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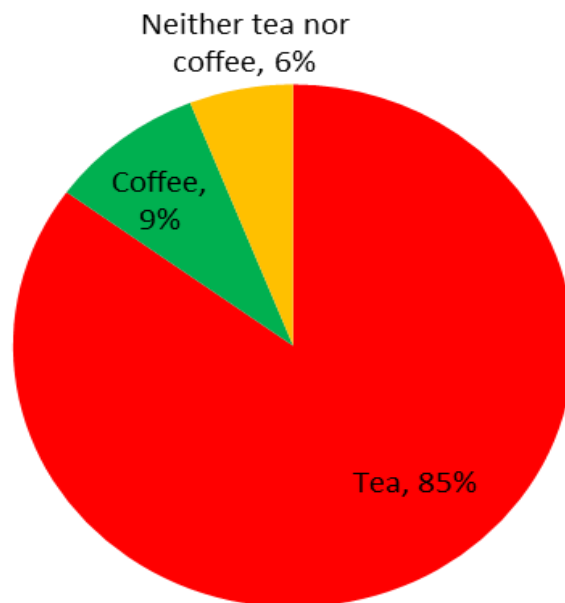
Islamabad April 30, 2012

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 85% of Pakistanis say they are mostly 'tea drinkers', only 9% say they are 'coffee drinkers'; 6% say they drink neither.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "Do you usually drink tea or coffee?" Responding to this, 85% said that they mostly drink tea, while only 9% said that they drink coffee. 6%, however, said they drink neither.

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The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2696 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during March 25 - March 31, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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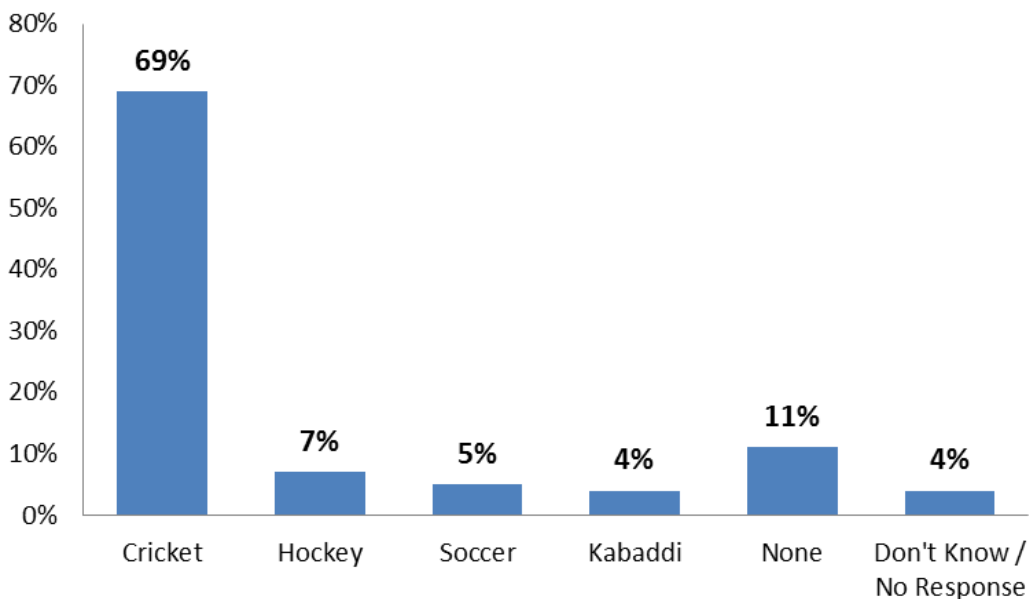
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A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “What sports do you like to watch personally?” Responding to this, 69% claim that they like to watch Cricket, 7% like to watch Hockey, 5% watch Soccer whereas 4% like to watch Kabaddi. However 11% claim to watch no sports while 4% did not give a view.

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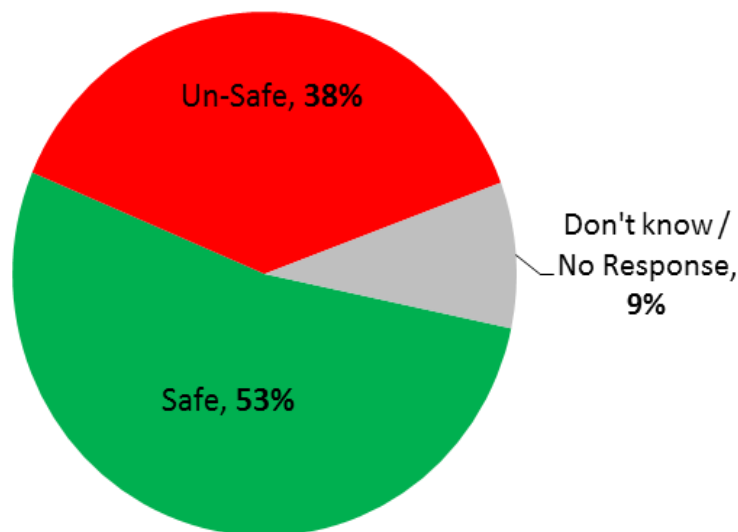
Islamabad May 03, 2012

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 38% of Pakistanis believe they drink un-safe water; 53% think it Is safe while 9% are unsure.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, is the drinking water you use safe for your health or unsafe?” Responding to this, 53% believe that the water they are drinking is safe whereas 38% think that it is un-safe. However 9% did not give a view.

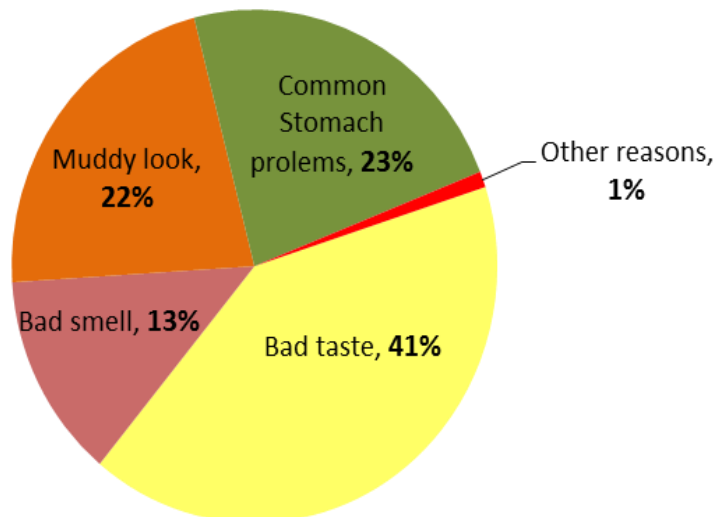

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, among those who believe they drink un-safe water, the majority senses it through ‘bad taste’ (41%) or bad smell (13%). Others determine it from its muddy look (22%) or its after-effects such as stomach problems (23%).



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, the drinking water you use is unsafe, why do you say so?” Responding to this, 41% claim that the water tastes bad, 13% claim that they sense unsafe water because of its bad smell, 22% claim that the water looks muddy, 23% claim that they sense unsafe water because of the common stomach problems while 1% claim other reasons for unsafe water.
