The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1817 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 8 – August 15, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

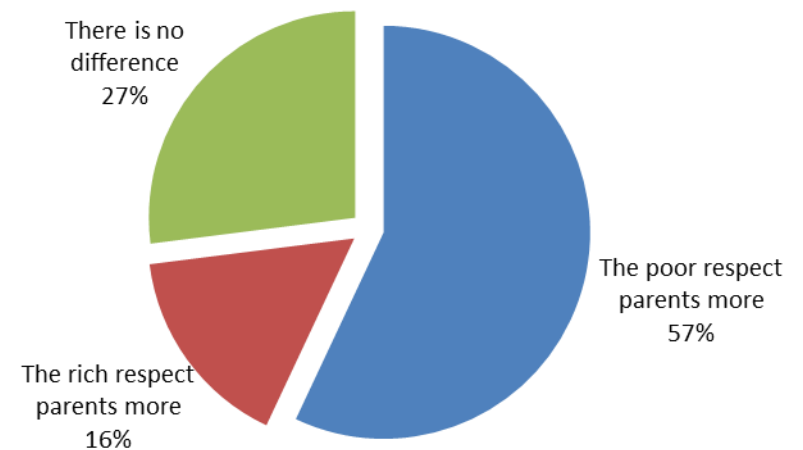

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 57% Pakistanis think the poor respect their parents more, 16% think the rich respect their parents more.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think poor people in our society respect their parents more, while some people think that rich people in our society respect their parents more. Yet others think that in respecting parents in our society, there is no difference between the rich or poor. What is your opinion?” In response to this question, 57% said the poor respect their parents more, 16% said that the rich respect their parents more, while 27% said there is no difference.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1817 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 8 – August 15, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.



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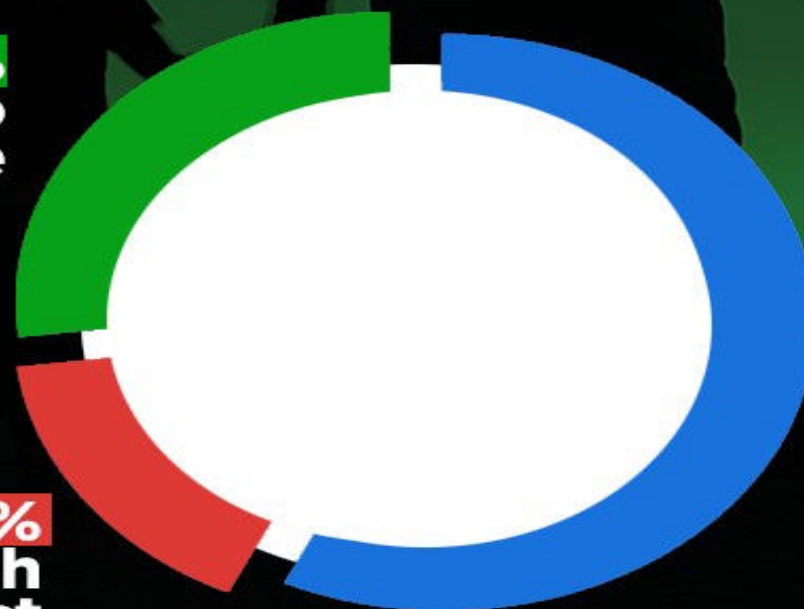

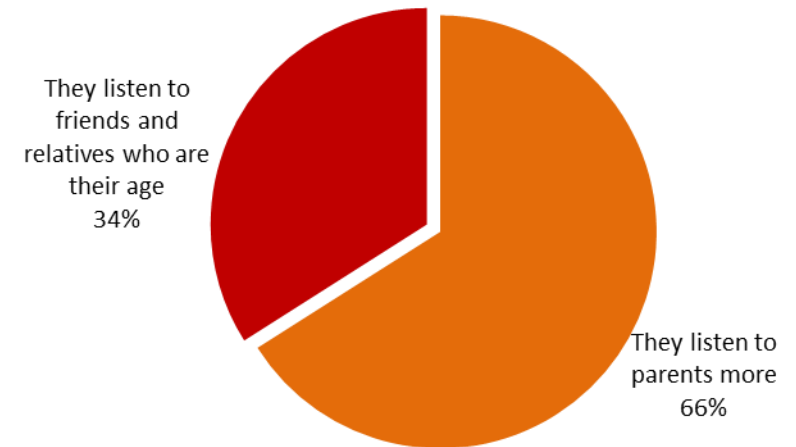

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think that these days in our society children give more importance to the advice and opinion of friends and relatives who are their age fellows than their parents, while other people say that such is not the case and children give more importance to the advice of their parents as opposed to friends and relatives who are their age fellows. What is your opinion on this?” In response to this question, 66% said they give more importance to the advice of their parents as opposed to friends and relatives who are their age fellows. 34% said they give more importance to the advice and opinion of friends and family who are their age fellows than their parents.

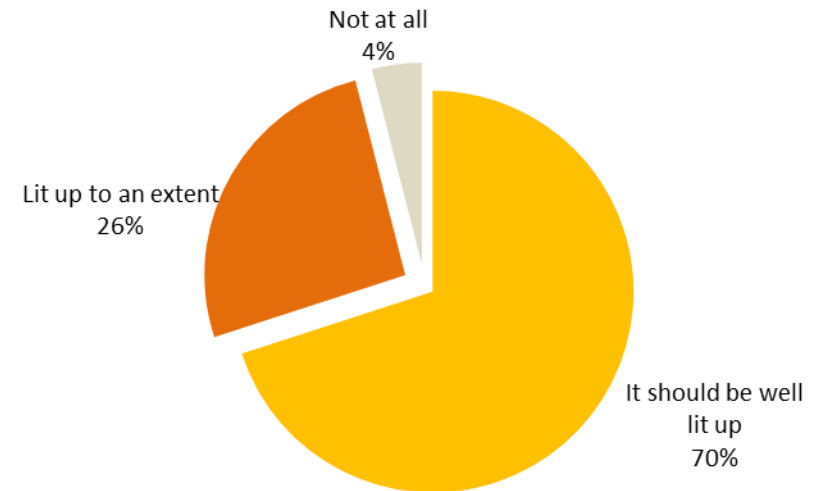

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think that at times of important ceremonies such as at the time of 14th August government buildings should be well lit up, while others say that they should be lit up to an extent. Yet others say that they should not be lit up at all. What do you think about this?” In response to this question, 70% said government buildings should be lit up well, 26% said they should be lit to an extent while 4% said they should not be lit at all.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1817 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 8 – August 15, 2016. 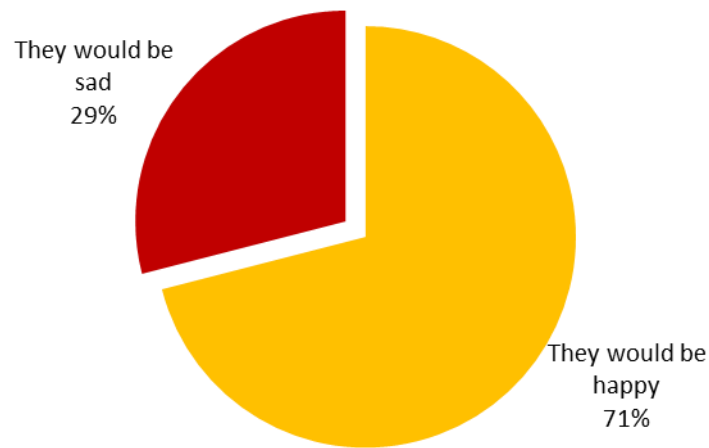

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people say that if the leaders of the Pakistan Movement for Independence (Pakistan Movement is the movement which Muslims started against the British in order to form a separate homeland) were alive, they would be happy with the current situation of the country, while others say they would be sad about it. What is your opinion on this?” In response to this question, 71% said they would be happy with the current situation of Pakistan, 29% said they would be sad.

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
