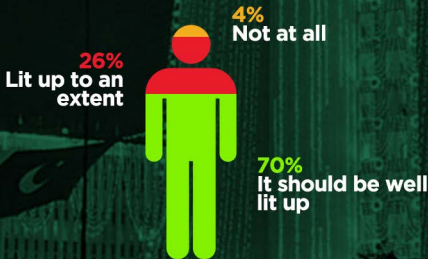

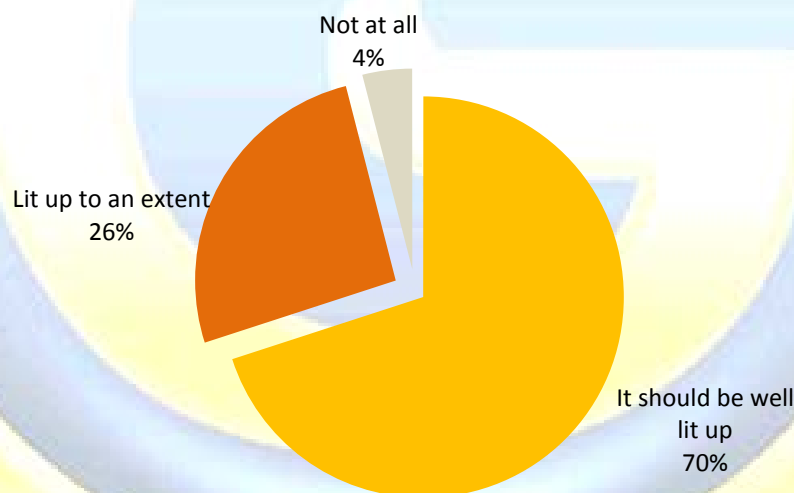
70 % Pakistanis think that government buildings should be lit up well at times of important ceremonies. (GRF POLL)

Islamabad, November 10, 2016

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 70% Pakistanis think that government buildings should be lit up well at times of important ceremonies.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think that at times of important ceremonies such as at the time of 14th August government buildings should be well lit up, while others say that they should be lit up to an extent. Yet others say that they should not be lit up at all. What do you think about this?” In response to this question, 70% said government buildings should be lit up well, 26% said they should be lit to an extent, while 4% said they should not be lit at all.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1817 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 8 – August 15, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
