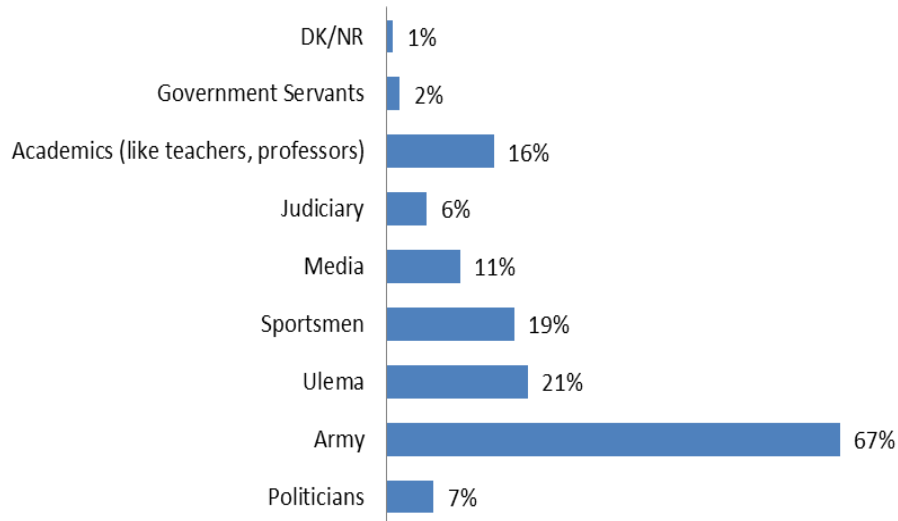

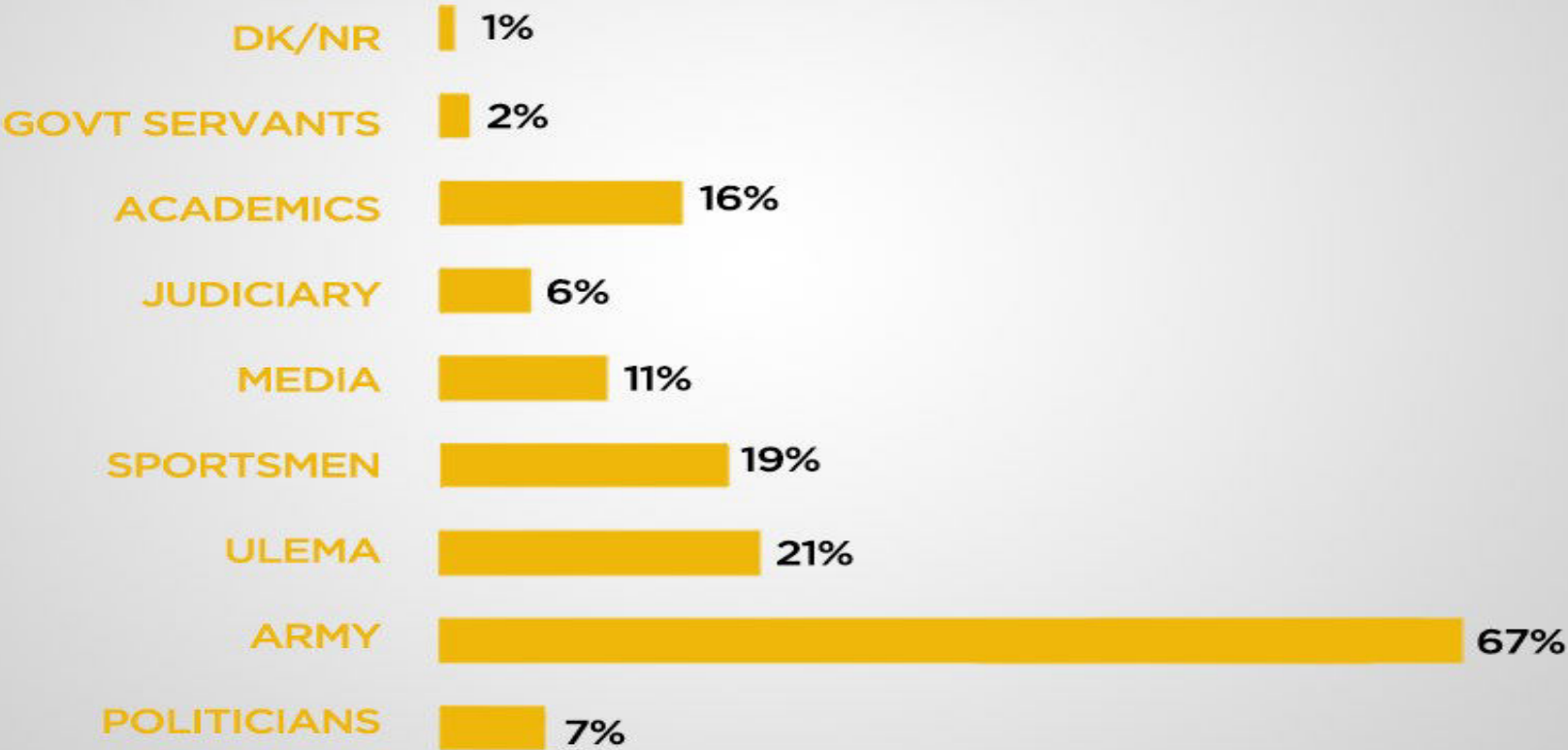

(Multiple responses allowed)” In response to this question, 7% said politicians, 67% said the army, 21% said Ulema, 19% said sportsmen, 11% said media, 6% said the judiciary, 16% said academics (like teachers, professors), and 2% said government servants. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1817 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 8 – August 15, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

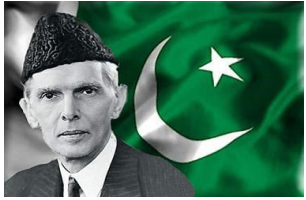

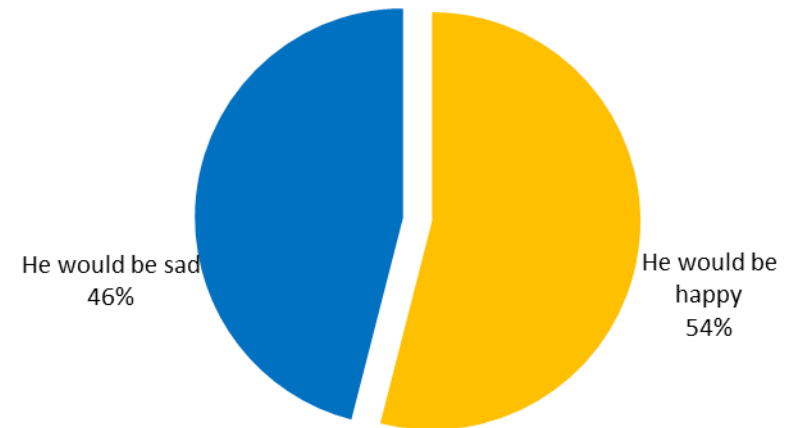


According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, more than half Pakistanis (54%) believe that if Quaid-e-Azam was alive, he would be happy about the current situation in Pakistan.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Kindly tell, if Quaid-e-Azam was alive, would he be happy or sad on the current situation of Pakistan?” In response to this question, 54% said he would be happy while 46% said he would be sad.

Bilal I Gilani, Executive Director Gallup Pakistan adds: “A similar poll was done in United States of America in context of USA’s founding fathers signers of Declaration of Independence in 2013 by Gallup USA (not related to Gallup Pakistan). Interestingly 71% Americans opined that the American founding fathers would be disappointed. 27% said they would be pleased.”

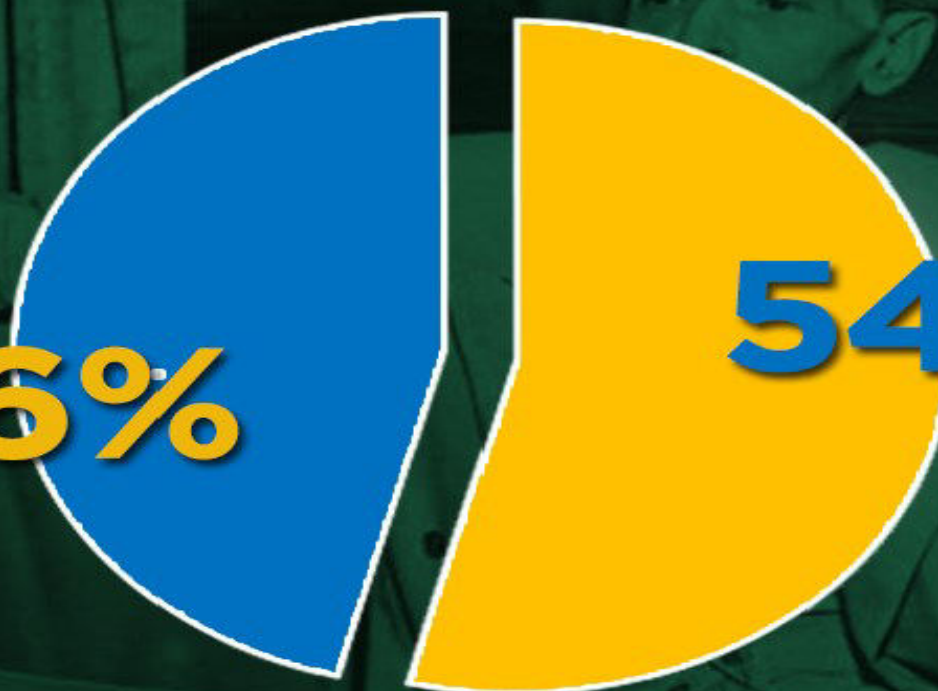

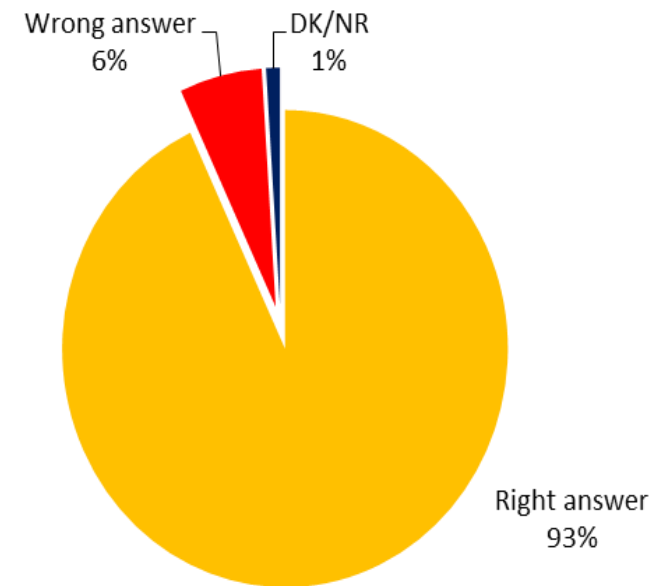

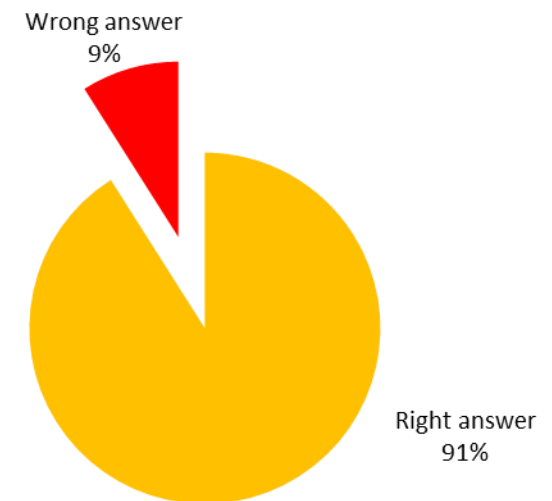

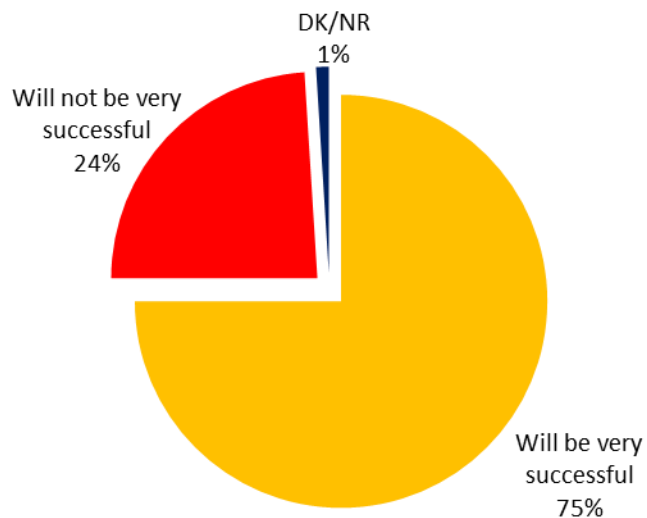

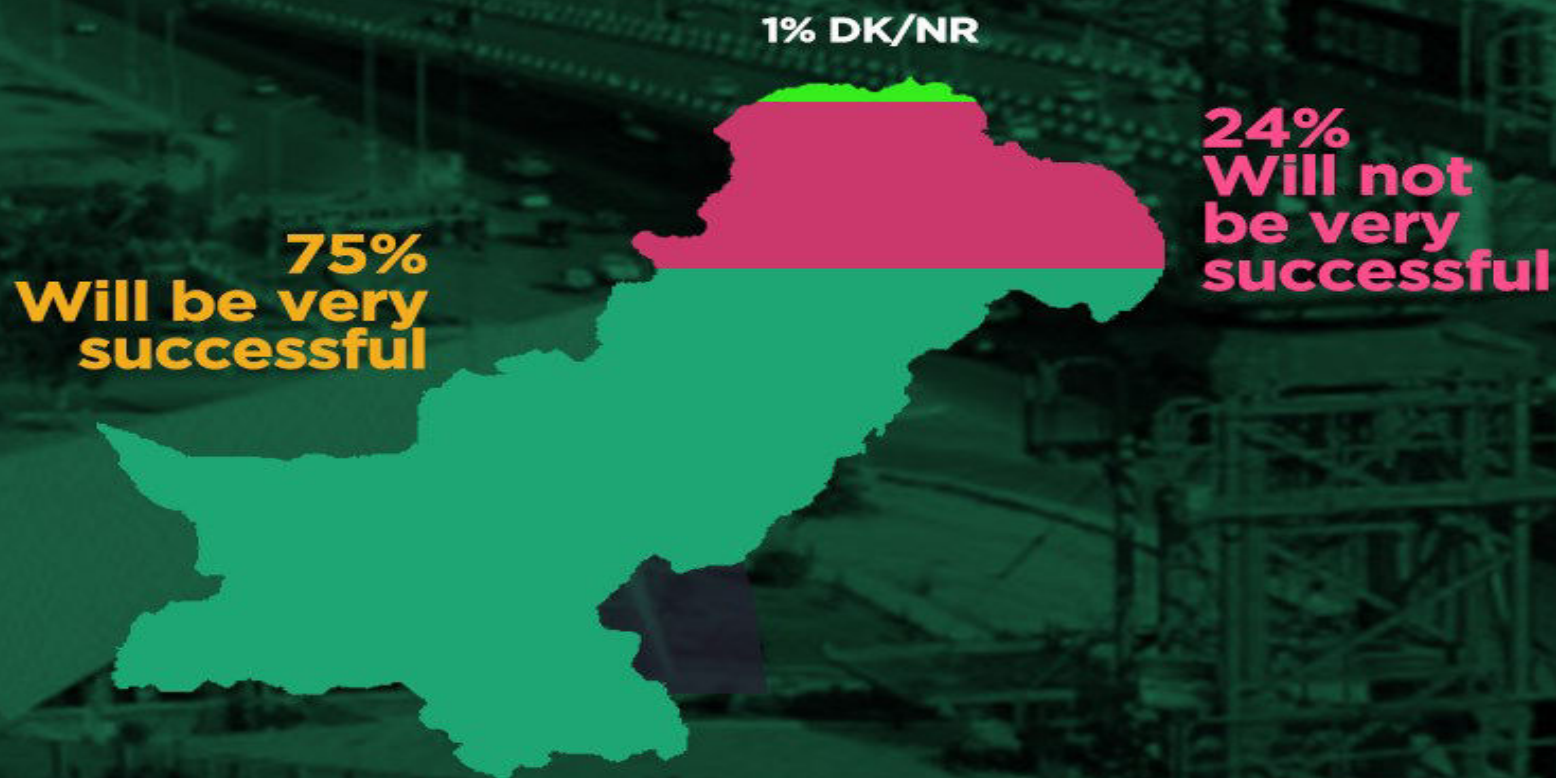
