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PERSONALITIES AMONG PAKISTANI CHILDREN*

According to a recent Gallup poll, Quaid-i-Azam Mohammad Ali Jinnah is the most liked personality among the Pakistani children. The survey which was conducted all over the country, asked children between the ages of 5 to 15 as to who was their most liked personality. 21% named the Quaid-i-Azam while 9% named Allama Iqbal. Among the more recent political figures, 2% named the late Prime Minister Zulfiqar Ali Bhutto and 3% named, President Zia-ul-Haq.

The most startling aspect of this nation-wide survey of the Pakistani children was that among the living personalities, the highest rating was obtained by the cricketer Imran Khan, who was named by 4% of the children as their most liked personality.

The survey also showed that for many children the role model was within the family. 10% of the children named their own father as their most liked personality, 4% named their mother, 2% named their own siblings, an elder brother or sister. 2% of the children named their school teacher as their most liked personality. Another 2% mentioned a grand parent. 30% of the children were unable to come up with an answer, and apparently did not have a clearly spelled out role model for them.
