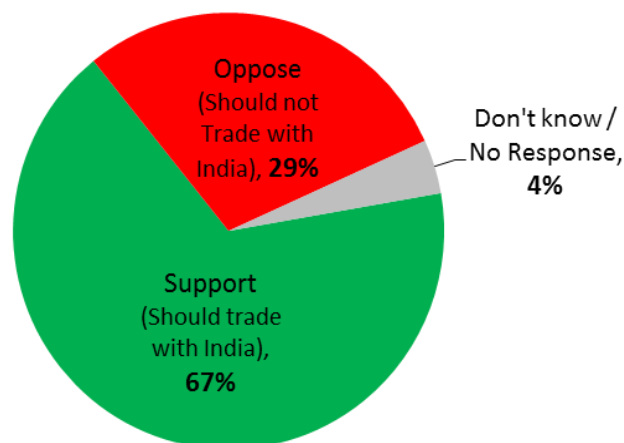

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 67% favor trade relations with India; 29% oppose. Net Support for trade with India rises significantly during the last 12 years.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, should Pakistan trade with India or not?” Responding to this, 67% support and believe that Pakistan should trade with India whereas 29% oppose and believe Pakistan should not trade with India at all. However, 4% did not give a view.

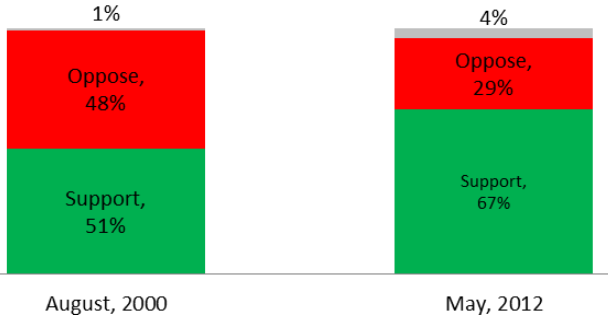
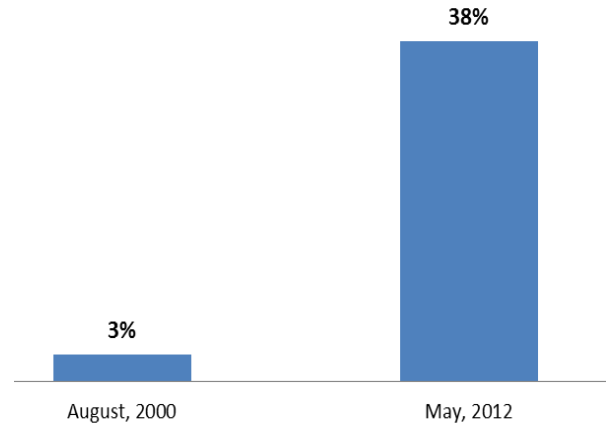
Further analysis shows that net support representing ‘support’ minus ‘opposition’ has risen significantly over the last twelve years from a net value of 3% in a similar survey conducted by Gallup Pakistan in the year 2000 to a net value of 38% in the latest survey in 2012.

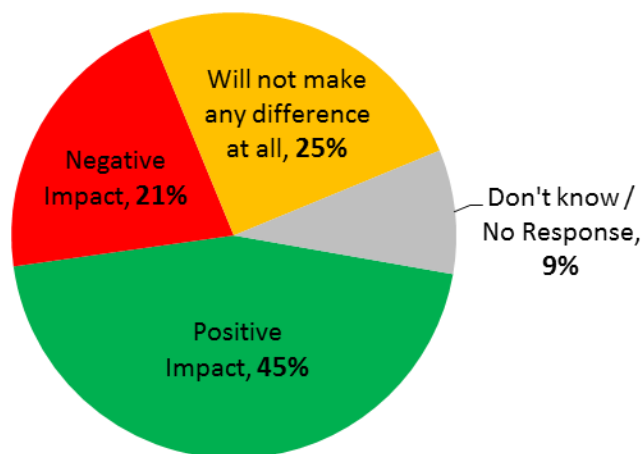

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, views are divided on the possible impact of more trade with India: Majority (45%) believes it will improve the overall Indo-Pak relationships, 25% believe it will make no impact; 21% think it may even have negative impact.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Some people think that by increasing trade between India and Pakistan will positively impact the relations of the two countries whereas some people think that it will make no difference and some people think that it will negatively impact the relations. What is your opinion on this?” Responding to this, 45% believe that it will positively impact the relations between Pakistan and India, 21% believe that it will negatively impact the relations whereas 25% believe it will make no difference. However, 9% did not give a view.

Question: “Some people think that by increasing trade between India and Pakistan will positively impact the relations of the two countries whereas some people think that it will make no difference and some people think that it will negatively impact the relations. What is your opinion on this?”

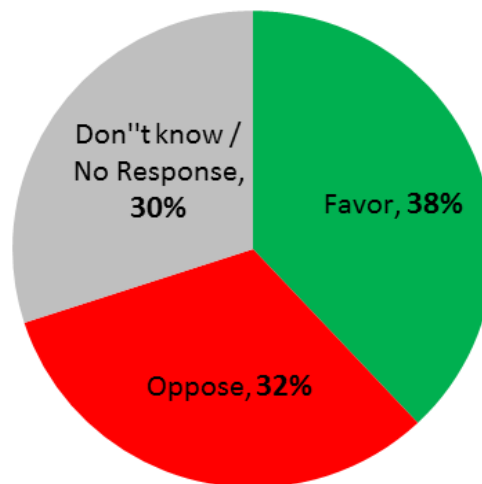

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Recently, Pakistan Cricket Board has appointed Muhammad Hafeez as a captain for T20. Are you in favor of PCB’s this decision or against it?” Responding to this, 38% are in favor of Muhammad Hafeez as captain of Pakistan Cricket team for T20 matches whereas 32% oppose this decision. However, 30% did not give a view.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 27% of Pakistani Men say they smoke cigarettes.

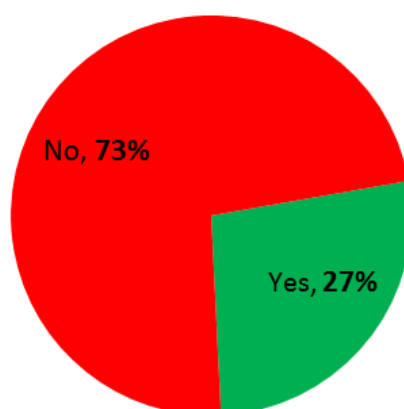


A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Do you smoke cigarettes?” Responding to this, 27% of men claim that they smoke cigarettes whereas 73% men claim that they do not smoke cigarettes at all.

Only a negligible number of women claim to be cigarette smokers. It should also be noted that this figure does not include smoking of tobacco in other traditional forms such as Huqqa / Shisha; Naswar (a sniff) and Paan (Chewing leaf).

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, more than half (56%) of Pakistani smokers say they want to Quit; 41% say they have (unsuccessfully) attempted to quit.

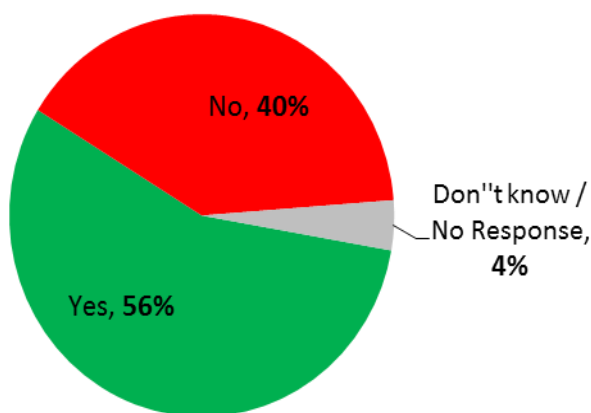


A nationally representative sample of smokers from across the four provinces was asked “Do you want to quit smoking or continue with the habit?” Responding to this, 56% said they want to quit smoking whereas 40% claim that they do not want to quit. However, 4% did not give a view.

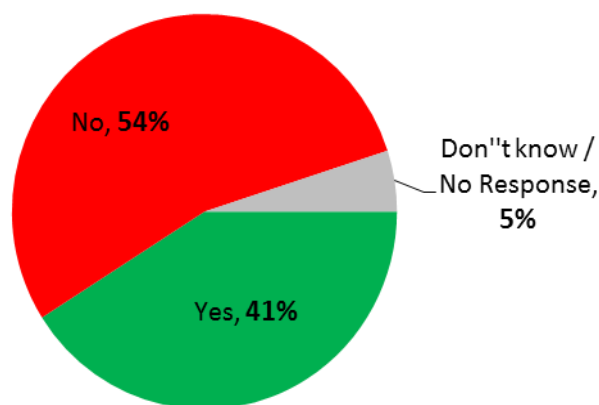
Further analysis shows that the desire to Quit is higher among the youthful smokers, under 30 (65%) than the middle aged smokers: 30-50, (51%). However, the desire to quit again rises among the elderly group of smokers, age: 50+, (81%).

Question: “Do you want to quit smoking or continue with the habit?”
