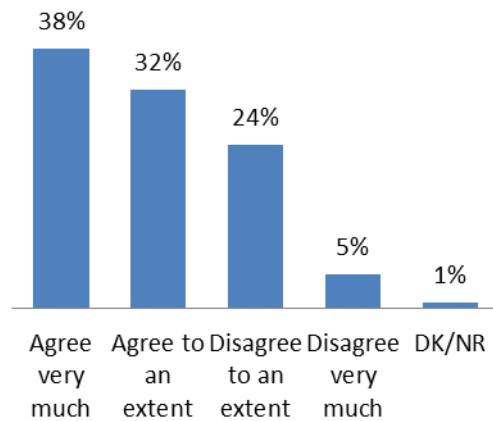

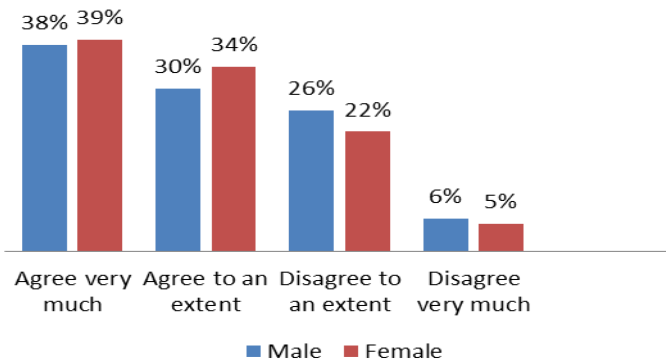

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, dominant majority of Pakistanis (70%) believe that women are getting more rights these days as compared to previous years.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked, "Some people think that women are getting more rights these days. For example, women make important decisions in the household like in what to buy, or how to educate or raise their children. Some people agree to this, while others disagree. What is your opinion?" In response to this question, 38% said they agree very much, 32% said agree to an extent, 24% said disagree to an extent, 5% said disagree very much. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

Gender breakdown

68% males and 73% females agree that women are getting more rights these days.

Comparing the two genders, 5% more females are of the view that women are getting more rights these days.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1812 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 15 – August 22, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

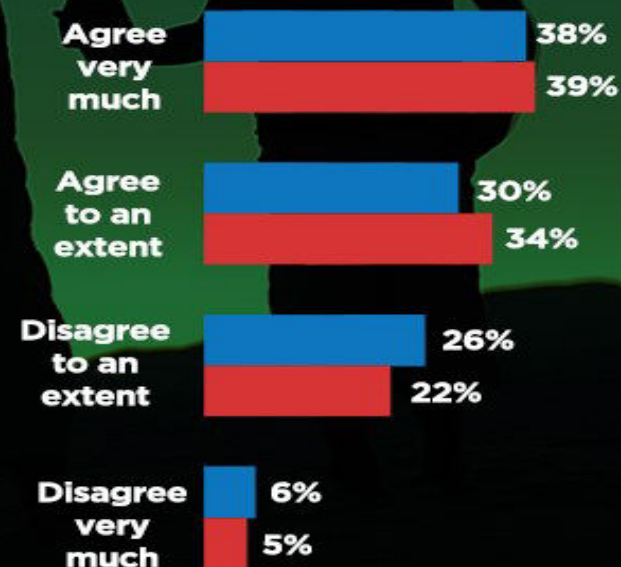

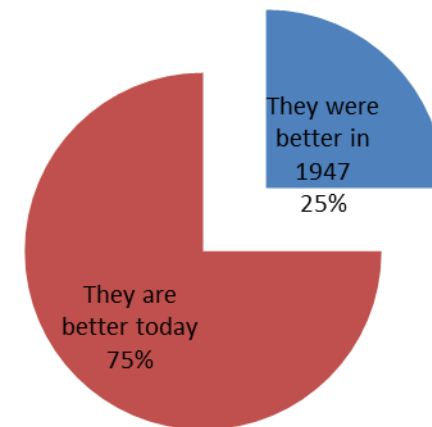

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1828 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 22 – August 29, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

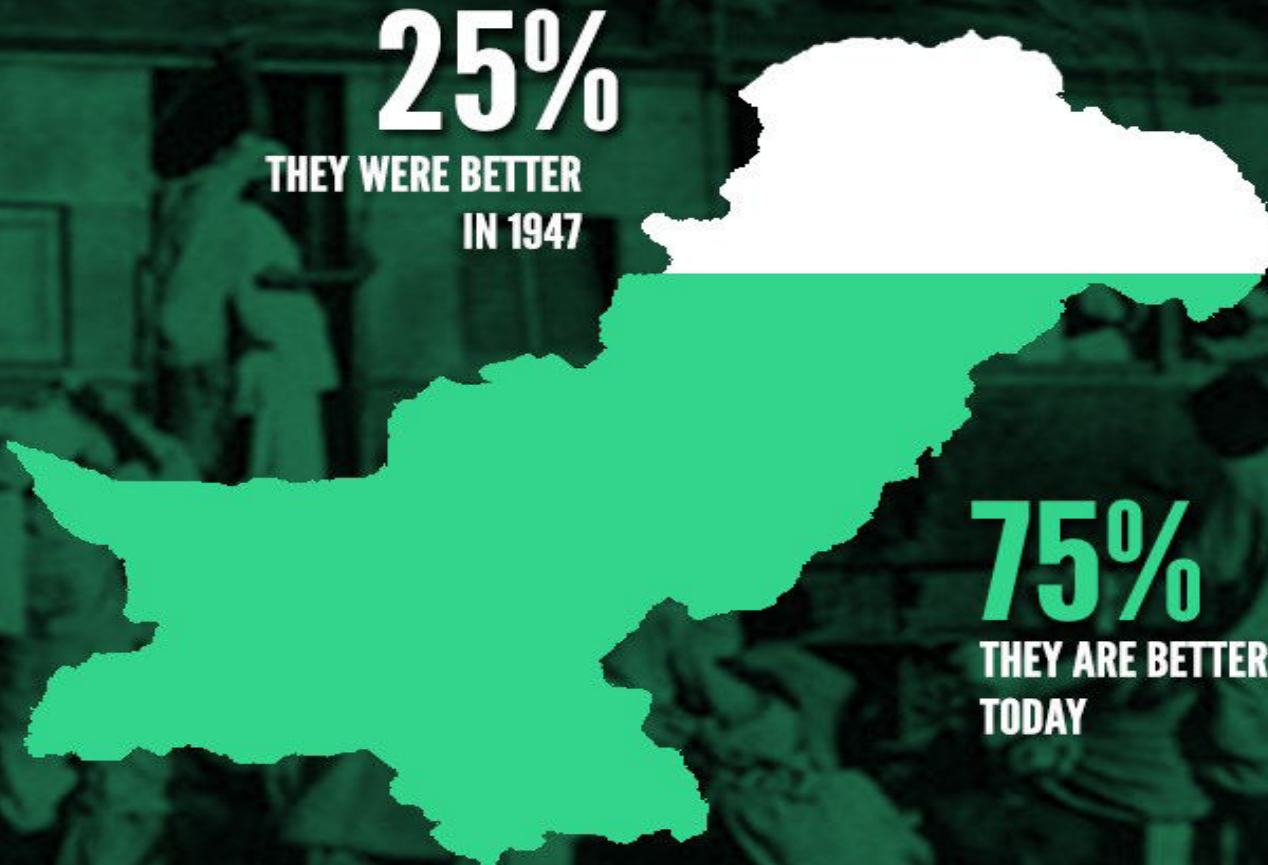

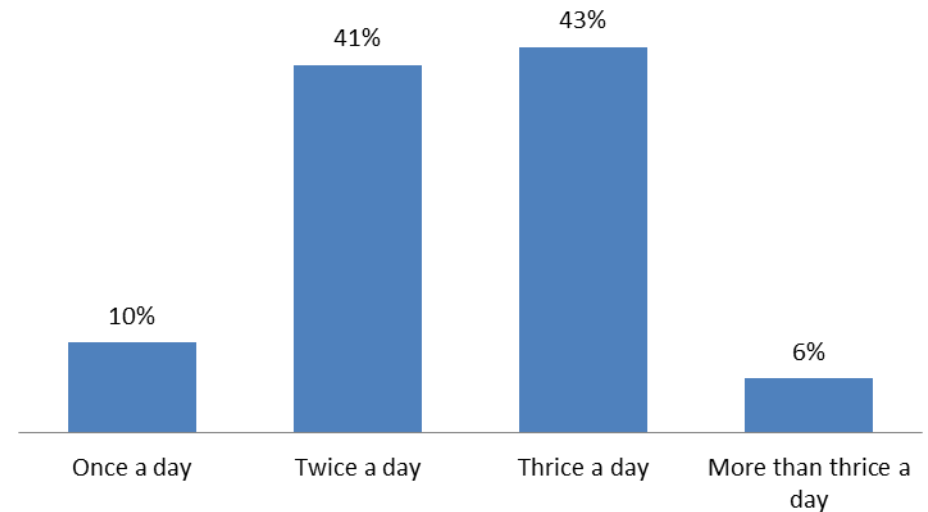

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked, “How many times do you eat during the day?” In response to this question, 10% said once a day, 41% said twice a day, 43% said thrice a day and 6% said more than thrice a day.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1892 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during August 29 – September 5, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

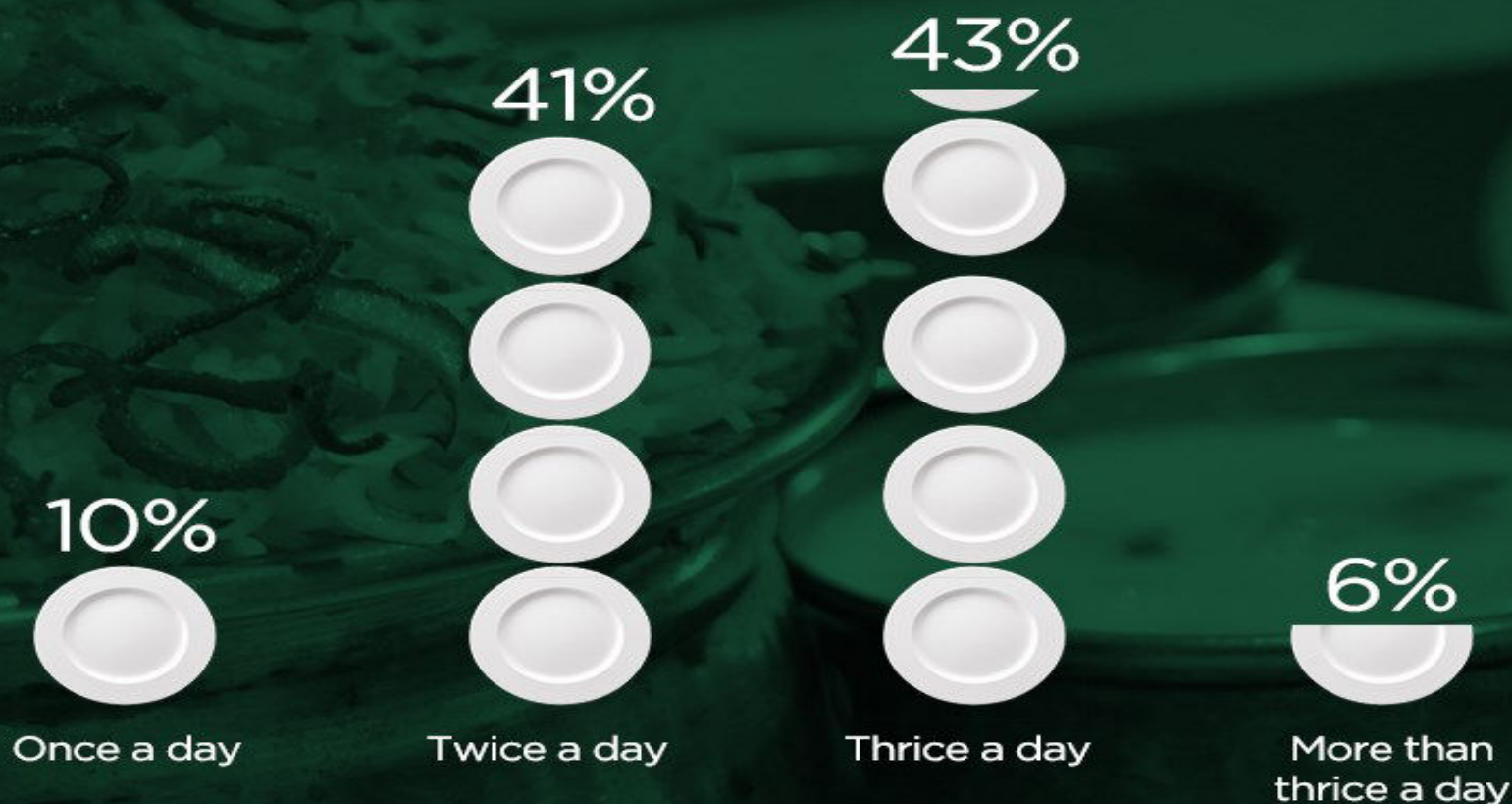

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 52% Pakistanis eat meat once a week or less.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked, “In your house usually how often do you eat meat?” In response to this question, 6% said almost every day, 41% said twice or thrice during the week, 26% said after a week, 12% said after every two weeks, 9% said once or twice a week, 2% said rarely, 3% said only on special occasions. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

Urban Rural Breakdown:

In urban areas, 6% said almost every day, 43% said twice or thrice during the week, 26% said after a week, 12% said after every two weeks, 8% said once or twice a week, 2% said rarely, 2% said only on special occasions. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond. In rural areas, 5% said almost every day, 36% said twice or thrice during the week, 28% said after a week, 13% said after every two weeks, 11% said once or twice a week, 2% said rarely, 5% said only on special occasions. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

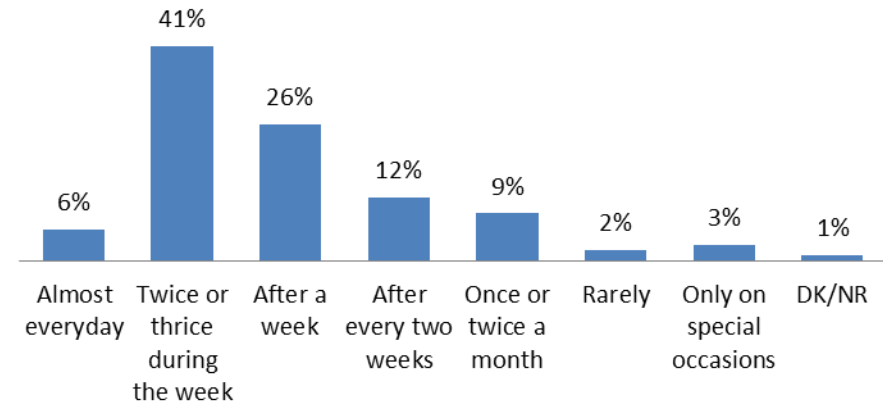
Comparing the two regions, 7% more urban dwellers eat meat twice or thrice during the week.

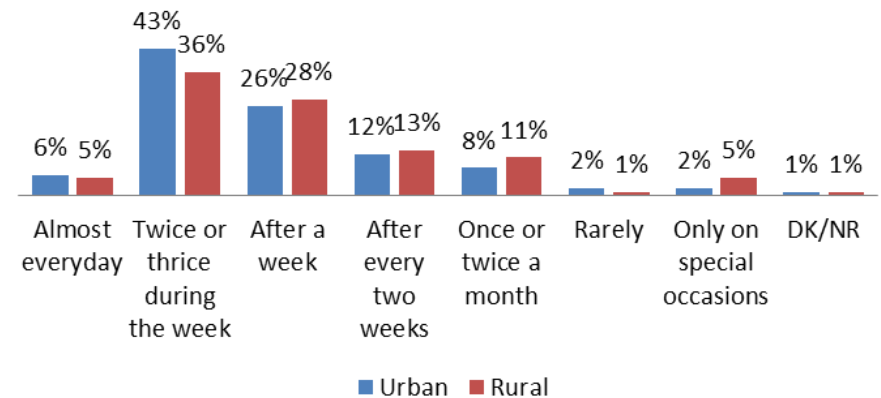

Urban Rural Breakdown



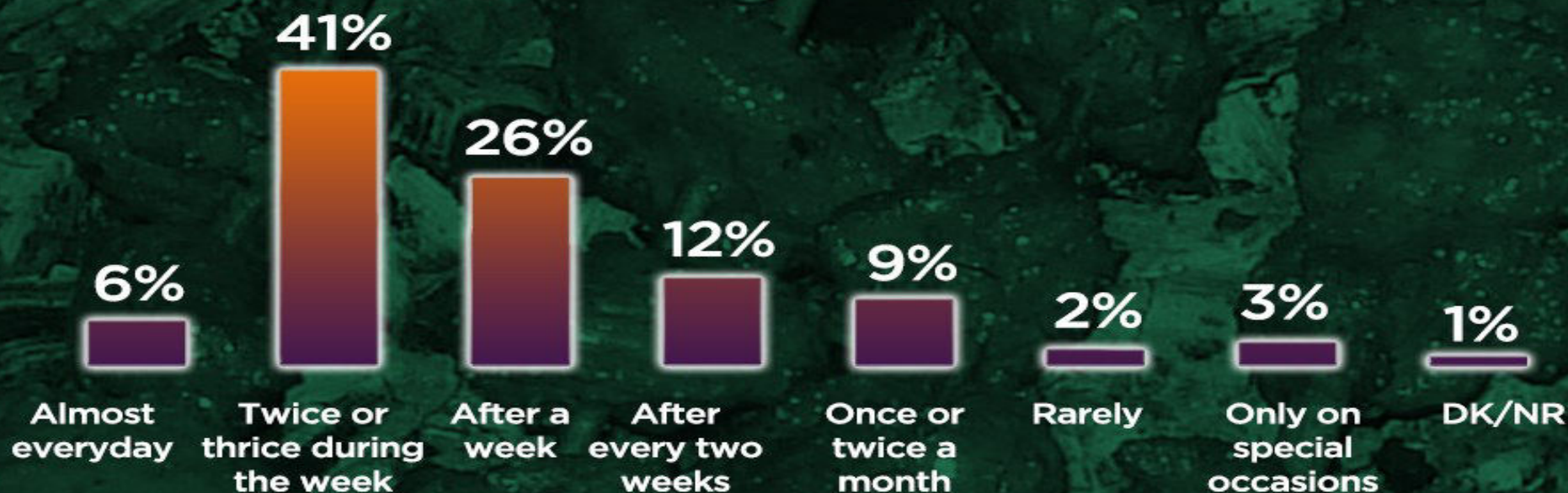

In your house usually how often do you eat meat?

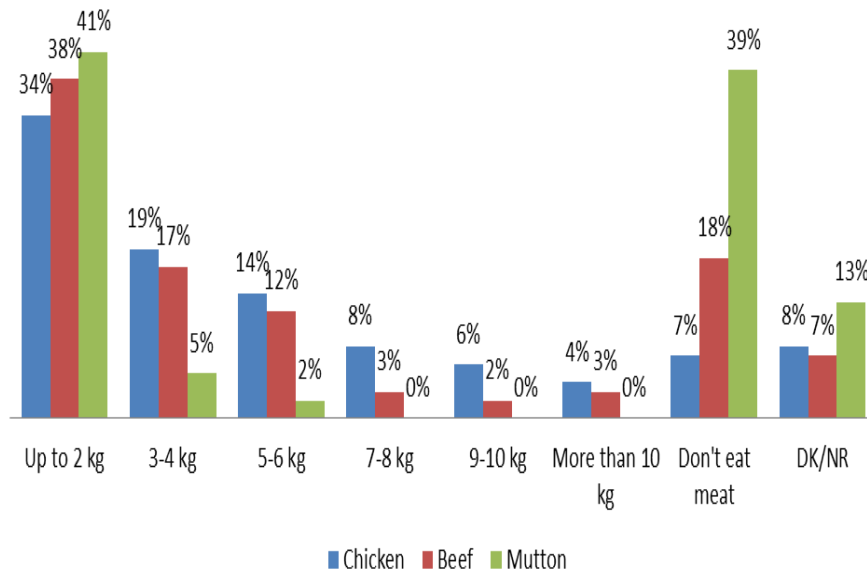

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, majority Pakistanis consume up to two kilograms of different meats (chicken, beef, and mutton) in a month.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces were asked, “In your household, what is the amount of different meats consumed in a month?” In response to this question for chicken, 34% said they consume up to 2 kg, 19% said 3-4 kg, 14% said 5-6 kg, 8% said 7-8 kg, 6% said 9-10 kg, 4% said more than 10 kg, 7% do not consume chicken and 8% did not know or did not wish to respond. For beef, 38% said they consume up to 2 kg, 17% said 3-4 kg, 12% said 5-6 kg, 3% said 7-8 kg, 2% said 9-10 kg, 3% said more than 10 kg, 18% do not consume beef and 7% did not know or did not wish to respond. For mutton, 41% said they consume up to 2 kg, 5% said 3-4 kg, 2% said 5-6 kg, 39% do not consume mutton and 13% did not know or did not wish to respond.
