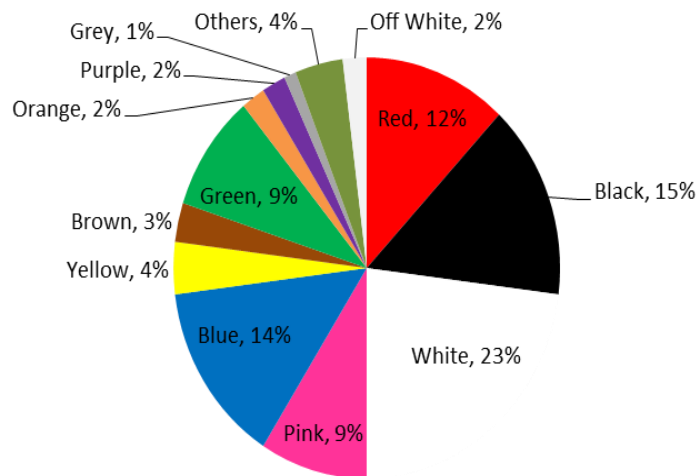

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 23% of Pakistanis say ‘white’ is their favorite color.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “**What is your favorite color?**” Responding to this, 23% said ‘white’, 15% said ‘black’, 14% said ‘blue’, 12% said ‘red’, 9% said ‘pink’, 9% said ‘green’, 4% said yellow, 3% said ‘brown’, 2% said purple, 2% said ‘orange’, 2% said ‘off white’, 1% said ‘grey’ and 4% said ‘others’.

Interestingly, the most popular color amongst males is white (33%) and amongst females is red (17%).

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2659 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 18, 2013 – February 25, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

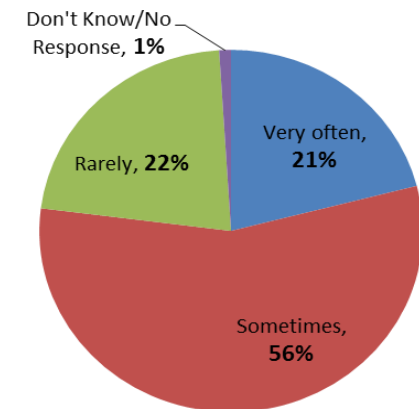
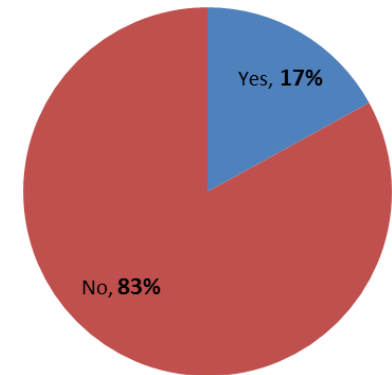
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 17% of parents say their child complains that he/she has to stand at school due to lack of chairs; 21% said they hear this complaint very often.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked **“Has your child ever complained that due to lack of chairs at school he/she has to stand?”** Responding to this, 83% said no and 17% said yes.

Respondents who said ‘yes’ to the above question were then asked **“How often do you hear this complaint?”** 56% said

‘sometimes’, 21% said ‘very often’ and 22% said ‘rarely’. However, 1% did not give a response.

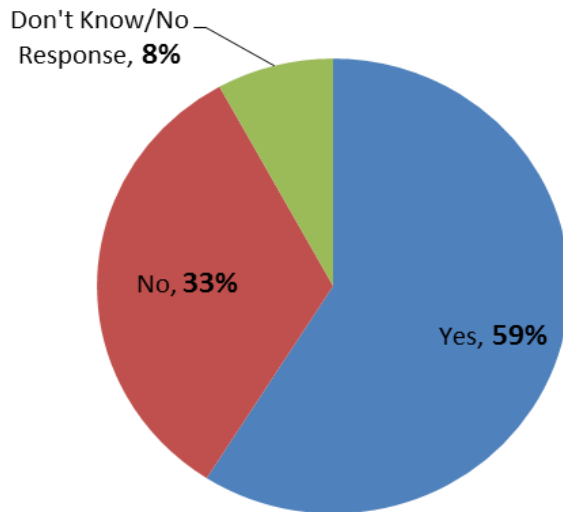

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 59% of Pakistani parents say their child goes to tuition centers after school.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “**Does your child go to tuition centers after school?**” Responding to this, 59% said yes and 33% said no. However, 8% did not give a response.

It is interesting to note that 67% of children in urban areas go to tuition centers after school compared to 55% from rural areas.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1821 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during March 11, 2013 – March 18, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, of parents whose children go to a Government school 35% say they pay a fee at that school.

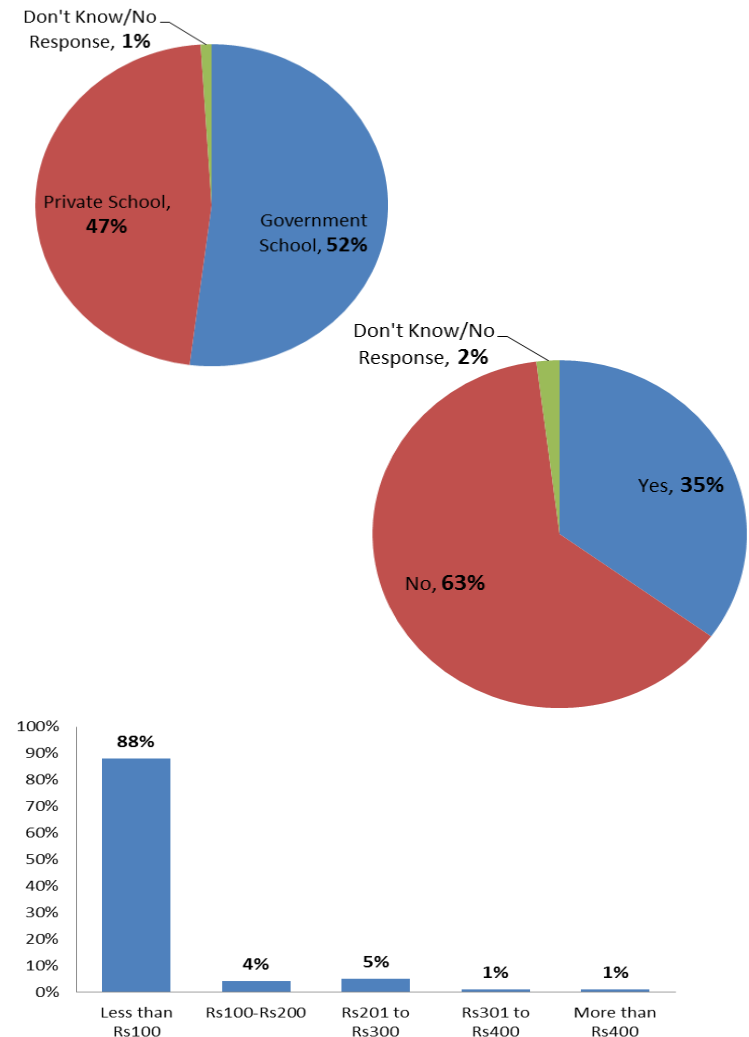
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked **“Does your child go to a Government School or a Private School?”** Responding to this, 52% said Government School and 47% said Private School. However, 8% did not give a response.

It is interesting to note that 60% of children in rural areas go to Government Schools whereas only 35% of children in urban areas go to Government Schools.

Respondents who said their children go to Government Schools were then asked **“Do you pay**

any kind of fee?” Responding to this, 35% said yes and 63% said no. However, 2% did not give a response. 88% of respondents who said they pay a fee at the school said they pay less than Rs100, 5% said they pay between Rs201 and Rs300, 4% said they pay between Rs101 and Rs200, 1% said they pay between Rs301 and Rs400 and 1% said they pay more than Rs400.

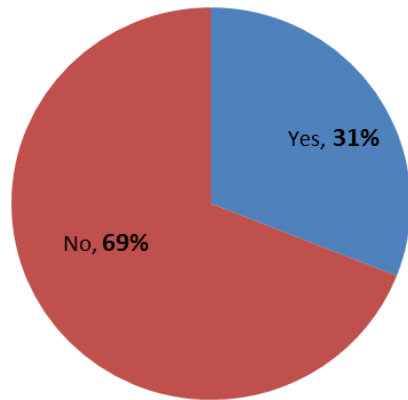

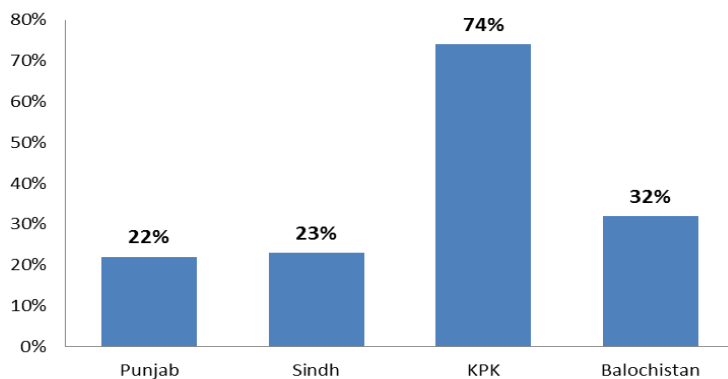

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 31% of Pakistani parents said their child complains of being hit by his/her teacher.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “**Has your child ever complained of being hit by his/her teacher?**” Responding to this, 31% said yes and 69% said no.

It is interesting to note that 33% of parents in rural areas said their child complained of being hit by his/her teacher, compared to 27% of parents in urban areas. A comparison between provinces shows that children complain the most about being hit by their teachers in KPK (74%), followed by Baluchistan (32%), Sindh (23%) and lastly Punjab (22%).

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1821 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during March 11, 2013 – March 18, 2013.
