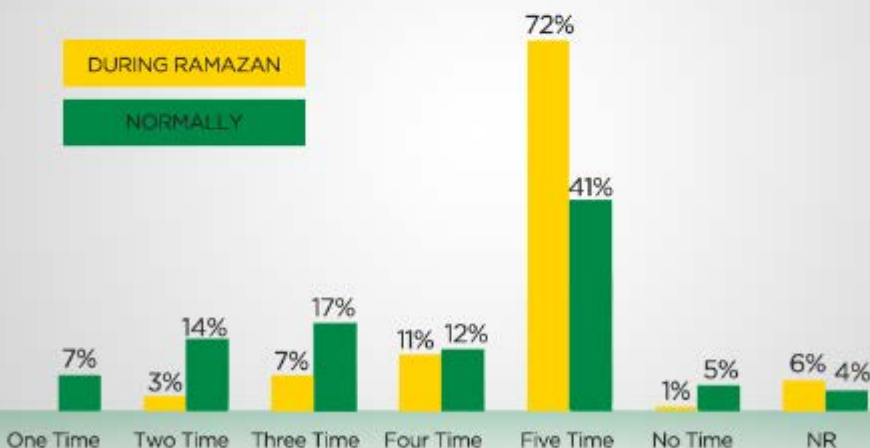


31% MORE PAKISTANIS CLAIM THEY PRAY FIVE TIMES A DAY DURING THE MONTH OF RAMADAN THAN THEY DO NORMALLY.

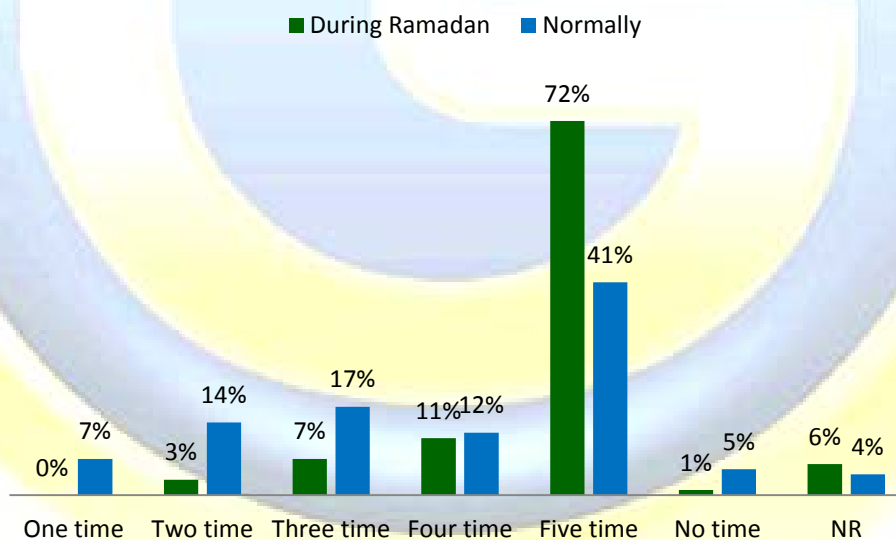
31% more Pakistanis claim that they pray five times a day during the month of Ramadan than they do normally. (GRF POLL)

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 72% Pakistanis pray five times a day during Ramadan, while only 41% pray five times a day normally.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Some people get the opportunity to pray, whereas others don't. How many times are you normally able to pray during Ramadan and how many times are you able to pray during months other than Ramadan?" In response to this question, 72% said that they prayed five times a day during Ramadan, 11% said they prayed four times a day, 7% said they prayed three times a day, and 3% said they prayed two times a day during Ramadan. 1% said they did not pray during Ramadan and 6% did not respond. The same people were asked how often they prayed normally. 41% said that they prayed five times a day normally, 12% said they prayed four times a day normally, 17% said they prayed three times a day, 14% said they prayed two times a day, and 7% said they prayed once a day normally. 5% said they did not pray at all normally, and 4% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1813 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 13 – June 20, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
