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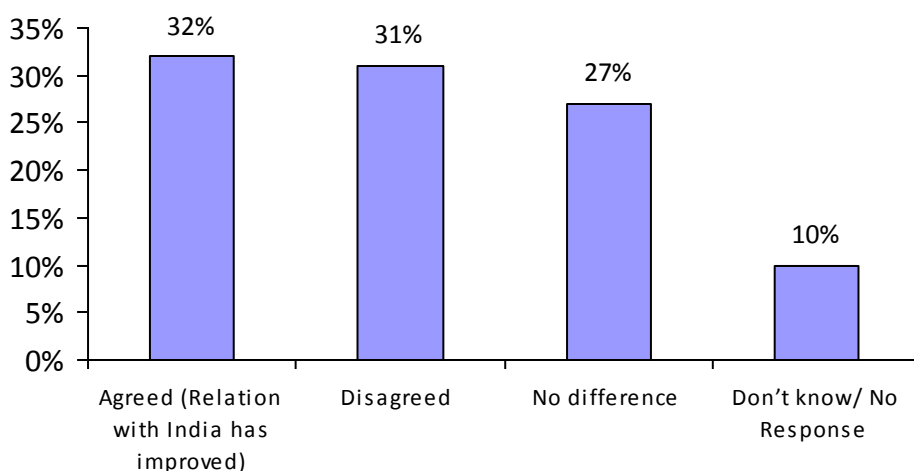

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan revealed that views are divided on whether Indo-Pakistani relations have improved during PPP government: 32% believe they have improved; 31% feel they have deteriorated while 27% say there is no change.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Would you agree or disagree with the view that Indo-Pak relation has improved during the PPP government, or would you say that there has been no change?” Responding to this 31% agreed that the Indo-Pak relation has improved, 31% disagreed whereas 27% believe that there has been no change in it. However 10% did not give a view.

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The study was released by Gilani foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 2698 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during November 06 - November 12, 2011. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

25% of Pakistanis remain highly concerned about their health: GILANI POLL/GALLUP PAKISTAN

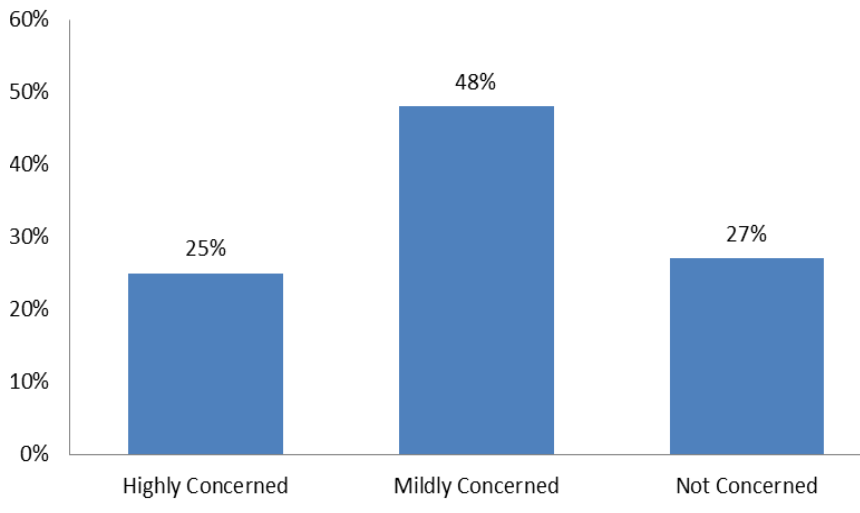

The results of a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan revealed that 25% of Pakistanis remain highly concerned about their health.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “How much concerned are you regarding your health?” Responding to this 25% are highly concerned about their health, 48% are mildly concerned whereas 27% are not concerned at all.

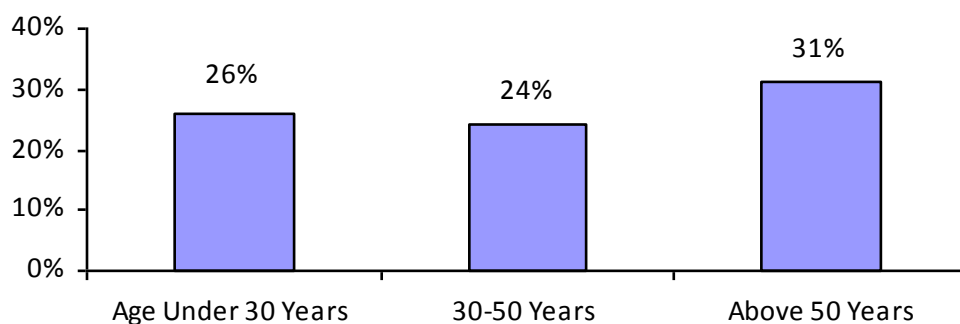
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Further analysis of the data shows a difference among various age groups, as the older population is more concerned than the younger. But interestingly the difference is not very wide. While 26% of the under 30 are highly concerned about health, the figure among those above age 50 is 31%. Similarly the difference among men and women is very minor.

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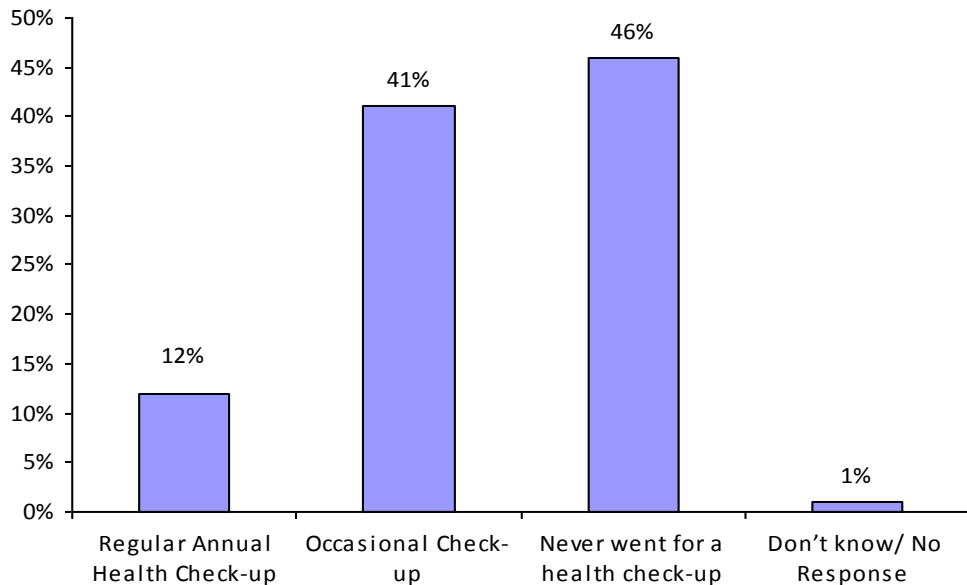

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan 12% of Pakistanis say they undergo annual health check-up.



A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “How often do you go for medical check-up?” Responding to this 12% of Pakistanis undergo annual checkups. Another 41% claim they sometimes or occasionally undergo a health check-up. The remaining 46% say they almost never undergo a health check-up. However 1% did not give a view.
