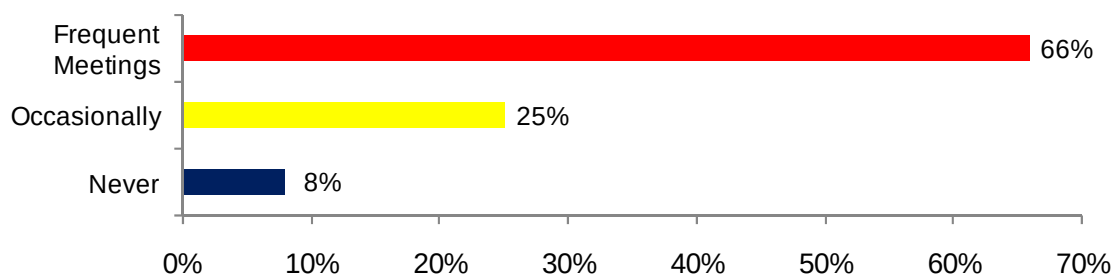

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan indicated that 66% of Pakistanis are of the view that frequent meetings between parents and teachers can prove to be very beneficial for the child's progress at school.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: "In your view should parent teacher meetings happen often, occasionally or never?" Majority (66%) favored frequent meetings between parents and teachers. 25% were of the view that occasional meetings are sufficient while 8% said that there was no need of these meetings at all.

"In your view should parent-teacher meetings happen often, occasionally or never?"

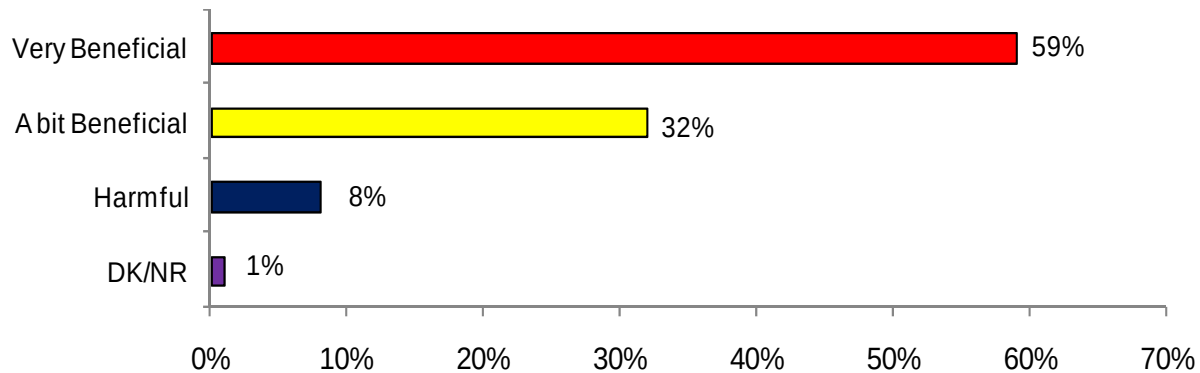

In a related survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: "In your view to what extent are Parent teacher associations beneficial for a child's academic performance?" 59% said that are very useful. 32% said that they are somewhat useful. Only 8% were of the view that they are rather harmful. 1% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2574 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during 10 July – 16 July 2011. Error margin is estimated to be approximately + 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

55% Pakistanis prefer an out of court settlement to solve their disputes, 44% are opposed to it: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

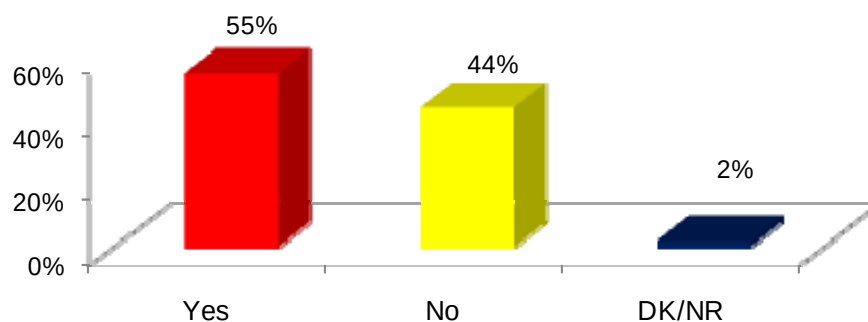
Islamabad August 16, 2011

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan revealed that more than half (55%) of the people of Pakistan prefer an out of court settlement to solve their disputes. The remaining 44% are opposed to the idea of an out of court settlement.



In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked to voice their opinion on engagement with the judicial system. The respondents were asked the following question: “Do you prefer an out of court settlement to solve your disputes, or otherwise?” 55% of the Pakistanis responded that they would prefer an out of court settlement, while 44% are opposed to the idea of an out of court settlement of their disputes. 2% did not know and/or chose not to respond.

63% of the Pakistanis believe that judicial system in Pakistan is complicated: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

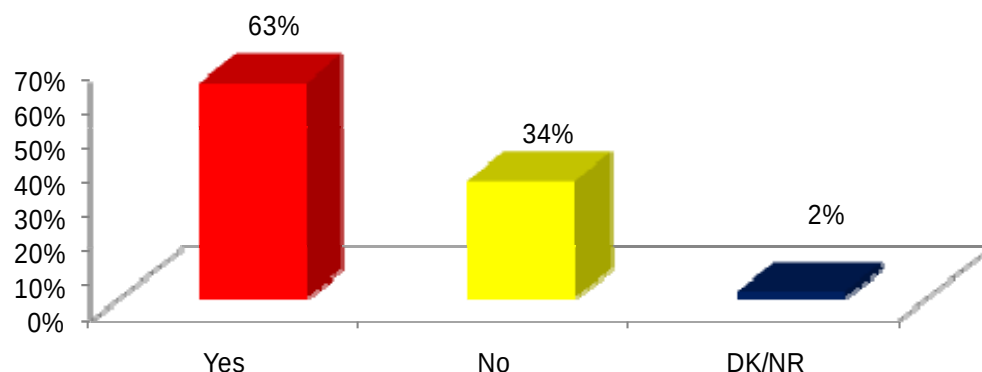

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan revealed that a significant majority (63%) of Pakistanis believe that the judicial system is complicated to deal with.



In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: “Do you believe that the judicial system of Pakistan is complicated, or otherwise?” A large majority (63%) of Pakistanis held the view that judicial system is complicated, while only 34% disagreed. 2% of the respondents chose not to answer.

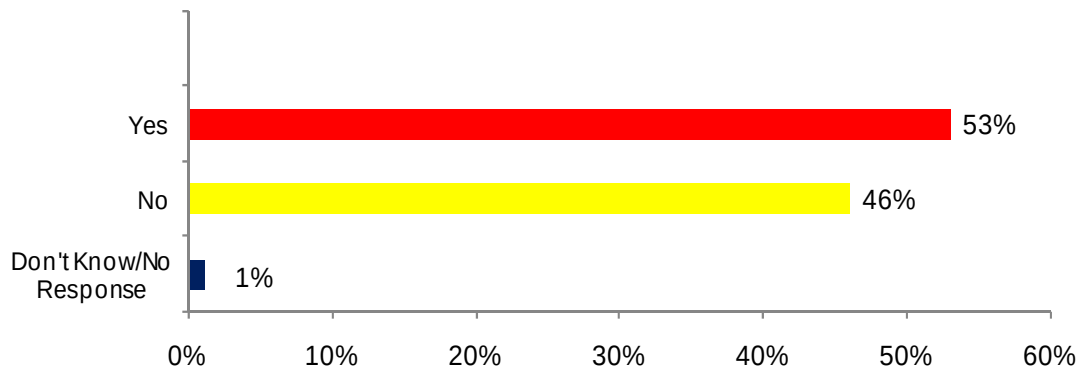

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan indicated that 53% of all Pakistanis attended a wedding ceremony in the month prior to Ramadan.



In a survey, a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: “Have you attended a wedding ceremony during the last one month?” 53% of the respondents stated that they have attended a wedding ceremony in the month prior to Ramadan, while 46% responded that they have not attended any wedding ceremony during the last one month. 1% did not know and/or chose not to respond.

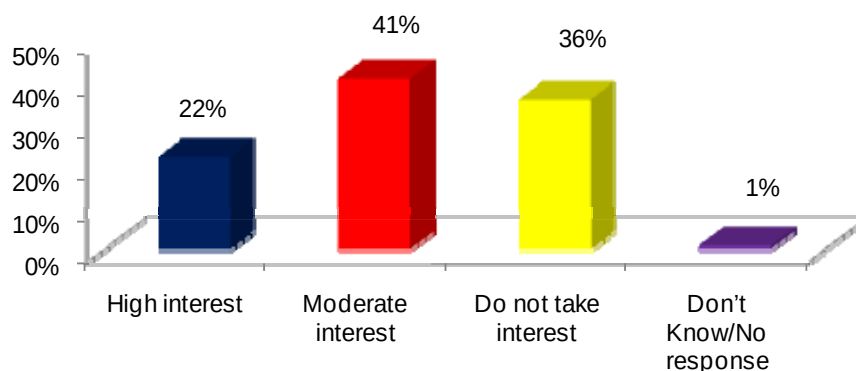
The results of a Gilani Research Foundation survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan indicated that 63% of Pakistanis take high or modest interest in advertisements on billboards, along roadsides.



In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the country were asked the following question: Many organizations and companies advertise their products at billboards or paste or write their ads and posters at walls. How much interest do you take in seeing and reading them?

The findings of the survey revealed that 22% of Pakistanis take high interest in reading such advertisements, while 41% take moderate interest. 36% people said that they do not take interest in reading advertisements at all on billboards, along roadsides and 1% did not know and/or chose not to respond.
