When Tested, 17% Of All Pakistani Adults Say They Had Higher Than Normal Blood Sugar: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

The results of a recent Gilani Poll conducted by Gallup Pakistan show that 17% of all Pakistani adults say that when tested, they had a higher than normal blood sugar level. It is important to note that the survey findings are based on perceptions and may not match a clinical reality.



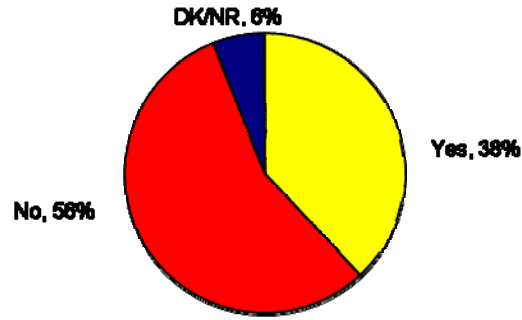
This figure has emerged from the responses to two survey questions where a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked firstly, “Have you ever had your blood sugar checked by a doctor or at a lab?” Respondents who had gotten a blood sugar test done were further asked, ‘In the past one year, have you been informed by a doctor that your blood sugar level is high or that you are diabetic?’ Results show that 38% respondents said they had gotten a blood sugar test done by a doctor or at a lab while 56% said they had not. 6% did not respond. Of the 38% who did get their blood sugar level tested, 44% said that they have been diagnosed as diabetic in the past year or have been told that their blood sugar level is high. This shows that the overall perceived incidence of high blood sugar in adult Pakistanis is 17%.

The results further show that this perceived incidence of high blood sugar increases as we move from younger to older adults; it is 11% in respondents less than 30 years old, 20% in those between 30 and 50 years and 30% among those above 50 years of age.

Total Perceived Incidence Of High Blood Sugar In Pakistani Adults= $38\% \times 0.44 = 17\%$

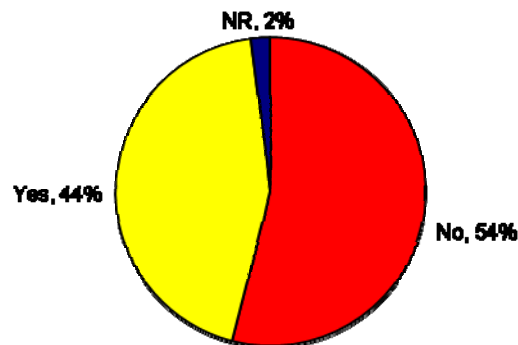
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“Have you ever had your blood sugar checked by a doctor or at a lab?”

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2774 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during April 2011. Error margin is estimated to be approximately + 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

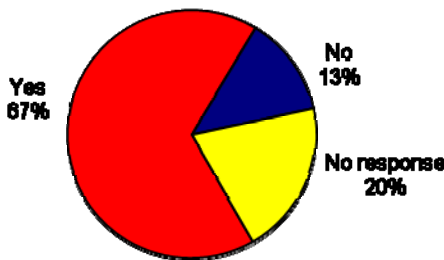

According to a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, more than two third of all Pakistanis (67%) believe that government should take steps for the Islamization of the society. However, 48% say steps should be taken one by one as opposed 31% who state steps should be taken at once.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: “In your opinion should government take steps to ‘Islamize’ the society?” Sixty seven percent (67%) replied in affirmative where as only 13% believed that there is no need for ‘Islamization’. A significant 20% gave no response.

“In your opinion should the government take steps to ‘Islamize’ the society?”



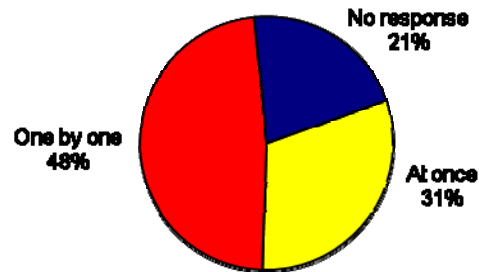

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Those who had said that the government should take steps to ‘Islamize’ the society were further asked: “Should government take steps for Islamization at once or one by one? Forty eight percent (48%) said that steps should be taken one by one for Islamization while 31% say that steps should be taken at once. 21% gave no response.

According to the results of a recent Gilani Poll conducted by Gallup Pakistan, nearly half of all Pakistanis (47%) feel that social evils need to be tackled by the whole society collectively. Nearly 35%, however, feel that this responsibility falls on the Government's shoulders.



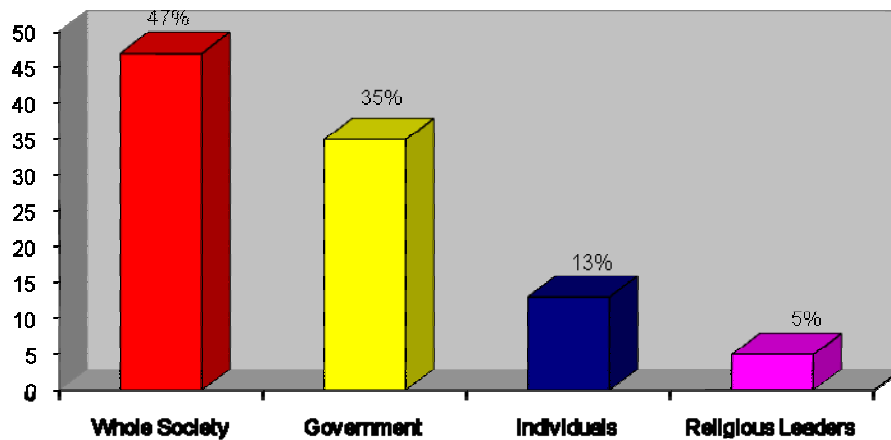
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question, "In your opinion, whose responsibility is it to keep a check on the various social evils that affect our society?" Results show that while a significant majority of 47% think this responsibility should be shared by the whole society, as many as 35% respondents say that this responsibility falls on the Government. Another 13% feel that we should all individually address the evils in our society while 5% think religious leaders can help tackle undesirable social practices.

The results reveal that 25% of the responded who were more than 50 years old said that social evils need to be addressed individually while only 11% of the respondents less than 30 shared this opinion. The results also show that while males are more inclined towards putting this responsibility on the Government, a comparatively higher percentage of females think the whole society should work to address social evils.

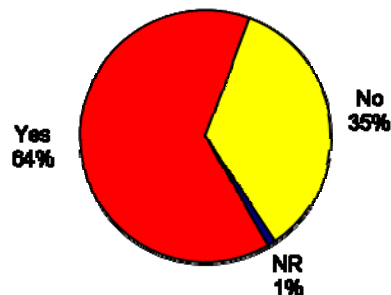

In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: “In your opinion should Pakistani women take part in sports or not?” Sixty four percent (64%) replied in affirmative while only 35% believed that Pakistani women should not participate in sports. 1% did not respond.

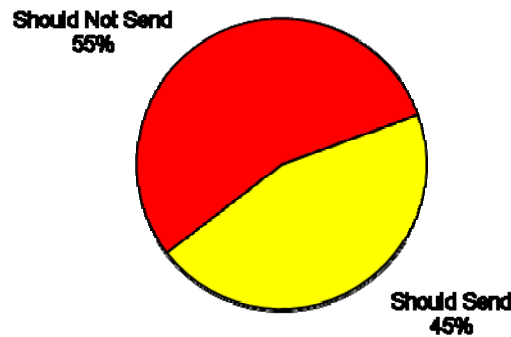

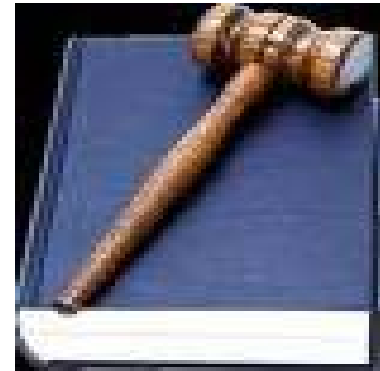

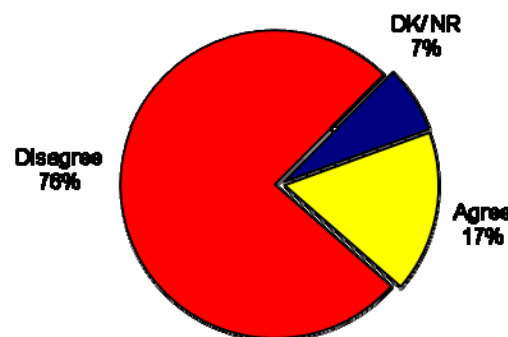

According to a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, more than three fourths of all Pakistanis (76%) feel they live in an unjust world. Survey results further reflect the opinion that Pakistani courts are unsuccessful in this regard as 76% think these courts fail to deliver justice and often let wrongdoers go unpunished.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: "Do you agree or disagree with the following statement: Whatever happens in the world is just?" As many as Seventy six percent (76%) respondents disagreed with the statement while only 17% said that whatever happens in the world is indeed just. 7% said they did not know or did not respond.

Whatever happens in the world is just?"



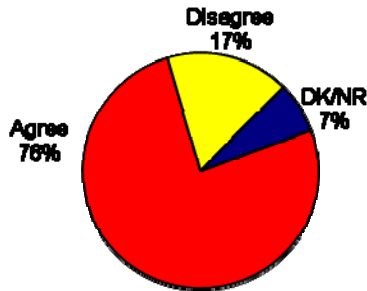

In a follow up question, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question, "Do you agree or disagree with the following statement: Pakistani courts often let off criminals without punishing them?" Responses to this question show that 76% respondents agreed with the statement while 17% felt that Pakistani Courts duly punish wrongdoers. 7% did not know or did not respond.
