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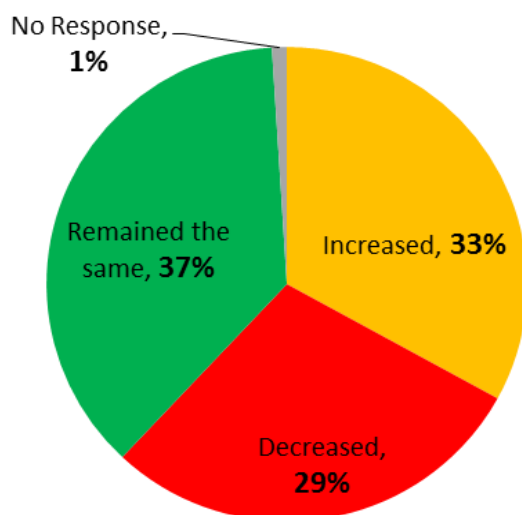

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, views are divided about whether the severity of winter has increased (33%), decreased (29%) or remained the same (37%) over the last few years.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, in the last few years has the severity of winter in your area increased, decreased or remained the same?” Responding to this, 37% said it has remained the same, 33% said it has increased and 29% said it has decreased. However, 1% did not give a view.

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The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2677 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 18, 2012 – November 25, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

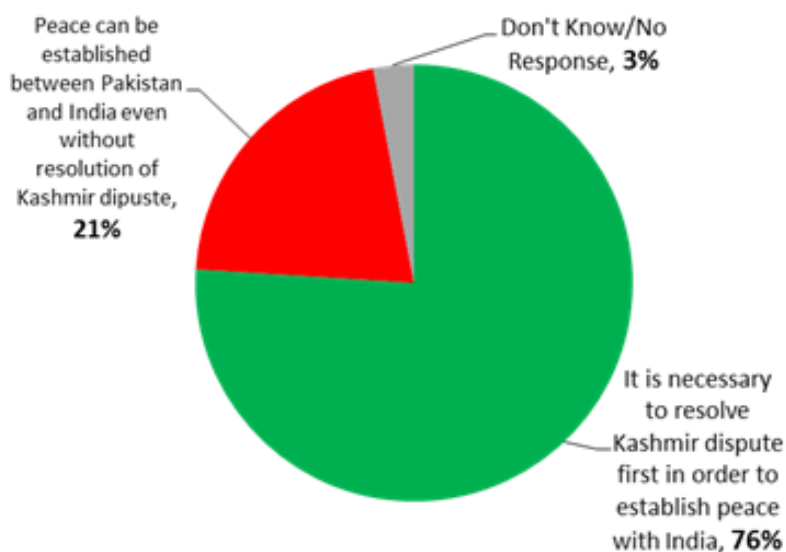

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, majority of Pakistanis (76%) think that the resolution of the Kashmir dispute is necessary for peace with India.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Do you think in order to establish peace with India it is important to resolve the Kashmir dispute or can peace be established with India without its resolution?” Responding to this, 76% said it is necessary to resolve the Kashmir dispute first in order to establish peace with India, and 21% said peace can be established between Pakistan and India even without the resolution of the Kashmir dispute. However, 3% did not give a response.

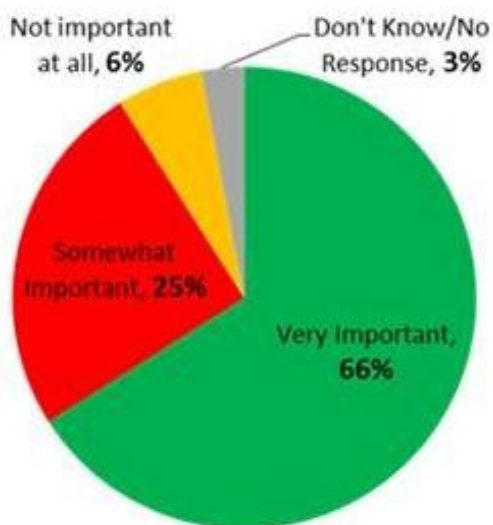

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, how important is the resolution of the Kashmir issue?” Responding to this, 66% consider it very important, 25% consider it somewhat important and 6% consider it not important at all. However, 3% did not give a response.

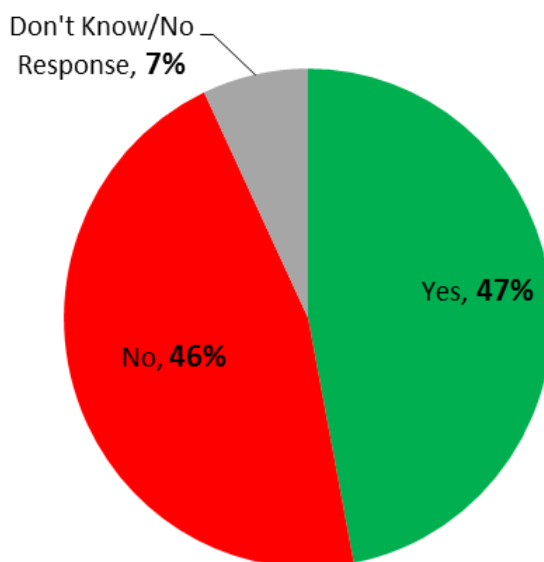

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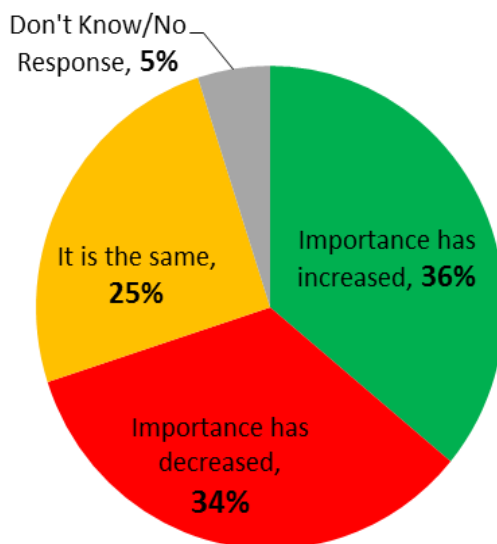

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, Pakistani views are divided about whether the importance of resolving the Kashmir issue has increased (36%) or decreased (34%).



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Some people think during the past 5 years the importance of resolving the Kashmir issue has decreased, while some disagree. What is your opinion on this?” Responding to this, 36% said importance has increased, 34% said importance has decreased and 25% said the level of importance is the same. However, 5% did not give a response.
