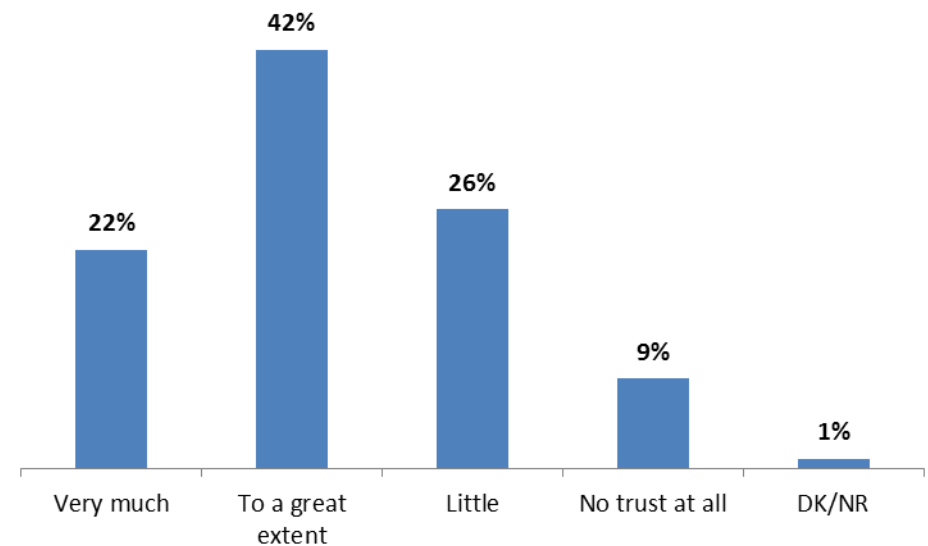

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 64% Pakistanis say they would trust a journalist to a great extent.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much do you trust a journalist?” In response to this question, 22% said that they would trust a journalist very much, 42% said that they would trust a journalist to a great extent while 26% said that they would have little trust in the journalist and 9% said that they would have no trust at all. 1% did not respond

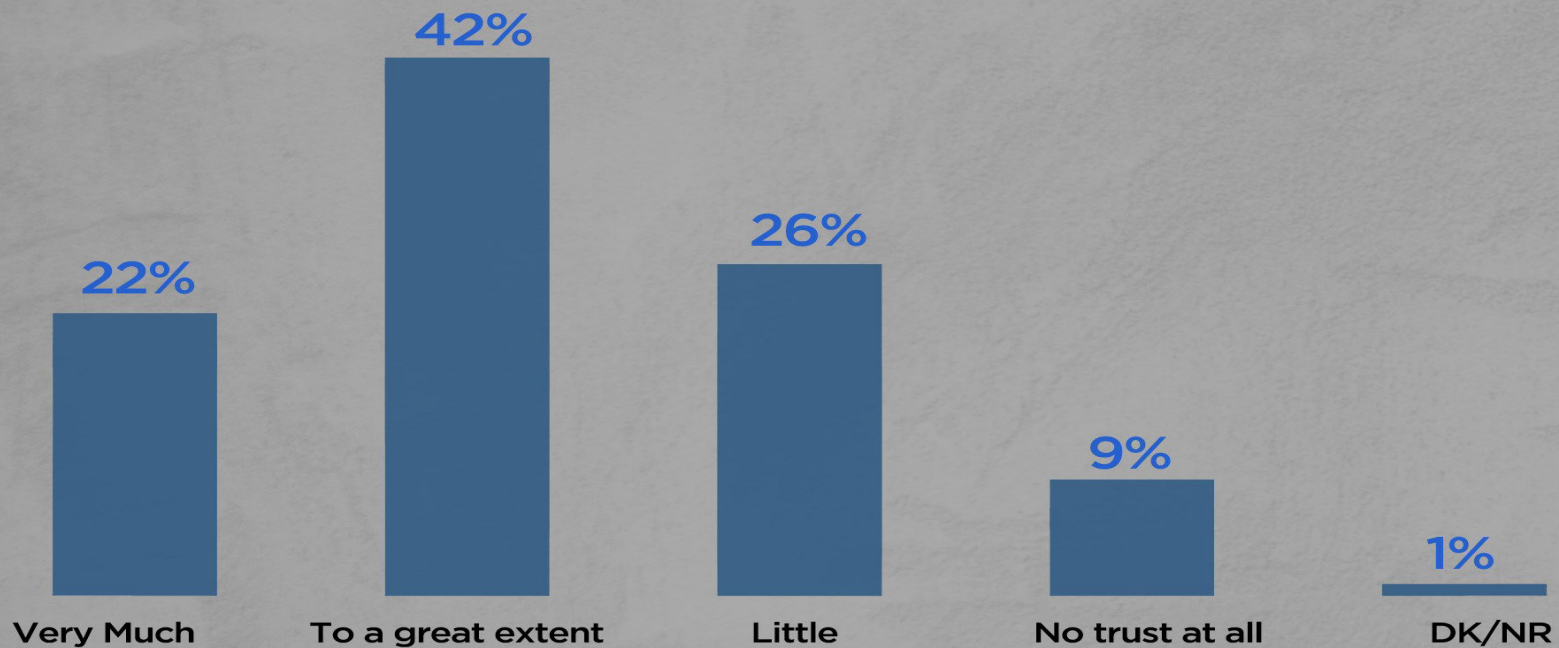

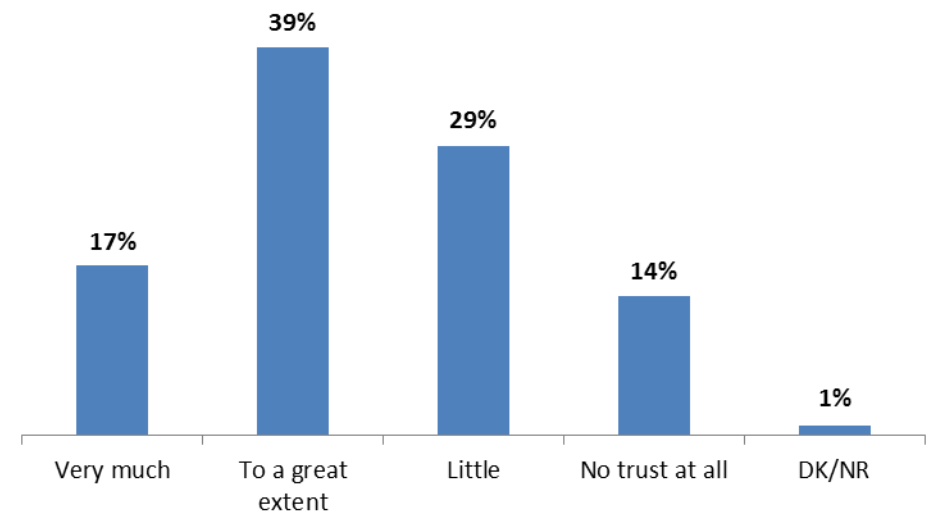

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 56% Pakistanis say they would trust a lawyer; 43% say that they would not trust a lawyer.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much do you trust a lawyer?” In response to this question, 17% said that they would trust a lawyer very much, 39% said that they would trust a lawyer to a great extent while 29% said that they would have little trust in the lawyer and 14% said that they would have no trust at all. 1% did not respond.

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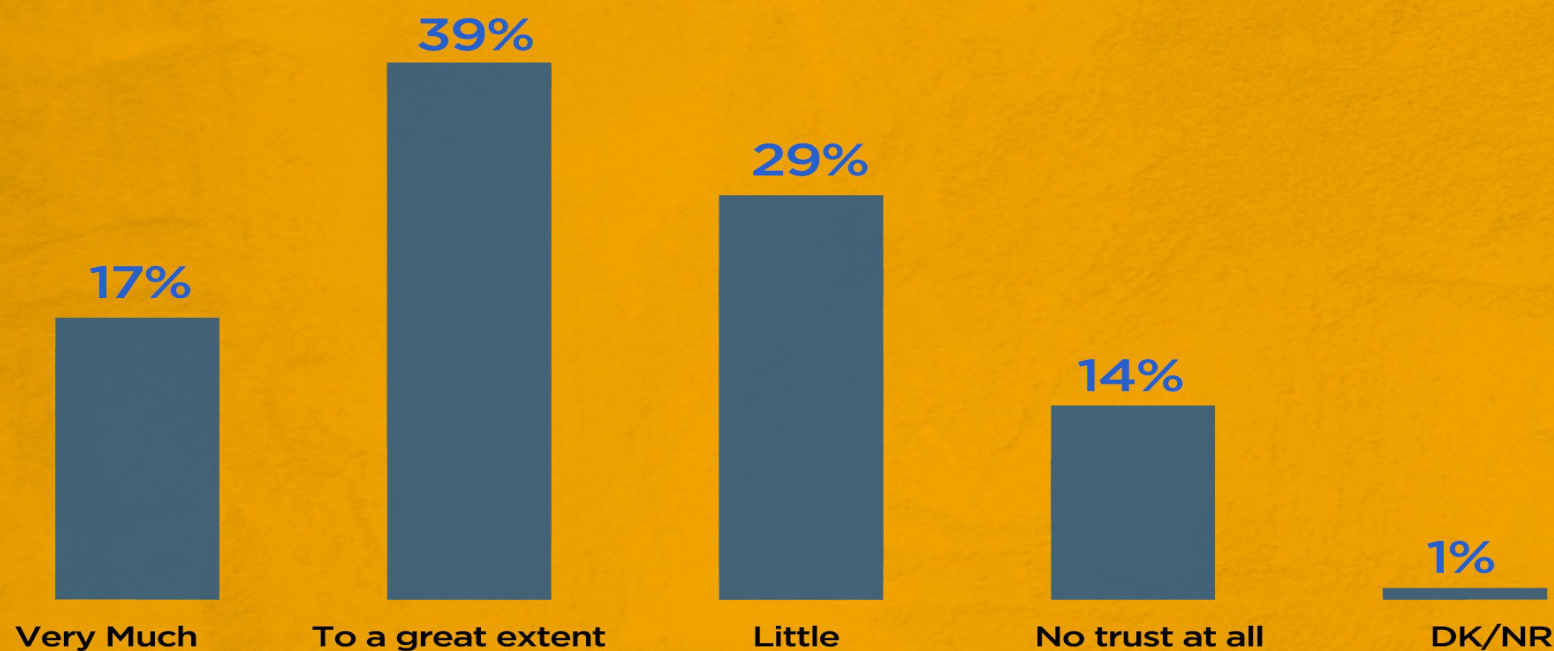


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More than half (56%) Pakistanis say they would trust a lawyer
