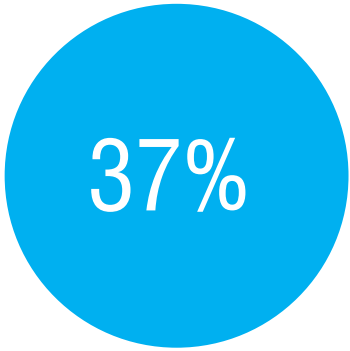

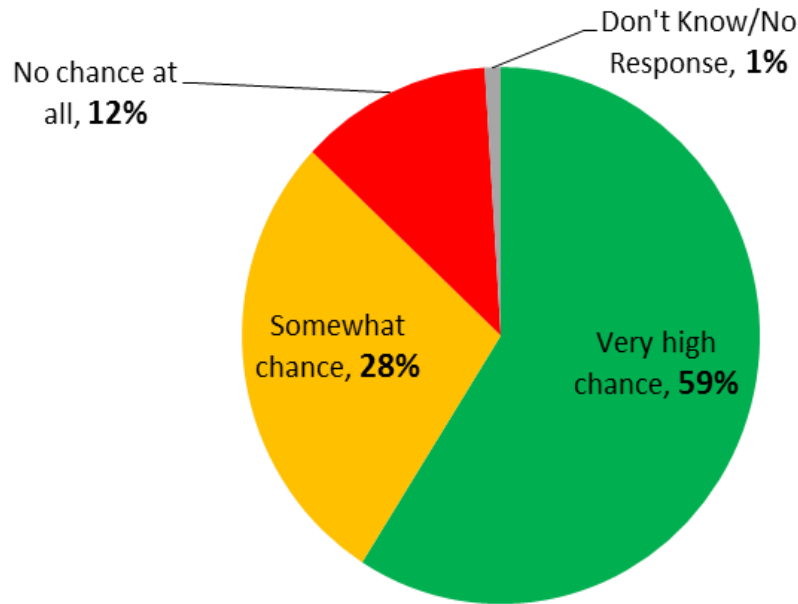

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 59% Pakistanis say there is a ‘very high chance’ that they will vote on Election Day.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women (18 years or 18+) from across the four provinces was asked “**What are the chances that you will go to vote on Election Day?**” Responding to this, 59% said ‘very high chance’, 28% said ‘somewhat chance’ and 12% said ‘no chance at all’. However, 1% did not give a response.

Comparing between urban and rural respondents, more rural respondents said there is a very high chance they would vote on Election Day (64%) than urban respondents (49%). This is consistent with turnout rates in Pakistan’s previous 9 elections where turnout in rural areas was higher than turnout in urban areas.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2641 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 15, 2013 – April 21, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.



According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 29% of those adult Pakistanis who claim they would not vote in General Elections said they will not vote because of 'threat of riots' on Election Day.

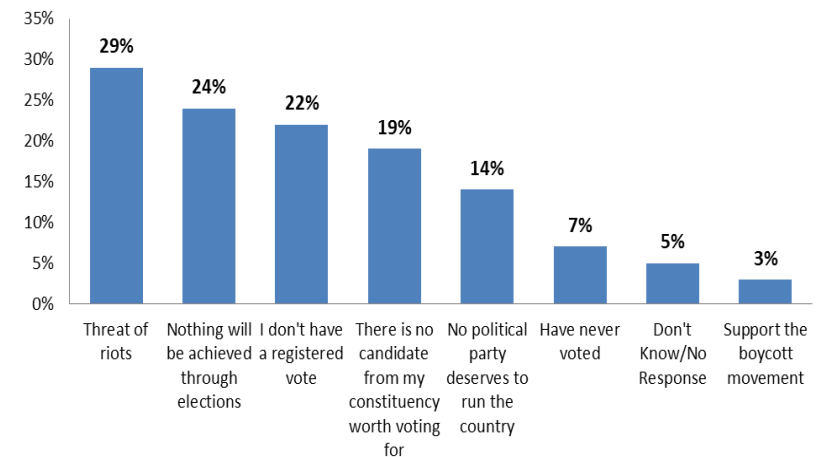
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked **"If there is no chance of you going to vote, what are your reasons?"** Responding to this, 29% said 'threat of riots', 24% said 'nothing will be achieved through elections', 22% said 'I don't want to vote', 19% said 'there is no candidate from my constituency worth voting for', 14% said 'no political party deserves to run the

country', 7% said 'have never voted' and 3% said 'support the boycott movement'. However, 5% did not give a response.

This question was only asked from respondents who said there is no chance of them going to vote on Election Day.

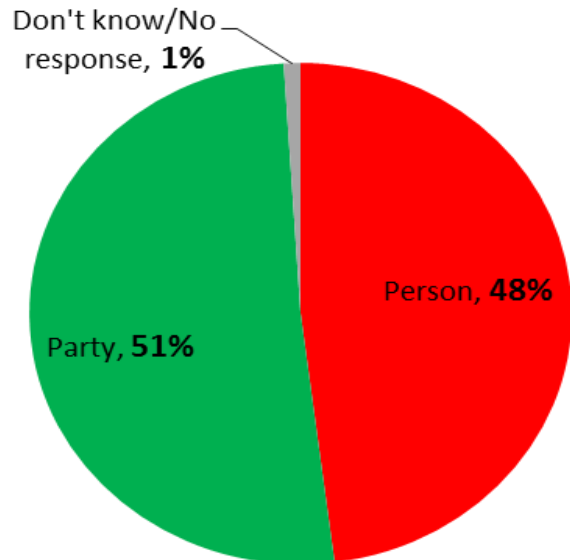
The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 305 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 15, 2013 – April 21, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, views are divided on whether vote should be for the person (48%) or the party (51%).

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “**In your opinion, should the vote be for the person or the party?**” Responding to this, 48% said for the person and 51% said for the party. However, 1% did not give a response.

Results were fairly similar between rural and urban localities, with 49% of rural respondents saying vote should be for the person and 46% of urban respondents saying vote should be for the person. However, there were differences in results between men and women, with 51% of men saying the vote should be cast for the person and 44% of women saying vote should be cast for the person.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2686 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 08, 2013 – April 15, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

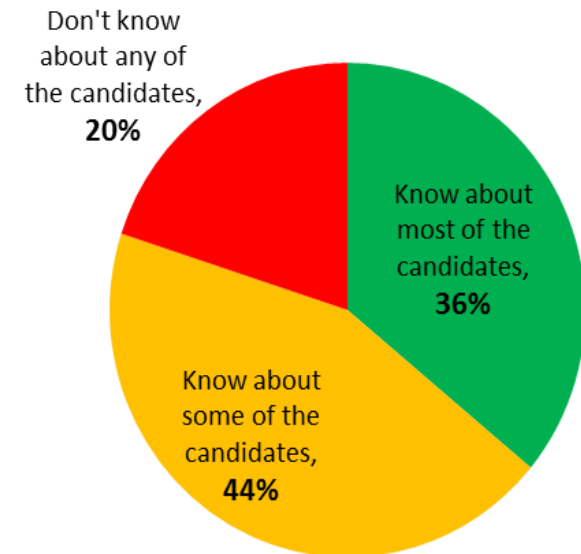
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 36% Pakistanis think they know about ‘most’ of the candidates contesting elections from their constituencies.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked **“Do you know which candidates are contesting elections from your constituency?”** Responding to this, 36% said they know of most of the candidates, 44% said they know of some of the candidates and 20% said they do not know of any of the candidates.

A comparison between urban and rural localities shows that more rural respondents (41%)

know about most of the candidates from their constituencies as opposed to urban respondents (27%). Similarly, there is also a difference between results of men and women, with more men (44%) claiming they know about most of the candidates from the constituency as compared to women (26%).

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2686 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 08, 2013 – April 15, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

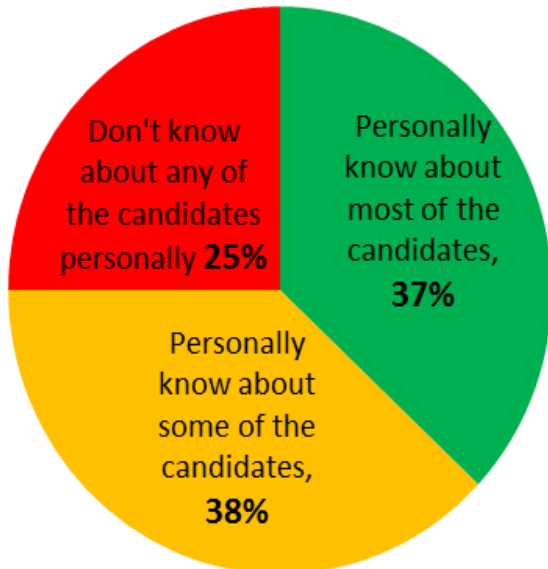

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 37% Pakistanis say they personally know about the “character and personality” of most of the candidates contesting elections from their constituency.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “**Do you personally know of the character and personality of any of the candidates contesting elections from your constituency?**” Responding to this, 37% said they know about most of them, 38% said they know about some of them and 25% said they do not know of any of them personally.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2686 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 08, 2013 – April 15, 2013. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm$ 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.
