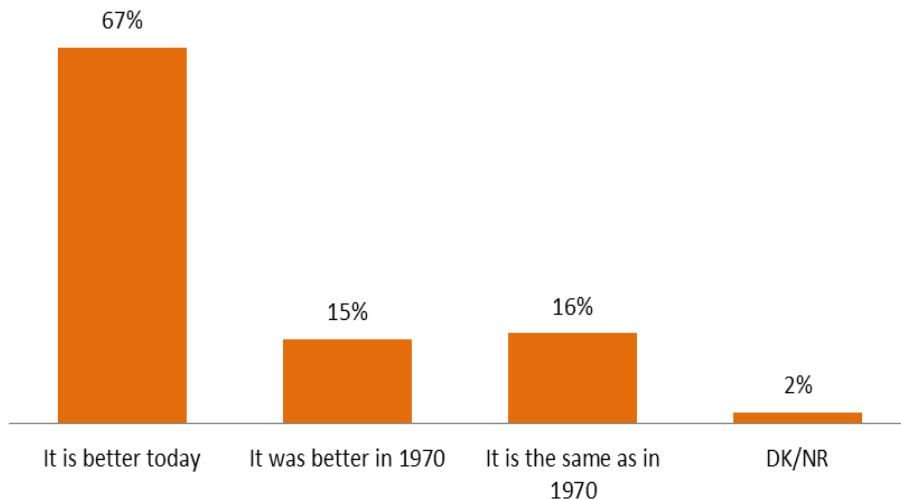

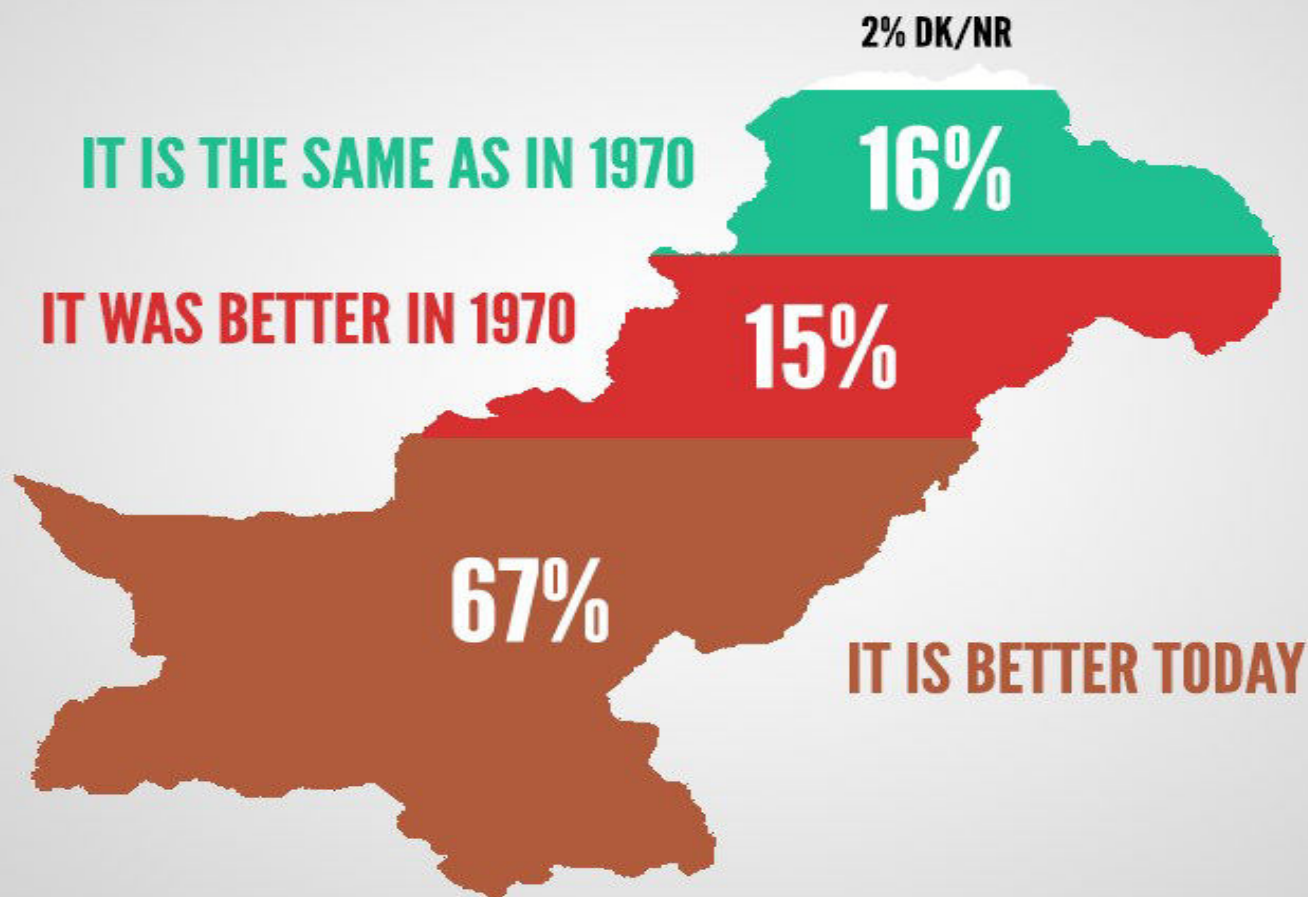

In response to this question, 67% said it is better today, 15% said that it was better in 1970, while 16% said that it is the same as in 1970. 2% did not or did not wish to respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1817 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 8 – August 15, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

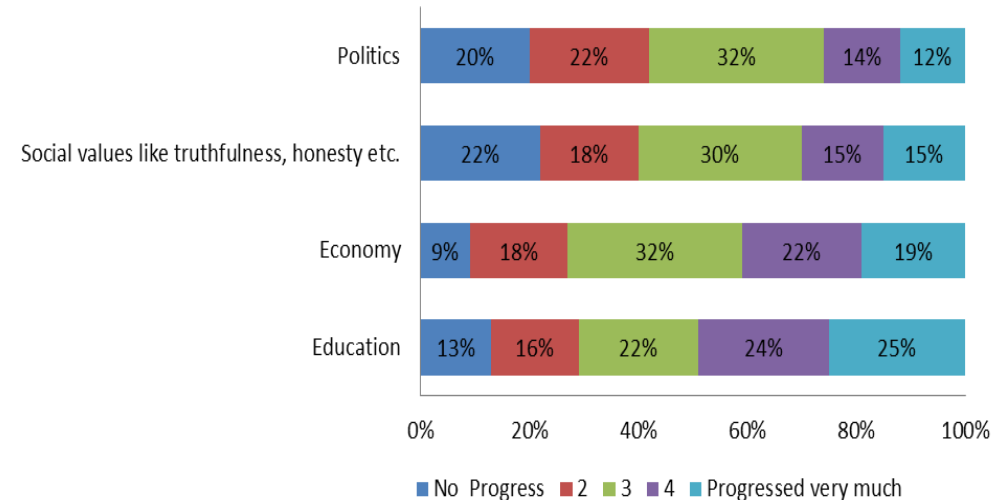

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 25% Pakistanis say that Pakistan has made significant progress in the field of education since 1947.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “If you have to rate Pakistan's progress since 1947 in the following fields on a scale of 1 to 5, where 1 means 'no progress' and 5 means 'progressed very much,' how will you rate Pakistan's progress in these fields?” In response to this question, 12% said that politics progressed very much, 15% said that social values like truthfulness, honesty etc. progressed very much, 19% said that the economy progressed very much while 25% said that education progressed very much.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1817 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 8 – August 15, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.



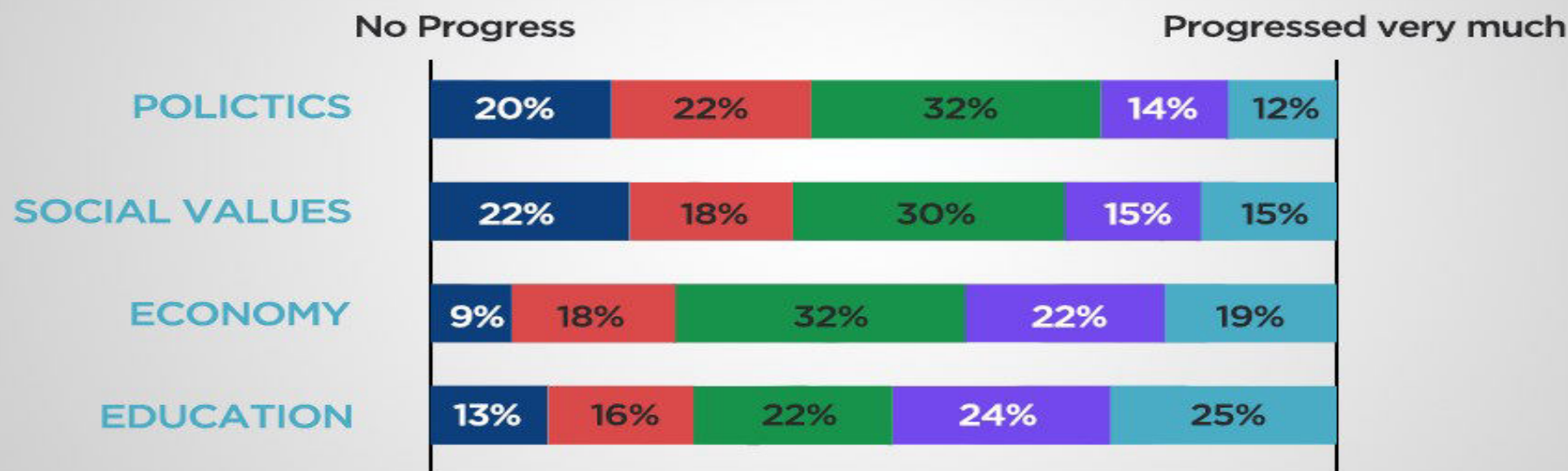

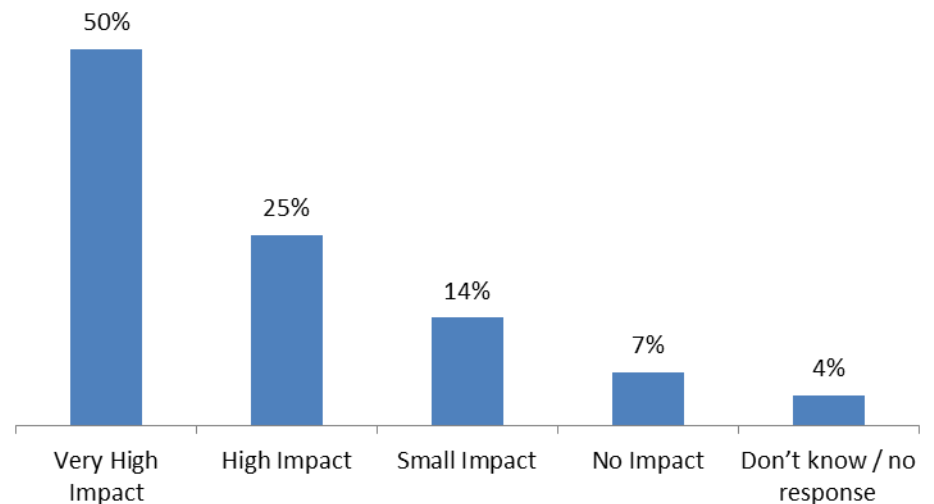

According to the survey in Pakistan carried out by Gallup Pakistan, majority (50%) Pakistanis believe that the election of new American President will have a very high impact on Pakistan.

A nationally representative sample of 1000 men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “How much, in your view, is the impact of American election on your country, on issues such as economic progress, trade, peace etc. In other words how much is the impact of American President on what happens in your country?” In response to this question, 50% said the American President will have a very high impact on Pakistan, 25% said high impact, 14% said small impact, 7% said no impact. 4% did not know or did not wish to respond. These results show that majority Pakistanis believe the outcome of the American election will tend to have a very high impact on the country in terms of economic progress, trade, peace etc.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1000 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 22 – August 28, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

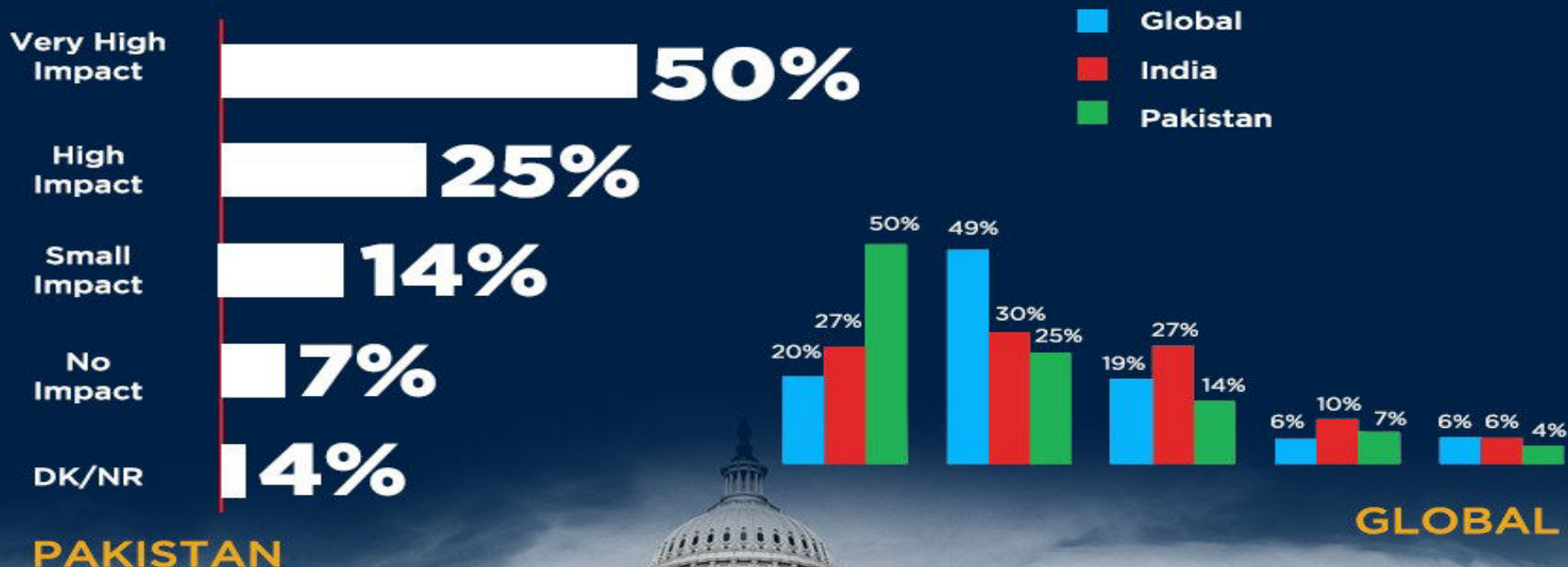

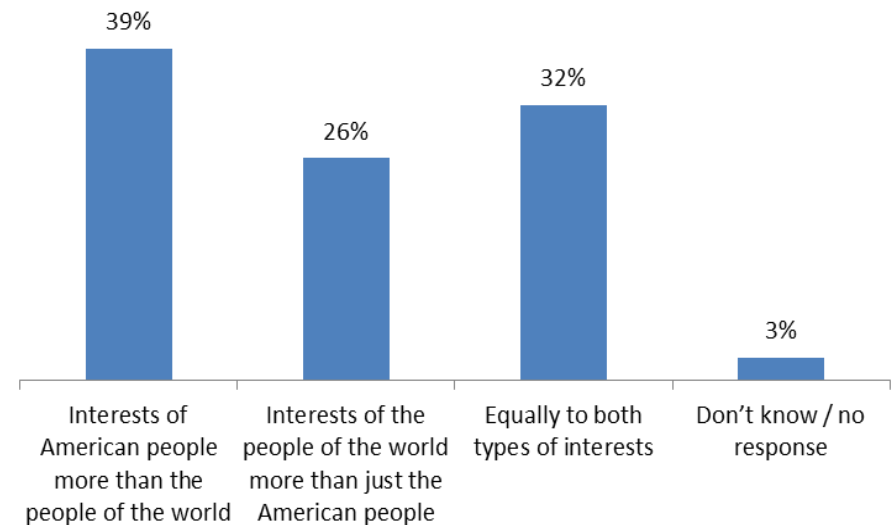

A nationally representative sample of 1000 men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Considering that America leads the global economy, should the new American President give priority to the economic interests of the American people, the interests of the people of the world as a whole, or equally to both?” In response to this question, 39% said the new American President should give priority to the economic interests of the American people more than that of the world, 26% said interests of the people of the world more than just the American people, 32% said equally to both types of interests. 3% did not know or did not respond.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1000 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 22 – August 28, 2016. 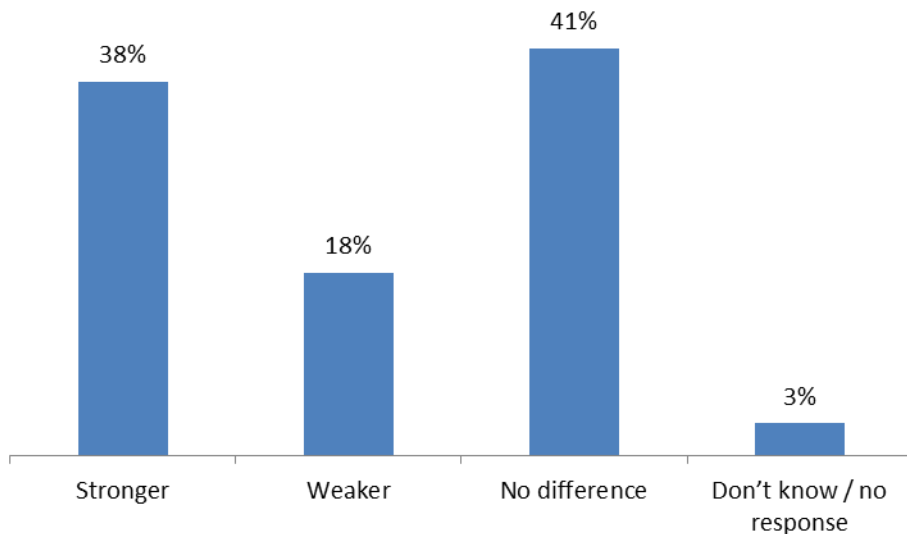

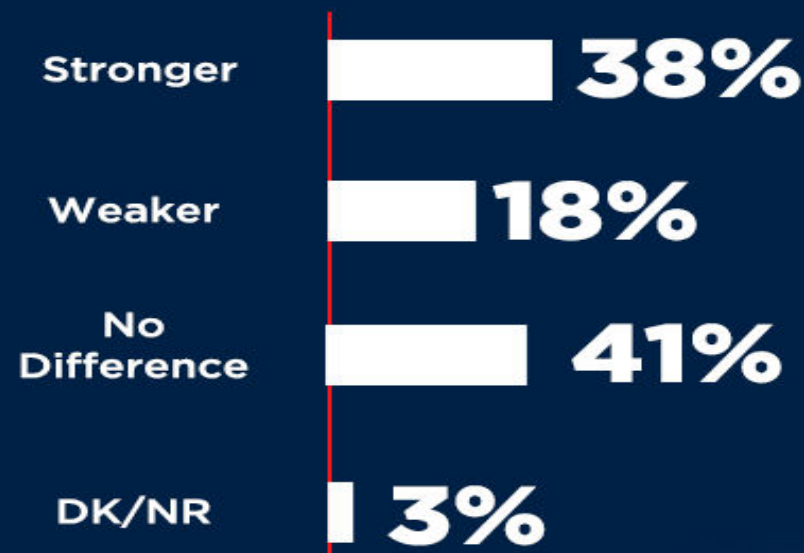

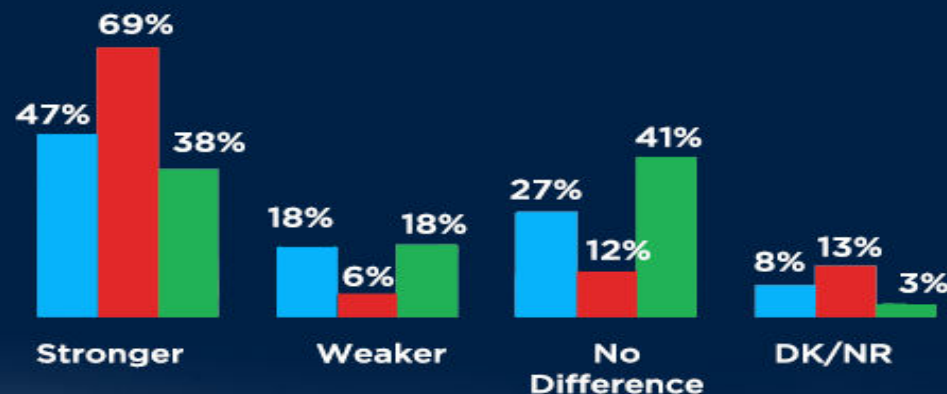
