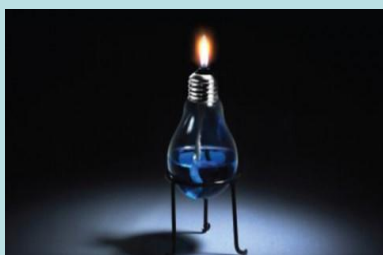

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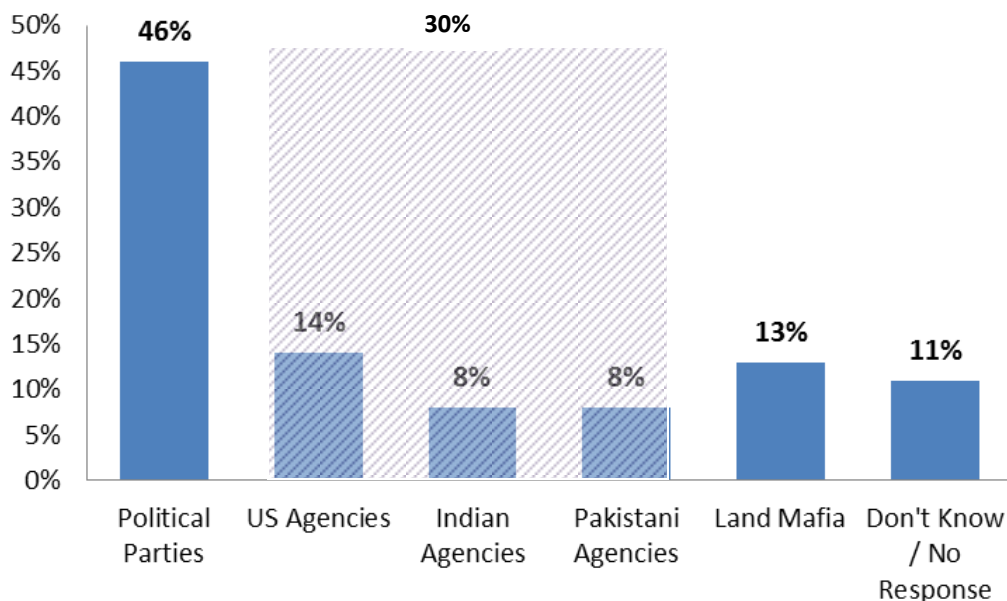

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 46% blame political parties for target killing in Karachi; 30% blame domestic and foreign intelligence agencies; 13% blame the land mafia; 11% did not respond.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, who is responsible for target killings in Karachi?” Responding to this, 46% believe that political parties are behind target killings in Karachi, 14% believe it to be work of US agencies, 8% believe it to be the work of Indian agencies while another 8% believe Pakistani agencies are behind target killings. 13% blame the land mafia however 11% did not give a view.

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The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2693 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 01 - April 07, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm$ 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

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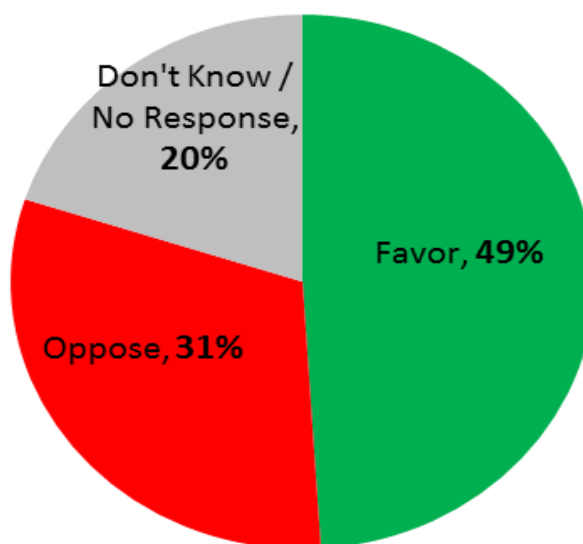

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 49% favor while 31% oppose acceptance of Indian offer to sell electricity to Pakistan, 20% are unsure.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Recently, India offered 5000 Megawatt electricity to Pakistan which it accepted. In your opinion, by accepting this offer, Pakistan did a good job or bad?” Responding to this, 49% are in favor of Indian offer to sell electricity to Pakistan while 31% oppose the Indian offer. However 20% did not give a view.

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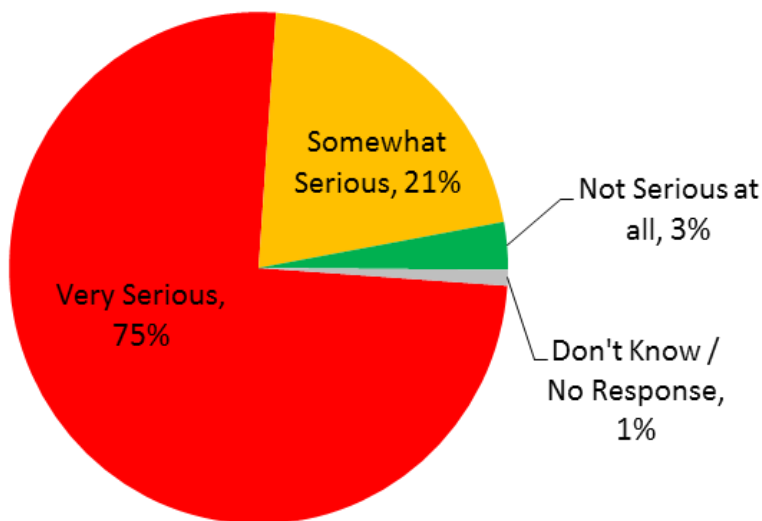
Islamabad April 18, 2012



According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 96% describe electricity load-shedding as a very serious (75%) or somewhat serious (21%) problem.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “How intense is the problem of load shedding in your area?” Responding to this, 75% believe it to be a very serious problem, 21% believe it to be a somewhat serious problem whereas 3% believe that it is not a problem at all. However 1% did not give a view.

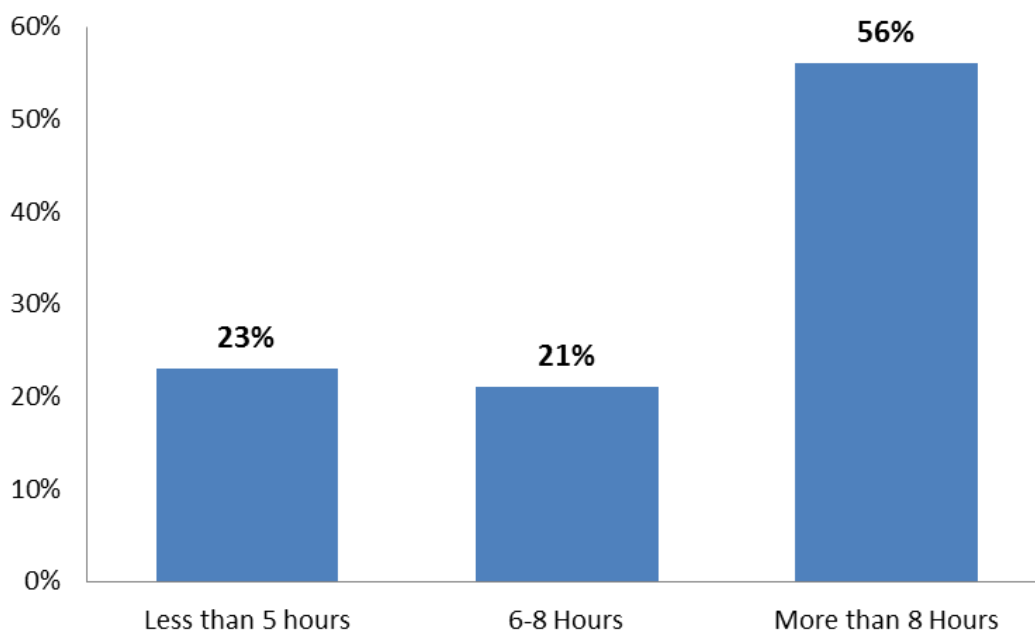

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 77% perceive duration of electricity load shedding to be more than 6 hours.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Kindly tell, what is the duration of load shedding in your area?” Responding to this, 23% claim that electricity load shedding in their area is less than 5 hours, 21% claim that duration is between 6-8 hours whereas 56% claim that load shedding duration is more than 8 hours.

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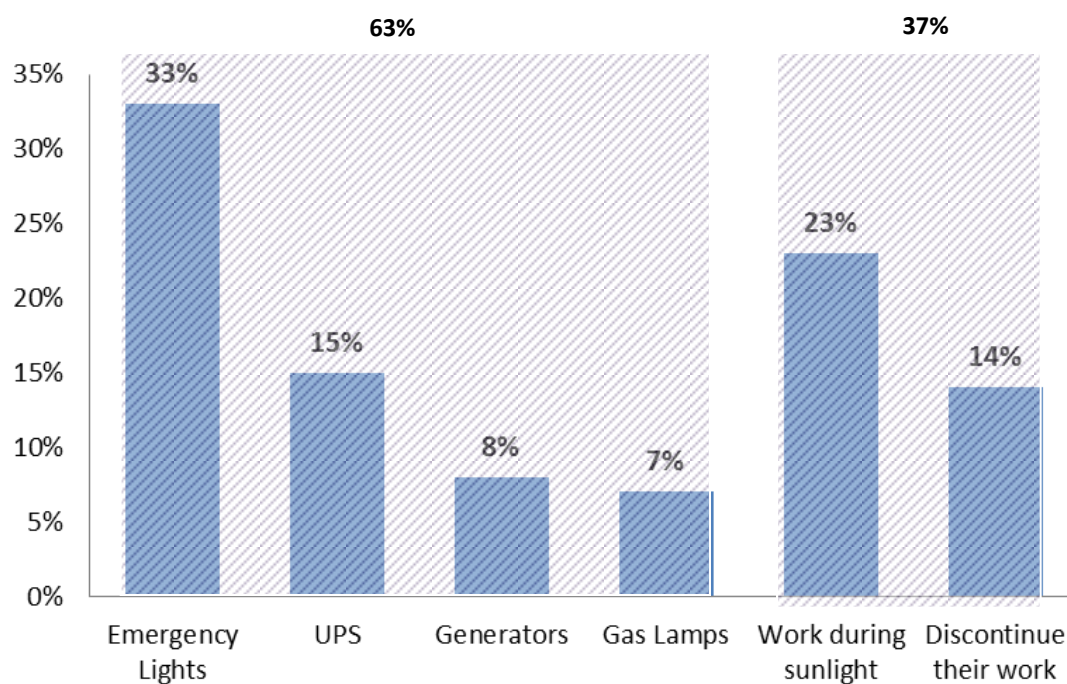

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, emergency lights (33%), UPS (15%) are the two most popular ways to cope with Electricity Load-shedding.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “What do you do to continue your work during load shedding?” Responding to this, 33% claim to use emergency lights, 15% use UPS, 8% claim to use generator while 7% use gas lamps. 23% claim to work during sunlight whereas 14% discontinue their work.
