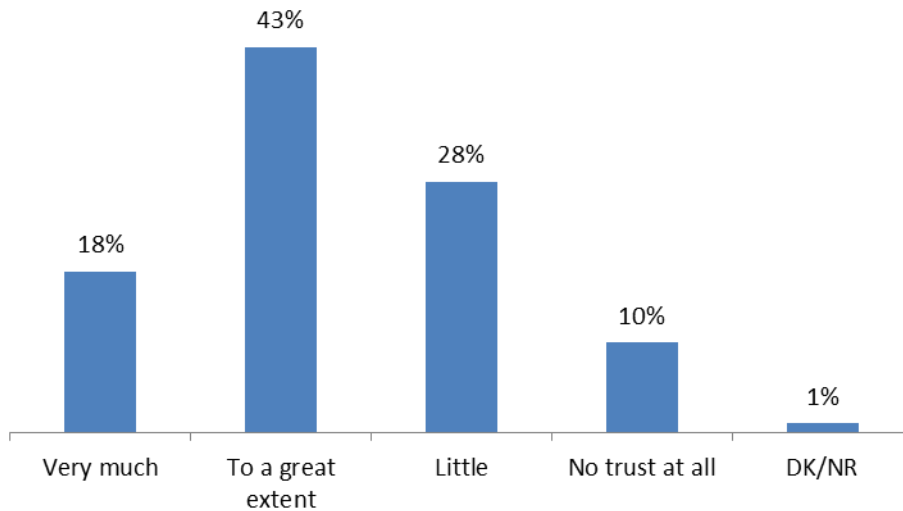


(Part 6 of an 8 part series) More than half (61%) Pakistanis say they would trust a councilor/ Nazim.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 61% Pakistanis say they would trust a councilor/ Nazim; 38% say that they do not trust a councilor/ Nazim.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much would you trust a councilor/ Nazim?” In response to this question, 18% said that they would trust a councilor/Nazim very much, 43% said that they would trust the councilor to a great extent while 28% said that they would have little trust in the councilor and 10% said that they would have no trust at all. 1% did not respond.

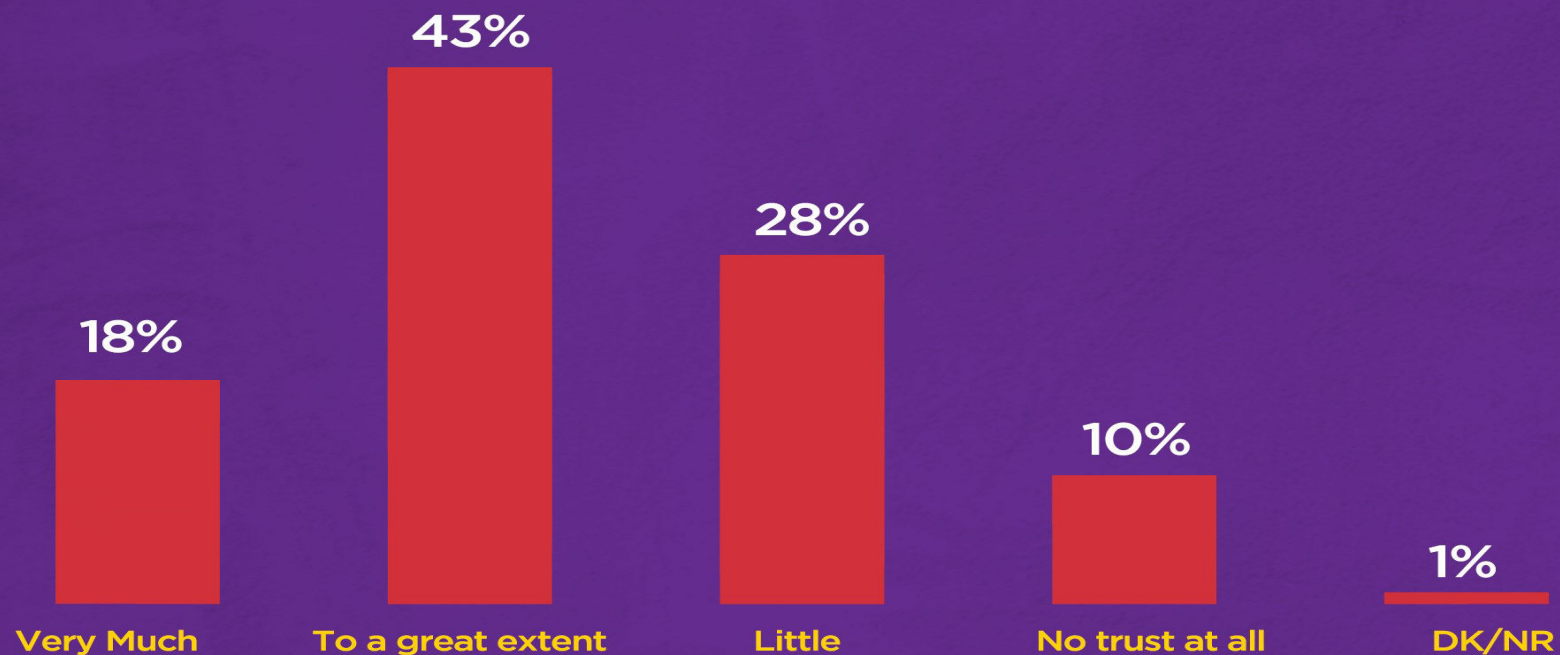
The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1850 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 18 – January 25, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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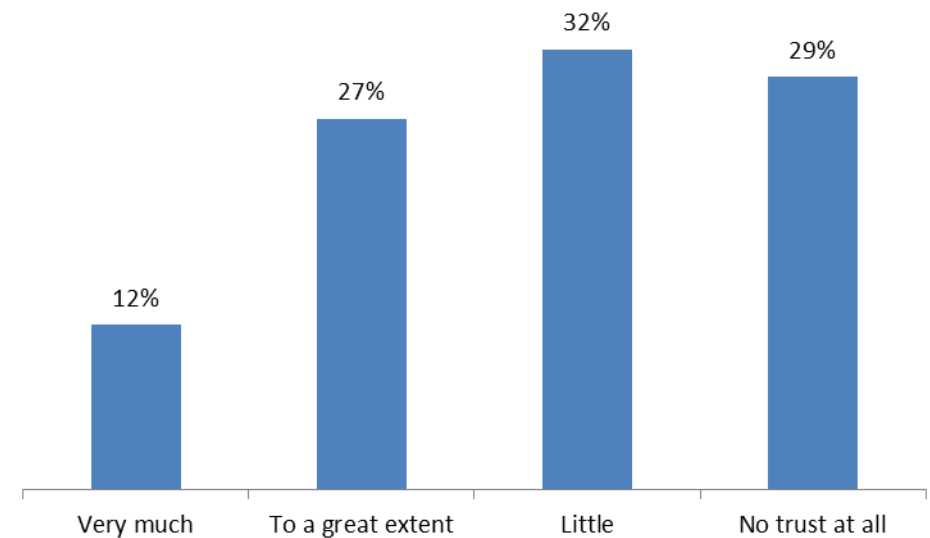

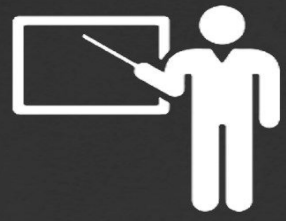
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 61% Pakistanis claim to have little to no trust in the police.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much would you trust the police?” In response to this question, 12% said that they would trust the police very much, 27% said that they would trust the police to a great extent while 32% said that they would have little trust in the police and 29% said that they would have no trust at all.

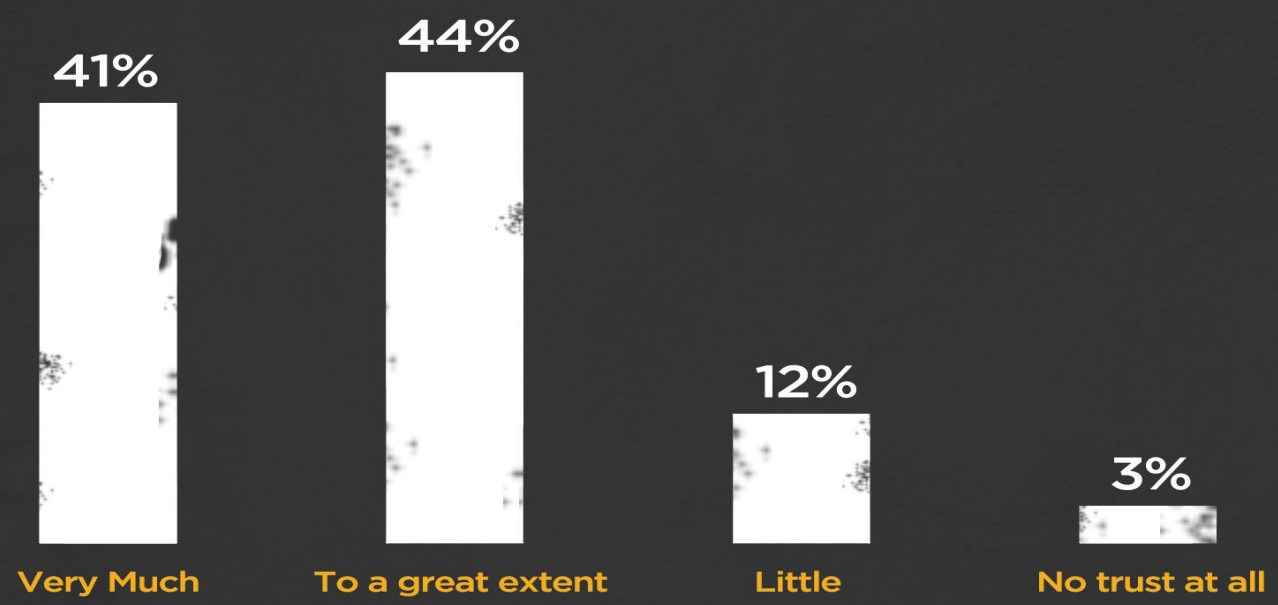

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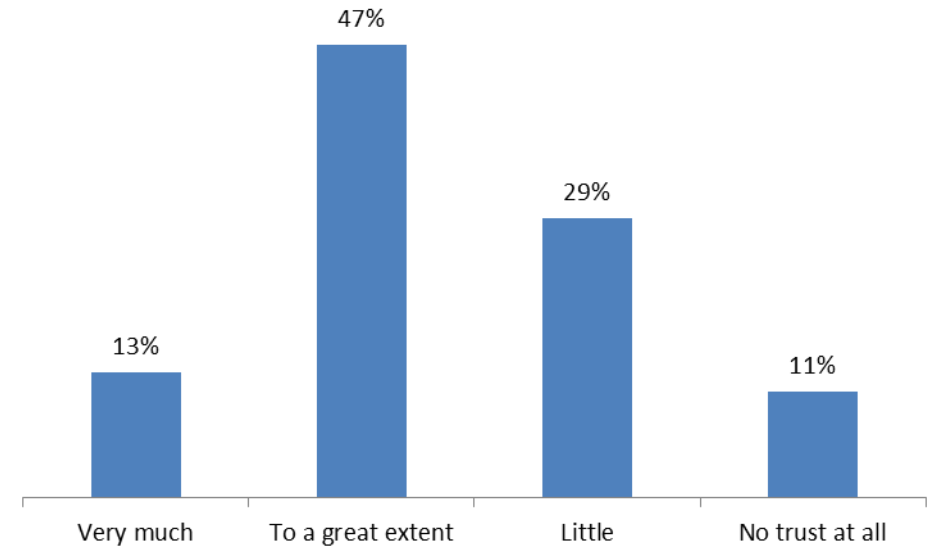

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 60% Pakistanis say that they would trust an industrialist; 40% say that they would have little to no trust in an industrialist.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “From the point of view of honesty and ethical trustworthiness, how much would you trust an industrialist?” In response to this question, 13% said that they would trust the industrialist very much, 47% said that they would trust the industrialist to a great extent while 29% said that they would have little trust in the industrialist and 11% said that they would have no trust at all.

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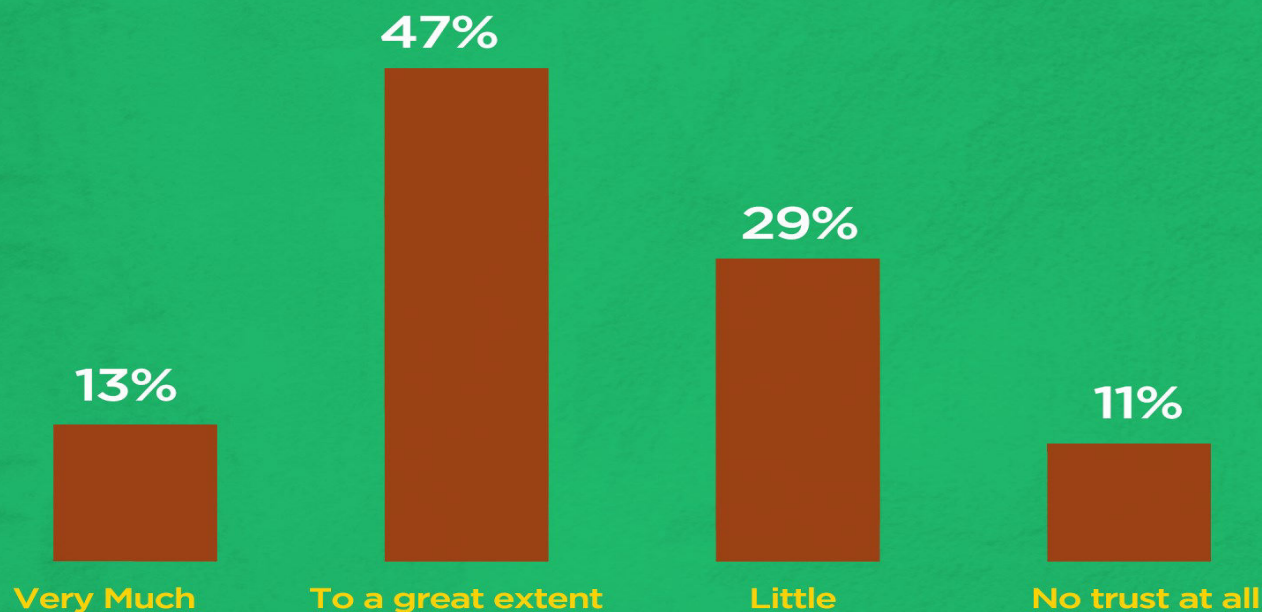

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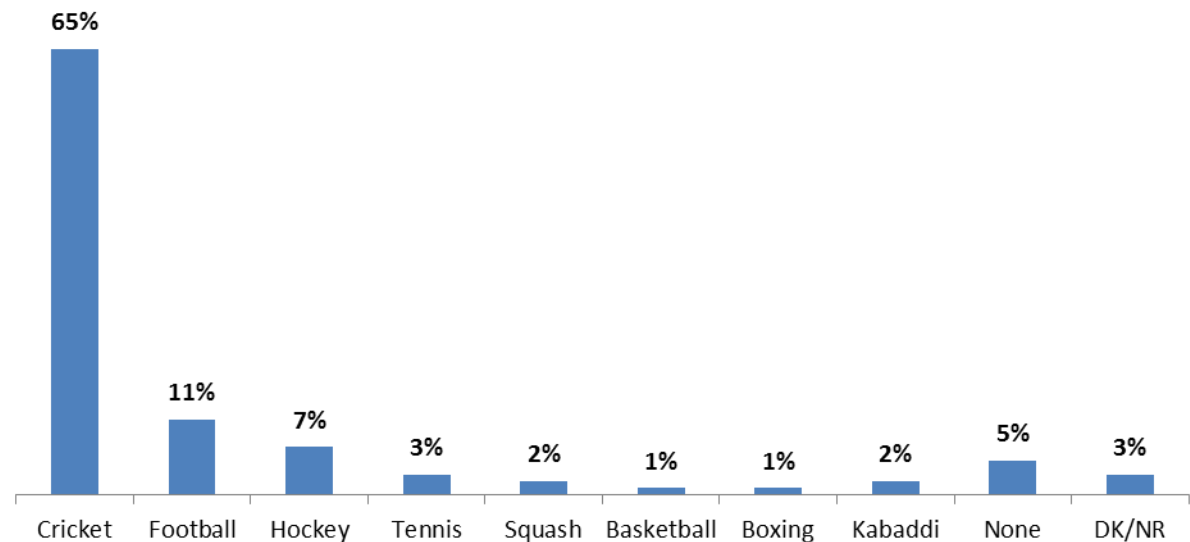
65% Pakistanis mention Cricket as their favourite sport.

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According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 65% Pakistanis mention Cricket as their favourite sport.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell, which sport are you most keen on?” In response to this question, 65% mentioned Cricket, 11% mentioned Football, 7% mentioned Hockey, 3% mentioned Tennis and 2% each mentioned Squash and Kabaddi. 1% each also mentioned Basketball and Boxing while 5% said none and 3% did not respond.

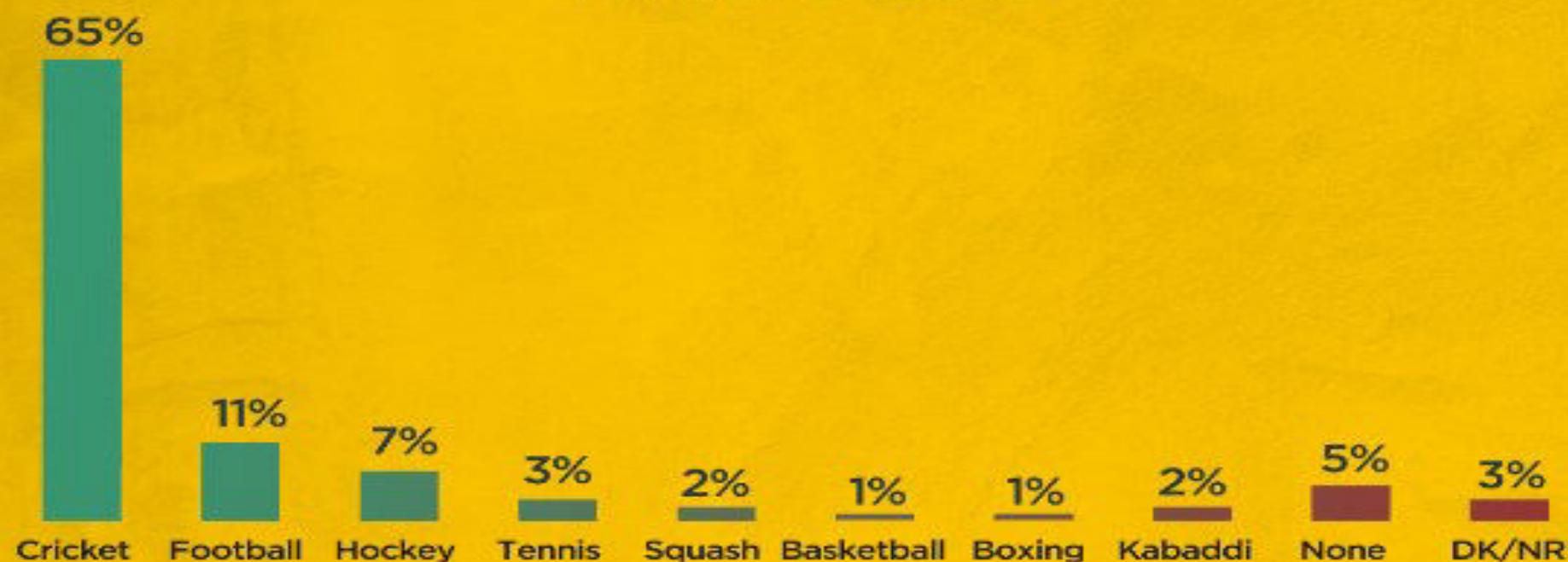
The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1822 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 01 – February 08, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

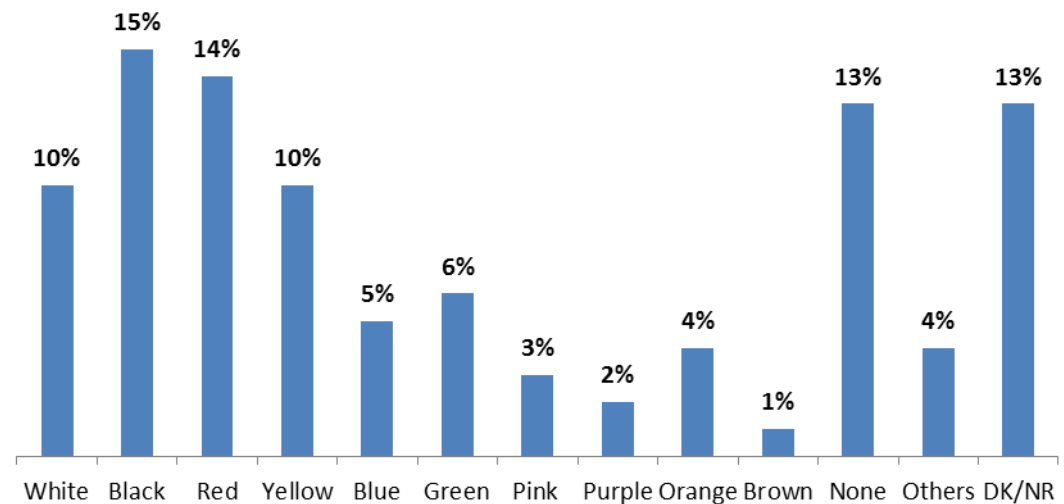
15% Pakistanis mention Black as their least favourite colour.



According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 15% Pakistanis mention Black as their least favourite colour.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell, which colour is your least favourite i.e. while choosing a colour for your attire, which colour would you be least likely to choose?” In response to this question, 15% mentioned Black, 14% mentioned Red while 10% each mentioned White and Yellow. 6% also mentioned Green, 5% mentioned Blue, 4% mentioned Orange, 3% mentioned Pink, 2% mentioned Purple and 1% mentioned Brown. On the other hand, 13% said none, 4% mentioned other colours and 13% did not respond.

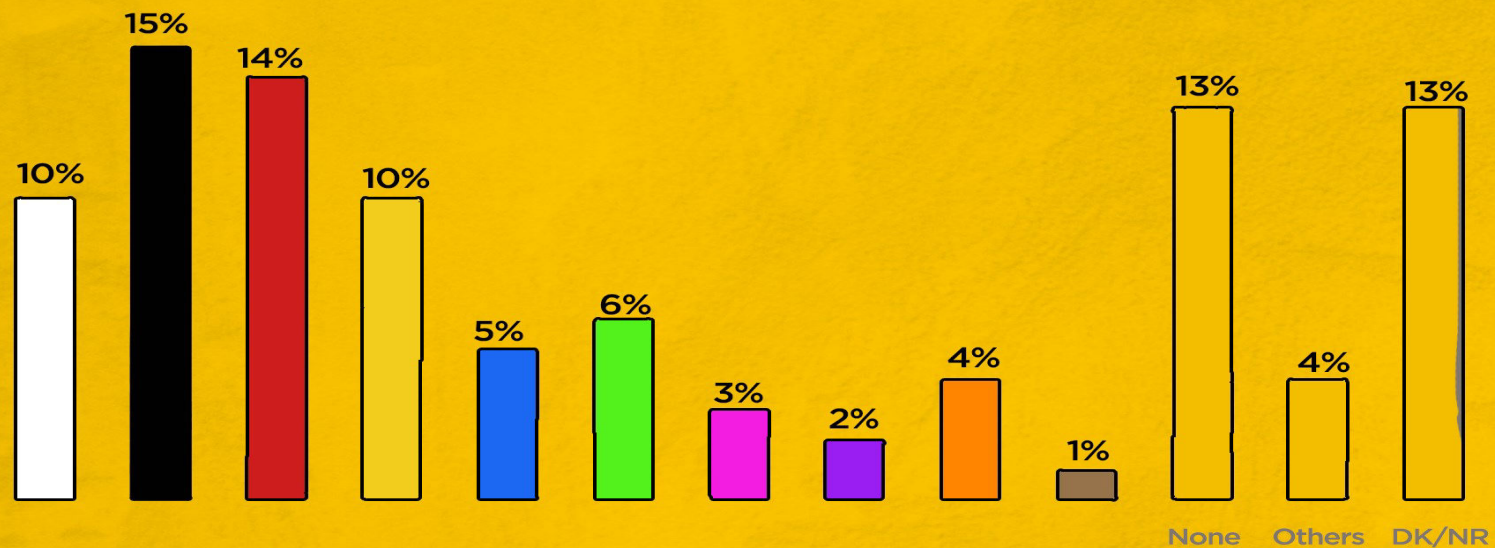
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Please tell, which colour is your least favourite i.e. while choosing a colour for your attire, which colour would you be least likely to choose?
