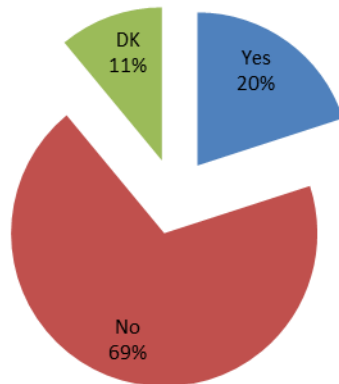

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 1/5th Pakistanis say that Indian content is still available on TV sets in their area.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Due to the recent tension between India and Pakistan, PEMRA, the media regulatory authority in Pakistan has intensified the restriction against India channels and Indian dramas and has imposed a complete ban on all satellite television and FM radio channels in the country to air Indian content. Despite the ban, some cable operators are still giving coverage to Indian channels. Are Indian channels being aired in your house or area?” In response to this question, 20% said yes, 69% said no, while 11% did not know.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1843 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during October 24– October 31, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

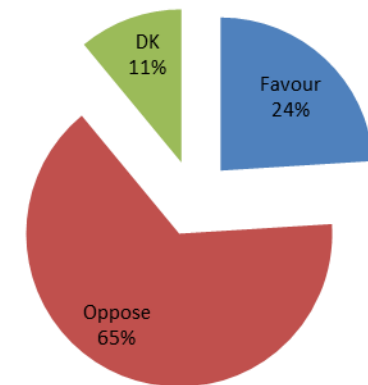

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, majority Pakistanis (65%) oppose airing of Indian content on Pakistani media channels.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people are in favour of airing Indian channels and dramas, while others oppose. Personally, do you favour or oppose airing of Indian content?” In response to this question, 24% favour airing of Indian content whereas 65% oppose for the same. 11% did not know or did not wish to respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1843 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during October 24– October 31, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

Some people are in favour of airing Indian channels and dramas, while others oppose. Personally, do you favour or oppose airing of Indian content?

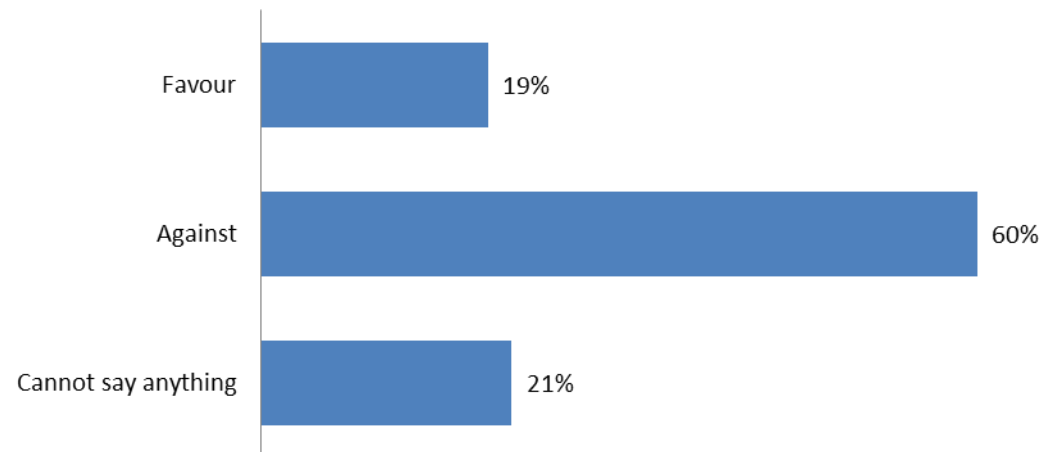

60% Pakistanis oppose Pakistani artists working in Indian movies and dramas.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 60% Pakistanis oppose Pakistani artists working in Indian movies and dramas.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Recently, Pakistan and India have started to make movies and dramas jointly. Some people are against the working of Pakistani artists in Indian movies and dramas, while others are in favour. Are you in favour or against the working of Pakistani artists in India?” In response to this question, 19% are in favour of Pakistani artists working in Indian movies and channels, while 60% are against it and 21% said they cannot say anything.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1843 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during October 24– October 31, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

60% PAKISTANIS OPPOSE PAKISTANI ARTISTS WORKING IN INDIAN MOVIES AND DRAMAS.



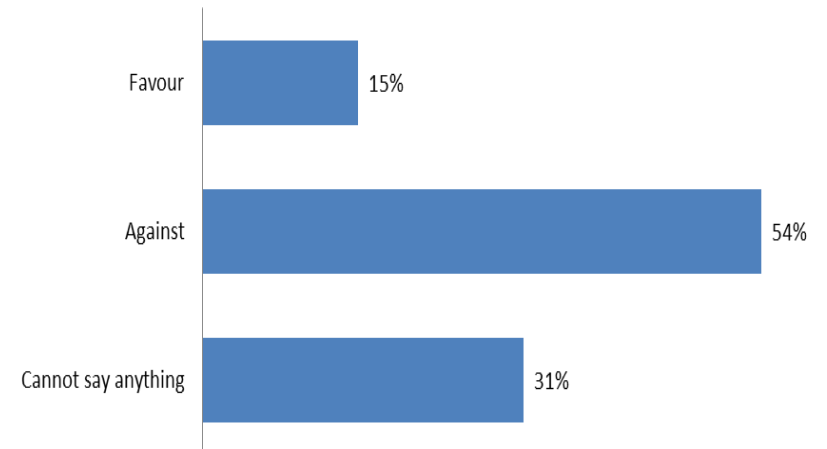

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Some people are against the working of Indian artists in Pakistani movies and dramas, while others are in favour. What is your opinion on this?" In response to this question, 15% are in favour of Indian artists working in Pakistani movies and channels, while 54% are against it and 31% said they cannot say anything.

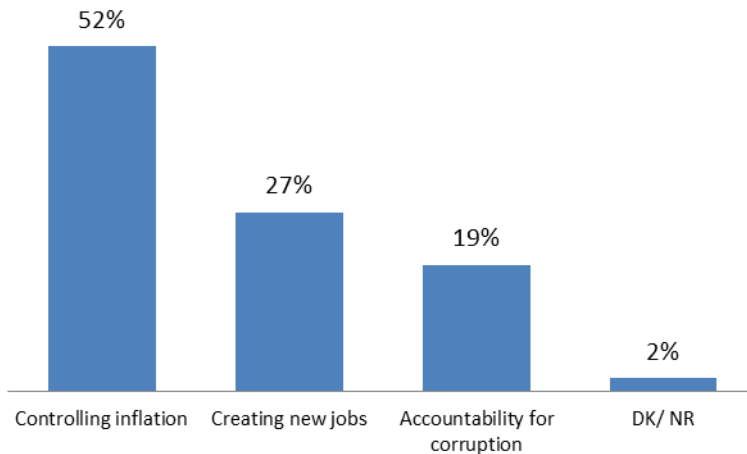

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 1 in 2 Pakistanis say the Prime Minister should first control inflation; 27% say he should create new jobs.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Suppose the Prime Minister asks you on telephone that which of the following three tasks he should do first. What would you suggest?" In response to this question, 52% said controlling inflation, 27% said creating new jobs while 19% said accountability for corruption. 2% did not know or did not wish to respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1872 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during October 17–October 24, 2016. Error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 per cent at 95% confidence level.
