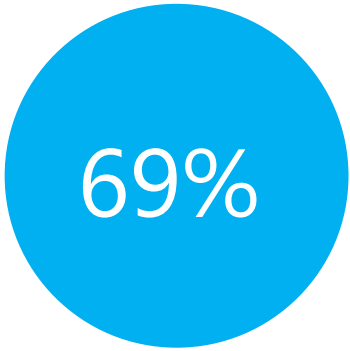

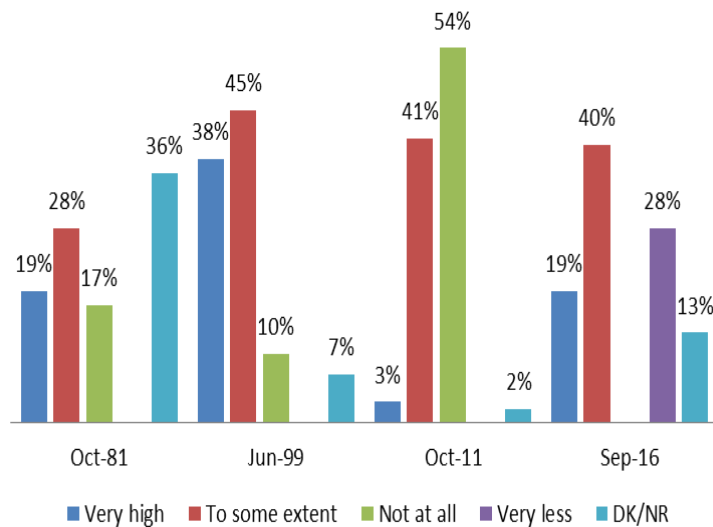

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, more than half Pakistanis (59%) believe there is a possibility (very high or somewhat) of war between India and Pakistan these days.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked in September 2016, “What is the possibility of war between India and Pakistan these days?” In response to this question, 19% said very high, 40% said to some extent, while 28% said very less. 13% did not know or did not wish to respond.

Trend Analysis:

The same question was asked in October 1981. In 1981, 19% said very high, 28% said to some extent, while 17% said not at all. 36% did not know or did not wish to respond.

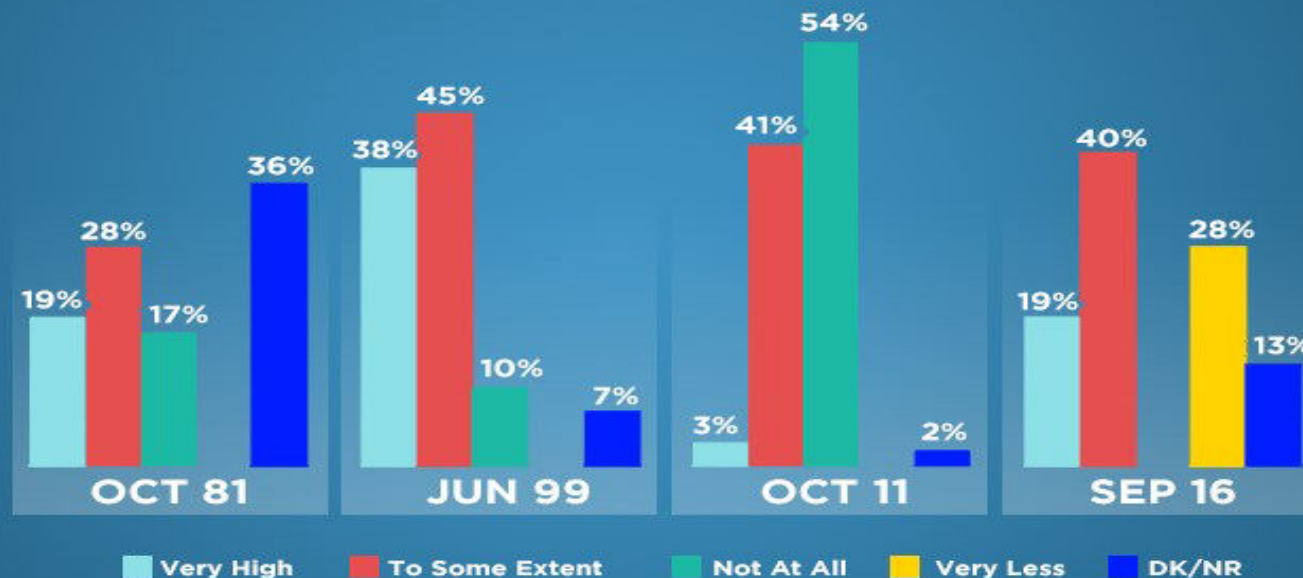
In June 1999, 38% said very high, 45% said to some extent, while 10% said not at all. 7% did not know or did not wish to respond.

In October 2011, 3% said very high, 41% said to some extent, while 54% said not at all. 2% did not know or did not wish to respond.

Comparing the results over the last 35 years, there has been a 12% increase in the proportion of Pakistanis who believe there is a possibility (very high or somewhat) of war between the two countries these days. (1981 vs. 2016)

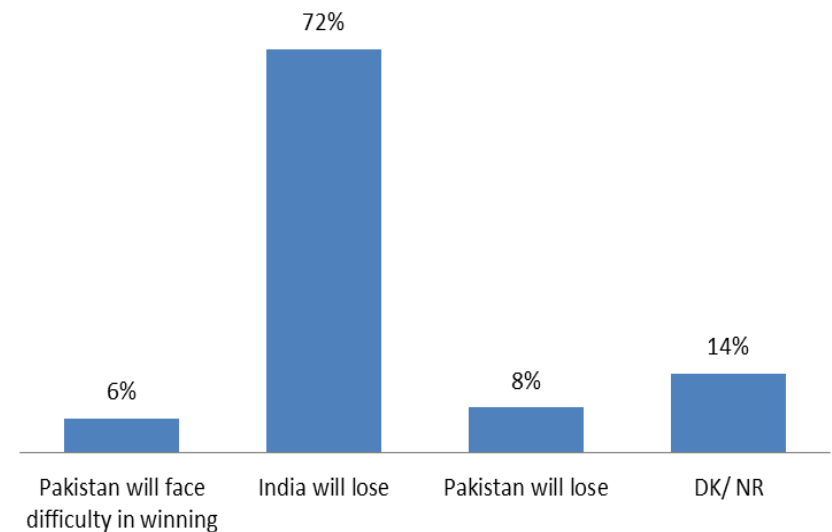

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “If war erupts between India and Pakistan, in your opinion what will be the result?” In response to this question, 6% said Pakistan will face difficulty in winning, 72% said India will lose, 8% said Pakistan will lose. 14% did not know or did not wish to respond.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1835 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during September 26– October 3, 2016. 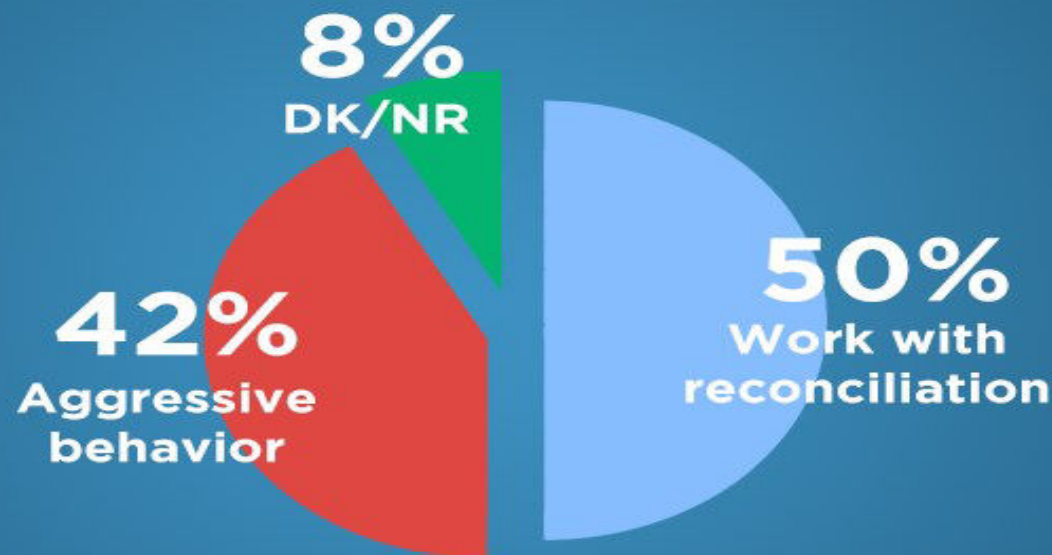

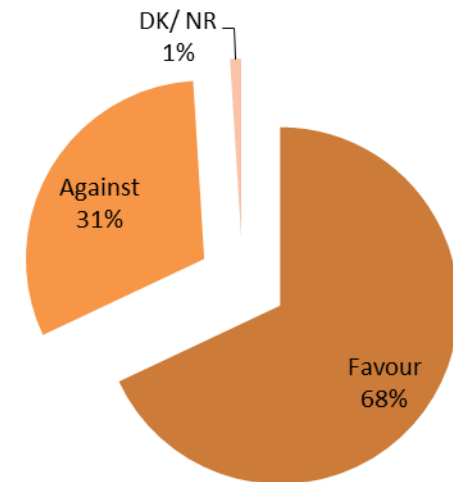

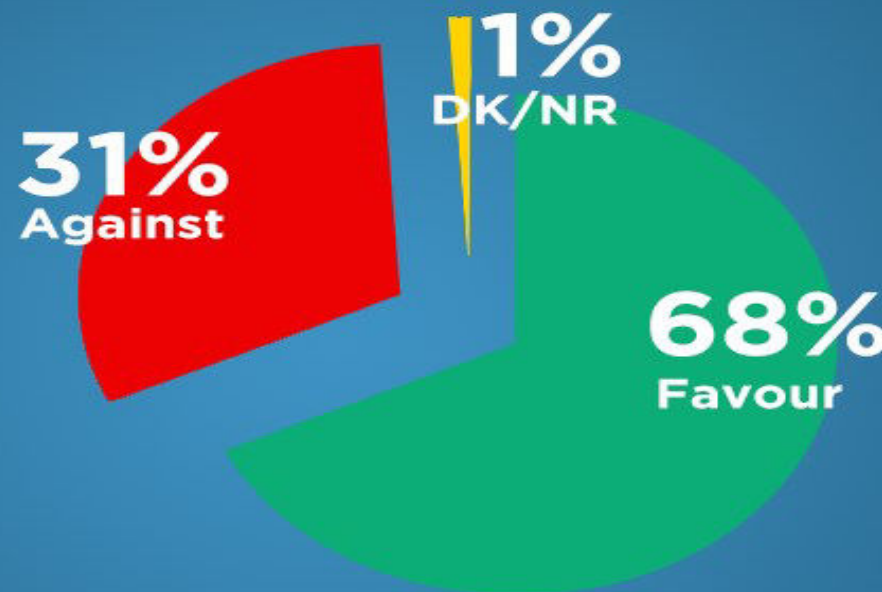

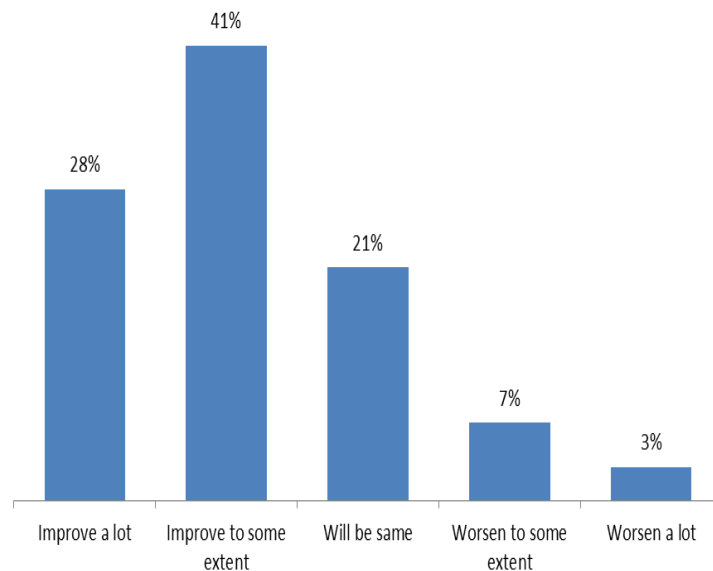

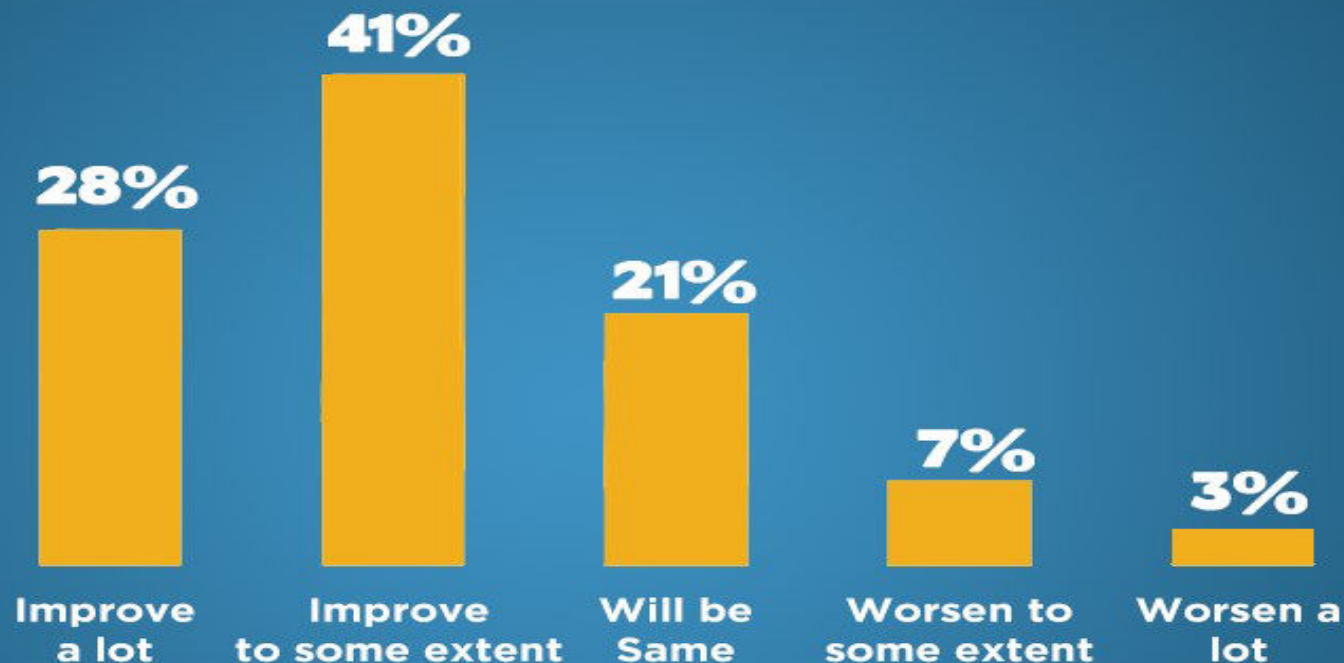

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 2 in 3 Pakistanis (69%) believe their household's economic situation will improve (very much or somewhat) compared to their ancestors.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Please think with reference to your future economic situation, and tell us do you think your economic situation will be better or worse compared with your ancestors. Some people say their household's economic situation will improve compared to their ancestors, while according to some it will worsen. What is your opinion?" In response to this question, 28% said improve a lot, 41% said improve to some extent, 21% said will be same, 7% said worsen to some extent, while 3% said worsen a lot.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1871 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during October 3– October 10, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 per cent at 95% confidence level.
