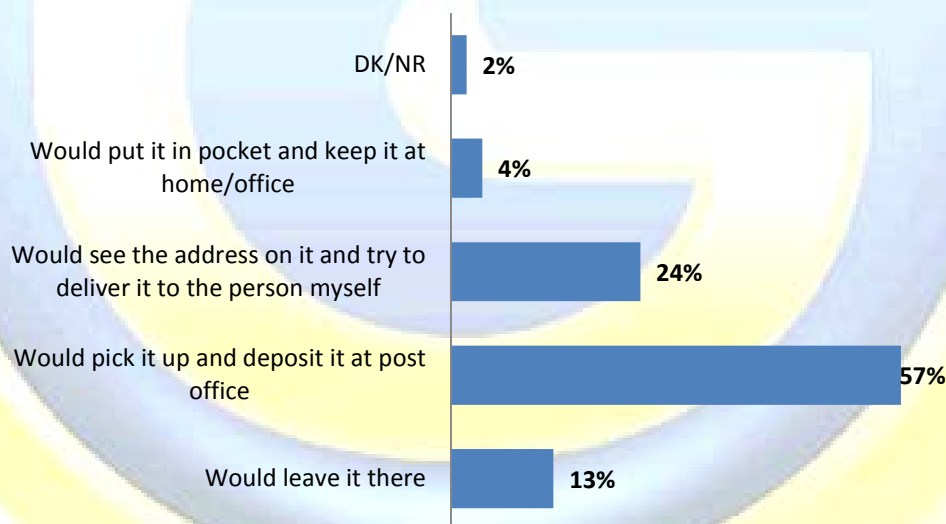

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 57% Pakistanis, if they chanced upon a person's Identity card lying on the ground while they were walking, would pick it up and deposit it at the post office.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "If, while walking, you find an ID card fallen on the ground then which of the following would you do?" In response to this question, 13% said they would just leave it there, 57% said they would pick it up and deposit it at the office, 24% said they would try to deliver it to the person themselves using the address given on it while 4% said that they would put it in their pocket and keep it at home or the office. 2% did not respond.

Bilal Ijaz Gilani, Executive Director at Gallup Pakistan adds "This poll can be taken as a proxy for gauging 'civic culture' in Pakistan. At least with respect to this poll, the culture of helping a fellow citizen exists."

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1783 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 15 – February 22, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
