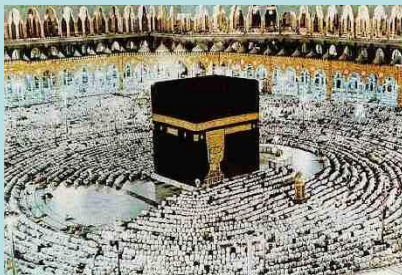

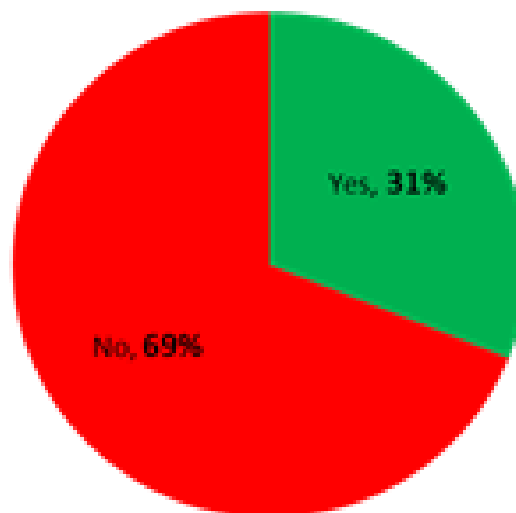

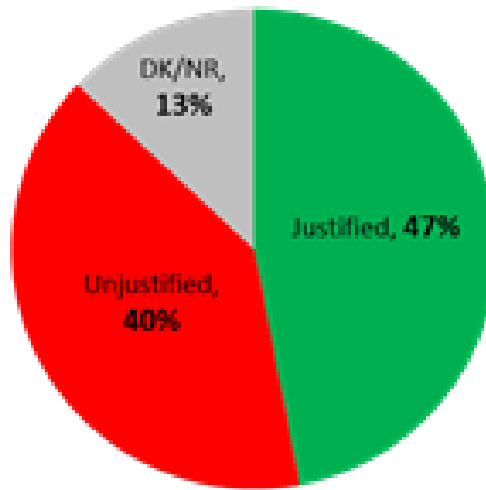


According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 31% of Pakistanis are aware of Sardar Akhtar Mengal's 6 point plea at the Supreme Court of Pakistan. Among them, 47% consider them justified, while 40% disagree.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "Baluchistan minister Sardar Akhtar Mengal presented a six-point agenda on the Baluchistan situation. Have you heard or read anything about it?" Responding to this, 69% said 'no' and 31% said 'yes'. The people who said 'yes' were then asked "In your opinion, are the points in the six-point agenda by Sardar Akhtar Mengal justified or unjustified?" Responding to this, 47% said they are 'justified' and 40% said they are 'unjustified'. However, 13% did not give a response.

Question: "Baluchistan minister Sardar Akhtar Mengal presented a six-point agenda on the Baluchistan situation. Have you heard or read anything about it?"

Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

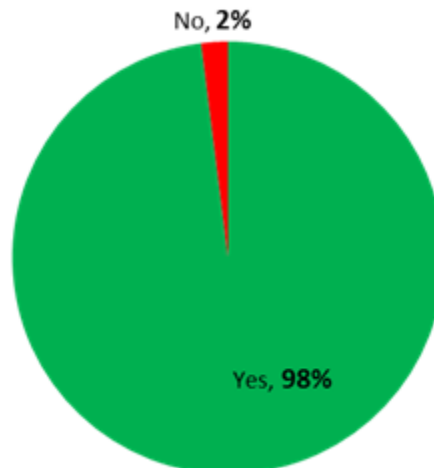

Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

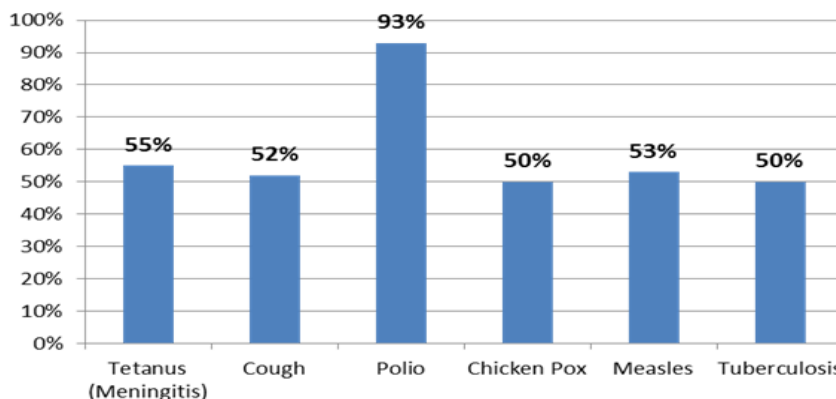

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, Pakistanis think Polio Drops are also a cure against five other diseases other than Polio.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Of the following diseases, which do you think Polio drops can protect against?” Responding to this, 93% said ‘Polio’, 55% said ‘Tetanus (Meningitis)’, 53% said ‘Measles’, 52% said ‘Cough’, 50% said ‘Chicken Pox’ and 50% said ‘Tuberculosis’. It is interesting to note that 7% of Pakistanis do not think Polio Drops are a cure for even the Polio virus.

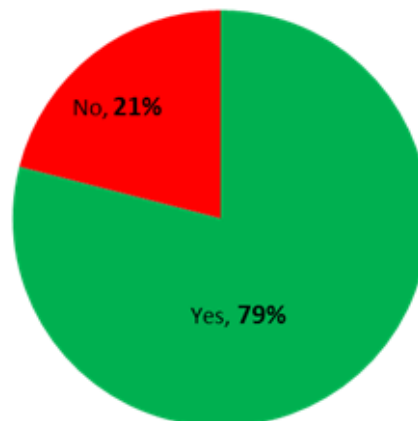

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked "In recent days, National Peace Award winner and activist for Peace and Education, Malala Yousafzai from Swat was seriously injured in an attack on her life. Have you heard/read about this incident?" Responding to this, 79% said yes and 21% said no.

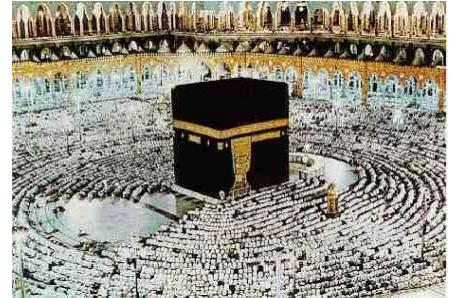

Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

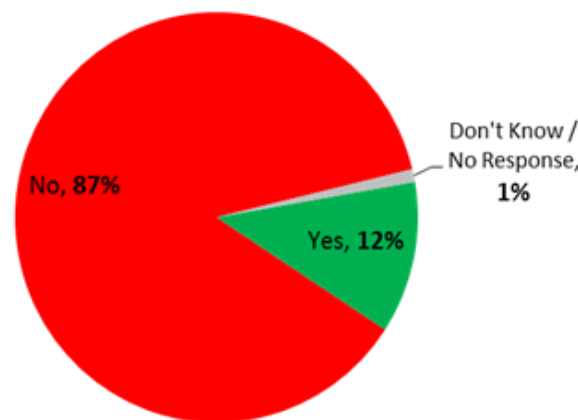

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, only 12% of Pakistanis say that someone from their household went for Hajj this year.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Has anyone from your household gone for Hajj this year?” Responding to this, 12% said that someone from their household has gone for Hajj this year whereas 87% said that no one from their house has gone for Hajj. However, 1% did not give a view.
