The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2562 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 24 – December 01, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

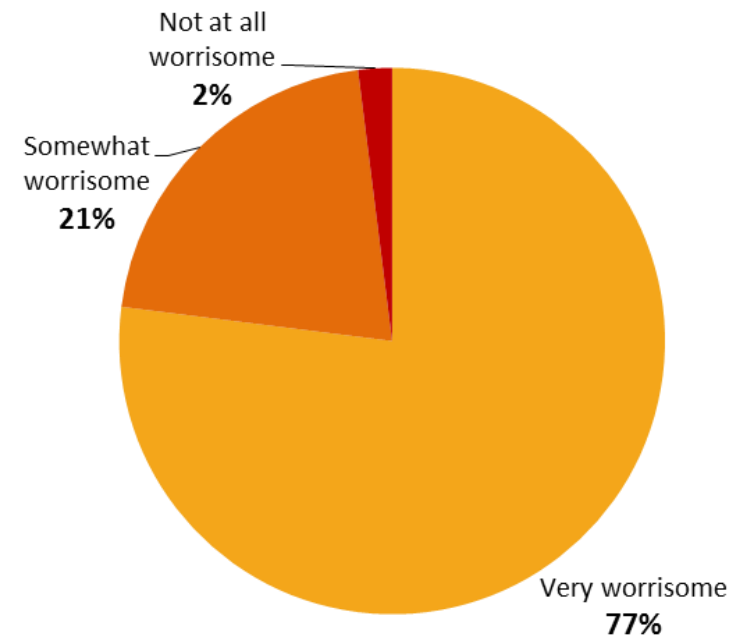

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 77% Pakistanis who have heard about Ebola think that it is very worrisome for the world; 21% think that it is somewhat worrisome.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces, who had heard about Ebola virus, was asked, “In your opinion, is Ebola virus very worrisome, somewhat worrisome or not at all worrisome for the world?” In response, 77% respondents said that Ebola virus is very worrisome for the world, 21% said that it is somewhat worrisome, while 2% believe that it is not worrisome at all.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2562 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 24 – December 01, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

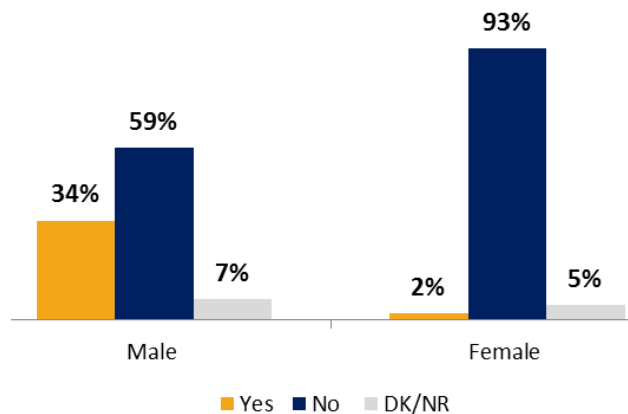
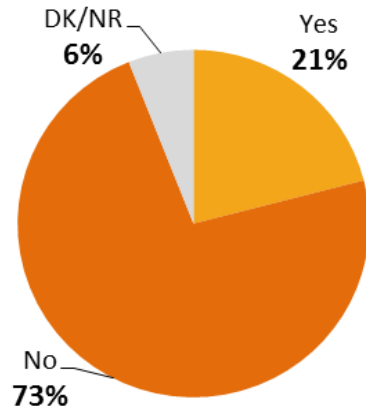
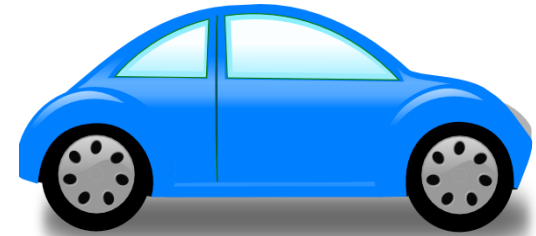
In your opinion, is Ebola virus very worrisome, somewhat worrisome or not at all worrisome for the world?

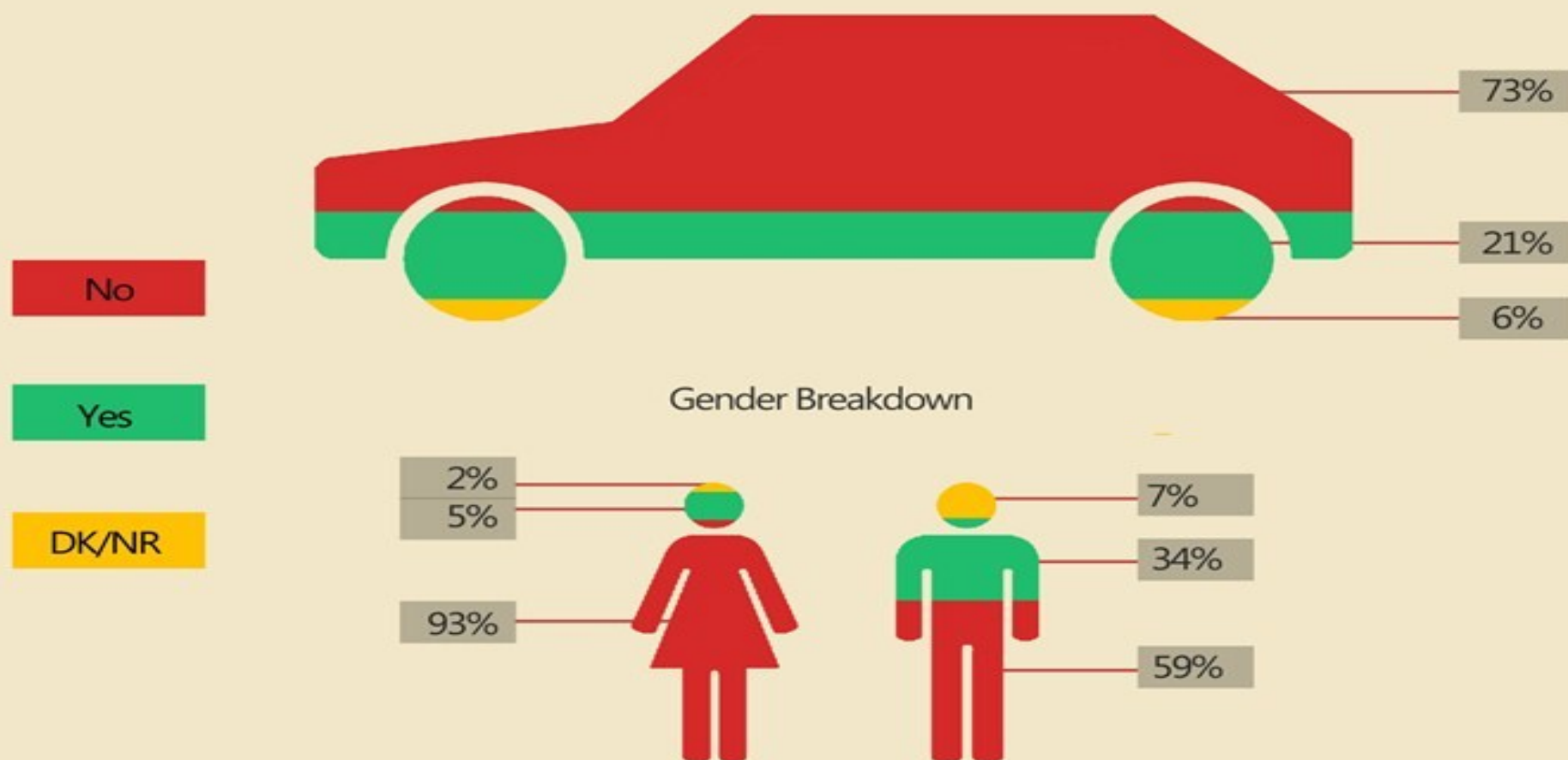
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, only 21% Pakistanis claim they can drive a car.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Please tell us, can you drive yourself?” In response, 21% respondents said they can drive cars, 73% said they cannot drive cars and 6% did not respond. According to the Gender breakdown, 34% among men said they can drive, while 59% said they cannot drive and 7% did not respond. Among women, an overwhelming 93% said they cannot drive, while 2% said they can drive and 5% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2562 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 17 – November 24, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

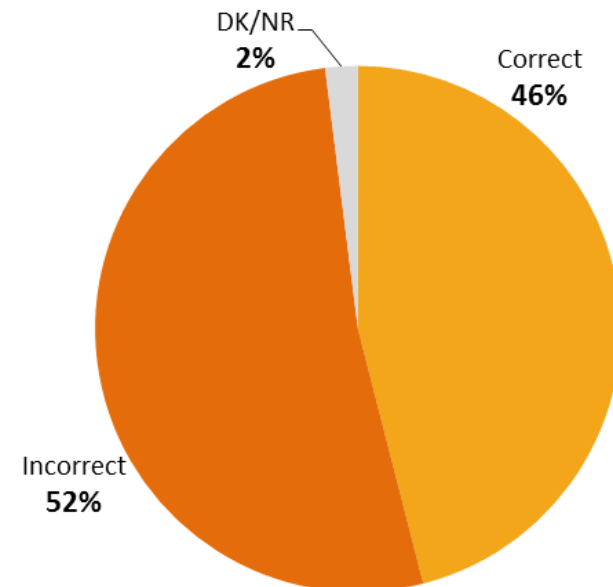

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 52% Pakistanis feel that women drive incorrectly as compared to men; 46% disagree.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Please think about driving cars and tell us if you think women drive in the correct manner or not compared to men?” In response, 46% respondents said that women drive in the correct manner as compared to men, while 52% said that women drive in the incorrect manner and 2% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2562 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 24 – December 01, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.



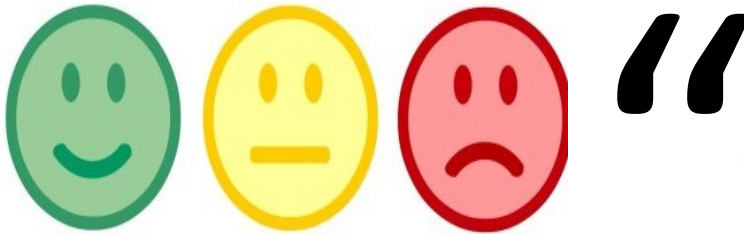

Pakistanis' level of satisfaction with their lives has fallen over the last decade.

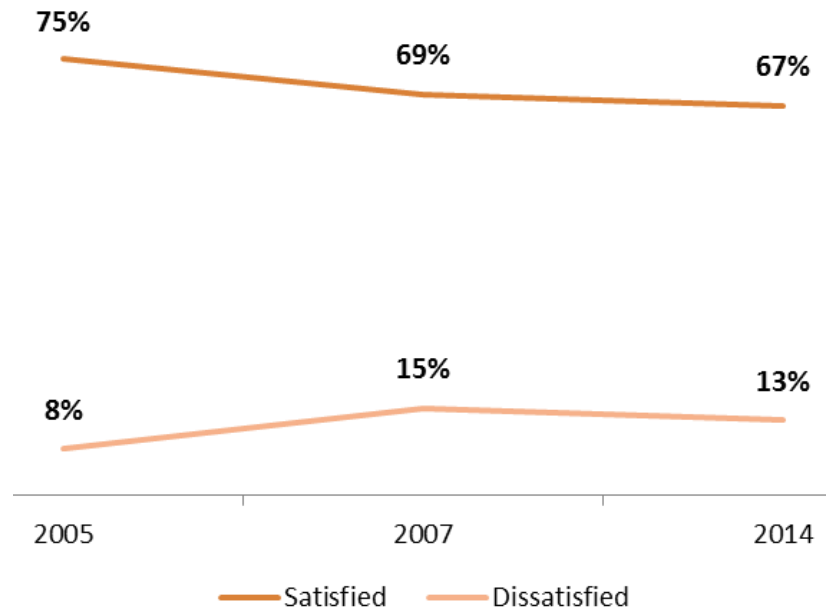


According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 67% Pakistanis said they are satisfied with the life they are living these days; 13% are dissatisfied.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, "How satisfied or dissatisfied are you with the kind of life you are living these days?" In response, 26% said they are very satisfied, 41% said they are somewhat satisfied, 20% said they are neither satisfied nor dissatisfied, while 8% said they are somewhat dissatisfied and 5% are very dissatisfied with the kind of life they are living.

This question was also asked during previous years. In 2005, 31% said they were very satisfied, 44% said they were somewhat satisfied, 17% said they were neither satisfied nor dissatisfied, while 7% said they were somewhat dissatisfied and only 1% were very dissatisfied with the kind of life they were living. In 2007, 33% said they were very satisfied, 36% said they were somewhat satisfied, 16% said they were neither satisfied nor dissatisfied, while 11% said they were somewhat dissatisfied and 4% were very dissatisfied with the kind of life they were living.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2562 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 17 – November 24, 2014. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.



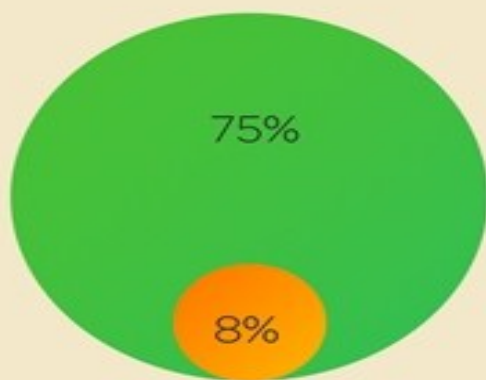
