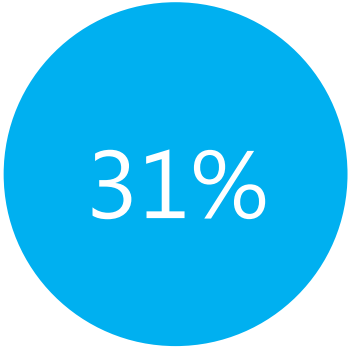

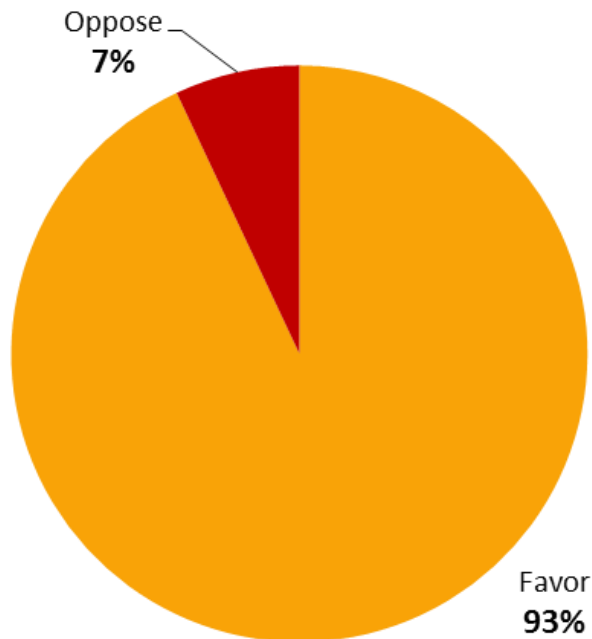

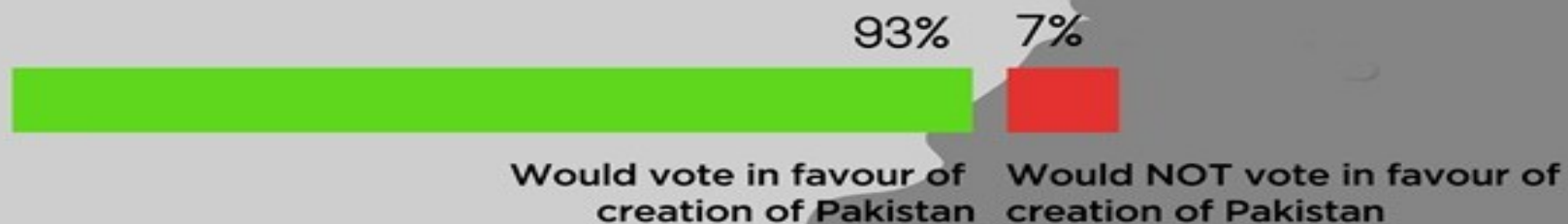

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 93% Pakistanis would vote for the creation of Pakistan if they were an adult in 1947.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Suppose you were an adult in 1947, and therefore able to cast vote, would you vote in favor of the creation of Pakistan or opposition?” Responding to this question, 93% respondents said they would vote in favor of the creation of Pakistan if they were an adult in 1947 and eligible to vote. Only 7% respondents said they would not vote in favor of the creation of Pakistan.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2558 men in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 18 – August 25, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

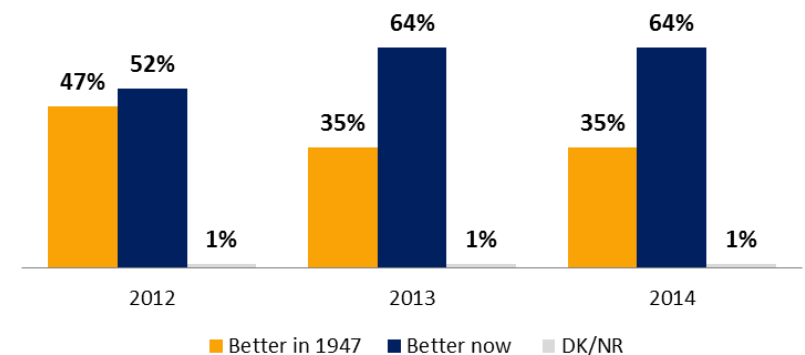
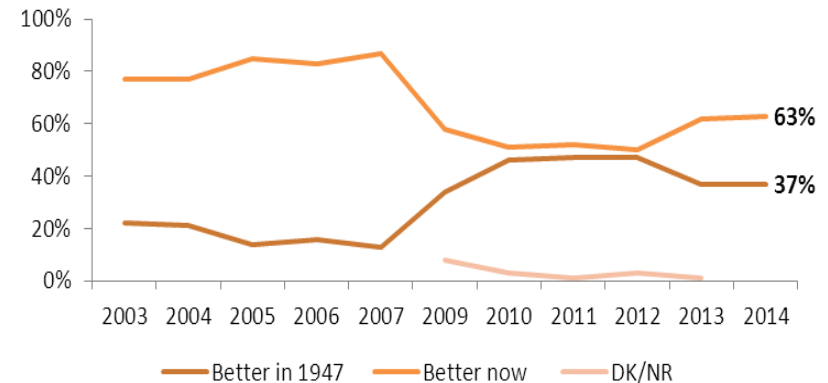

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 63% Pakistanis believe that Pakistan is in a better condition than it was in 1947; 37% disagree.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think that Pakistan has not progressed much in the past 50 years, while others disagree with this. Do you think Pakistan's condition was better in 1947 or is it better now?” In response to this question, 63% respondents said that Pakistan's conditions were better now than they had been in 1947 while 37% said that conditions were better in 1947. Data from previous years indicates a sharp decline in the public's positive perception of Pakistan's progress between the years 2010 to 2012 before rising slightly in 2013. Recent trend analysis over similar topics have also indicated a fall in nationalistic fervor and optimism about the country between the years 2010 to 2012.

Following up, respondents were further asked, “And tell us about your province, were conditions in your province better in 1947 or are they better now?” Responding to this question, 64% respondents said conditions in their province are better now while 35% said they were better in 1947 and 1% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2558 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 18 – August 25, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

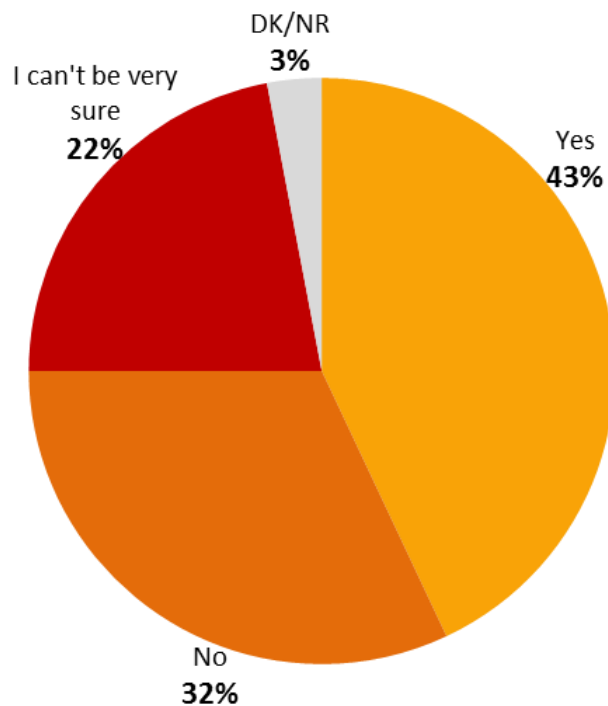

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 43% Pakistanis believe that Pakistan needs foreign aid; 32% disagree.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Does Pakistan need foreign aid?” In response to this question, 43% Pakistanis said that Pakistan needs foreign aid while 32% said that Pakistan does not need foreign aid and 22% said that they could not be sure. 3% respondents did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2705 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 09 – June 16, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm$ 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

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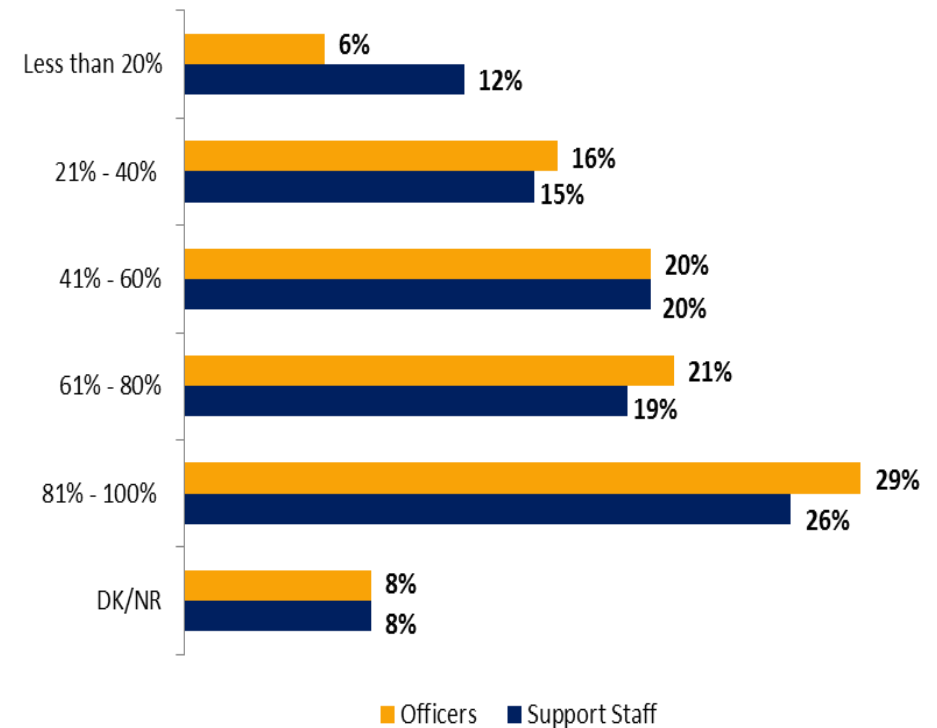

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 78% Pakistanis believe that more than 40% of government officers are corrupt.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “How many government servants out of 100, do you think are involved in bribery and corruption?” 6% respondents believe that less than 20% of government officers are involved in bribery and corruption, while 12% believe the same of the support staff. 16% respondents think that the percentage of officers involved in corruption is 21% - 40%, while 15% think the same of the support staff. 20% respondents are of the opinion that the percentage of both corrupt officers and support staff is around 41% - 60%. Moreover, 21% respondents believe that 61% - 80% officers are involved in corruption, and 19% think that the same amount of support staff is corrupt. The highest numbers of respondents for both officers (29%) and support staff (26%) said that 81% - 100% are corrupt. For both officers and support staff, 8% of respondents did not answer.

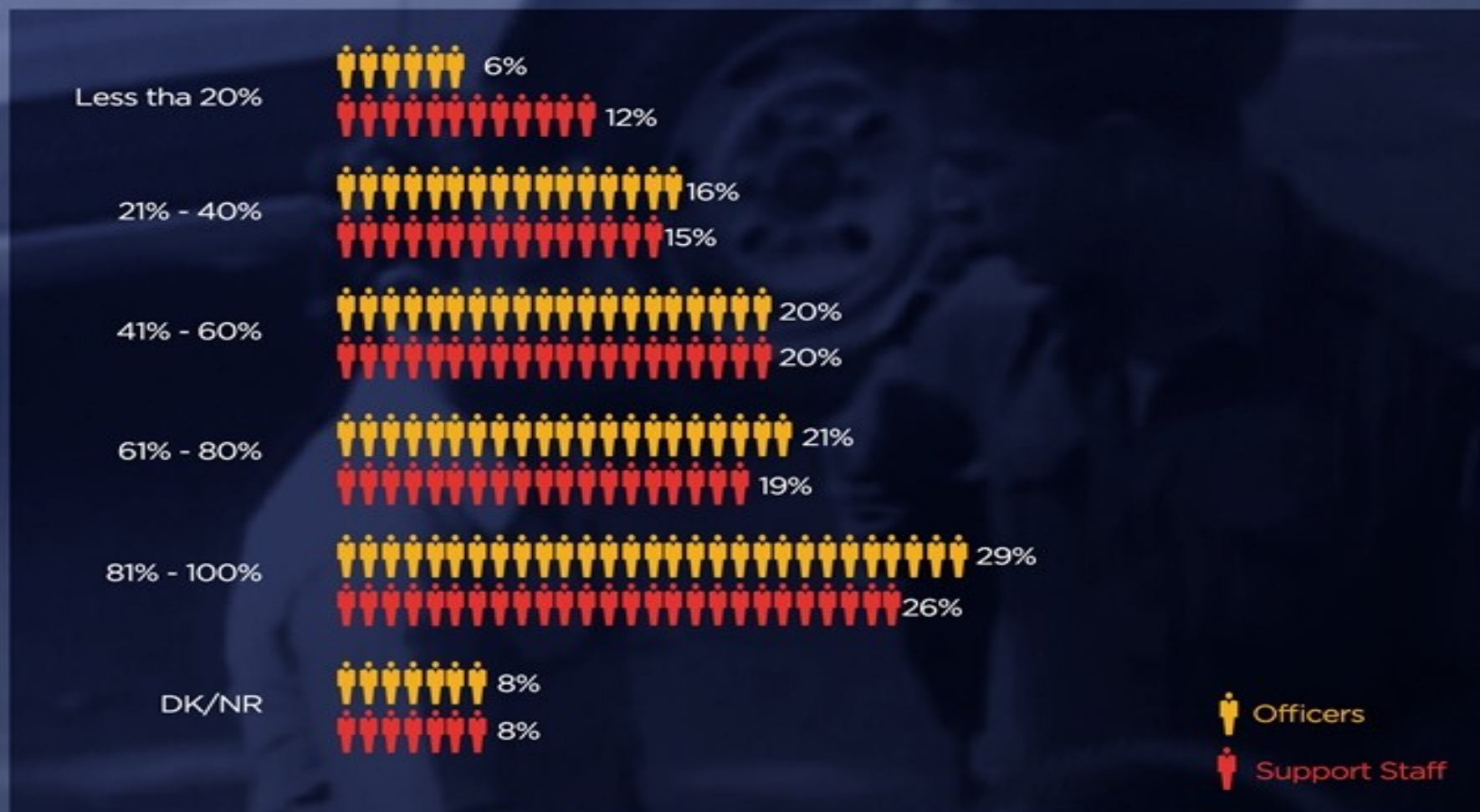

Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

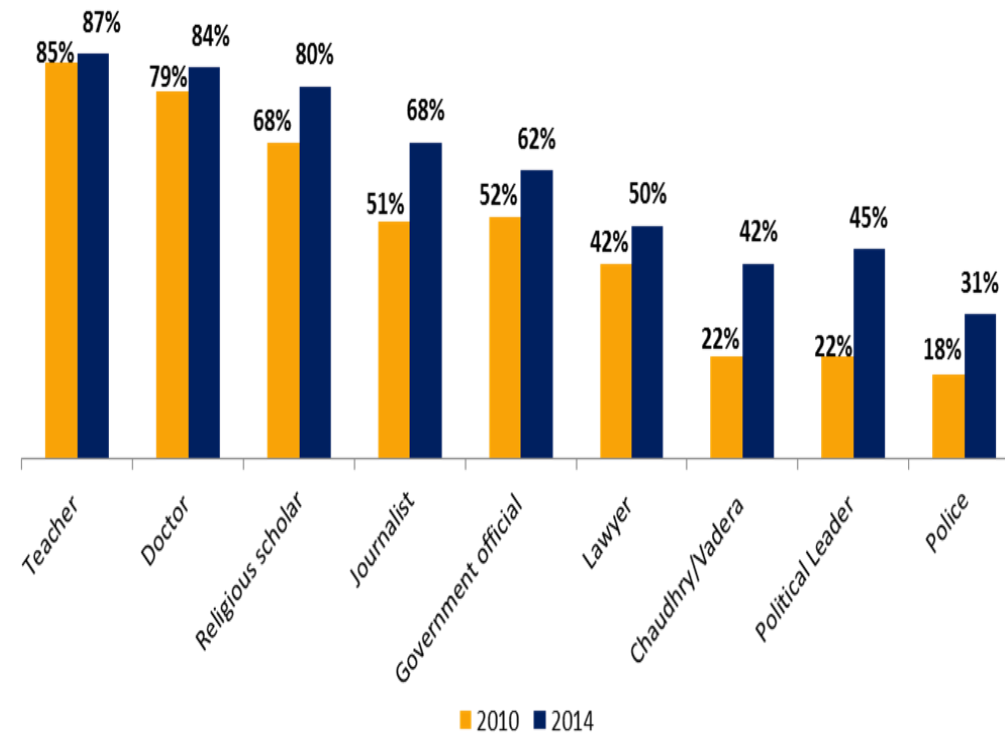

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 87% Pakistanis trust teachers; only 31% trust the police.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “In regards to honesty and moral character, how much do you trust the following people?” Responding to this question, 59% respondents said they trust teachers a lot, 28% trust them somewhat, 11% trust them very little while 2% don’t trust them at all. Regarding doctors, 48% Pakistanis said they trust them a lot, 36% trust them somewhat, 12% trust them very little while 3% don’t trust them at all and 1% did not respond. 47% respondents trusted religious scholars a lot, 33% trusted them somewhat, 14% trusted them very little while 5% did not trust them at all and 1% did not respond. Police had the highest percentage of respondents saying they did not trust them at all at 38%. Only 8% respondents trusted the police a lot, 23% trusted them somewhat, 30% trusted them very little and 1% did not respond. Political leaders and chaudhrys also got low trust ratings from the public.

A comparison with data collected in 2010 shows that, over the past four years the pattern of these trust ratings has not changed much. The same occupations attracted more trust in 2010 (teachers, doctors, religious scholars), while chaudhrys, political leaders and police had low trust ratings at that time as well at 22%, 22% and 18% respectively. Interestingly however, overall trust ratings have improved a little with all occupations getting higher percentage of respondents who trusted them than in 2010.

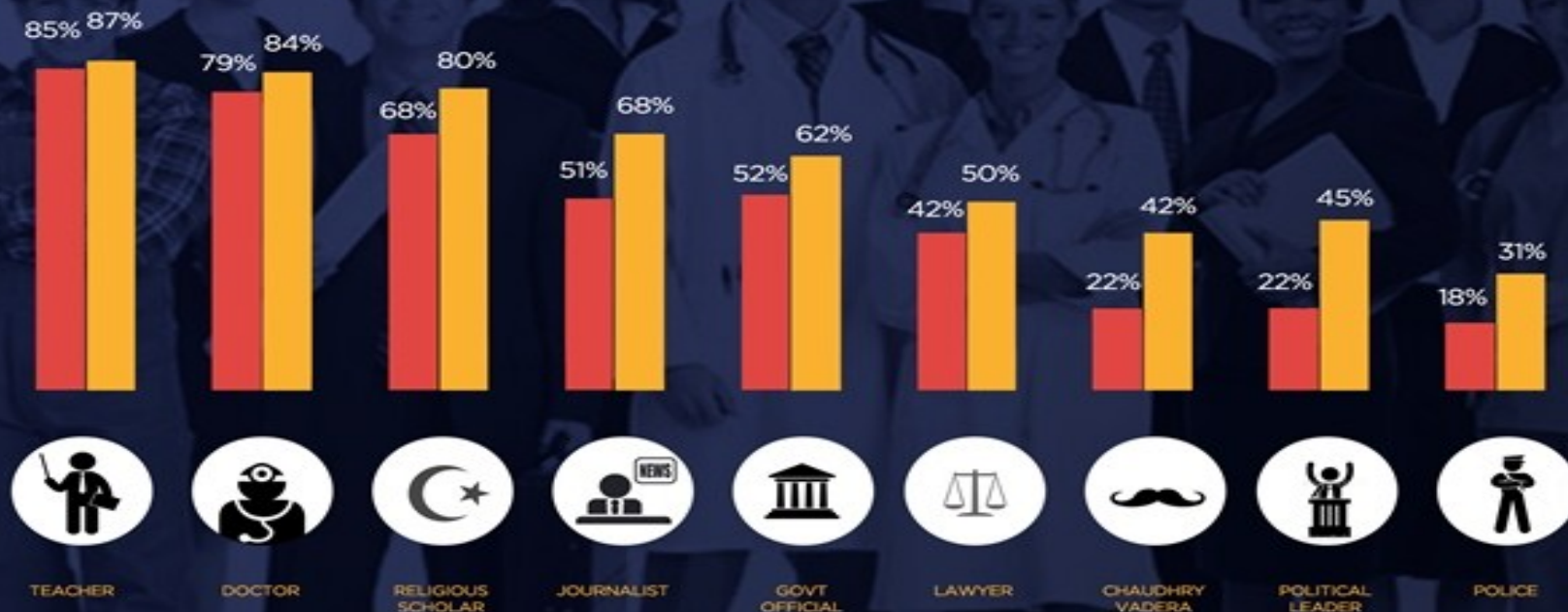
The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2548 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 21 – April 28, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
