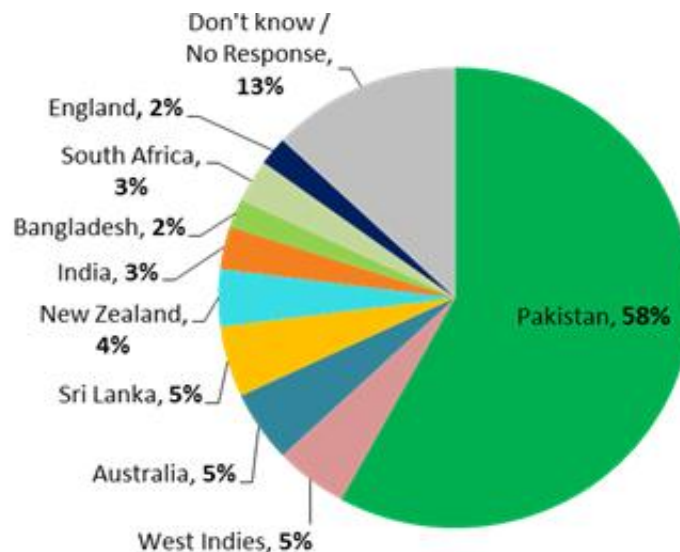

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, majority (58%) consider Pakistani Cricket Team as favorites for T20 World Cup this year. However, this view had been expressed prior to the team's humiliating defeat by India last Sunday.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "In your opinion, which team has the most chances of winning the T20 world cup this month?" Responding to this, 58% believe Pakistani team will be the champions of the T-20 series, 5% believe Australia will hold the trophy, 5% believe West Indies would win, another 5% cited Sri Lanka. 14% of respondents mentioned other countries as their favorites. The remaining 13% were unsure.

Question: "In your opinion, which team has the most chances of winning the T20 world cup this month?"

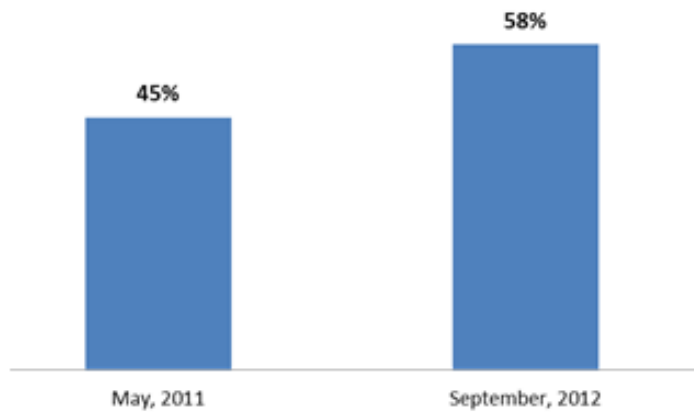

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2669 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during September 16, 2012 – September 22, 2012. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

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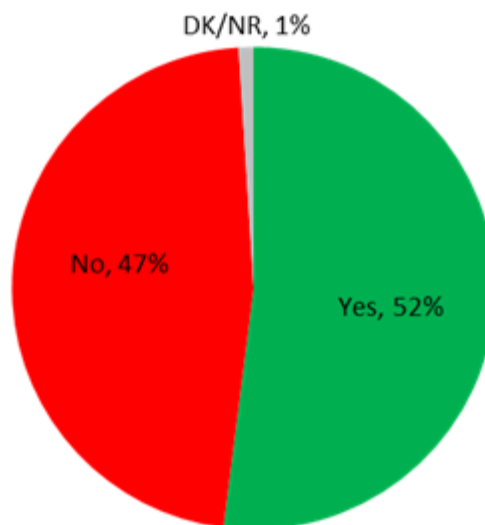

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, only half the population, 52%, is familiar with the issue of ‘missing persons’.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Recently, incidents have been reported in the media according to which people are taken away from their homes by the agencies and tortured without any case being filed; such people are referred to as missing persons. Have you heard or read anything about it?” Responding to this, 52% of people said yes and 47% said no. However, 1% did not give a response.

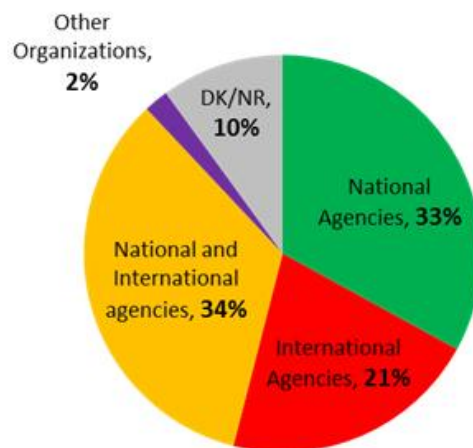

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, both national and international intelligence agencies are seen as instruments for extra-judicial abduction of missing persons.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, who is responsible for extra-judicial abduction of missing persons; national agencies, international agencies, both or some other organizations?” In response to this, among those who are familiar with the issue (nearly half of the population) the suspicion is that national and international agencies are both responsible for this act (34%). 33% chose ‘national agencies’, 21% chose ‘international agencies’ and 2% mentioned other organizations. However, 10% did not give a view.

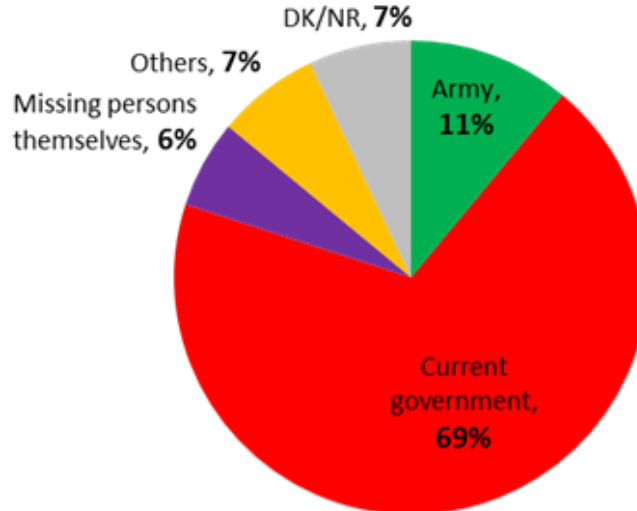

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “In your opinion, who is most responsible for extra-judicial abduction of missing persons?” Responding to this, 69% of Pakistanis blame the present government, 11% blame the army, 7% blame others and 6% blame the missing persons themselves. However, 7% did not give a response.

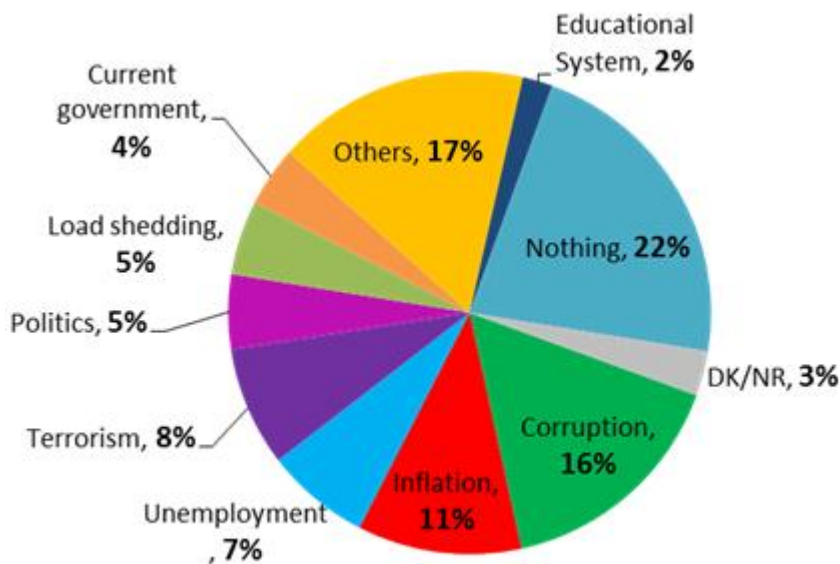

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “What do you dislike most about Pakistan?” Responding to this, corruption tops the list. It is cited by 16% of Pakistanis. Other most disliked aspects of Pakistan include inflation (11%), terrorism (8%) unemployment (7%), politics (5%), load shedding (5%), current government (4%), educational system (2%) and others (17%). It is worth noting that 22% of Pakistanis say that there is “nothing” that they dislike about their country. However, 3% did not give a response.
