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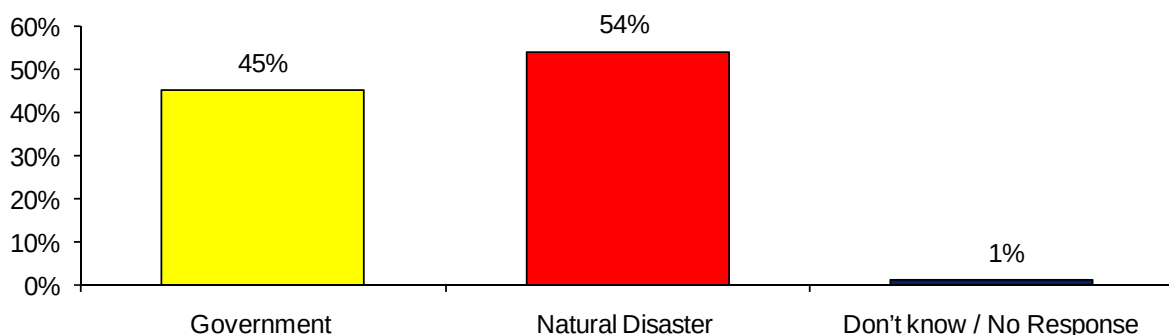
Islamabad October 10, 2011

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan revealed that Only Half (45%) blame government for flooding disasters; the other half (54%) regard it as unforeseen natural calamity.



In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: “In your opinion who is responsible for the damage in Sindh due to recent floods?” Responding to this, only 45% blame the government for flooding disaster in Sindh where as 54% consider it as a natural disaster. However 1% did not give a view.

The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2721 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during September 18-September 24, 2011. Error margin is estimated to be approximately + 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

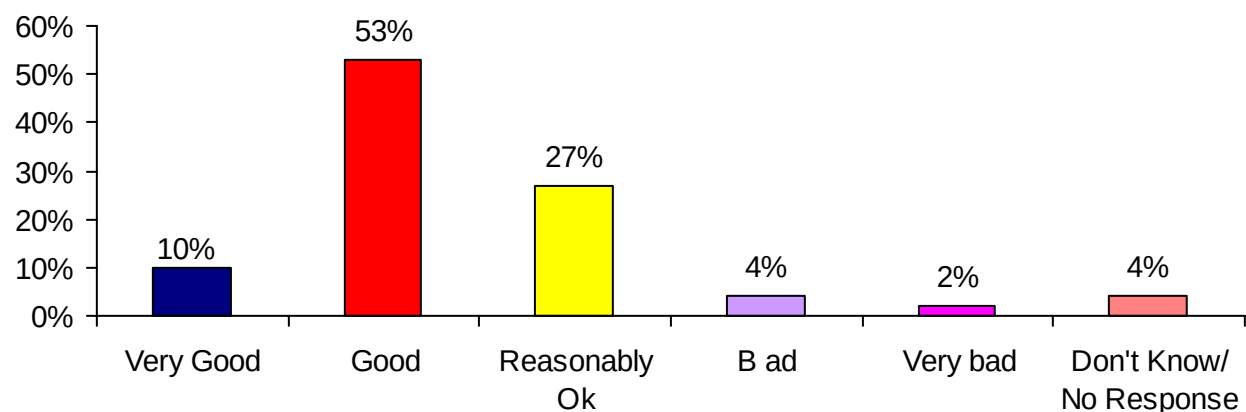
The results of a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan revealed that Majority (63%) of Pakistani believe they are in good health; only 6% think their health is bad. Perceptions begin to change, but not sharply after Age 50.



In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: “How would you rate your overall health/fitness/well being?” Responding to this, majority (63%) of Pakistani think that they are in very good or good health; 27% think that they have reasonably ok. Health whereas only 6% who think that their health is bad or very bad. However 4% did not give a view.

There are some differences between Gender, Income Groups and as people age. The perception that ‘any health is good’ is higher among Male (67%) than Female (59%) and it is lower among the poor population earning only Rupees 7,000 a month (58%) compared to those earning more than that (65%). As people age fewer think they are in good health. But interestingly, there is no sharp decline.

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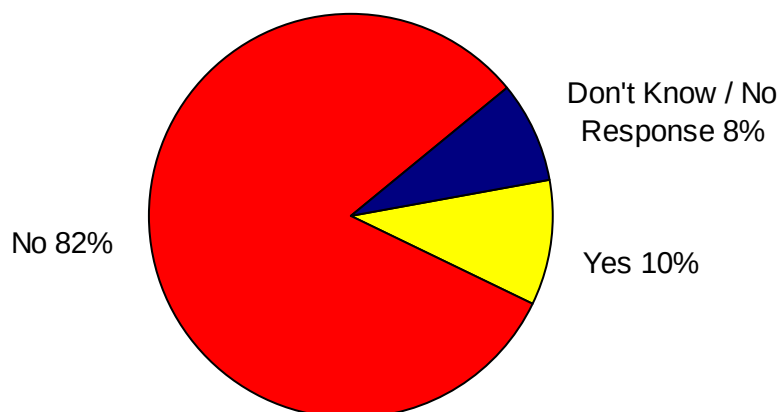
Islamabad October 12, 2011

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan revealed that 10% of Pakistanis say they suffer from a long term chronic disease. Among those over Age 50, the figure is 17%.



In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: “Are you suffering from any long term disease, physical illness or not?” Responding to this, only 10% of Pakistanis said that are suffering from a long term chronic disease or physical illness where as majority (82%) of people said that they have no disease. However 8% did not give a view.

Error margin is estimated to be approximately + 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

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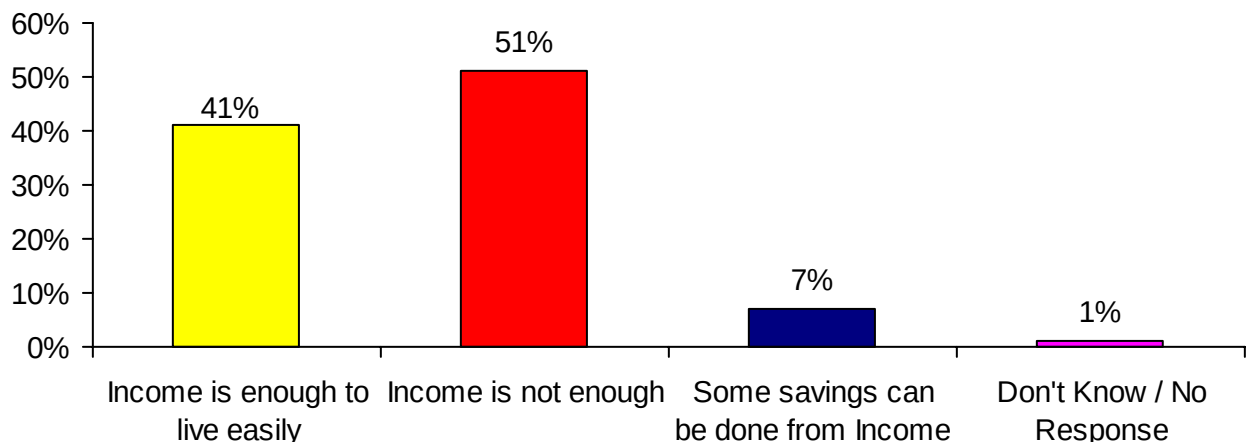
Islamabad October 13, 2011

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In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: “Is your current salary enough for you or is it less or are you able to make savings?” Responding to this, half of Pakistanis (51%) say that they have to struggle to survive in their current income; 41% say that their income is good enough to meet their expenses whereas only 7% say that they are able to make some savings from the income. However 1% did not give a view.

Error margin is estimated to be approximately + 2-3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

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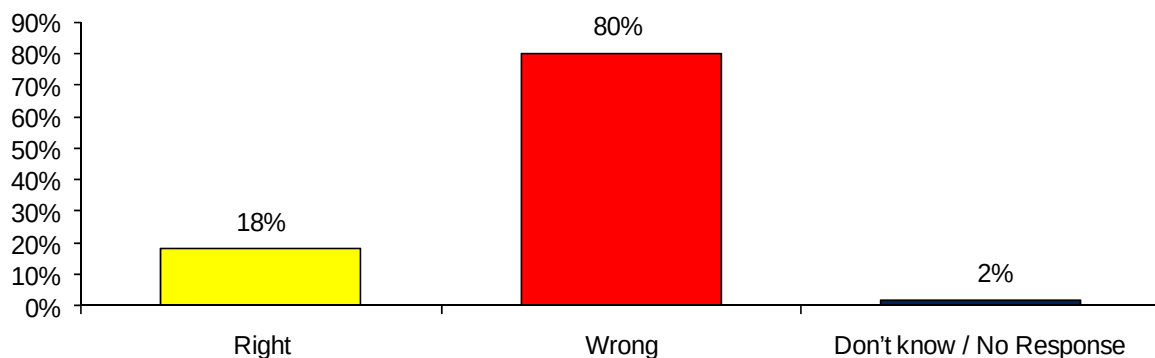


In a survey a nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked the following question: “In your opinion is our country going in the right direction or wrong?” Responding to this, majority (80%) say that the country is headed in the wrong direction whereas only 18% believe that the country is headed in the right direction. However 2% did not give a view.

In a comparable survey released recently about the United States, only 13% of Americans believe their country is headed in the Right direction, whereas majority (85%) of the American believe that the country is headed in the Wrong direction.
