Kashmir Day

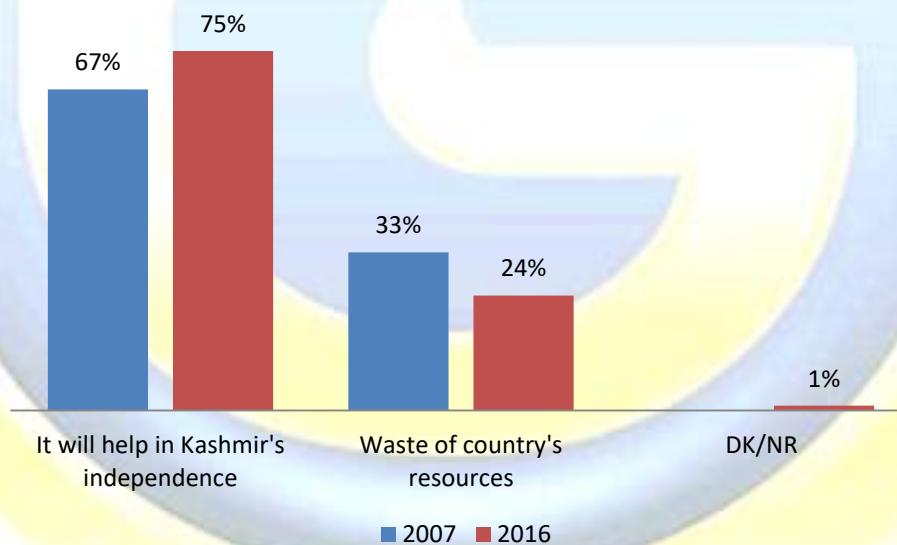
According to a Gallup Pakistan National Survey conducted in the year 2007 (9 years ago) respondents were asked, "Some people think that celebrating Kashmir Day will help in Kashmir's independence, while others think country's resources are wasted celebrating it. What is your opinion?" To this, 67% said it will help in Kashmir's independence, 33% said waste of country's resources.

Comparative Picture: The question was asked again in 2016 to enable a concrete comparison. In 2016, 75% said it will help in Kashmir's independence, 24% said waste of country's resources. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

According to public opinion, there has been an 8% increase in the proportion of Pakistanis who believe celebrating Kashmir Day will help in Kashmir's independence and a 9% decrease in the proportion of Pakistanis who believe celebrating Kashmir Day is a waste of country's resources.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision making in Pakistan.

Who are Non Supportive of Kashmir Cause?

Of the 24% Pakistanis who believe celebration of Kashmir Day as waste of resources, 22% are men and 25% are women; 24% are residents of Punjab, 19% are residents of Sindh, 32% are residents of KPK and 11% are residents of Balochistan.
