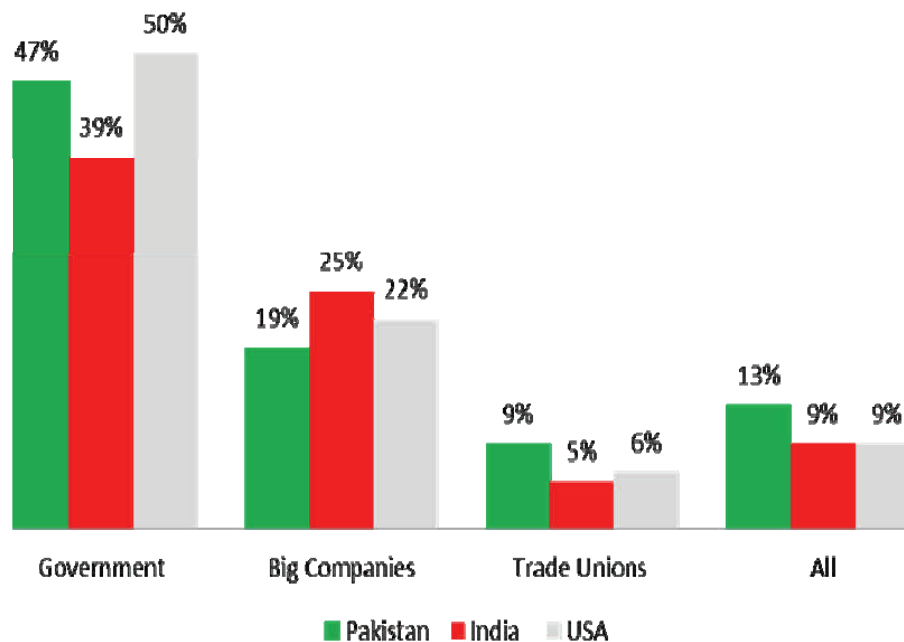

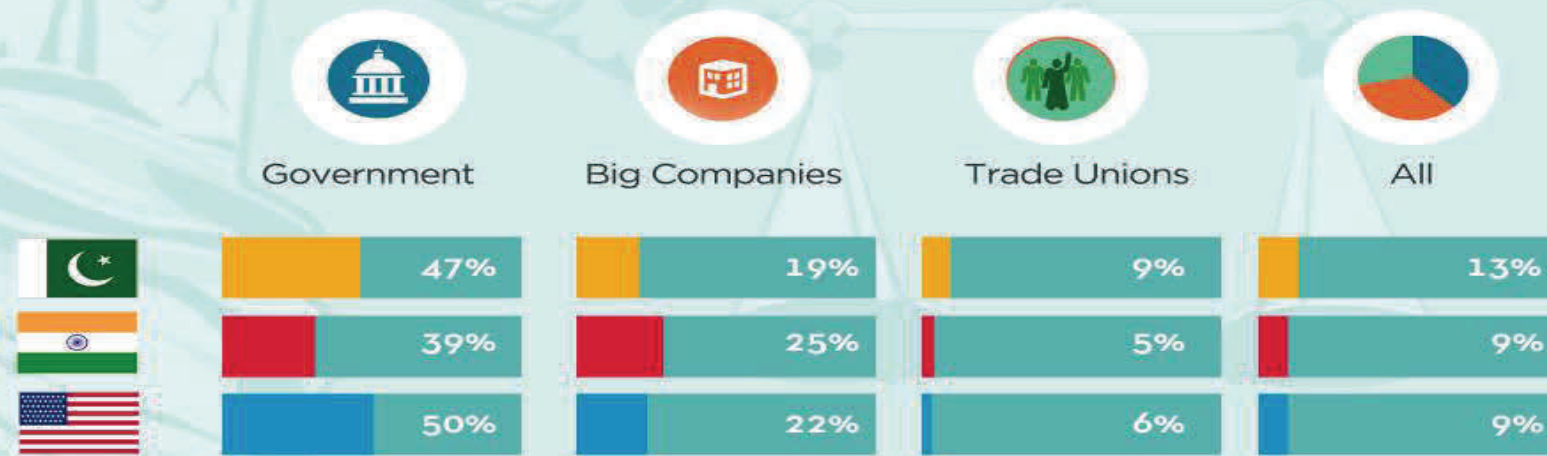
According to the GlobeScan Radar 2014, 47% Pakistanis believe that the government is responsible for the lack of economic and social justice and equality. The fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International Association.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Who do you think is most responsible for current lack of economic and social justice and equality in this country? Is it the government, big companies, or trade unions? Or would you say that there is currently no lack of economic and social justice in this country?” Responding to this, 47% people answered that government was responsible, 19% held big companies responsible, 9% blamed trade unions and 5% denied any lack of justice and equality in the country. 13% of the respondents said that all of these were responsible while 2% said that none were responsible. 5% of the people did not respond.

When the same question was asked in other countries, 62%, 50% and 39% respondents in UK, USA and India respectively blamed the government for the lack of economic and social justice and equality. 25% people in India held big companies responsible while 22% people in USA and 17% in UK thought the same. Indonesia and Nigeria both had large majorities of 81% and 74% respectively holding the government responsible. On average, 55% respondents in 24 countries blamed the government and 16% blamed big companies.

The study was released by GlobeScan and the fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1000 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 2013- April 2014. 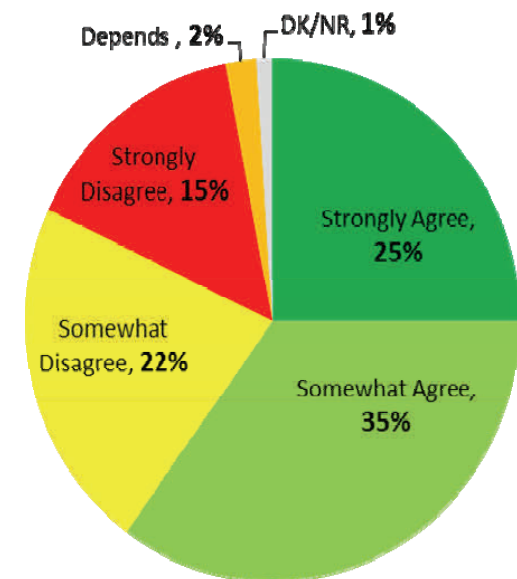

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, "Please tell me if you strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, or strongly disagree with each of the following statements: I feel guilty about my negative impact on the environment?" Responding to this, 25% Pakistanis said they strongly agreed with the statement, 35% said they somewhat agreed with it, 22% said they somewhat disagreed with it and 15% disagreed strongly. 2% respondents replied that it depends and 1% did not answer.

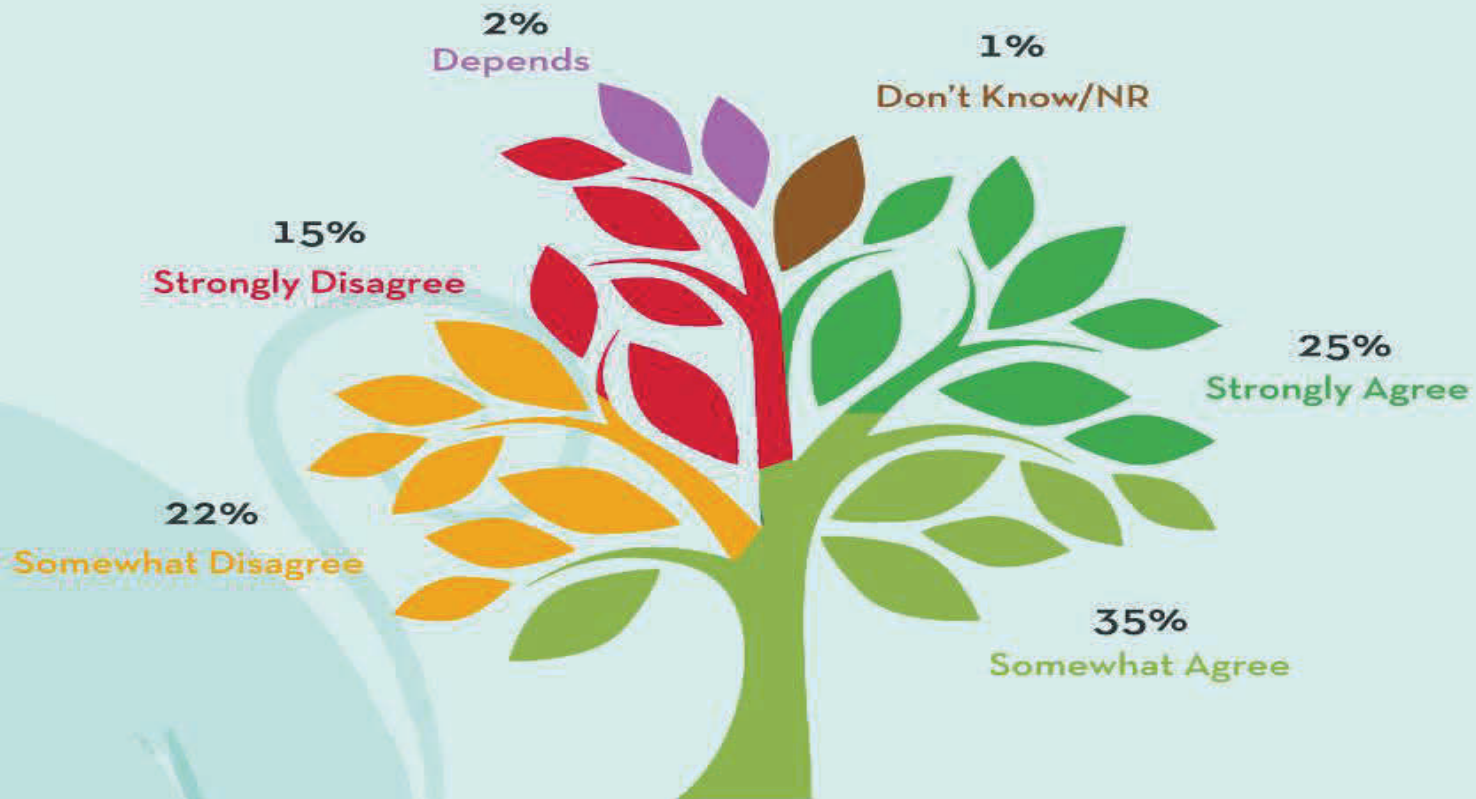
The study was conducted in 24 countries across the world. When the same question was asked in other countries, China had the highest number of respondents who agreed with the statement (71%), followed closely by Greece (69%) and India (68%). China and India also had the lowest number of respondents who disagreed with the statement. Only 23% people in India and 28% in China did not feel guilty about their impact on the environment. Germany and Russia had the lowest number of respondents agreeing with the statement at 29% each, and the highest number of respondents who disagreed at 66% and 63% respectively.

The study was released by GlobeScan and the fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1000 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 2013-April 2014. 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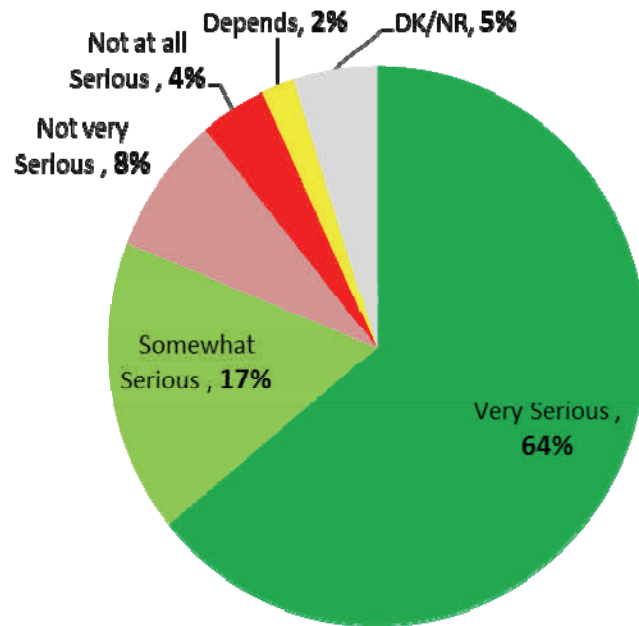

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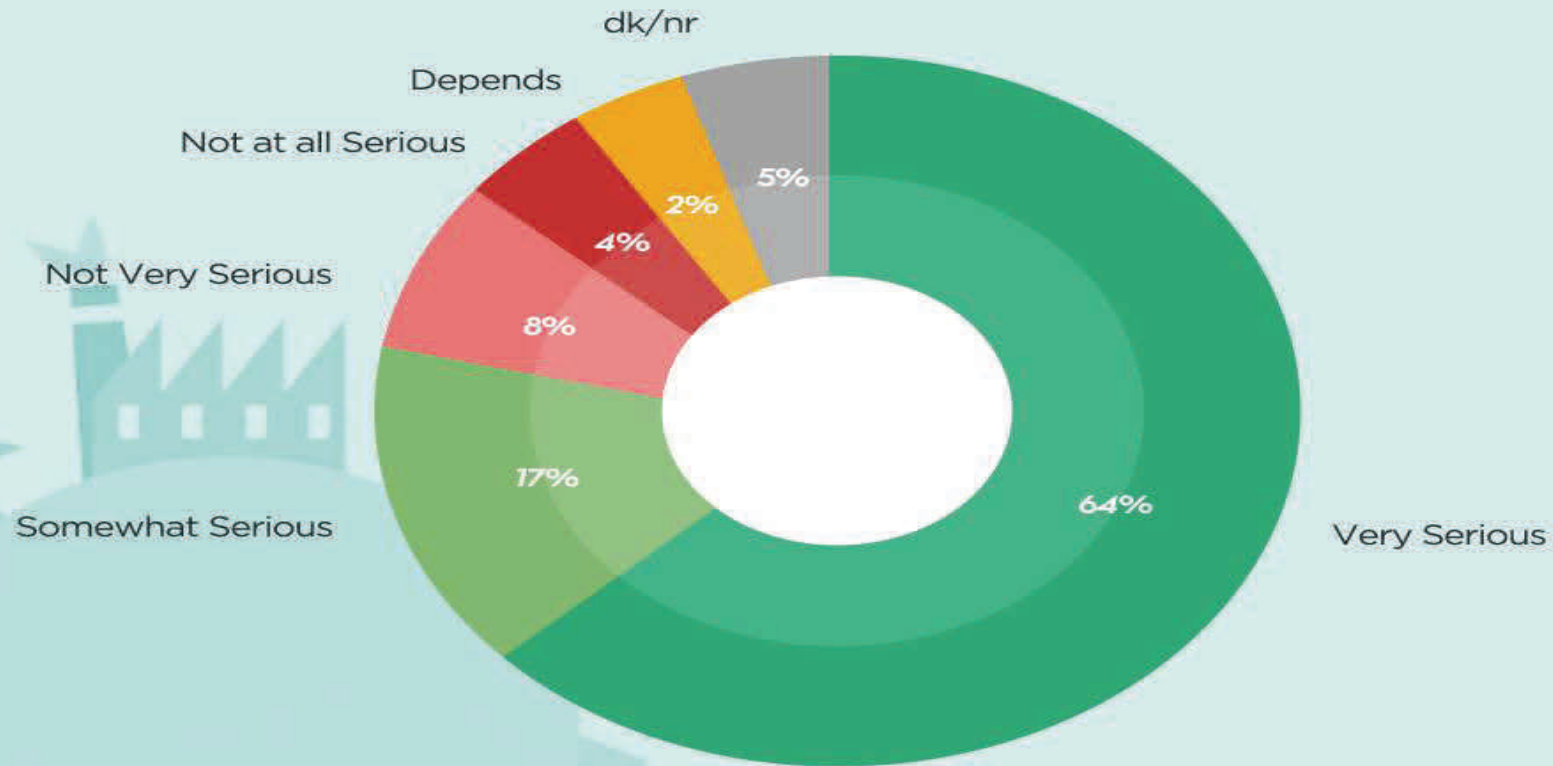
According to the GlobeScan Radar 2014, 81% Pakistanis believe that rising costs of food and energy is a serious global problem; 13% disagree. The fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International Association.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, "For each of the following possible global problems, please tell me if you see it as a very serious, somewhat serious, not very serious or not at all serious problem: The rising cost of food and energy?" In response, 64% Pakistanis said it was a very serious problem, 17% said it was a somewhat serious problem, 8% thought it was not very serious and only 4% said it was not a serious problem at all. 2% of the respondents said that it depends and 5% did not answer.

The study was conducted in 24 countries across the world. When the same question was asked in other countries, India and South Korea had the lowest number of respondents who considered the problem serious at, 71% and 79% respectively. They also had high numbers of respondents who thought the problem was not serious at 17% and 14% respectively, with India just 1% higher than Pakistan. Spain, Turkey and Chile had the highest number of respondents who said the problem was a serious one, with 99%, 96% and 95% respectively.

The study was released by GlobeScan and the fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1000 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 2013- April 2014. 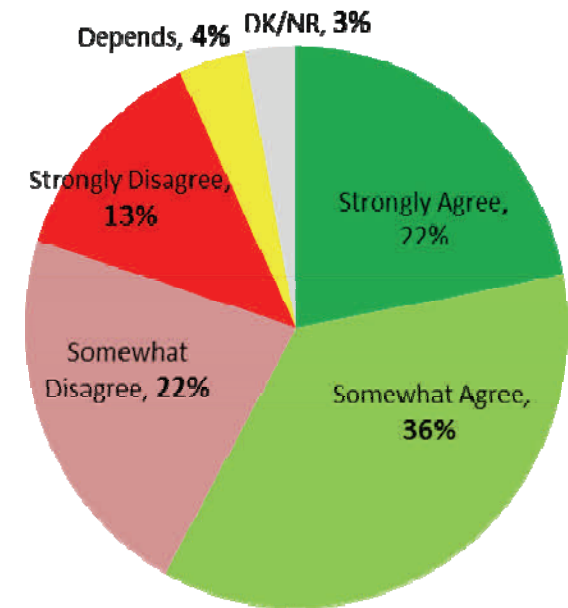

The fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International Association.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell me if you strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, or strongly disagree with each of the following statements: I am willing to pay more for products produced in a socially and environmentally responsible way?” Responding to this, 22% Pakistanis said they strongly agreed with the statement, 36% said they somewhat agreed with it, 22% said they somewhat disagreed with it and 13% disagreed strongly. 4% respondents replied that it depends and 3% did not answer.

The study was conducted in 24 countries across the world. When the same question was asked in other countries, Australia had the highest number of respondents who agreed with the statement (85%), followed by Greece (80%). 67% respondents in India agreed with the statement. Australia, along with Greece, also had low numbers of respondents who disagreed with the statement at only 13% and 17% respectively, ahead of only Turkey at 12%. Respondents in Mexico were split almost evenly with 47% agreeing and 48% disagreeing.

The study was released by GlobeScan and the fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1000 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 2013-April 2014. 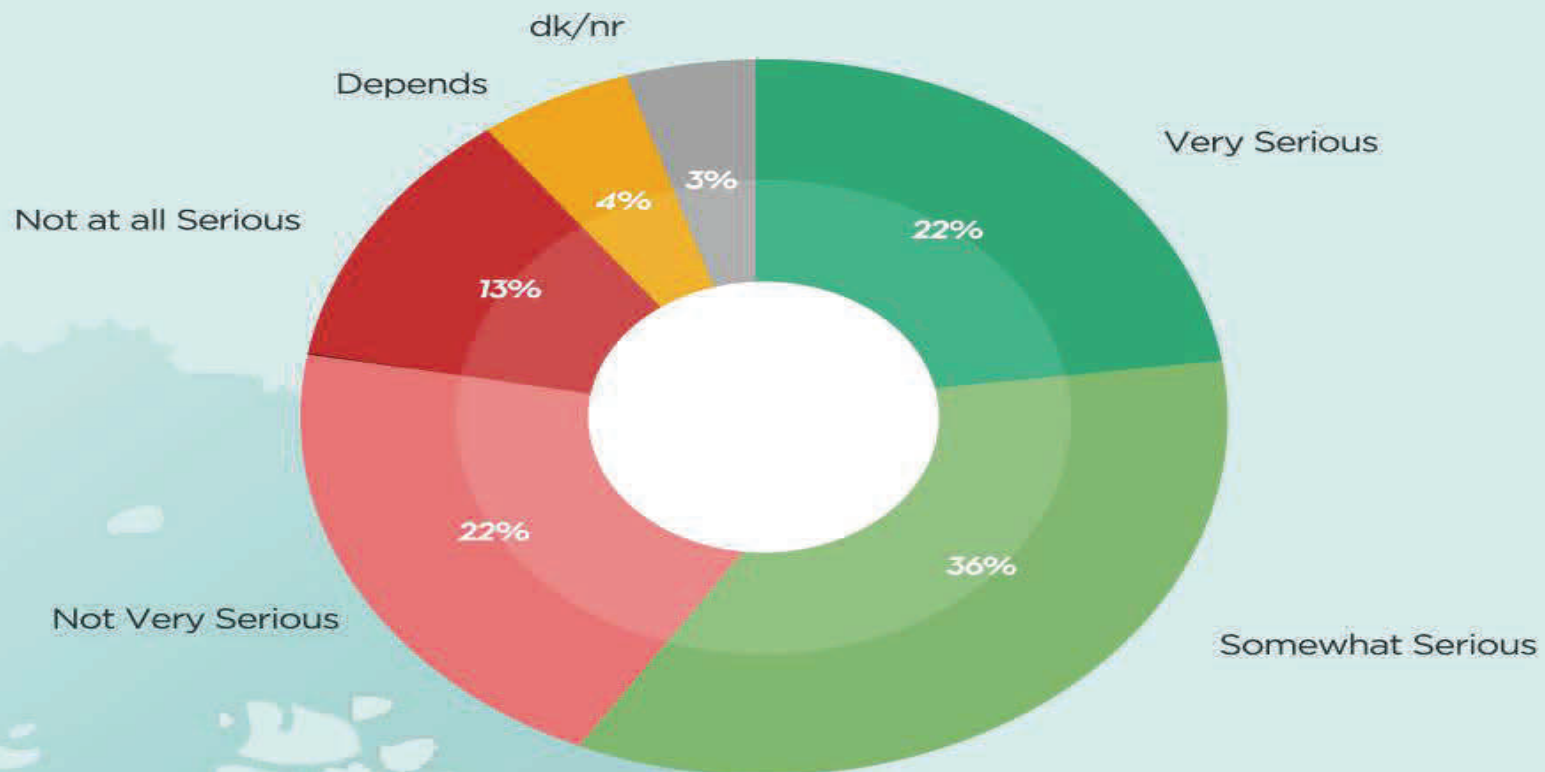

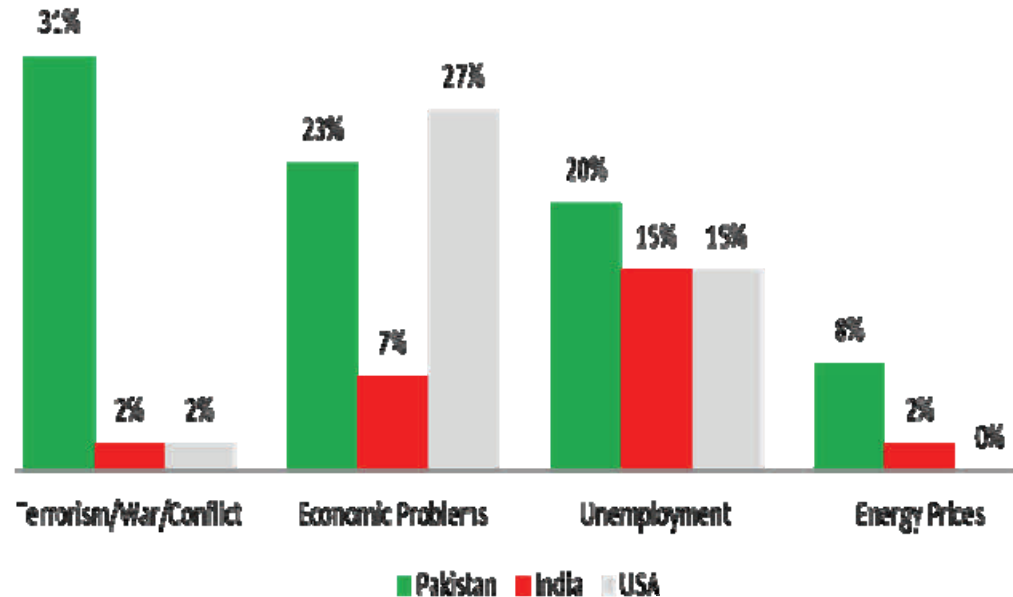

According to the GlobeScan Radar 2014, 31% Pakistanis believe the most important problem of country is terrorism. The fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International Association.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, "What do you think is the most important problem facing our nation today?" In response, 31% Pakistanis said terrorism and war, 23% said economic problems, 20% said unemployment and 8% said energy prices and supply. Environmental quality, corruption and poverty had 3% of the votes each, 2% of the respondents said education and 1% said political problems, 6% mentioned other problems.

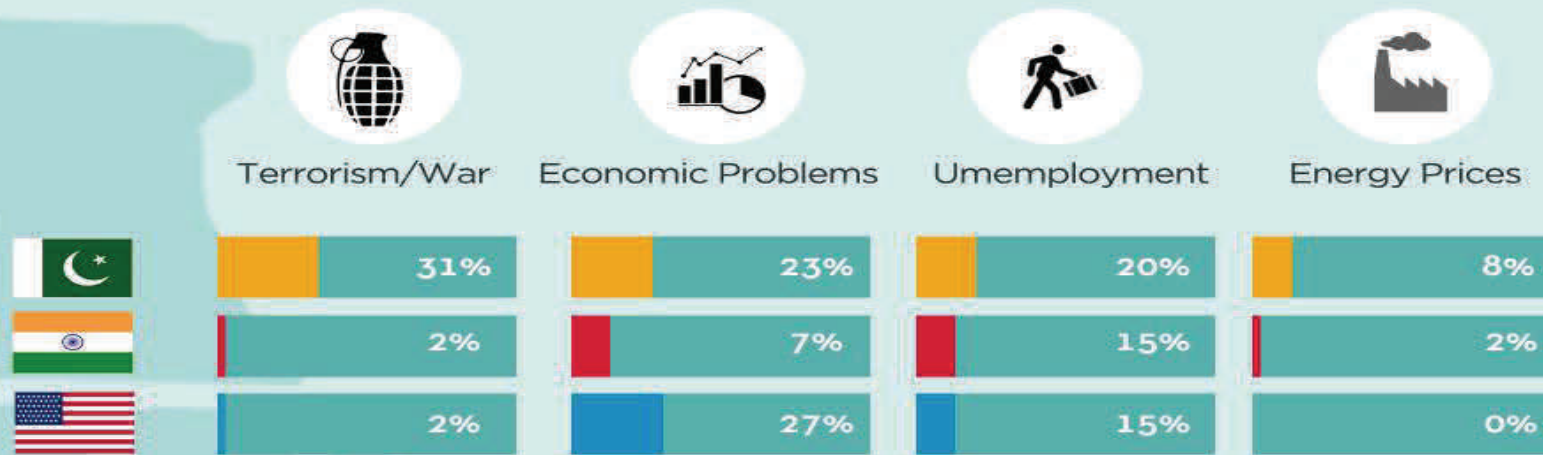
The study was conducted in 24 countries across the world. When the same question was asked in other countries, terrorism was not rated highly in any other country with only 2% people in USA and India believing it to be the most important. Respondents in USA, UK, Russia and Canada rated the importance of economic problems highly with 27%, 29%, 24% and 21% respectively while only 7% people in India thought that economic problems were most important. Unemployment was considered the most important problem in India (15%) and Turkey (20%), and was also highly rated in USA (15%).

The study was released by GlobeScan and the fieldwork for the survey in Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1000 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 2013- April 2014.
