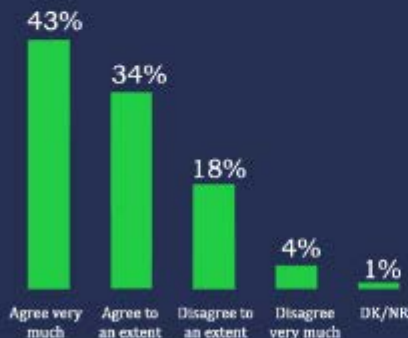

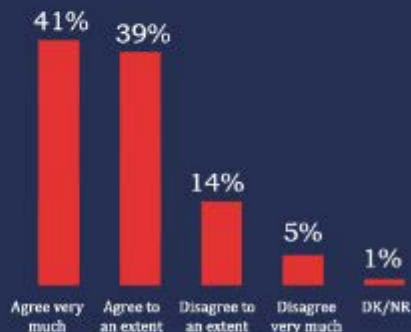

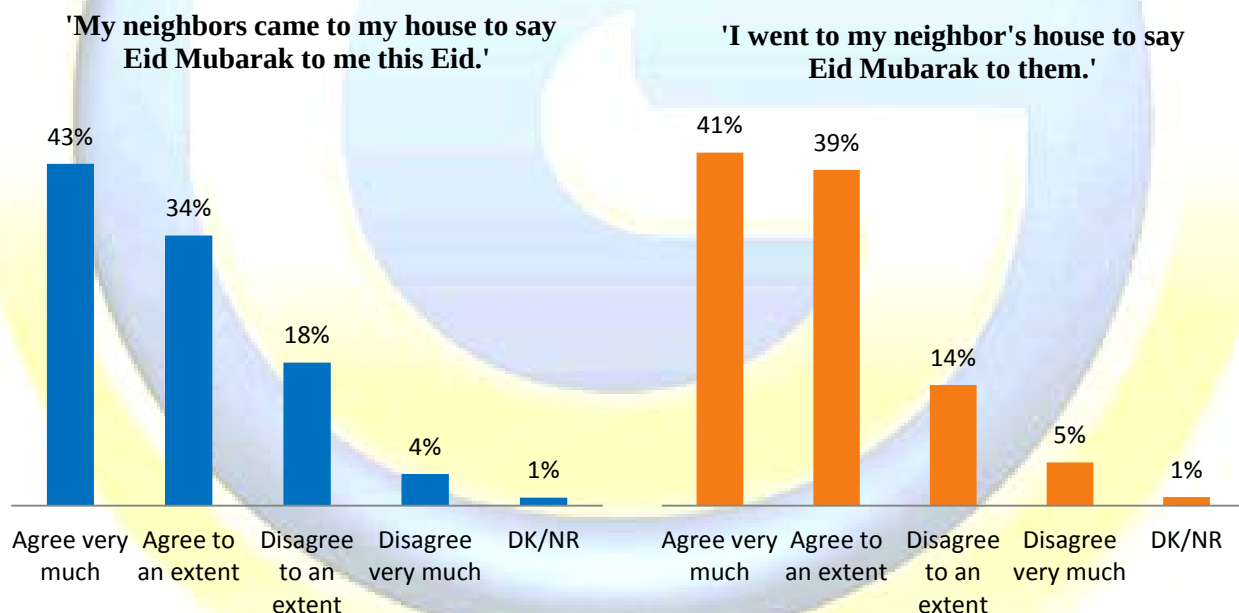
A significant majority of Pakistanis (77 %) say that their neighbors came to their house to say Eid Mubarak to them. (GRF POLL)

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, a significant majority of Pakistanis (77%) say that their neighbors came to their house to say Eid Mubarak to them.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Please tell if you agree or disagree with the following statement: 'My neighbors came to my house to say Eid Mubarak to me this Eid.'" 43% said that they agree very much with the statement, 34% said that they agree to an extent, 18% said that they disagree to an extent, and 4% said that they disagree very much. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond. Respondents were also asked: "Please tell if you agree or disagree with the following statement: 'I went to my neighbor's house to say Eid Mubarak to them.'" To this, 41% said that they agree very much with the statement, 39% said that they agree to an extent, 14% said that they disagree to an extent, and 5% said that they disagree very much. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1867 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 18 – July 25, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 per cent at 95% confidence level.
